Toppled tractor trailer blocks morning traffic

A semi-truck overturned on North U.S. Highway 17-92 in Sanford early Tuesday morning causing major traffic delays and spilling several gallons of gasoline into the city's storm water drains.

The wreck occurred around 7:30 a.m. when the driver of the truck, Jose L. Benitez of Kissimmee, lost control while traveling south on North U.S. Highway 17-92 at the sharp bend in front of Lake Monroe. This scene is fairly common on this stretch of highway, with at least one serious acci-

dent at the site each year.

"The truck just went sideways and then went over," said Marc Holle of Titusville, who was working, along with a crew of men from Nile Underground Technologies, on underground utilities just steps from the accident scene.

Before rescue workers arrived on the scene, Holle, along with Frank Fuller, and two other men, pulled 62-year-old Benitez from the vehicle.

"As we were pulling him out, at first we thought there was glass from the windshield on his elbow," explained Fuller of Nile Underground Technologies. "But, it was his

bone coming out."

According to Holle, Benitez's foot was pinned in the steering wheel. He and another onlooker bent the

wheel while Fuller pulled the driver from the wreckage. The four good Samaritans helped, Benitez to the sidewalk and stayed with him until para-

medics arrived.

As rescue workers from Sanford and Seminole County

Mr. Magic to retire his wand and cape

The wand has been put away, the black cape folded up and Sanford resident Harry Wise is calling it an end to a 50-year career as Mr. Magic. The fable began on Oct. 30, 1953, for the teenage boy who had saved nickels and dimes to purchase his first magic props. Today, the official "magic den" at the rear of Wise's Sanford home is chocked-full of top hats, silk scarves and other essential magical wares. The room is so packed of illusionary tools and sleight of hand tricks that it's enough for four or five magic shows.

"If anyone wants to buy all this stuff and take it on the road, they can," he said. "I'm officially throwing in my wand."

Wise took magic on as hobby in 1950, three years later he was turning professional as he got his first gig at the old Sanford Grammar School across George Touhy Park from his home. From there, he launched the largest running magic and illusion

Sanford Veterans' Day parade in jeopardy

For the first time since the World War II era, Sanford may not have a Veterans' Day parade.

During a special called meeting of the Seminole County Area Veterans Advisory Council Saturday at the American Legion on Sanford Avenue, representatives unanimously voted to pull their parade permit.

The council represents the American Legion, Paralyzed Veterans of America, Disabled American Veterans, Fleet Reserve, Submarine Veterans of Seminole County, Casselberry Veterans and Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Leaders of these groups said they were making their action known because they felt the city of Sanford was not being fair with parade permit requirements. At the top of their list of complaints for the Nov. 11 parade is a \$1 million liability insurance policy naming the city as a co-insurer.

According to city officials, the same insurance requirements has been asked of the veterans groups for the past three years.

"The same insurance requirements were there for the previous years," said Al

29 Aug. 2003 We've been very busy since the bombing of the Shiite mosque. That has caused somewhat of an uprising among the Shiites

and made things unpredictable for us.

When these Iraqis take to the streets to protest it is like a sea of people all in a frenzy. Law and order must be maintained somehow, but you don't want to get trapped in the middle of the crowd. Conditions still vary from section to section, one

place may hate our guts and in other sections the people are not so bad. Still you cannot tell who, or where, the enemy is.

It is very difficult for the G.I. to find a niche in this confusion and we are the scapegoats for everything that goes bad.

We have been mainly conducting patrols in the streets or watching over our police stations. We must keep an eye on the Iraqi police to make sure they are following procedures and are on the job.

The other day my humvee got a flat tire while on patrol and we had to "limp" it all the way back to Camp

St. Johns maintains tax rate

The St. Johns River Water Management District's Governing Board adopted its fiscal year 2003-2004 budget and voted to maintain its current tax rate for a third consecutive year.

Following the second of two public hearings, the board gave its final approval to the district's \$196.8 million budget for the fiscal year that begins Oct. 1. The adopted budget reflects \$36.8 million in budgetary items that were included in the current year's spending plan but could not be completed by the end of this fiscal year. Those funds, called re-budgets, were not included in the tentative budget introduced in July.

The board also approved holding steady at its 0.462 millage rate. Under a 0.462 millage rate — 46.2 cents for every \$1,000 of assessed property value — the owner of a \$100,000 house who claims the standard \$25,000 homestead exemption would pay \$34.65 per year in property taxes to the district.

show in the southeast taking it on the road to nearly every state and Canada including numerous performances at various Seminole County schools and the Ritz Theatre, now Helen Stairs Theatre on Magnolia Avenue.

"I knew I was on my way," he said. "There was no stopping me after that."

However, there is more to Mr. Magic than meets the eye. He was also commonly referred to as the Dark Veil. Typically, Dark Veil was a night owl performing in clubs while Mr. Magic went to schools, birthdays and theatres.

"No one realized Mr. Magic and Dark Veil were one in the same," Wise coyly admits.

The magic to Wise's career was the ability to reinvent himself. He changed his act over the years about five times, and not only did he make it big as a magician, but also a circus ringmaster, an Orlando television trickster and a crafter of ghouls and ghosts.

From 1960 to 1965, thousands of Central Florida youngsters remember Mr. Magic on the children's variety television show Uncle Walt's Adventures, airing every weekday afternoon on channel six.

He, however, for seven years lived his lifelong dream during five tours for four different circuses as resident ringmaster and magician. As ringmaster, Wise was also responsible as the general manager of the big top, which was not a small task considering there was about two shows a day for weeks straight. Usually, the only breaks were to travel.

"The circus was a hard task, but it was fun," he said. "And I always wanted to be a circus ringmaster."

Perhaps Mr. Magic's greatest fame came in the "Dr. Jekyll and his Weird Show." The midnight ghost show promised an array of ghastly sights and Wise delivered with a real-life Frankenstein. Mummy and other horror helpers. The show toured throughout the United States,

including three tours of Canada.

It was actually a traveling ghost show out of Ohio that played at the Sanford Ritz Theatre in 1950 when Wise decided his life was meant for the world of mysterious. He was 15-years-old when his parents took him to the ghost show and "walking home I told mother and dad I want to be that man."

Some parents might have pushed their son away from the stage of illusions and enchantments, but not Wise's. They encouraged and helped him save money so he could start sending away for tricks of the trade from magic catalogs.

A local Sanford magician, Bill Hoffman, was Wise's first mentor. A RCA projectionist and soundman for the Florida State Theatres Corporation, Hoffman owned a radio repair shop next to the Ritz Theatre on Magnolia Avenue and taught Wise the art of conjuring.

There's more to magicians, however, than just magic. A good illusionist also needs charisma and a commanding

presence to captivate an audience.

Wise learned "stage craft and the business of the show" from his second mentor, John Cates of Texas. He toured with Cates as an apprentice and watched how the master played the audience.

"You're almost an actor when you're on that stage," Wise said. "Johnny Cates taught me the theater of it."

For hundreds of Sanford kids, most adults now, there will never be another like Mr. Magic. It's evident as he's still singled out by former admirers such as longtime Sanford officer Eddie Hughes who stopped Wise the other day to say he remembered watching his act as a fourth and fifth grader.

From the guillotine gag to the floating lady, or "the suspension of the princess," Mr. Magic was more than just illusion and trickery. It was all out good times.

"They remember fun because I did a lot of comedy," he said. "I think that was a great thing (for them)."

Grieshaber, Sanford city manager. "If there were any fee waiver request I'm not aware of that, but when I look at the other applications I see that same requirement."

The insurance police is but one of many of the veterans' concerns. According to Ken Ferrin president of SCAVAC, last minute additions to the parade wouldn't be allowed this year.

"You're going to tell a Vietnam Veteran he can't be in the parade," he said.

"In the past, Sanford has been very good to the veterans," Ferrin admits. "But, I think we may be better off looking for another location not just for Veterans' Day, Memorial Day too."

A Vietnam Veteran and I.I. Col. in the U.S. Marines, Grieshaber said he thinks there still is a chance to right the ship.

"To me it sounds like a

communication problem," he said. "It also says on the form (to write) any request to waive policy and/or fees. It's right there and it was left blank."

The city commission was to vote on the Veterans' Day parade permit at its next meeting Monday, Oct. 13. Grieshaber suggested both sides may be able to work out their differences at the meeting. It is up to the council to waive any fees or policies.

"We're not trying to say it would be granted, but we're not saying it wouldn't," he said.

In the meantime, the Seminole County veteran groups are spreading the word that they feel "slighted" by the city of Sanford, and suggested a couple other cities such as Lake Mary or Casselberry may welcome their parades with open

arms.

"This is a break in a long, long standing tradition," said Don Abberton, of the Paralyzed Veterans of America.

According to Ferrin, the decision to withdraw the permit was not easy.

"There's a great deal of reluctance," he said. "This is not something we're taking lightly. In a way we feel insulted."

Although the Veterans' Day parade is probably the longest running event in the city, it doesn't mean they'll get special consideration in the permitting process.

"I will absolutely do everything I can (to get the Veterans' Day parade), but we will treat everybody fairly and equally," Grieshaber said. "We require other parade participants to have insurance or request a waiver of fees."

Marlboro through the worst sector of Baghdad. The flat tire was on the right rear and we had no spare. I put my humvee in the center of the patrol, three vehicles, as it was the one with the flat.

We were going so slow on a back road to the camp that Sgt. Bates jumped out of his truck, which was in front, and started taking photos of the tire while Sgt. Coe and his driver SPC Gieger were calling on the radio, sarcastically, about our tire "being a little low." It was both stressful and humorous at the same time. However, we realized that we were flopping along on a busted tire through the same areas where we'd been ambushed before.

I felt like a wounded duck flopping down the street. Had we been hit there was no way that we could have got out of there on a flat tire, we would have been sitting ducks in a shooting gallery. I thought it was symbolic of this whole operation, flopping around like a duck without a spare. The vehicles are always breaking down because of the wear and tear, spare parts are scarce, tires are practically non-existent, just like real food is scarce. Anyway we made it back safely but the tire was nothing but mince meat.

My patrol was sent out to a hospital this morning because of a drive-by shooting that occurred there. The assailants fled the scene leaving no injuries. While there, I told the [Iraqi] guards [at the hospital] to divide up their ammunition as they only had a few rounds. I inspected one guard's AK-47 and found he had no ammo at all.

3 Sept. 2003 I guess you heard that a car bomb went off at one of our police stations here. I can hear distant Iraqi gunfire right now as I write this. We were not involved with the police station bombing, but I was at another station and picked it up on the base radio. I think they said there were 45 casualties. This was the station by the JOC [Joint Operations Center] which is a little too close for comfort. There were two MPs killed in Baghdad the other day but not from our unit. This place has got to be the bloodiest place on earth. That UN bombing by itself was enough blood and gore to last a lifetime.

4 Sept. 2003 I have a humorous story to tell. We were on patrol with my A-team vehicle in the lead of two other vehicles. We went through a large mud puddle about the size of a small lake in the middle of the highway.

The water splashed over the hood and thoroughly soaked Raymaker, my gunner. You could not see through the water as it was so much of a drenching, coming right over the hood and roof. Raymaker who was in the turret got soaked. I heard him yell something but it sounded like he was gurgling...

We had been instructed to "force hydrate" ourselves to prevent becoming a heat casualty, so I guess Raymaker got "forced hydrated."

I saw the CSM [Command Sergeant-Major] and the regimental commander [2nd US Cavalry Regiment] at chow reading the Fort Mellon to Baghdad books and pointing things out to each other. They told me they want to donate some things to the Sanford Museum. They really love these books and the 2nd Cav's connection to Seminole County. That's why they'd like to donate some captured artifacts from here because they know it would be properly exhibited for everyone to see and not end up in some G.I.s closet where nobody would see it. Also they asked if you can send them three more copies of "The History of Fort Mellon."

Four officers join Sanford police ranks

The ranks of the Sanford Police Department are swelling with four new officers sworn in Monday.

Heather Smart, Ryan Forrest and Sean Coyle joined the force as fulltime officers and Edward Genao entered the department as a reserve officer, required to work a minimum of 20 hours of service per month. The three full-time officers are all Central Florida residents, however, Smart is originally from Pennsylvania, Forrest hails from Maryland and Coyle comes from New York.

Smart and Forrest are new to law enforcement, but Coyle is a former Lake Mary police officer. The trait they do all share, is they sought work on the Sanford force because of its active nature.

"It's just something I've always wanted to do," Forrest said about public law enforcement service. Smart and Coyle also desire to eventually become K-9 officers.

"I've been wanting to do it since I was little," Smart said.

With the new arrival of officers the police department remains at 111 sworn total positions as the 'newbies' will

replace several departing police officials.

"I think these four officers here are glad and eager to work in Sanford," said Chief Brian Tooley. "We're happy about the fact that they're here."

Looking at the horizon, Tooley could also be expecting five new officers thanks to the help from the federal Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS). It was announced last month that SPD would receive \$375,000 in federal funds for five full-time officers bringing the total number of sworn officers to 116.

The program provides up to 75 percent of the total cost of salary and benefits for the additional manpower for three years, however, the city council must approve the grant as it is required to pick up the remaining costs.

Tooley said the additions to the department are causing him consider a couple of options for reconfiguring patrols in hopes of getting "the most bang for the buck." The reconfigured patrols would help officers to be more proactive and provide greater protection to neighborhoods and businesses, he said.

arrived on the scene they were faced with another serious issue. Apparently as the truck tipped, the gasoline tank was punctured causing gasoline to pour from the truck onto the roadway.

According to Mark James of the Sanford Police Department, the truck holds 60 to 70 gallons of gasoline in each of its two tankers. Only one of the truck's tankers was ruptured, so it is estimated that 70 gallons of gasoline were released from the truck, much of which poured into the city's storm water drain and traveled directly to Lake Monroe.

Because of the gasoline spill, oncoming traffic was detoured in both directions from Mangoustine Avenue to First Street until approximately 10 a.m. while crews cleaned up the wreckage.

Preliminary investigations show that the cause of the accident was a shift in the truck's load while traveling around the bend. However, speeding has not been ruled out at this time.

Benitez was transported to Central Florida Regional Hospital in Sanford with non-life threatening injuries. He was treated and released Tuesday morning.

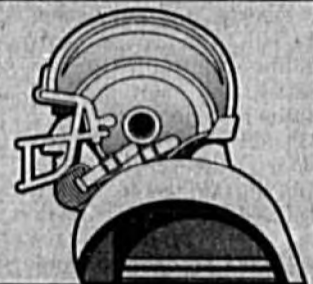

While it was turnovers that doomed Lake Mary against Oviedo, it was penalties that proved to be the Rams' undoing this week.

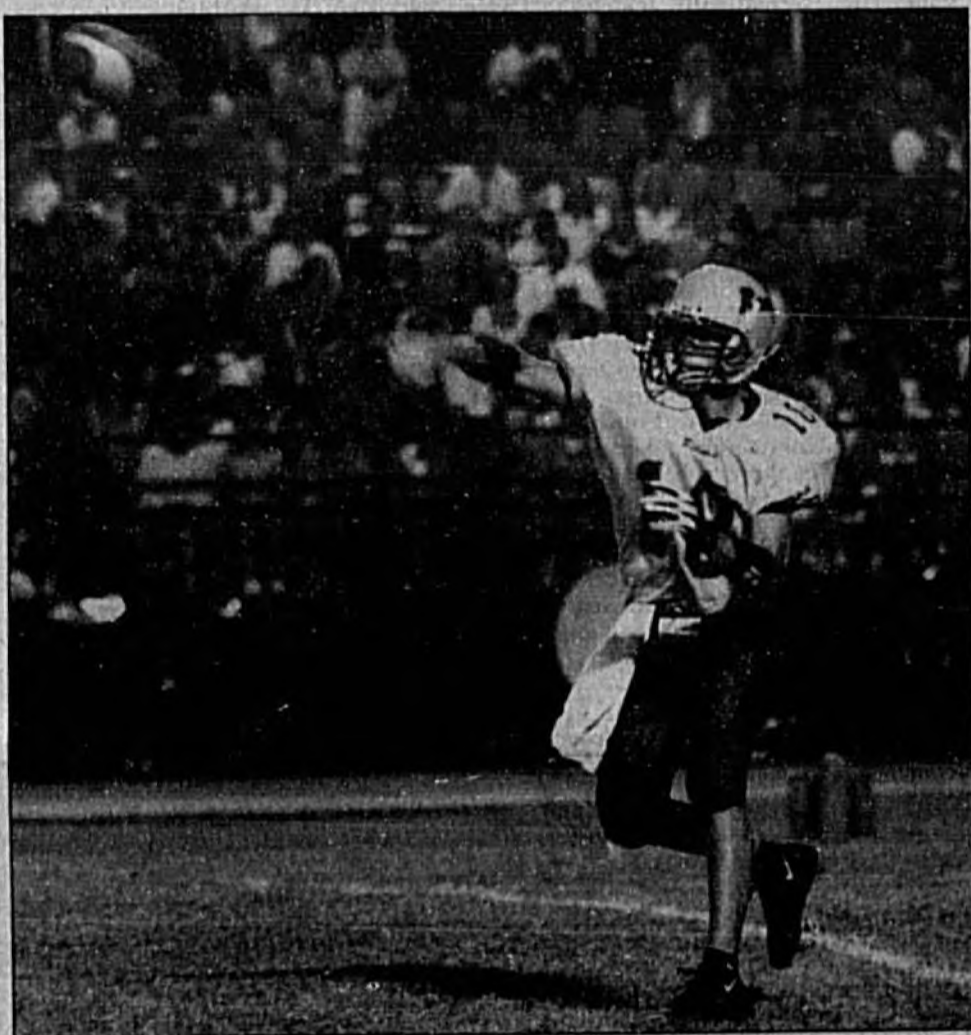
Lake Mary (1-3) took a 6-0 lead early in the second quarter as the Rams' defense continually stifled the Bobcats' offense.

Rivera to start at QB for UCF

UCF head football coach Mike Krueczek has named junior Jon Rivera the starter at quarterback for Saturday's home game with Buffalo.

Rivera will replace Ryan Schneider, who is out with a shoulder injury.

Schneider will be re-evaluated next week. The start for Rivera snaps a streak of 34 straight starts at quarterback for Schneider, the third longest streak in school history.

For just the second time in 13 seasons, UCF will have its starting quarterback miss a start due to injury. Vic Penn was the last UCF quarterback to miss a start due to injury during the 2000 campaign.

Rivera was 3-for-4 for 36 yards and an interception last week at Kent State. The New Jersey native also ran five times for 20 yards.

The Golden Knight (1-3, 0-1 MAC) hosts Buffalo (0-5, 0-1 MAC) in Mid-American Conference action Saturday at the Florida Citrus Bowl. Kickoff is set for 6 p.m. in the second MAC game for both schools in 2003.

Last week, both schools faced MAC opponents from the state of Ohio. UCF committed eight turnovers in a 36-16 loss at Kent State while Buffalo dropped a 38-21 decision at home to Akron.

The Bulls own the nation's longest losing streak as they have dropped 15 straight games. The last time Buffalo won was at Rutgers in 2002. The Bulls topped the Scarlet Knights 34-11 last season in New Jersey.

The Golden Knights are looking to even their record at 1-1 in the MAC and also snap a two-game losing streak.

Live coverage on the UCF ISP Sports Network (radio) begins at 4 p.m. with the pregame show. In Orlando, the game can be heard on 740 - The Team (WQTM), with Marc Daniels, Garry Parris and Jerry O'Neill calling the action.

Saturday's game is the fifth meeting between the two schools including the fourth game played at the Florida Citrus Bowl. UCF is a perfect 4-0 all-time vs. the Bulls while averaging 49.5 points per game.

Last season at Buffalo, UCF won 45-21 behind five touchdown passes by Schneider. The five touchdowns through the air were a season-high by a MAC quarterback in 2002.

Free safety Dave Barnes had four of the interceptions, returning three for touchdowns. He also had six tackles.

Williams led the team in tackles with 14, while Ryan LaRose and Jenkins both had seven.

The lone Citrus Heights touchdown came at the end of the third quarter.

"Our boys have been practicing for six weeks, anxiously awaiting this first game," said head coach Ron Williams. "They have been chomping at the bit for an opportunity to face a real opponent on the field. They were like caged lions just waiting for the chance to get out there and have some fun. And I must say, they had a lot of fun."

Knowles was the leading scorer with 14 points, while Unsworth scored 13 points, eight of which came on service aces. She also had four kills.

six-touchdown game by a MAC quarterback last season.

Nine Kent State possessions started in UCF territory last Saturday afternoon at Dix Stadium in Kent, Ohio as the Golden Flashes moved to 2-0 in the MAC for the first time since 1986 and only the second time since 1977.

Kent State jumped out to a commanding 23-3 lead thanks to the arm of Joshua Cribbs. The junior tossed two touchdown passes to Darrell Dowery — 39 and three yards — along with three Travis Mayle field goals.

In four games in 2003, UCF has been outscored 48-3 after the Golden Flashes scored 13 first quarter points. UCF's first score of the game came when Matt Prater chipped in a 26-yard field goal.

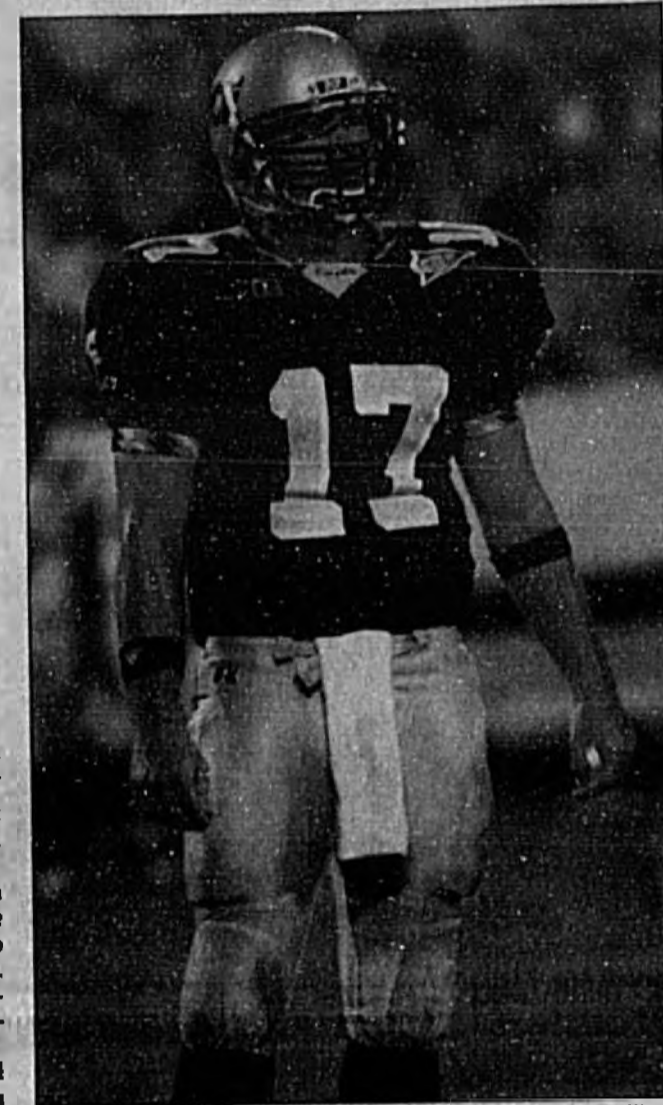
Cribbs' second touchdown pass to Dowery came at the start of the second quarter to extend the KSU lead to 20-3. All four of Kent State's scoring drives began in UCF territory.

Mayle drilled his third field goal of the half with 12:52 remaining in the first half to give the Golden Flashes a 23-3 lead. The drive was set-up after UCF fumbled for the second time in its own territory.

The Golden Knights finally scored a touchdown with 4:03 left in the first half when Schneider found Tavaris Capers on a 13-yard touchdown pass. The scoring pass marked the 25th consecutive game that Schneider has thrown a touchdown, extending his own school record.

Capers tied a career-high with nine receptions for 82 yards and a touchdown on the day. Capers has finished with nine receptions in each of UCF's four games this season.

Kent State capitalized on UCF's fourth turnover of the game and the second interception thrown by Schneider when Usama Young picked off Schneider at the UCF 25-yard line. From there, Charles Newton

Artist inspired by a Costa Rican parrot

Linda Amundsen, the poster artist of the 17th Annual Lake Mary-Heathrow Festival of the Arts, has been painting since she was a little girl. Today, at age 64, Amundsen shares her artistic love with her 11-year-old granddaughter, Katie.

"She likes to paint, so she comes over and paints with me," said Amundsen, a 36-year resident of Longwood. "We really enjoy doing that together and she is becoming quite a little artist. She just won a coloring contest at Publix and, last year, was commended by the school PTA for painting a woman in camouflage with an American flag."

As Katie follows in the footsteps of her grandmother, she will have quite impressive shoes to fill. As a full-time artist, Amundsen participates in several juried art shows each year.

Known for her tropical and Florida-themed oil paintings, Amundsen also paints lighthouses and landscapes.

"I really lose myself when I'm working," said Amundsen, who admits she paints every day. "I can be tired and come out and set up my easel and paints and get so relaxed. It really is a wonderful outlet for me. I forget about everything."

As the poster artist of this year's art festival, Amundsen's "Polly," an oil painting of a parrot from Costa Rica, will be seen on T-shirts and brochures promoting the festival.

The inspiration for "Polly" came to Amundsen when she and her husband were on a family cruise through the Panama Canal. While at a resort in Costa Rica, she met Polly.

"In the lobby were these beautiful parrots," she said. "They were so fantastic and beautiful I knew I was going to paint them." Along with "Polly," Amundsen

also completed a painting of a pair of parrots, "Friends," which she recently sold. Amundsen has donated "Polly" to the art festival where it will be auctioned off to the highest bidder.

The proceeds, along with the money raised from T-shirt sales, parking and other fund-raising items, will be given to Seminole County Public Schools for scholarship money.

"This is such a great cause," she said. "I'm honored to be a part of the festival."

Amundsen will also have an exhibit during First Thursdays at the Orlando Museum of Art, located at 2416 N. Mills Ave., in Orlando, on Oct. 2. The Mount Dora Center for the Arts, located at 138 E. Fifth Ave., in Mount Dora, will feature Amundsen during a month-long senior exhibit beginning Oct. 3, and she has been invited to attend the Epcot Wine and Cheese Festival for the third consecutive year, being held Oct. 18 through Nov. 16.

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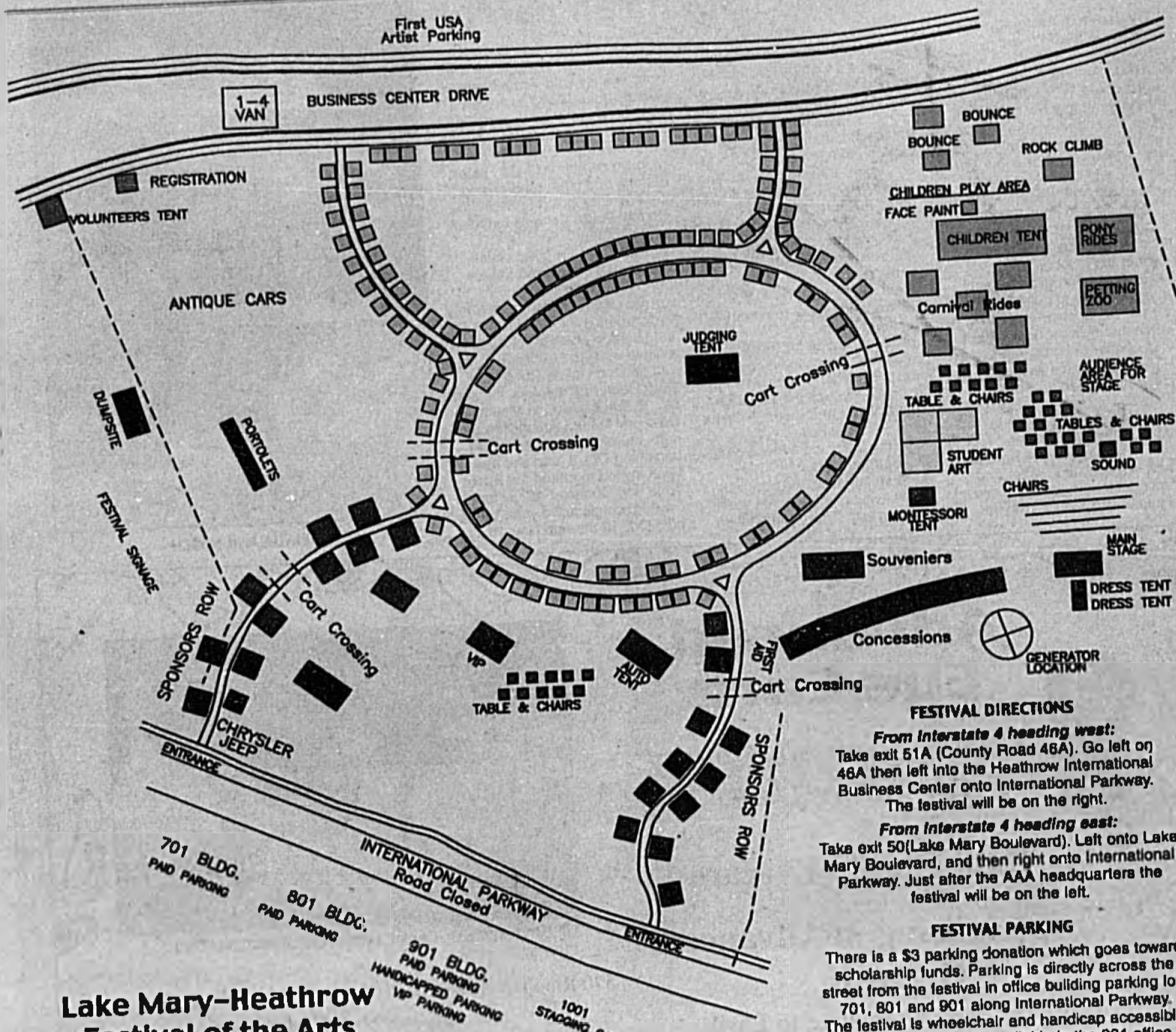
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Festival Directions & Map

Along with the wonderful camaraderie

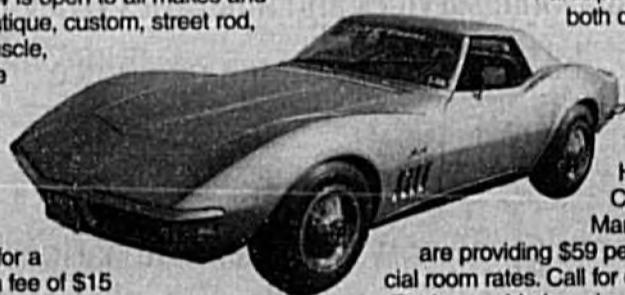
of fellow "car nuts," the art festival provides things for the children to do, including musical entertainment and a variety of art and crafts on display. There will be space for shade covers.

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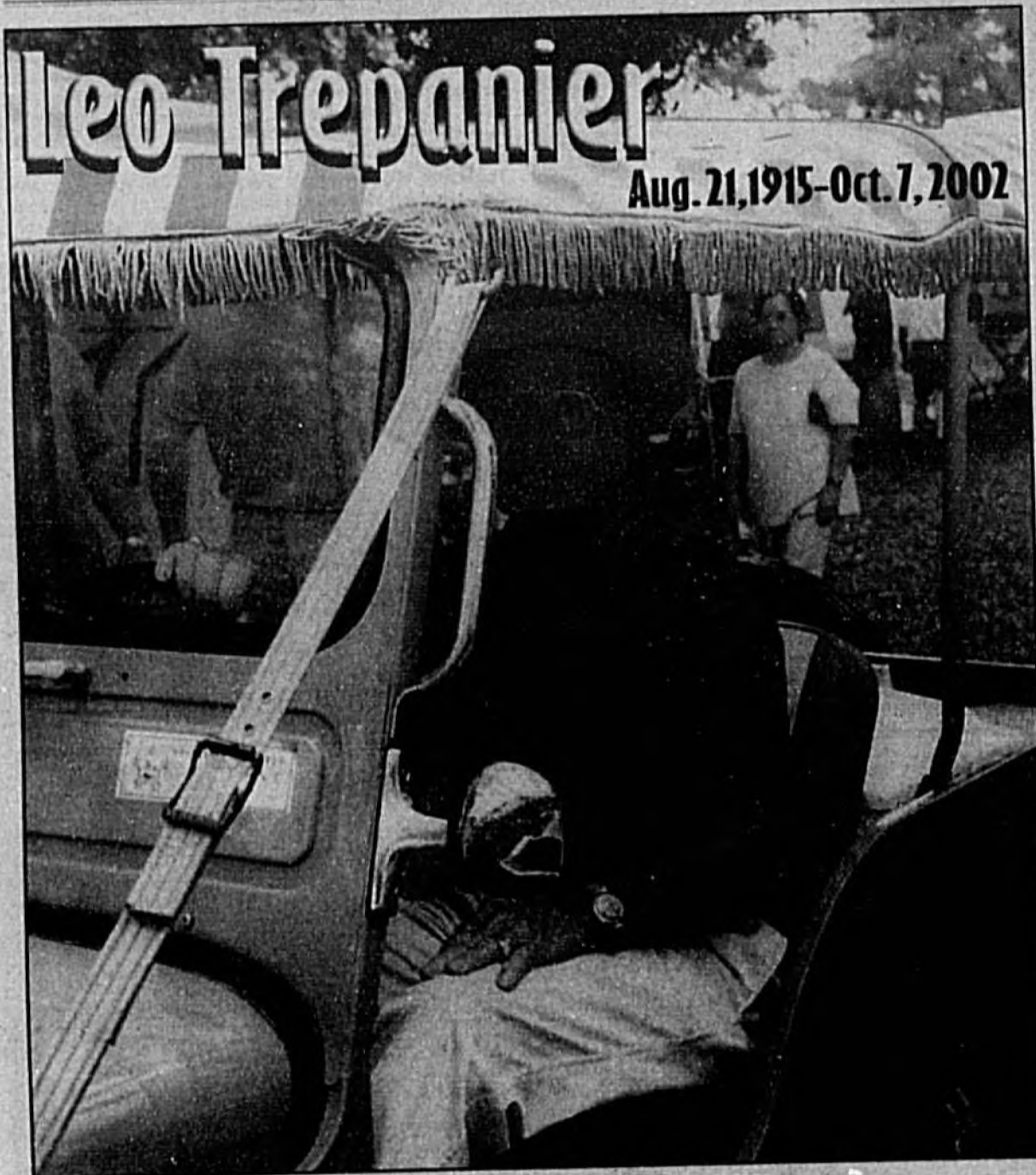

L&L Acres owner shared his land, time for festival

After an auspicious beginning, the Second Annual Lake Mary-Heathrow Festival of the Arts found a home at L&L Acres in October 1988.

Across Lake Mary Boulevard, from Heathrow's business entrances, came a special dedication and commitment from a special man; Leo Trepanier.

Born Aug. 21, 1915, to Joe and Emma Trepanier in Duluth, Minn., he was a Central Florida resident for nearly 50 years. Leo Trepanier was a land-owning pioneer along the southside of Lake Mary Boulevard and the developer, with his sister Lois M.

Palucci, of the 200-acre L&L Acres ranch.

Trepanier raised prize Santa Gertrudis cattle on the pastoral L&L Acres when he allowed organizers of the Lake Mary-Heathrow Festival of the Arts to hold their annual event on the ranch. He became a familiar sight patrolling the area in his pink Jeep as making sure accommodations were right for festival participants and more than 100,000 weekend guests.

He was known to all as someone who would do anything to help out, and he will be sorely missed.
