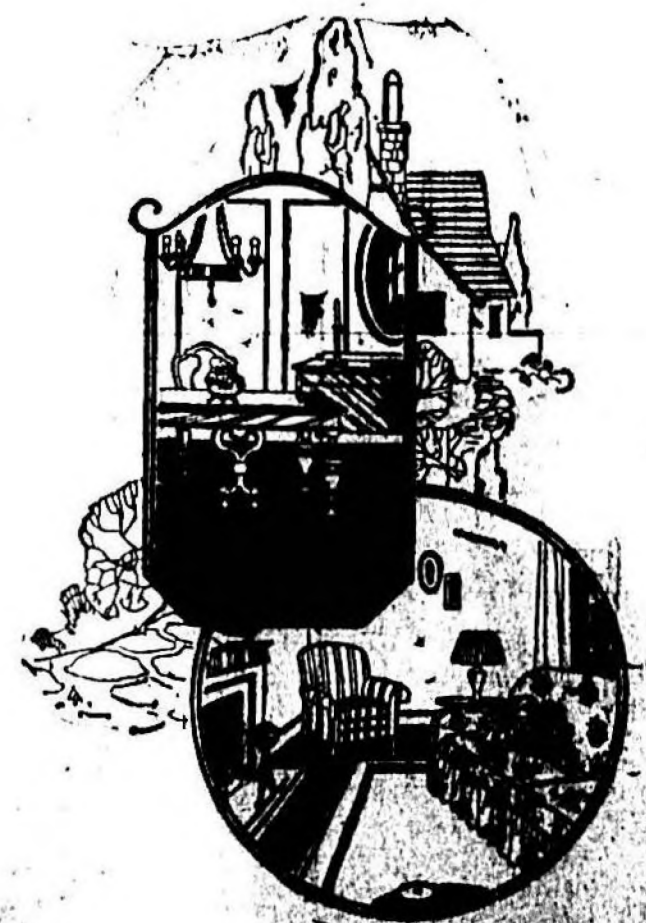

Surely Sanford Could Lead The Way

Atlanta is going to spend a lot of money on the removal of its sewage disposal plant, on Peachtree Road, to another location. It wants to use the present site, which was the scene of the Battle of Atlanta in the Civil War, as a public park.

That is in Atlanta. Here in Sanford we find the easiest way to get rid of the city sewage is dump it into beautiful Lake Monroe. So we do it that easiest way.

Instead of desiring to make its lake front more beautiful, Sanford uses the lake as a receptacle for the city's filth. And then serenely accepts the vile odors and disgusting sight at its front door as something it cannot help!

Atlanta intends to spend a million dollars in the making of a memorial park on the site of its present disposal plant. And it has nothing to compare with Lake Monroe as an asset to that park. It has a little creek whose waters it wants to keep pure and sparkling.

Inasmuch as Atlanta intends to carry its disposal plant to the banks of the Chattahoochee River, that stream will not be benefited by the change. But the plant is built on scientific plans, and there is none of the disgusting features in the sewage disposal problem that is found in cities that grossly dump the untreated filth through open sewers into the nearest lake or river.

Speaking of Sanford's unintelligent use of Lake Monroe for a sewer outlet, could not Sanford not only remedy this condition for its own town but be instrumental in securing the passage of legislation that would prevent any town or community in the state from emptying sewers into any Florida lake or river?

This would be worthwhile work. And Sanford could lead the way.

"Safety First" Rules That Will Work

The Herald, along with patient newspapers everywhere, has published hundreds of editorials on the subject of safe driving of automobiles. We have helped in all the "Safety First" campaigns that have come along, and given space that would measure into yards and furlongs for "warnings" as to what not to do in the operation of a motor car.

If all this ever did anything for the protection of the people, this paper has no means of knowing. Perhaps it has. But considering the perversity of the usual human, it is certainly more to be expected that a device adopted by the Warren (Ohio) Tribune has much more of a chance for getting results than would any of the usual "Safety First" declamations.

The Ohio paper, undoubtedly wanting to make things safer for highway traveling, takes the excellent plan of offering some contrary advice. On the theory then, that people are always ready to do the opposite of what they are told to do it is very easy to see that every motorist could find big helps to safe driving from the Tribune's rules. They go like this:

- Always drive fast out of allowa. Always race with locomotives to crossings. Engineers like it; it breaks the monotony of their jobs. Always pass the car ahead on curves or turns. Don't use your horn, because it might annoy the other fellow and cause him to turn out too far. Demand half of the road, the middle half. Insist on your rights. Drive fast on wet pavements. There is always something to stop you—often a heavy truck or strong curb. Never yield the road to the car behind. The driver may be a "run runner" being pursued. New drivers should practice in the heaviest traffic. It gives them the experience they should have. Always speed; it shows the people you are a man of pep, even though an amateur driver. Never stop, look and listen at railroad crossings; it consumes time. Drive confidently, just as though there were not 18,000,000 other cars in service. In wet weather always drive in trolley tracks. It's smooth going and out of the mud. Always lock your brakes when skidding. It makes the job more artistic. In sleazy weather drive close to pedestrians. Dry cleaners appreciate it. Always use a cut-out. All snappy drivers do. Never sound your horn on the road; save it for use late at night as a doorbell. Very few homes have guns.

BENEVOLENT FOLKS WHO are expressing sympathy for the state of Florida are advised to save it for some cause that needs it. Florida does not. Others who are using sympathy as a mask for slander and sycophantically commiserating with the Peninsula State are warned that cold facts will beat them up "Poor Florida"—pity the poor! Had nearly eighteen million dollars in the state treasury July 1—and did not owe a cent. Governor Martin recently authorized a reduction of 291-2 per cent in the state tax-rate—nearly one-third. 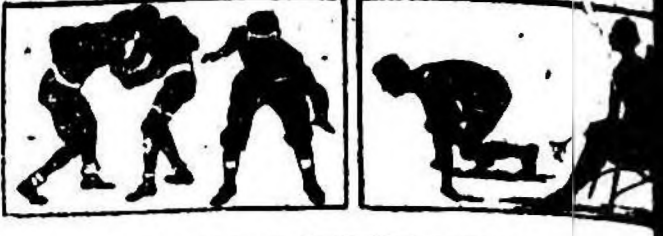
