Rev. E. D. Brownlee and Dr. C. J. Marshall Tell of Trip—DeCotton Speaks.

Sanford Kiwanians, Wednesday noon, heard with interest two talks by the Rev. E. D. Brownlee and Dr. C. J. Marshall regarding the condition of the Titusville Road over which a Sanford delegation of Kiwanians traveled Tuesday to attend a meeting of the Titusville club.

Rev. Brownlee told of the fact that led by the Kiwanians, Titusville has already raised \$1,000 as its quota in the repair of this important highway. Dr. Marshall gave some interesting data relative to the condition of the road at present. He said it is in much better condition in Brevard county than in Seminole county.

Following Dr. Marshall's talk, Mayor Forrest Lake announced that Seminole county's \$1,000 would be ready by the end of next week and that work would begin at once on repairs of the road.

Another talk enjoyed by the meeting was given by George A. DeCotton, who spoke on the Aubrey Lee Nickel's case. He presented the true facts of the case and spoke further how these facts had been distorted until much sentiment in the state had been raised in Nickel's behalf. FLORIDA BAPTISTS OPEN CONVENTION

Annual Meeting at DeLand This Week Attended by Hundreds of Church Representatives From Throughout State.

DELAND, Dec. 12.—With 349 messengers registered for the first session Tuesday morning, the 69th annual convention of the Florida Baptists opened at 9:30 o'clock in the local Baptist church. Many more are expected to register later in the convention.

Meeting also at this time is the 30th annual gathering of the Florida Women's Missionary Union, which held a preliminary mass meeting in Stetson auditorium Monday evening and began the convention sessions in the Presbyterian Church at 1:30 Tuesday afternoon. Although the enrollment of women is not yet complete, it is indicated that the number attending the women's convention will exceed those attending the state Baptist sessions.

The convention of Baptists was opened at 9:30 o'clock with devotional services in charge of J. F. Mendel of Groveland.

In the organization of the convention Dr. Albert A. Murphree of Gainesville, president of the University of Florida, was re-elected president; Dr. Lincoln Hulley of DeLand and Rev. S. B. Cole of Madison, vice presidents; Dr. C. L. Collins of Ocala, re-elected recorder and statistician; and J. W. Senterfitt of Marianna, assistant recorder.

Address of Welcome.
Dr. Lincoln Hulley of Stetson University in his pleasing manner extended a hearty welcome to the delegates to the assembly. Dr. Hulley's welcome was supplemented by greetings by Mr. V. W. Gould and Dr. J. J. Morgan on behalf of DeLand and the local ministerial association.

Dr. A. J. Holt of Punta Gorda, in well chosen words responded to the welcome extended by the local citizens.

The annual convention sermon was delivered by Dr. A. J. Moncrief of Pensacola, who held the close attention of his audience as he in a masterly manner gave facts and figures to refute published utterances alleging "decadence of public morals, decline in effectiveness of the Christian church, a spirit of lawlessness and crime wave that threatens society."

Dr. Moncrief took as his text Ecclesiastes 7:10—"Say not that former days were better than these, for thou hast not considered wisely." The speaker said the accusation of moral decay was untrue in conception and untrue in essence, and was due to a tendency toward pessimism. He pointed out that the sins of which people complain today are the sins of which mankind was guilty 100 years ago, 1,000 years ago and even 3,000 years ago, and that any indictment of moral decadence, or of religious decay, applicable today truly applied to generations of the distant past.

The speaker cited numerous evidences of the progress of civilization to standards that were elevated, showing better social ideas and better material conditions today than existed in the past. "No," the speaker said, "we are not living in an age of decadence and declining moral standards, but rather in an elevated standard of spiritual and material conditions."

The convention recessed at 12:30 o'clock and reconvened at 2:30. On the program for Tuesday afternoon was an open forum in which numerous subjects of interest to the Baptist were liberally discussed.

BREVARD TO RAISE MONEY FOR REPAIR TITUSVILLE ROAD

Active Campaign For Funds Will Be Made This Week and Next—Volusia Agreed

In regards to the repairing of the Titusville road, which the three counties of Brevard, Volusia and Seminole are to each raise \$1,000 for that purpose, the Titusville Star-Advocate has the following to say about raising of the funds in that county:

At an enthusiastic meeting of the Chamber of Commerce held Wednesday night when a larger attendance was had than at any time in the near past, plans were made and arrangements completed whereby the road from Southmere to the St. John's River will be put into passable shape at a date in the very near future.

Leading up to this meeting Wednesday night a good deal of planning had been done. The road from Southmere to the river had been surveyed and an estimate secured which showed that \$3,000 would put the road through Volusia county in passable shape at any time regardless of the weather conditions.

Overtures had been made to the commissioners of Volusia county and the matter had been discussed with the Chamber of Commerce of Sanford. It was agreed by the three bodies that each would raise \$1,000 to be spent on these few miles of road through Volusia county.

The Chamber of Commerce of Sanford pledged their \$1,000, the commissioners of Volusia pledged theirs and Wednesday night the local Chamber of Commerce pledged the third \$1,000.

Committees were appointed to raise this fund by Wednesday night of next week. The committees were as follows for Titusville: J. J. Parrish, J. E. Nobles, W. J. Darden, Archie Donaldson and R. M. Wicker. For Sanford: Phil Roberts, J. G. Cook and Thos. Bosser.

Friday of this week and Tuesday and Wednesday of next week are expected to see everybody in the town and put the proposition across. The sentiment of the meeting Wednesday night indicated that it would take but very little effort to raise the required amount to do this work.

ROTARY TO SPREAD CHRISTMAS CHEER

Will Supply Needy Families in Sanford and Seminole County With Christmas Boxes—Will Complete Boy Scout Quota.

THREE FORCES MOVE ON CAPITAL

ARMY IS GROWING

Tampico Garrison Reported As Having Joined the Rebels—Situation Considered Serious—Many Leave Capital

(By The Associated Press)
SAN ANTONIO, Dec. 12.—Large bodies of armed men from all sections of the state of Vera Cruz are joining General Sanchez in his rebel march on Mexico City, according to private advice received by San Antonio Light. Army at present believed to number 25,000 well armed and equipped men.

NOGALES, Ariz., Dec. 12.—More than two thousand armed insurgents are marching from Tepic, now in the hands of the rebels, with the intention of penetrating Sinaloa and taking that state and Sonora, according to reports received here Tuesday night.

The invaders are taking control of all towns and cities in the line of march and are moving with great rapidity, late advices state. They are reported to be under the leadership of Gen. M. Dieguez, Marcarin Gaxiola and Raanet Bustina. The retreating forces the advices declare, include the 24th regiment, one of the crack outfits of the Mexican army, which recently revolted.

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Dec. 12.—The states of Aguascalientes and Guanajuato have revolted and three separate forces are now marching on Mexico City from as many directions, according to a report received here Tuesday. The report is based on a wireless message sent by General Estrada from Guadalupe to the station at Vera Cruz which in turn was relayed from there in a private message to San Antonio.

The report states General Estrada and Sanchez are marching on Mexico City. The report says that insurgents are within 20 miles of Puebla, which is six hours ride from Mexico City. This report, however, is doubted by those acquainted with the terrain of that part of the country. If it is true, however, the water and light plant at Nacaca, state of Tlaxcala which supplies Mexico City, Puebla and in that section with water and light will be endangered by the insurgents.

The military commander of the state of Guanajuato is General Rodolfo L. Gallegos and that of Aguascalientes is Gen. Juan Rios Zertuche. It is not stated whether the revolt in those states is led by military or by civil authorities. Despite the fact that the revolting forces in Mexico are widely separated, communication is maintained by wireless since the troops of de la Huerta are reported to have gained control of wireless stations in Guadalupe, Tepic and several on the west coast as well as stations in Vera Cruz on the Atlantic.

In this respect, the insurgents have an advantage not held by the revolutionists in former years when governmental control of the wires left insurgents in the several sections of Mexico without means of communication except by runners. Hence this means of wireless General Estrada, commanding the insurgent forces west of Mexico City is unable to keep in constant communication with Gen. Sanchez of the insurgent forces at Vera Cruz.

A brief official statement was given Tuesday night at the premier's official residence in Downing Street, which tells the story tersely. It read: "After careful consideration of the constitutional precedents and their bearing upon the situation which has arisen as a result of the general elections, the cabinet decided unanimously this morning that it was their constitutional duty to meet the parliament at earliest possible moment. The parliament therefore will reassemble on January 8."

FILES DEEDS FOR CHURCH PROPERTY

Judge Warlow Placed Deeds for Holy Cross Church Property on Records in Seminole County—Interesting History.

Warrent deeds were filed Wednesday in the office of the clerk of the circuit court which will be of interest in Sanford. These deeds recorded in Orange County at Orlando before the division of the county, affect the property upon which the Holy Cross Episcopal Church Rectory and Brotherhood of St. Andrew club-house were formerly located.

There were four deeds recorded, the first one being from Henry J. Sanford and wife of Jacksonville to John Freeman Young, then bishop of the Florida diocese of the Episcopal Church. The deed was dated April 19, 1873 and was recorded in Orange County on April 28. This deed designated the property transferred as lots one and two of block six and was further designated as the northwest corner of Fourth Street and Church Street.

The other deed affecting this particular piece of property was made out by Bishop Edwin G. Weed, who succeeded Bishop Young, to the Protestant Episcopal Church of the diocese of South Florida. The date of the deed was August 12, 1902.

The other two deeds affect lots six and seven in block six. The Florida Land and Colonization Company of England decided to the Protestant Episcopal Church of Florida this property for the consideration of "one dollar and other valuable consideration" the date of the deed being August 15, 1889. On June 1, 1894 the property was transferred again to the South Florida diocese.

Judge T. Pion Warlow of Orlando sent the deeds to the clerk's office which were recorded Wednesday.

Playing the Game

In other columns of this page appears a poem by Grantland Rice which every man, woman and child in Seminole county would do well to read. It has to do with sportsmanship, sportsmanship from the ground up. In play and in business that is a quality sometimes lost sight of in the fear of defeat and the dread of failure.

Everyone likes to see a football team fight, fight until every man drops in his tracks. The sand in your eyes may be driving you mad and your brain in a whirl upside down, while your breath comes short and hot, but don't forget it is a game you are playing no matter how close is the score.

When their halfback breaks through for a twenty yard run, tackle low and hit hard, but when the ball is down, lend him a hand to get up. It won't hurt you any and it may help him a lot. When the game is about ended and no score has been made and you would die before yielding an inch, their tall fullback drops back to try a drop kick. Break through the line and give all you've got to smear his play, but if the ball gets away and goes over the goal, you are a man if you tell him "nice shot" and he will know you as such.

In the spring when you get out the old bat and go down to the diamond for a game, don't kick about sides or positions to play, or whether you are safe or not. Play errorless ball, that's all you want. When you are hit at the plate and the umpire refuses to allow you a base, come back and knock out a homerun. It will do you no good to throw sand in his face.

Then in golf it's the same way. If your game is a bit ragged and you are slicing and hooking and digging in traps, you are a quitter if you swear at your caddy and break up your clubs. Think hard and find out what is the matter with your game and come home in two under par.

If you are on the eighteenth green, playing accumulative syndicates, with a ten foot putt left for a halve, take plenty of time and figure the slope. Feel of the grass and brush away the leaves. Take hold of your club and putt for the cup. If your opponent sneezes, hand over the cash. It will hurt him that much.

In business it is just the same way. You find men who will take their medicine, and you'll find those who won't. But read the poem.

A LONG EXPERIENCE with Congress and politicians convinces me that the politician is ignorant of his trade. Which is curious, because the average American is very much a master of his trade, whatever it may be. If he is out on the road selling hats, or in the office making out bills for those hats, or in the factory putting the hats into boxes, he knows what he is about and is able to judge hats intelligently; some are able to look ahead six months and determine whether brown or gray hats will be worn.

GATOR FOOTBALL STAR'S RECORDS

GAINESVILLE, Fla., Dec. 12.—"Little Joe" Merrin, Joe K. is his official name, has by sheer grit nailed a regular wing position on Florida's varsity this year. He is short on weight—exactly balancing 150 pounds—but overflowing with pluck. Critics have praised him to the skies, and are only sorry that the skies are too low. The way Joe speedily gets down on kicks and then pulls a clean, hard tackle, is a sight of wonder to the fans. He is a bear in the aerial game—at blocking, receiving and intercepting.

Merrin hails from the home of strawberries, Plant City. There he began his career at high school and made himself famous by four successful years of football. His classmates recognized his ability by choosing him as their president.

Jim came to Florida three years ago, but footballically speaking, he has been here only two years. Last year, with his slight 140 pounds he was able to make a position of substitute. Now with his ten pound increase he has beat all competition. There is no telling what he will do next year, his last, but Texas and others may prepare for a big shock from a little wire.

GAINESVILLE, Fla., Dec. 12.—Clyde Norton, a brilliant line man, has an unusual football record, as before he came to the University of Florida he had never seen a football, but after appearing on the field showed such marked ability as a lineman that after one year's playing on the scrub team was given a regular berth on the varsity as a guard. He played a great game against Harvard last year, outplaying all that he went against. Unfortunately he broke his collar bone against a tackling dummy and was kept out of all the later season games.

Norton came here from the Winter Haven high school in 1920, and has a good athletic record as a basketball player in high school circles before coming to the university. His first year here he played on the scrubs, breaking into the line of the varsity in his second. This year he has had hard luck, spraining his ankle early in the season and had to use crutches instead of his legs. Now, however, he has discarded the crutches, and probably will again get some practice. He weighs 184 pounds.

GAINESVILLE, Fla., Dec. 12.—James Richard (Dick) Rose, Jr., is one whose playing has done much toward the success of the Gators this year. He has helped Lightsey hold down left end, and has done so in a creditable manner. His ability to establish his fame as a football player and to get into the play ball player at Florida. Dick is 21 years old, five feet nine inches tall, and weighs 170 pounds. He is one of the most consistent players in the Gator line-up.

Ever since he has been large enough to carry the ball, Dick has been practicing the pigskin art. His first playing was in Tennessee but his high school and prep school record was made on Florida gridirons. He played with a number of high schools and prep teams throughout the state and was an all-state tackle in 1921 when he played with Duval. In 1922 he was the regular right end on the Baby Gator team which won the southern freshman championship. Dick hails from Jacksonville and is a junior in the Law College.

EXPENSES TO BE CUT.
BRADENTOWN, Dec. 12.—Expenses of clubs in the Florida State League will be cut to the extent of approximately \$5,000 per club next season, under plans outlined by the official board. The salary limit will be trimmed down to come within \$2,250 a month for each club, including pay of the manager. Hotel bills also will be reduced and allowances for meals will be held to \$2 a day for each player. The league also plans to use only one umpire in each game.

Scott High officials informed the Lakeland team's management that the game could be arranged provided an agreement were reached on the terms.

SARASOTA TO BUILD ROADS

SARASOTA, Dec. 12.—The people of Sarasota county have been called upon to vote on January 29 on a bond issue of \$500,000 to build more roads in the county. The highways will be laid out by the chamber of commerce and the county commissioners. 

An address Thursday afternoon by Rev. A. Scott Patterson, of Africa, preceded by various reports and discussions, will end the session.

Report of the Federal Trade Commission Shows Body Active

Eleven General Economic Inquiries Were Pushed During Year—Export Business Increases.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—A review of a year's endeavor to restrain business methods opposed to good morals and tending to monopoly, was put before Congress Monday by the Federal Trade Commission in its annual report. Along with the series of investigations and proceedings against hundreds of individual business houses and trade associations, the commission described the general economic investigations which it has conducted by special order of Congress or otherwise, into the industries of grain exporting and coal mining, into speculation on exchanges, and into trade practices such as that involved in the "Pittsburg base" for steel sales in the west.

There were, during the last fiscal year, commission complaints directed against 2,384 separate respondents, alleging improper conduct in commercial transactions, or the maintenance of unlawful customs in trade. These, and others pending, resulted in the final issue of 78 orders, directing individuals and groups to desist the practices complained against.

The commission's report in its legal sections showed that continuous litigation had been precipitated, by appeals of concerns involved from final of tentative findings directed against them, the result of which, the report said, had been "to develop the law of business practices under the court's rulings."

Eleven general economic inquiries were pushed during the year, the commission pointed out, and several were brought to the final report stage. These included the investigation into the effect on cotton and cotton prices of central exchange operations. One of them, on petroleum, the commission added, had expressed the findings that the "whole trade was dominated by the Standard Oil interests,"

alone or in alliance with other corporate groups."

Its findings in repeated investigation of the bituminous coal industry, the commission said, were still "handicapped" by court review, and the inability so far to obtain figures on investments, profits, and costs.

The Webb-Pomerene law, empowering American concerns to associate in export trade enterprise under commission scrutiny had furnished ground at the end of the year for combinations in 123 industries. The report noted an increase in the amount of export business under the associations, and a general increase in the amount of trade interest taken in international business. Administering the law, the report said, the commission had found opportunity to remedy grievances of foreign purchasers against American producers in a number of instances, and commented that the practice went far "to the establishment of good will in foreign markets."

No recommendations for legislation were made.

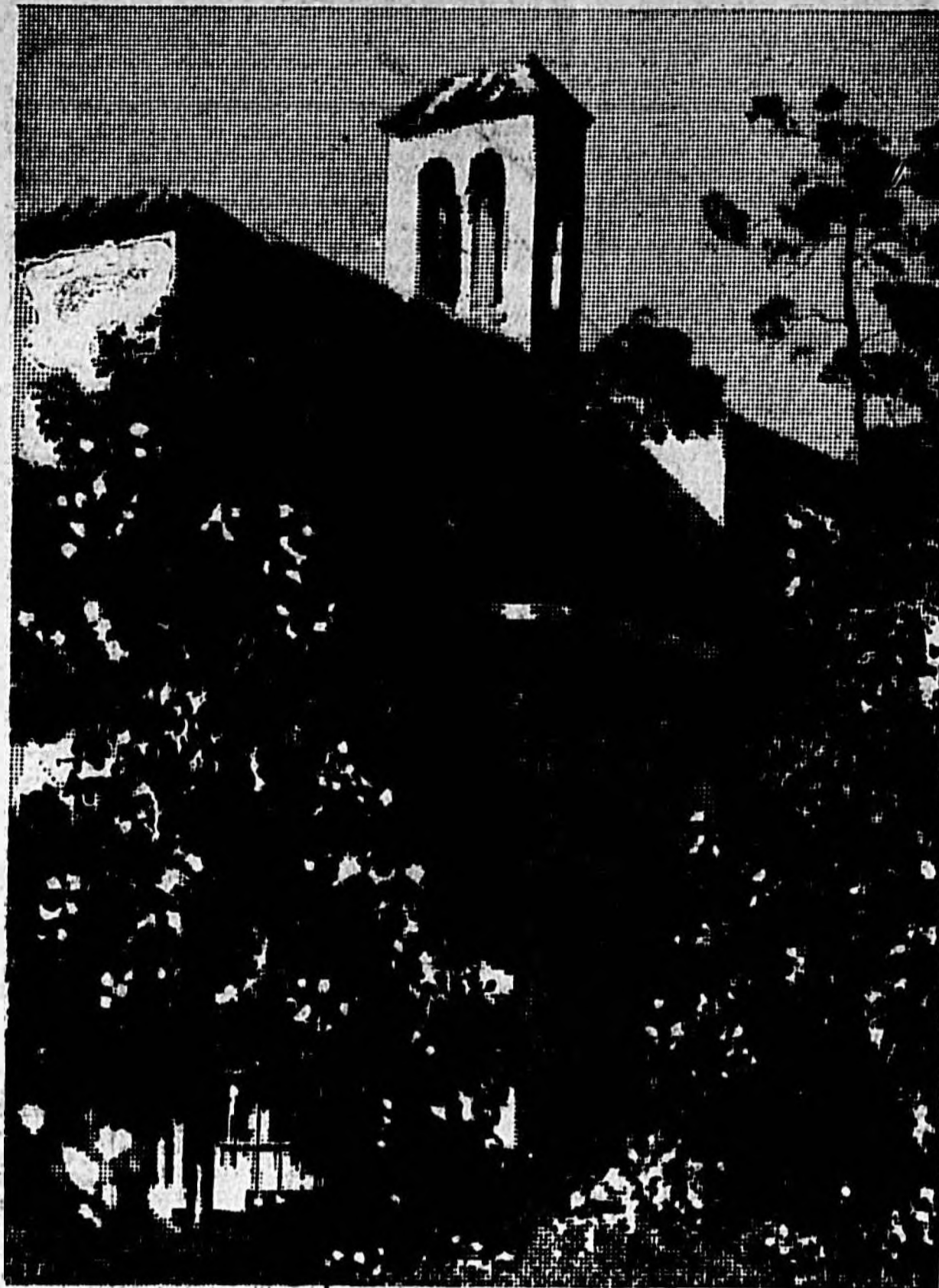

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE ACQUISITION AND ESTABLISHMENT OF A WATER WORKS PLANT OR PLANTS BY THE CITY OF SANFORD, FLORIDA, TO BE MAINTAINED AND OPERATED AS A PUBLIC UTILITY, AND PROVIDING FOR AN ISSUE OF UTILITY BONDS BY THE CITY OF SANFORD, FLORIDA, IN THE SUM OF THREE HUNDRED AND SEVENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS, THE PROCEEDS TO BE DERIVED FROM THE SALE THEREOF TO BE USED TO ACQUIRE, ESTABLISH, PURCHASE AND CONSTRUCT A WATER WORKS PLANT OR PLANTS.

Whereas, the Charter of the City of Sanford, Florida, provides, among other things, that the City of Sanford, Florida, shall have the right to acquire, establish, own and operate as a public utility, a water works plant or plants and to provide the City and the inhabitants thereof, with water, and

Whereas, the City Commission of the City of Sanford, Florida, now deems it most expedient and to the best interest of the City of Sanford, Florida, to acquire, establish, maintain and operate as a public utility, a water works plant or plants, and

Therefore, Be It Enacted By The People of the City of Sanford, Florida:

Section 1. to-wit: To acquire, establish, purchase and construct a water works plant or plants, including suitable land, easements, structures, boilers, engines, dynamos, machinery stand pipes, reservoirs, pumps, conduits, and other apparatus and appliances necessary in obtaining, accumulating and distributing an adequate supply of water, said water works plants or plants, when completed, to be operated and maintained by the City of Sanford, Florida, as a public utility, for the purpose of furnishing to the City of Sanford, Florida, and to the inhabitants thereof, an adequate and ample supply of water.

Section 3. It is the determination of the City Commission of the City of Sanford, Florida, that the said sum of Three Hundred and Seventy-five Thousand (\$375,000.00) Dollars, will be required for the purpose mentioned in Sections One and Two of this Ordinance.

That a bond issue in the sum of Three Hundred and Seventy-five Thousand (\$375,000.00) Dollars, for the municipal purpose enumerated and specifically set forth in Sections One and Two of this Ordinance, is hereby authorized, provided, however, that before said bonds or any part of said bonds shall be issued, this ordinance shall be first approved by a majority vote of the electors of the City of Sanford, Florida, actually participating in an election to be called and held at such time and in such manner as is prescribed by the Charter and the ordinances of the City of Sanford, Florida.

Whereas, the Charter of the City of Sanford, Florida, provides among other things that the City of Sanford, Florida, shall have the right to acquire, establish, own and operate, as a public utility, an electric light and power plant or plants, and to provide the City and the inhabitants thereof, with electric current for power and light, and,

Section Three: That it is the determination of the City Commission of the City of Sanford, Florida, that the said sum of Three Hundred and Ten Thousand (\$310,000.00) Dollars, will be required for the purpose mentioned in Sections One and Two of this Ordinance.

Whereas, the Charter of the City of Sanford, Florida, provides among other things that the City of Sanford, Florida, shall have the right to acquire, establish, own and operate as a public utility, a gas plant or plants, and to provide the City and the inhabitants thereof with commercial gas, and

Section Two: That the City Commission of the City of Sanford, Florida, further deems it expedient and to the best interest of the City of Sanford, Florida, and it is the determination of the City Commission of the City of Sanford, Florida, to issue utility bonds of the City of Sanford, Florida, in the sum of One Hundred and Sixty Thousand (\$160,000.00) Dollars, the proceeds derived from the sale of said bonds to be used for the following municipal purpose, to-wit: To acquire, establish, purchase and construct a gas plant or plants, including suitable land, easements, structures, boilers, engines, dynamos, machinery, reservoirs, tanks, conduits, conductors, pipes, gasometers, and other apparatus and appliances for making, manufacturing, generating and distributing commercial gas, said gas plant or plants, when completed, to be operated, and maintained by the City of Sanford, Florida, as a public utility, for the purpose of furnishing to the City of Sanford, Florida, and to the inhabitants thereof, an adequate and ample supply of commercial gas.

Section Three: That it is the determination of the City Commission of the City of Sanford, Florida, that the said sum of One Hundred and Sixty Thousand (\$160,000.00) Dollars, will be required for the purpose mentioned in Sections One and Two of this ordinance.

Section Four: That a bond issue in the sum of One Hundred and Sixty Thousand (\$160,000.00) Dollars, for the municipal purpose enumerated and specifically set forth in Sections One and Two of this Ordinance, is hereby authorized, provided, however, that before said bonds or any part of said bonds shall be issued, this ordinance shall be first approved by a majority vote of the electors of the City of Sanford, Florida, actually participating in an election to be called and held at such time and in such manner as is prescribed by the Charter and the ordinances of the City of Sanford, Florida.
