Attorney-General Says No Violation Comes If Beverage Is Used For Certain Purpose

TALLAHASSEE, Dec. 12.—(A.P.)—The manufacture, sale and transportation of liquor in Florida for medicinal, scientific and mechanical purposes were held legal by Attorney General Cary D. Landis in an opinion made public yesterday.

McKesson-Grover, Stewart Drug Company of Jacksonville requested the opinion, and the attorney general's office sent this opinion by wire.

The laws of Florida provide that it is not unlawful to manufacture, sell at wholesale or transport alcohol for medicinal, scientific and mechanical purposes. Licensed druggists may sell



Big League Moguls Meet At Chicago To Swap Ivory, Cash In Hopes Of Winning Flags

CHICAGO, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Baseball's trade winds whipped into a veritable gale last night as major league club owners and their pilots, all of them out to get their men, sailed into Chicago for their annual winter meeting and shopping tour.

No less than a score of players in both leagues were reported to be on the ivory block and the magnates, confronted with important problems in baseball such as the adoption of a uniform ball and what to do about radio broadcasts of games, admitted happily that they anticipated the biggest turnover of talent in many years. The various problems will be discussed in separate meetings today and Wednesday while the trades and sales will be completed in hotel lobbies, nooks and corners.

As the baseball writers watched for news and impending trades yesterday, they spied one of the first arrivals and a central figure in one of the outstanding deals about to be completed, Mickey Cochrane. The Athletic catcher was reported already sold to Detroit as manager and catcher and was straining at the leash, waiting for Connie Mack and Frank Navin of the Tigers to arrive to announce it officially. Navin already has announced he was certain of getting Cochrane, and planned to clinch the deal after a short conference with the tactician of the Athletics. Cochrane was enthusiastic over the deal and was planning trades and sales in his mind and discussing Detroit's proposals for 1934.

As far as the league meetings were concerned, the leaders expected to adopt a uniform baseball for both circuits and offer Kansas Mountain Leads another contract as committioner. The radio problem appeared to be unsettled and the best information was that those clubs that so desired could broadcast, but that the league or clubs would ask for a cut in the profits accruing from the baseball broadcasts.

"Personally, I don't look for any change in the radio policy," said Will Harridge, president of the American league. "Some want it some don't. The situation is about the same as a year ago."

Both President Harridge and President John Heyler of the National League agreed that a uniform baseball would be advantageous, but the big question was which ball—the American or National league sphere?

Nazi claims were included in that number and a statement that France will permit concessions in the business territory.

Of the sum \$4,000,000,000, \$3,000,000,000 is to be repaid and \$1,000,000,000 interest. The remaining 100,000,000 marks is to be repaid in 1934.
