Lake Mary mulls charity donations

LAKE MARY - The ques-tion of whether city tax dollars should be given to charitable organizations has come up again in Lake Mary. The

matter is brought up almost every spring, not only in Lake Mary, but before other city commissions and councils.

During discussion in 1901, the Lake Mary City Commission agreed that it wasn't appropriate to use general tax dollars for non-profit organizations.

organizations.

Thursday night, a request for a \$10,000 contribution was brought up for discussion. The money would go to Better Living for Seniors, to start a Lake Mary Ritchen.

"I think our policy should stay where it is now," observed Mayor David Mealer as the discussion started.

"I disagree," responded Commissioner Thesi Greene. Greene expinined that he was connected with and was well consisted with the works of letter Living for Senters, and altered the city would receive your benefits from horing this

"I could name 10 organisa-tions from which our editors beneit," said Commissions George Buryen. "But tax-payors should have the right to tell the city have to spend their money, I taxpayors want to support these organisation, they should. But they didn't give up their tax dellars to give

work with "Commissioner different organisations have come in asking for funds. Better Living For Seniors is a fine organisation and many of our citizens participate. It's essential that our citizens are able to go to such a facility for help, and as such. I urge everyone, if they wish to donate, to take this opportunity."

She continued, "but I concur with Commissioner Duryea that our duty in

spending tax money should go to the city and its needs first." Commissioner Gary Brender spoke next. "I'm inclined to agree with the mayor, George and Shella." he said. "There is no fair way to designate a group. Each group considers

Duryea that our duty in

itself more important than another. But we should not use tax dollars this way. Anyway, the more govern-ment gets involved in financ-ing non-profit organizations, the fewer people will get in-volved."

Greene, noting that he was in the minority on the matter, suggested the city at least set a criteria for considering non-profit organizations which might receive donations from the city. "In fact," he said, "I'll make that in the form of a motion."

Sewyer escended the motion for discussion. "I'll support getting some type of criteria made, but if we do, we must not give any indication to all non-profit organisations that they will receive money."

"We'll have to stiguiste that this would not be automatic," added Brender. "Anyway, I think we already have criteria on the books."

City Attorney Donna McIn-nah Interjected by questioning what Commissioner Greene's affiliation with Better Living for Seniors might be. "I serve as their attorney." he responded. "But this request is fast for the kitchen project, and there's no way I would besefit from this."





Then, earlier this year, Mikes, according to city records, offered the city up to \$200,000 if he did not have to rebuild the courts. He also also rebuild the courts.

been withdrawn.

However, not before the residents of Tuscawilla readied themselves for battle.



During this past week, much has been said about baseball great Jackie Robinson, who officially joined Major League Baseball 50

Due to research by Sanford Herald writer Russ White, much has been learned about the poor treatment Robinson received when he played in Sanford 51 years ago, when he was told, "no, you can't play here."

There is no way to fix Old Sparky

We have a problem with our Electric Chairl Florida's Old Sparky, is out of order. Not that the condemned are any less dead, upon the execution of their sentences; for it does kill. Those who are compelled to ait in it, do not get back up. No worry about its former occupants for they are no longer among the living. It isn't working because the manner in which it dispatches affects our tender sensibilities. How curious we are. We hide behind fictions, as if technicalities, legalities, and communal hand wringing could veil the ugly face of the practice of execution. The fact is, there is no manner in which one human being can take another human being's life that is not cruel.

The act of homicide itself in any form and upon any occasion is inherently evil.

The inhumanity of the practice of killing is only increased, not lessened, when it is done at the hands of bureaucrats and politicians. Execution in its present fashion, killing by abstract process, administered by technocrats. is akin to water torture, where death is visited upon by those who sit upon its row, one drop at a time, as they flounder; fish out of water, winding their way through a labyrinth of appeals and legal machinations, established by the very institutions that are intent on taking their lives.

Execution, as opposed to killing, murder, war or indifference; is truly a killing in cold blood, it lacks the personal touch, for with execution there is no provocation, no passion, no psychosis, most importantly there is no malevolence, just a slow methodical walk toward death. We kill people as if they are



fungible, we take their lives no differently than if we were making widgets, in Starke's factory

If we are going to execute people for the commission of crimes we might as well simply admit to the bestiality of the process. Let's strip ourselves of these polite fictions and admit how little we value life. Our attempts to samitize executions are bound for failure, be it lethal injection, the gas chamber, electrocution, firing squad, guillotine, crucifixion, stoning, impaling or draw and quartering. We behave as if we could dampen the brutality of the practice, of execution, by

drowning our actions in legalese.


Ever wonder why we hide the face of the condemned, certainly the mask is not for their benefit. If we can't even bear to look in their eyes as we kill them can we ever truly say that the practice can be executed in a fashion which is humane.

So if there is no-good way, as it rela our tender sensibilities, to execute people do we do it? The two most common justifications for the practice are deterrence, and simple payback. Both are false.

Executions have been commenplace for hundreds of years, yet people continue to commit crimes which would qualify them for that type of punishment under our present standards. To say that executions deter people from committing murders is as stupid as saying that World War I was the war to end all wars. With or without executions there are those among us who will rape, injure, rob and murder their fellows, it is a human behavior, that we are not going to be able to avoid. Nor does the death penalty side in the suppression of these behaviors, because it would appear that the tendency to engage in such conduct is less in societies that do not practice the art of execution.

At first blush, payback may seem to be sufficient rationale, but in my life I have seen the innocent convicted and the guilty go free. I must confess that I lack sufficient field in our ability to absolutely ascertain guilt or innocence to stomach the idea that even one innocent may suffer execution for every ten thousand who may deserve to die.

There is no good reason to execute people in a civilized society, and no correct way to accomplish so dirty a task. The day has come for us to realize that there is no way to fix Old Sparky, it never did work, and never will.

The "Wee Help Children's Resource Center" to a computerised resource information service for all physically or mentally disabled children and their families in the Central Florida area.

The "Wee Help Children's Resource Center" started in the early 1980s by Ken Hudson (the group's current president) after Mr. Hudson's (late) son Vince, became severely brain injured. It was di cult for Ken and his wife Phyllis to find the information they needed to help their son. It was then that Ken created the "Wee Help" concept.

A successful businessman and civic leader, Mr. Hudson has been involved in such groups as the Optimist Club, Jay-cess, Variety Club, National Head Injury Foundation and The Seminole County Advisory Council for the Disabled.

In the beginning the organization was simply called "Wee Help Network" and was a private philanthropic endeavor, so Ken put up all the capital. Virtually alone, Ken managed to help hundreds of people. This continued for several years, then last summer, Ken decided to expand the service to help more people (families, who need this kind of service). That's when the organization became the "Wee

Help Children's Resource Center". Classified as a 501 (C) (3) Non-Profit Charitable Organization, the "Wee Help Children's Resource Center" has a board of directors and has had some fundralsers. The most ambitious was a golf mara-thon (held last year) which made several thousand dollars.

The "Wee Help Children's Resource Center" features an extensive computerized database that includes information on products, services and agencies.

The main goal of the organization is to find a facility that can be used to set up a computer room, as well as, a library. The group is hoping this facility (or space) can be donated. Also needed are volunteers to help with the various projects

and, of course, "money".

The next big fundraiser will be an art auction to be held later in the year. We will let you know in this "Special People" column. 
Money for high schools: What about the little kids?

Seen you will be hearing about plans to seemd \$40,000,000 to renovate part of Lake Breatley High School. The Administration also waste a new middle actual at Heathern for \$17,500,000-allering Laborium to be closed and given to Seed, a private school the Detrict contracts with to headle expelled students. This will measurable berrowing \$0 million clothers when interest rates are skyrocketing. This specifing bings will cap the Detricts ability to berrow manay until property values increase enough to generate more times or until the tempayers are forced to pass a bond inoue. There are some things tempayers seed to know.

First, why does the School District want to renovate Lake Brantley at a cost of \$0.1 million dollars more than it would cost to just build another high school?

Secondly, the school system plans to build

Secondly, the school system plans to build another high school in Oviedo on ground pur-



chased two years ago, right outside of the win-dow being shown to taxpayers in the five Year Capital Plan. There will be no money left to

berrow to build that new achool.

Thirdly, these expenditures will keep the School District from addressing overcrowded elementary achools for at least the next five years and probably for the next sight years.

The School System currently has 51 elementary achools. Elementary achool enrollment increases constantly over the entire year, while middle achool and high achool enrollments decline as older kids leave during the achool year. Next year there will be 150 portables at the elementary achools, housing some 3.579 students. This is the equivalent of almost five elementary achools attending achool in portables. And there will be a constant growing need for more portables at elementary achools as a population builge moves through the achool system. Especially if there is to be an effort to reduce class room size even further to provide better teaching. provide better teaching.

Elementary schools will be bursting at the

seams when the schools open next July 31st. Every inch of available space will be jammed with classrooms. Will there by any money for new classrooms for elementary schools? None-if the current Pive Year Capital Building Plan is adopted by the School Board. Does there need to be any more classrooms for elementary schools?

need to be any more classrooms for elementary schools?

The answer is yest Elementary school is where children get started-either towards a successful school experience or to educational failure. Once started on the path of educational failure-the road to a lifelong hell of poor, or no jobs soon becomes a super highway, always spiraling downwards for those caught in the traffic jam. 
In addition, warrants were issued for five absconders and 10 predators living out of state. Of the 10, three are in jails and seven are under the supervision of a parole officer.



Newnans Lake is sunshine heaven FISHING FORECAST

SANFORD _ The sun is shining on Newnans Lake these days. The 6,000 acre lake near Gainesville, once renowned for its large mouth base and crapple fishing, is one of the hottest sunshine base fisheries in Florida today.

Came and Fresh Water Fish Commission

(OFC) creel surveys show anglers landed nearly 30,000 sunshine base there during October and November of 1996. This means that the majority of anglers fishing the lake were catching their 20 fish daily beg limits.



PC biologist, Randy Meyers, said state base are easy to locate in maste Lake because two of the three apets' are marked by OFC fish sector buoys.

These buoys mark deep areas of the lake where brush and specially constructed fish attractor panels have been anchored the bottom." Meyers said. "At least 90 percent of the sunshine base caught from the lake are taken from these areas."

The creek mouths on the north shore of the lake are also good areas, especially when the creeks are flowing after a heavy rain. Myers said two anglers, last spring, using rattletraps and plastic budied (tgs., cought eight sumshine base totaling 60 passed wide flohing the creek mouths.

While live obtainers and shad typically are their sumshine base, grass strimp FLORIDS AND TASTE GREAT!



are the top choice on Newmans according are the top choice on Newmans according to local anglers. Most anglers use care pales strong with 12 to 20 pound test line and fish 5-7 feet below a cork. It is common for anglers to catch 8 to 10 pound sunshine bass from the brush piles.

Sunshine base are voracious feeders and grow rapidly. Ample forage is the key to any successful sunshine bass fishery, and Newmans is absolutely loaded with threadfin and gizzard shad, Meyers said.

SHUPE'S SCOOP

Bass action is great in Puzzle Lake, Low water levels have scores of bass in the main river channel, where they readily strike tiny Rapalas. Anglers can have a ball using ultra-light spinning tackle with six-pound test line. Bream, shad, speckled

sux-pound test line. Bream, shad, speckled perch and over catfish will also jump on small Rapalae intended for base.

Behastian inlet is featuring improving action with snook on large live shrimp or finger mullet. Old timers use a bare lead head jig tipped with a live shrimp and fish this combination slowly across the rocky bottom. Radfish, jack crevalle, bluefish, trout and ladyfish are also pientiful. A wide variety of lurse such as one-curse life and variety of lures such as one-ounce jigs and Mavericks will also take their share of fish. Captain Jack at <u>Port Canaveral</u> reports

that high seas have kept boats in Port. inside the Port, expect good fishing for sheepshead and flounder. Trout and redfish are improving daily on the <u>flats of</u> the Benana and Indian Rivers.



A patent is a grant bestowed upon the inventor by the government, giving the inventor the right to exclude others from making, using or selling the invention claimed by the patent, A U.S. patent is only valid in the United States and the territories. its territories. A utility patent may be obtained for a new process, machine, article of manufacture, composition of matter, and or any new and matter, and or any new and useful improvement thereof. The utility patent is valid for 17 years. A special patent may be granted for plants and ornamental designs. The period of these patents vary from 3-1/2 years to 14 years depending on the fees paid.
