Maines Formally Enters Race For Office of Judge

Judge Schelle Maines, it was announced several weeks ago, will be a candidate for the office of county judge. In this issue Mr. Maines makes formal announcement of his intention to seek that office in the primary election of June 3.

Judge Maines, who was for some time municipal judge, is not a stranger in Seminole county having been a resident of Sanford since the creation of this county in 1913. He has been practicing law since July, 1915, and has filled the office of prosecuting attorney of the county court for seven years.

Judge Maines is much encouraged by the support he has received thus far in his race, he declared Friday. Indications are favorable and friends have assured him of further support, he stated.

Jump To Escape Fire And Fatally Injured

MONTPELIER, Vt., Feb. 15.—Two persons were killed and the nine missing are believed to be dead on account of fire which destroyed an office building on Main Street Friday. A number of others are seriously injured. The loss is estimated at \$300,000. Both the dead sustained fatal injuries when they jumped from a window and missed the life net.

The Jalisco front, has been decisively defeated and is in flight, the Mexican embassy announced Thursday.

"With him," it was added, "the armies of Generals Dieguez, Garcia, Arnaiz, Ramirez and Garrido also fell. The battle occurred near La Piedra and ended yesterday after 11 hours of the most intense fighting. The casualties were extremely heavy.

"At the same time General Guadalupe Sanchez, one of the few rebels in the field since the evacuation of Vera Cruz, was defeated in an attack in Santa Lucrecia. He had been trying for five days to take the federal garrison. He has taken refuge in the mountains and is being pursued.

"Guadalajara, capital of Jalisco and long the rebel stronghold of Estrada adherents, was formally occupied Tuesday. The rebel garrison of the city, a comparatively small unit, fled toward Colima."

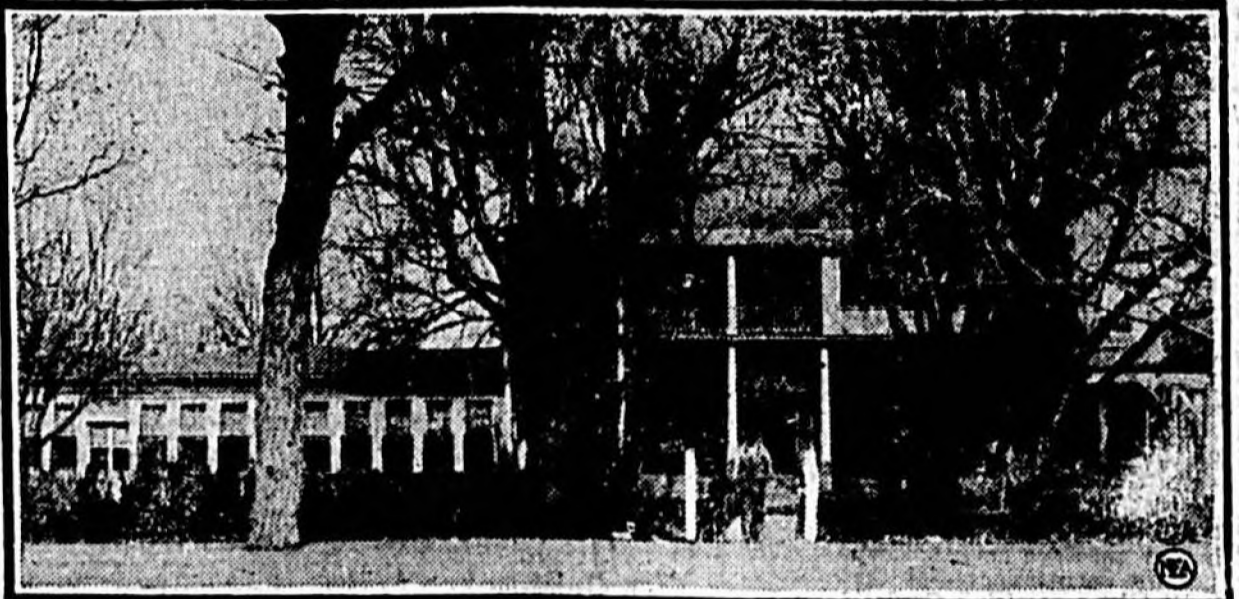
A large delegation representing men from all over the state has arrived already and indications are that many more will arrive before the exposition opens on Saturday.

methods by which former Interior Secretary Fall put into operation his leasing policy, and provided the investigators with several new sensations.

John C. Shaffer, publisher of the Chicago Post, and several other newspapers, testified that Fall told him in the same month he entered the cabinet that he would lease Teapot Dome to Harry P. Sinclair.

Says Got One-Eighth
He himself, Mr. Shaffer said, got a one-eighth share in the \$1,000,000 Sinclair paid the Pioneer Oil Company in connection with the Teapot deal and through an advance agreement with Fall was promised in addition 200 acres in Teapot Dome.

E. C. Finney, assistant secretary of the interior, testified that the Fall leases were negotiated privately and that not even the department's own solicitor was asked for an opinion as to their legality.

A letter written before the contracts were signed, by H. Foster Bain, director of the bureau of mines, saying he understood Attorney General Daugherty had given an "informal and verbal" opinion upholding the leasing policy, was put into the committee record.

Authorizes Search for Files
As a result the committee authorized a search of the files of the department of justice.

Beyond all this, Mr. Mellon asserted, there have been periodical audits of the accounts of paper stocks held by the bureau and on which the securities are printed. These audits, he explained, have covered the entire period since the beginning of the war and no discrepancies were found, he asserted, "beyond the petty discrepancies that would naturally be expected in transactions involving several hundred million pieces of paper."

Dont's Issued To Drivers by Public Safety Committee

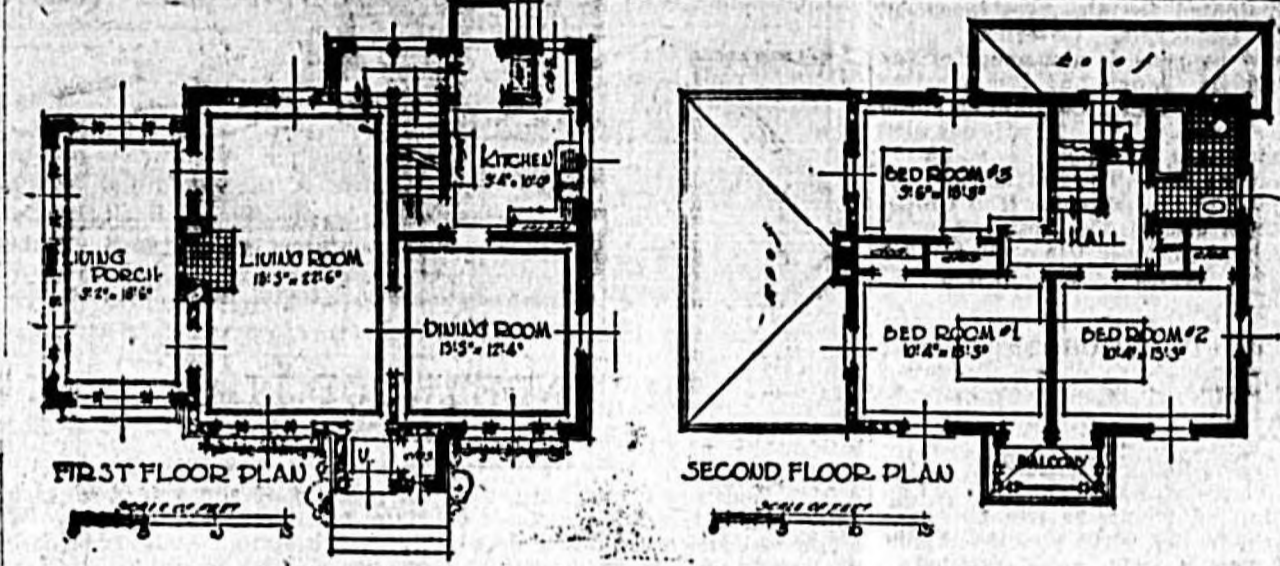
TALLAHASSEE, Feb. 15.—Thirty "don'ts" for autoists, recommended by the public safety committee of the Florida League of Municipalities and adopted by the league at its last meeting here, are to be broadcasted in the state as a safety measure:

1. Don't park on the wrong side of the road.
2. Don't back up without blowing your horn.
3. Don't speed up when anyone asks for the road.
4. Don't pass anyone on a curve.
5. Don't pass anyone at a blind street intersection.
6. Don't speed in school zone.
7. Don't run over a child.
8. Don't drive on the wrong side of the road.
9. Don't try to mix whisky and gasoline; they won't mix.
10. Don't forget to dim your lights when passing another car.
11. Don't forget that careful driving brings its own reward.
12. Don't forget that the pedestrian has as much right to street crossings as you have.
13. Don't forget to be courteous to the other driver.
14. Don't cut curves too sharp.
15. Don't neglect your brakes as they are very handy at times.
16. Don't hog the road as you may get hit sometime.
17. Don't forget to signal when turning to the left and when stopping.
18. Don't forget your oil and gas.
19. Don't leave your engine running when parking your car.

20. Don't pull into the road without looking back.
21. Don't leave your car unlocked.
22. Don't violate traffic laws.
23. Don't forget that the man on your right has "Right of Way."

—AN ECONOMICAL HOUSE THAT WILL NEED NO REPAIRS—

When building costs are high, one should build well and permanently, that is, sound substantial construction around an economical plan, so as to avoid the expense of repairs and also to make every foot of floor space count as usable room.

The house herewith illustrated embodies these requirements.

The construction is of hollow tile stuccoed outside and plastered inside, the roof is slate. The only work which will require painting is the small amount of wood trim.

As to the plan arrangement, the architects have worked it out along lines of real economy. The entrance is into a small vestibule with coat closet adjoining, thus the usual hall space is given over to the living room.

The stairs go up from the rear of the living room while also serving the kitchen, giving the advantage of a service stairway without the extra cost.

The refrigerator is located in a closet off the rear entry.

On the second floor are three bedrooms, a bath and plenty of closets, all conveniently arranged about the small central hall.

A stairway leads from the second floor hall to a generous attic.

A small balcony over the front entrance connects to the two main bed rooms of the second floor, it is a convenience for these rooms as well as making an attractive feature on the exterior.

A cellar extends under the entire house, except the living porch, and here is the laundry, heater and coal space and such.

The house sets high enough above the ground to give a light, dry cellar and to avoid excessive excavating.

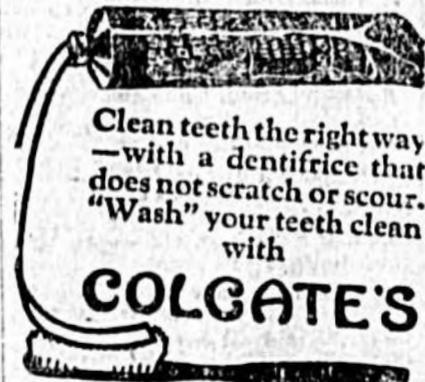
various New York and Brooklyn dailies. At this time Bach only weighed 122 pounds.
