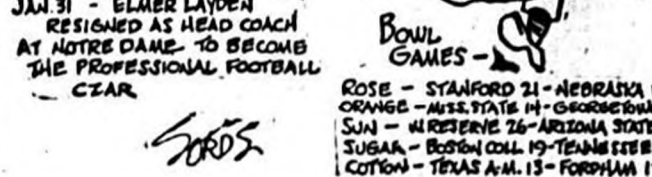

Young Nazi Soldiers Flee From Counter-Attack As Russians Continue Offensive

Panic Spreads Among Germans

Increasing Pressure Is Put On African Forces By English

LONDON, Dec. 28.—(A.P.)—A British bomber force today estimated to be the largest ever, has been reported to have been rushed to about 50 percent of its peak strength.

LONDON, Dec. 28.—(A.P.)—Eighteen bombers today destroyed a German air base in the small island of Vagsoy, 100 miles north of Bergen, Norway, it was officially announced today.

The British have pushed forward in Libya, striking from the south at the retreating main Axis force in the Agheida area and bombing Axis troops from the air in the Bardia sector.

New German youth units of 17 and 18 years, comprising most of an entire German youth unit, are being sent to the front in the Agheida sector, 35 miles southwest of Bardia.

Panic was said to have spread and untrained reinforcements from the transport and clerical sections of the German army were reported to have been rushed into the front in a desperate effort to stem the rout.

U. S., Russia, Britain United Against Axis

Military, Diplomatic Plan Mapped By Roosevelt-Churchill And By Eden-Stalin

The major powers fighting the Axis—the United States, Britain and Russia—have been united in a common military and diplomatic program aimed at the final destruction of Hitlerism, it was disclosed today as the British foreign office announced in a historic statement that Foreign Secretary Eden had been conferring in Moscow for two weeks with Soviet Premier Stalin.

Eden and Stalin reached full agreement on all questions relating to conduct of the war, the statement said. Furthermore, as they talked they kept in constant touch with the White House in Washington, where President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill were similarly laying war plans with complete understanding and agreement.

Nothing was said in the British foreign office statement identifying in one released in Moscow regarding whether Russia would go to war with Japan. Unofficial observers have posed this question, weighing both the advantages and disadvantages of Russia's remaining normally neutral in the Pacific, ever since Japan declared war on the United States and Britain.

Slovak Citizens At Slavia Show Loyalty To U. S.

SLAVIA, Dec. 29.—(Special)—Slovak citizens here reaffirmed their loyalty to the United States at a meeting yesterday, and sent the following wire to President Franklin D. Roosevelt:

"With the most sincere approval of our country's war in self-defense against the forces of democracy, we, the citizens of Slavia, wish to assure you that Americans of Slovak descent are firmly united with all other loyal Americans behind your enlightened leadership."

The impudent slander cast upon the Slovak race when the traitorous Nazi government of war on our beloved United States makes us the more resolved that America will be victorious.

"But we do know they have an attack that is likely to score any time. They'll no doubt score 27-0. We'll just have to score more than they."

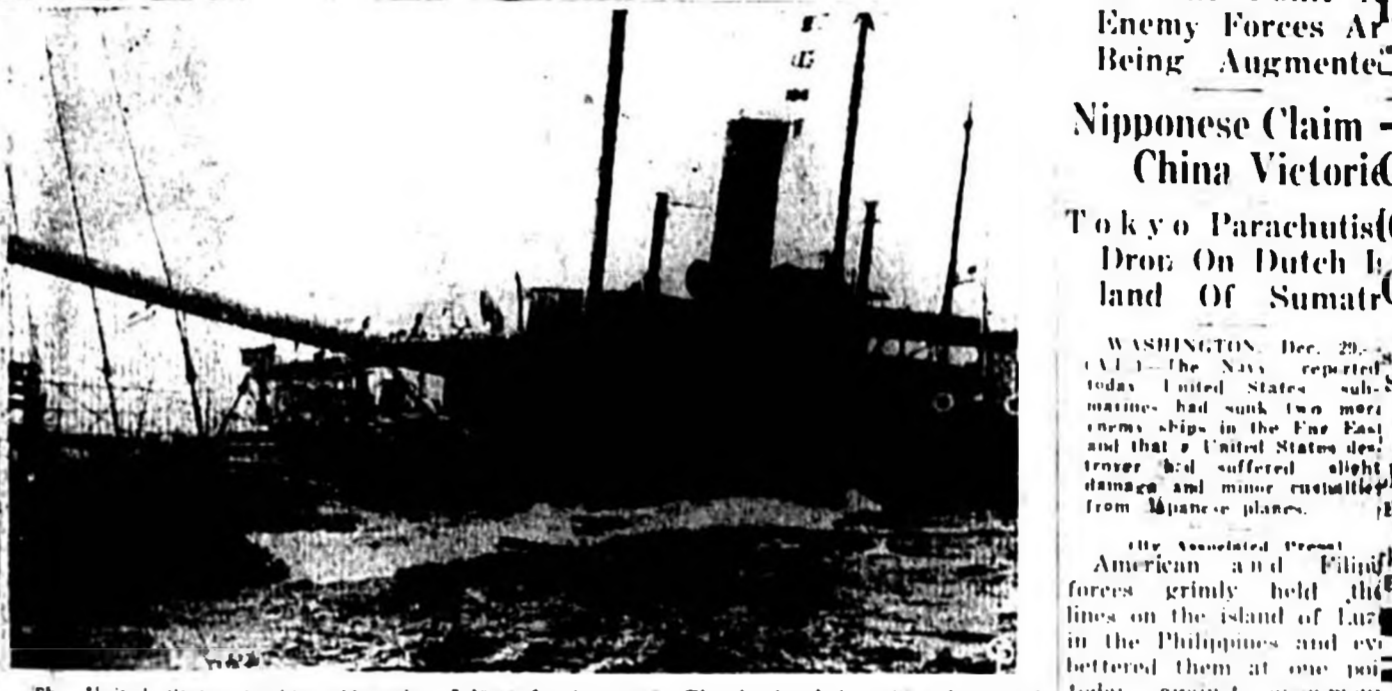

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—(A.P.)—The Navy reported today that United States submarines had sunk two more enemy ships in the Far East and that a United States destroyer had suffered slight damage and minor casualties from Japanese planes.

The Japanese war fleet forces grimly held the lines on the island of Luzon in the Philippines and yesterday they were reported to have captured several Japanese numbers. The Japanese continued to put reinforcements ashore while the U. S. gave the beleaguered islanders hope that they were on the way.

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F. D. R. Pledges Support And Aid To Philippines

British Singapore Troops Fall Back Under Jap Assault

Tokyo Forces Suffer Heavy Losses As Attack Is Pressed Above China City

Ipoth Is Vacated By Englishmen

Little Damage Is Reported As Nippon Planes Drop Bombs

On the Malayan front, the British reported the Japanese strongly attacked British lines north of Singapore, but suffered heavy casualties. London dispatches said the British have withdrawn from Ipoth, 190 miles north of Singapore, to escape a threatening Japanese movement. The Japanese bombed Singapore's defenses inflicting little or no damage, according to the British.

The British defenders of Singapore's approaches fought back strongly against a Japanese penetration south of Ipoth, in and communications center, in western Malaya, but the invaders' supplementary drive along the coast apparently made no progress.

The fall of Kuching, the capital of British-protected Sarawak on the island of Borneo, when the Japanese took it, is reported to have been a serious blow to British-American communications with the allied Dutch East Indies, according to London dispatches.

At the beginning of the campaign, the heaviest fighting was in progress in the Malay States to the south of Ipoth.

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Lindbergh Volunteers His Services To U.S.

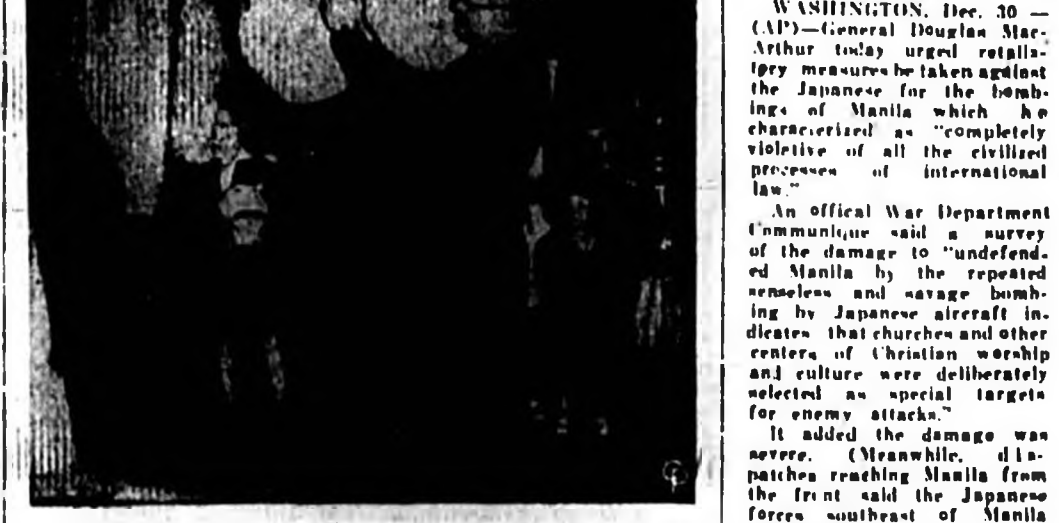
