GATORS DEFEAT AGGIES AND GET IN CONFERENCE

Vanderbilt Eleven Downs Strong Minnesota Team; Oglethorpe Wins From Mercer By A Big Score

ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 24.—The Alligators of the University of Florida by defeating the Mississippi Aggies 27 to 0, Saturday moved into ranks of Southern conference eleven undefeated in that select circle. The victory in Montgomery gave the Everglades representatives a record of one victory and a tie in two conference games. Teams with clean conference slates include Georgia, Alabama, Washington and Lee and Florida.

The Vanderbilt Commodores became admirals in an afternoon by defeating the great Minnesota team 16 to one week after the Gators had topped Illinois. The Southerners used a carefully coordinated forward passing attack to advantage and Wakefield's trusty toe also contributed to the victory.

Oglethorpe caught the ferocious Mercer Bear in a trap and won 35 to 0. The Macon team entered the game favored in many quarters to win, its stock having been bullish instead of bearish following a ten to nothing triumph over Florida. The score came as a shock pre-game forecasts suggesting a struggle to the bitter end with a point or so either way deciding the affair. Oglethorpe intercepted two Mercer passes in the closing moments to pave the way for touchdowns. The game will have an important bearing on the S. I. A. A. race as both teams had escaped defeat in the association. Centre, a member of the S. I. A. A., and conceded to be a powerful eleven, has played only one S. I. A. A. game.

Wake Forest won a clear title to the North Carolina state championship by defeating North Carolina State 12 to 0, the champions making their laurels certain in the last two periods after the Wolf Pack had held them at bay in the first half.

The heavy Georgetown team ran true to form and defeated Loyola in New Orleans, 25 to 0. The Hill Toppers gaining momentum as the game progressed. The visitors scored three touchdowns in the last half.

Fort Benning, with a part of its team in Washington playing with the all infantry team for the president's cup, nevertheless defeated the Farris Island Marines 10 to nothing in a hard fought game.

Open Golf Tourney American Players At Daytona To Be To Meet British Golfers At Tampa

DAYTONA, Nov. 24.—Florida players, masculine and feminine, permanent residents and tourists visitors alike, are invited to compete with those from other states and Canada in the Florida East Coast golf tournament, which will be held on the river and ocean skirted coast of the Clarendon hotel at Seabreeze, beginning Monday and closing Thursday evening with a trophy-presenting Thanksgiving dinner dance at the Clarendon hotel.

The tournament, to be given under the auspices of the Seabreeze Daytona Beach Association and Daytona Golf and Country Club, marks the opening of the winter golf season in Florida, and entries received to date indicate that use of the Clarendon course may be necessitated also. A varied array of trophies is offered by the Seabreeze-Daytona Beach Association, composed of capitalist and sportsmen, who plan to make the event one of a series to be held in winter and summer from now on.

Florida's star players have arranged for entry against those of other states, but plans have been perfected for play by "lesser lights" as well. Those desiring to enter can do so by reporting to the professionals, Capt. Charles Clarke and Harry Rawlins, at the Clarendon course Monday morning. These players with C. Young, president of the Daytona Golf and Country Club, will direct the tournament.

Large Hotel To Be Built at Bradentown

BRADENTOWN, Nov. 22.—A Chicago concern has acquired 1747 acres of land on the Palmsola road, as the site for a 400 room hotel, it is announced here. It is understood that \$488,000 was paid for the property and that the hotel is to cost \$1,500,000. The same concern purchased nearly 1,000 acres of land on the Tamiami Trail starting from a point near the flood farm, across a day of Hummer canal, and running to what is known as the Waller pasture. This and other tracts, acquired by the Chicagoan are said to involve expenditures of \$1,250,000.

Dade County Wants Large Bond Issue

MIAMI, Nov. 22.—Dade county commissioners will be petitioned, under plans being worked out, to authorize the issuance of \$300,000 in bonds for the construction of additional roads through the Everglades. The proposal involves special road and bridge district No. 2 where the farmers desire more and better roads to enable them to market their products.

LAKELAND, Nov. 24.—The football game between Southern College and the University of Havana, scheduled to be played in Tampa on November 29, will be played here instead of the Cigar City, it is announced by Coach Alderman of the Methodist squad. A fast and hard struggle between the two teams is anticipated by football fans in this vicinity. Southern's eleven has gone through a good season and hope to wind up with a smashing victory over the Cubans. The latter, however, have under the tutelage of American coaches this season and have made a record that indicates a fighting spirit dominates the players.

Non-Registered Car Owners To Be Fined

WEST PALM BEACH, Nov. 24.—Get a state automobile license tag or pay a \$50 fine is the ultimatum broadcast by city authorities here to owners estimated to number 500, who it is declared are operating their cars without state tags. The city commissioners have adopted an ordinance to meet the situation, providing for the \$50 fine.

ORLANDO, Nov. 24.—The chamber of commerce here has adopted a resolution expressing the belief that the people of the county should go to the aid of Rollins College, Winter Park, and bear a reasonable part of a \$13,000 item needed to complete the school's \$75,267.98 budget for the coming year. Dr. W. C. Weir, president of the school, told the chamber of commerce that anticipated income from funds available amounted to only \$61,075.
