

JACKSONVILLE- (UPI) Miss America of 1964 her honey-brown hair covered with grime and her eyes reddened, said it with stark simplicity: "I didn't think that we would get out of there alive."

Clad in a white hospital gown and sitting in a wheel chair, beautiful Donna Axum, told how she was rescued from the Roosevelt Hotel after spending more than an hour in a smoke-filled room

on the 10th floor Sunday. "The first thing I heard this morning was the telephone ringing in the living room of our suite," said the 21-year-old University of Arkansas student from El Dorado, Ark.

"We just thought it was the telephone operator trying to wake us early, so we ignored it. But then I heard the sirens and smelled the smoke." Miss Axum said she woke her chaperone, Miss Lucille Previtti of Lynwood, N. J., and they donned bathrobes and slippers and tried to enter the hall.

"The smoke in the hall was terrible so we went back into our rocm," Miss America said.

"We tried to stay at the window but Lucille passed out and dropped to the floor," she continued. "I could tell she was still breathing so I didn't worry about her. . ." Miss Axum said she was

able to carry on a shouting conversation with Bill Cashman, the man in charge of ber Gator Bowl appearance, as he stodd in the street be-

Asked what she said to him, Miss America smiled and answered: "Come get me." Miss Axum said that after she and Miss Previtti had

been in the room an hour William Fielden Jr., 19, son from Miami who has been handling her Florida appearance, kicked down her door. Fielden then carried the two women across the hall to the room where he, his father and brother were stay-

"I didn't know who it was at first," Miss Axum said, but I recognized him after he came into the room. After I saw Bill I just knew everything was going to be all right."

The elder Fielden said there was little smoke in his room and that they waited there quietly until two firemen came and led them down 10 flights of stairs and out of the hotel.

Doctors said they would keep her in a hospital this morning. After her release she is to go to Miami to take part in the Orange Bowl parade on New Year's Day.

Doctors said her condition was excellent and they do not expect her to experience any ill effects from the heavy smoke.





Nikita Talks Of East-West **Agreements**

MOSCOW - Premier Niki a S. Khrushehev said today he believes East-West agree ment can be reached in the war issues, including reduction of armed forces and military spending on both sides.

In an exclusive statement to United Press International this correspond ent's questions on the pros pects for peace in 1964 Khruschev cited Soviet budget cuts for military spending earlier this month and said: "It would be a good thing it other states took similar action . . . I would call it a policy of mutual example in the curtailment of the arms

Face." Khruschev listed these areas of possible agreement:

—The slowing down of the arms race and further alleviation of international tensions.

-Reduction in the armed forces and cuts in military expenditures. -The reduction of armed

forces stationed in other countries. -A non-agression pact between the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) and the Communist Warsaw

Treaty powers. -The establishment of nuclear-free zones and agree ment to prevent the spread of nuclear weapons.

"An effort should be made to restrict the arms race, step by step, thereby fostering a favorable atmosphere for the radical solution of this issue through general and complete disarmament," Khrushchev sald.

Addressing himself to the people of the United States,

"In the coming year we want to see the development of relations of peaceful cooperation, good neighborliness and friendship between the people of the United States and the Soviet Union.

"This is important for our countries. It is important for other nations, too."

Arguing that the Soviet Union needs peace to advance its ambitious economic plans, Khrushchev said:

"The American people, we believe, do not want war either. The Soviet people are gratified to note that many people in the U. S., including prominent figures, believe it necessary to seek ways to bring about mutual understanding and achieve agreements, peaceful settlements, on disputed problems."

Khrushchev endorsed the late President Kennedy's policy of peaceful cooperation expressed satisfaction that President Johnson has declared his intention to continue that policy...

Science Helping Keep Fish Fresh

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UPI) . Families someday may be able to store fresh fish in the refrigerator for three weeks without loss of its goodness, an Oregon State University food scientist says.

R. O. Sinnhuber said a new way of preserving food, radiation - pasteurization, offers promise of extending shelf-life of foods if certain problems ean be overcome. He and mierobiologist A. W. Anderson are directing research on the effect of radiation-pasteurization on food spoilage organisms in sea-foods, under a \$28,000 contract with the Atomic Engergy Commission.

In radiation - pasteurization, Sinnhuber said, fairly low dosages of gamma rays are passed through food, killing nearly all the bacteria. No haet is involved in the process and the food is in no way radioactive.

Research workers also want to learn about microorganisms surviving the radiation treatment and about those that develop during storage. Sinnhuber said radiation of seafoods was a promising hope for extending the world's lood supply if further research and development can be continued.
