SANFORD - A Sanford man who allegedly held a gun to the head of a fast food restaurant employee while threatening to kill her was arrested by Sanford police responding to a burglary in progress late last night at Burger King.

Five employees had been locked in the freezer and a sixth threatened with a gun before police apprehended the man at the Sanford Burger King, 2930 S. Orlando Dr.

Kevin Renard Brown, 25, of 1702 McCarthy Avenue, has been charged with armed robbery, five counts of false imprisonment, use of a firearm in the commission of a felony, and possession of a firearm by a convicted felon.

# Murder probe continues

WINTER SPRINGS - Police are seeking a Winter Springs man for questioning after the body of his estranged wife was found stuffed in the trunk of a car.

The body of Becky Darlene Ormiston was found Sunday, about the time she was to report for work as a nurse at West Lake Hospital in Longwood.

She walked her children in the (Sanford) neighborhood. She was a wonderful, sweet woman. -Mary Collins

Seminole County Sheriff's spokesman George Procchel said Robert Ormiston is believed to be in the northeast, possibly Rhode Island where authorities have been notified police would like to question him. Proechel said this morning the cause of death for Mrs. Ormiston was strangulation.

Prior to moving to Winter Springs, the couple had lived on Magnolia Avenue in Sanford for nearly three years, according to Mrs. Ormiston's friend and neighbor, Mary Collins.

# New bar codes appear on mail

WASHINGTON - Many of the letters arriving in America's mailboxes Monday had longer codes printed below the address - an effort to speed sorting by automation.

The new bar codes, a series of long and short lines like the codes on food and other product, permit machines to sort business mail down to the letter carrier's route.

The codes do not apply to nonbusiness mail sent by individuals.

In addition to the 5-digit ZIP code, the new bar codes will include four digits for speed sorting and two additional digits for a carrier's route. For the first, time the letters also will carry a printed version of the code for sorting by hand if necessary.

# 2 AF men die in fiery crash

FORT WALTON BEACH - Two Air Force men stationed at nearby Hurlburt Field have died in a flery single-truck crash here.

An Air Force spokesman Monday identified them as Airman 1st Class Jason D. Napier, 21, whose parents live in Bellbrook, Ohio, and Franklin, Ohio, and Airman 1st Class Blake Toothman, 23, of Cambridge, Idaho.

Both had been assigned to the 1st Special Operations Maintenance Squadron at Hurlburt, said Sr. Airman Dean Miller.

They were killed Saturday when their pickup truck clipped a concrete light post at about 70 miles per hour, hit an electrical pole. flipped and burst into flame, said police traffic homicide investigator Rick Troilinger.

"Because of the rolling and flipping they did. I couldn't tell who was driving." he said. "They were burned beyond recognition."

### Private company wants to build prison

FORT MYERS - A private company says it can relieve overcrowding by building a 2,500-bed prison in rural Hendry County and charging the state to house inmates.

"it's a possible solution for some of the state's problems," said Richard Buss, senior vice president of South Florida Corrections Inc. of Fort Myers.

Buss said the rate would be competitive with the daily average of \$39.71 to keep inmates in existing state prisons.

Bob Macmaster, spokesman for the Department of Correc-tions, said budget officials weren't familiar with the proposal.

Buss said he briefed 12 state officials March 15, including Corrections Secretary Harry Singletary and state lawmakers Tim Ireland and Keith Arnold, both of Fort Myers.

Hendry County Administrator Lionel Beatty favors the proposal. He said it would create jobs and increase the tax base in the county, which already has a state prison for about 1,000 inmates.

# Lawyers boycott court appointments

FORT LAUDERDALE - A judge was forced to take out classified newspaper ads to find lawyers for death penalty cases after a dispute over fees led local attorneys to boycott court appointments.

The dispute began when Chief Broward County Judge Dale Ross signed an order slashing 28 percent from the pay appointed lawyers receive, touching off a series of accusations. closed-door meetings and negotiations.

When all failed, Broward defense lawyers turned to a tacit boycott, refusing to accept court-appointed capital cases. Private lawyers are appointed to represent indigents when public defenders have conflicts that keep them off the case.

Ross countered with help-wanted ads in three local trade newspapers, seeking replacements willing to work at the lower rate, which was cut from \$70 an hour to \$50 an hour, with a maximum fee of \$25,000 per case.

While judges scramble to find competent lawyers willing to work at the cut-rate prices, at least two murder defendants too poor to hire their own lawyers languish in Broward jalis.

# NEWS FROM THE REGION AND ACROSS THE STATE **Republicans reluctant** Governor pushes for agreement on health care reform

TALLAHASSEE - Gov. Lawton Chiles continued to negotiate Monday with reluctant Republicans on his health care reform bill, but agreement appeared elusive.

The governor, who has hinted he may call the Legislature back for a special session if an acceptable health care reform doesn't pass before the April 2 adjournment, asked legislators to give his proposals a chance to work.

"Is everything going to work on this perfect? No. it might not." Chiles said. "But what we have isn't working now. We can't sort of sit here and wait for the perfect thing to come along."

Chiles summoned key lawmakers to his office for a 40-minute meeting on the bill, which has passed the House but remains stuck in a Senate committee.

Chiles wants to set up 11 regional organizations that would pool their purchasing power in an effort to bring down health care costs and provide access to care for 2.5 million uninsured Floridians. The bill would create the framework for reforms targeted for enactment by 1995.

Sen. Alberto Gutman, the Miami Republican who chairs the Senate Health Care Committee, has raised objections to including 1.7 million Medicaid recipients and 300.000 state workers and their dependents in the purchasing organizations, which Chiles favors.

"We need to make comprehensive changes to the system, but at the same time we can't trade quality," Gutman said. "What happens if the (regional alliances) don't work out? This is unproven."

Chiles agreed to insert language in the bill that would ensure its impact could not reduce benefits for Medicaid recipients or state workers. He also said Gutman's worry that the plan would eliminate patients' ability to choose their doctors was unfounded.

The governor said it is essential to include the public sector in the regional organizations to get the most out of every health care dollar.

"We want purchasing power." Chiles said. "At some stage, we've got to determine if we're concerned about the 2.5 million people who don't have any coverage.'

Gutman said he was "willing to do whatever it takes" to reach a compromise. The Health Care Committee is scheduled to consider the reform bills Tuesday morning.

# Retired ship loss women 10

PENSACOLA, Fla. (AP) -Navy women say they may lose an opportunity to serve at sea, and for the career advancement that goes with it, if the Navy's largest mixed-gender ship is retired.

They also would lose their only chance to serve on an aircraft carrier if the Navy decommissions the USS Forrestal. Those in aviation specialties would have virtually nowhere else to go for sea duty.

The ship, based at the Pensacola Naval Air Station but now undergoing an overhaul in Philadelphia, has been targeted for the Navy's mothball fleet as a cost-cutting measure.

Part of the \$157 million overhaul is to reconfigure berthing space to accommodate 900 women. The Forrestal is the only carrier on which women can serve because it is classified as a non-combat ship. Federal law prohibits females from serving in combat.

# Nuclear plant safety urged during storms

HUTCHINSON ISLAND - Greenpeace urged the Nuclear Regulatory Commission to investigate the safety of nuclear plants during severe storms and hurricanes.

Turkey Point was on a "hot shutdown" during the Aug. 24 hurricane. The NRC said FPL was correct in going to that shutdown during the storm.

The storm inflicted \$90 million in damages, destroying the plant's administration building and wiping out all the security cameras and sensors.

### Second plant closes in Panama City

PANAMA CITY - The Louisiana Plastics plant here will close in nine months and probably lay off most of its 96 employees. company officials said.

It is the second Panama City manufacturing plant to announce its closure in four months. Goody Products in December disclosed it would shut down a 139-employee plant that made plastic items for women's hair.

The Louisiana Plastics plant makes plastic cups and containers for the food packaging and food service industries. It is being closed because of the high cost of shipping goods

to and from Panama City, said Walter Riesen, vice president of Illinois-based Packaging Resources Inc., which recently acquired Louisians Plastics from Bernis Co.

He said some of the Panama City employees may be given a chance to relocate at other plants.

# NASA tries to get to the bottom of engine shutdown

CAPE CANAVERAL - Columbia's flight has been put off for at least three weeks while NASA tries to get to the bottom of an engine shutdown that aborted the shuttle launch a heartstopping three seconds from liftoff.

NASA scrambled Monday to make sure there were no leaks that could cause a launch-pad fire or explosion after the shutdown, which was blamed on a stuck valve. The space agency said the seven astronauts were never in any danger.

The U.S.-German research mission originally was scheduled for five years ago but was postponed by the 1986 Challenger disaster and by other problems in the past six weeks. The nine-day flight is off for at least three more weeks while NASA tries to pinpoint the

problem with the valve and fix it.

"We certainly want to understand what happened and assure ourselves that it doesn't have any application across the fleet," shuttle manager Leonard Nicholson said.

Shuttle officials hope to decide by the end of this week whether to bump shuttle Discovery ahead of Columbia. Discovery already is on

NASA's other isunch pad, where it is being readied for liftoff around April 7.

Scientists involved in Discovery's atmospheric research mission want to get started as soon as possible so they can measure the ozone over the Northern Hemisphere during the crucial winter-to-spring transition.

"We're arguing as strongly as we can." said mission scientist Timothy Miller.

Nicholson said it's too carly to say what effect the delay will have on this year's schedule of eight shuttle flights.

On Monday, two of Columbia's main engines ignited properly in the final 61/2 seconds of the countdown. But a valve in the third engine apparently failed to close, and the engine did not fire correctly, NASA said.

On-board computers sensed the problem and shut down all three engines.

Engine valves were blamed for the two previous engine shutdowns on the launch pad. in 1984 with Discovery four seconds before liftoff and in 1985 with Challenger three. seconds before launch.

On that same Challenger mission, two weeks later, an engine shut down prematurely 51/2 minutes into the flight, forcing the shuttle into a lower-than-intended orbit.

"It's probably been my ticket to be advanced," Chief Petty Officer, Paula Stewart told the Pensacola News Journal for a story Sunday.

Without shipboard experience it is difficult to get good evaluation reports, said the meteorologist, one of 216 women now among the Forrestal's 2,000-member crew.

"That's what the Navy's all

about, going to sea," she said. Petty Officer Wendy Roth walted seven years for a job directing traffic on a carrier deck. She finally got it last year when the Forrestal came to Pensacola to replace the USS Lexington as the Navy's training carrier. The Lexington is now a floating museum in Corpus Christi, Texas.

"If they eliminate the Forrestal they eliminate any opportunity for me to go on a ship and learn the shipboard aspect of my job," Roth said.

Lt. Amanda Balika, a public affairs officer, said she would be on shore duty if not for the Forrestal.

# Juries' racial makeup debated

MIAMI - The debate over the racial makeup of juries did not begin with the cases of William Lozano or Rodney King. But it is an issue which has been thrust once again to the forefront of the American courtroom.

"It's the major issue facing the courts today," says Paul Roths-tein, a law professor at Georgetown University and former chairman of the American Bar Association's criminal procedure committee.

"In order to produce peace and harmony, verdicts have to be accepted by all comers, and that requires an effort to get a diverse population on your jury." he says.

Several acquittals recently have not yielded that "peace and harmony," and many blame the racial makeup of the juries.

Lozano, a suspended Miami policeman, was convicted of firing a bullet which resulted in the deaths of two black men. An appeals court overturned his 1989 manslaughter conviction. igniting three days of bloody riots. His retrial has been marred and delayed by the jury issue.

in Los Angeles, an all-white jury's acquittal of the white policemen who beat King sparked the 1992 riots.

In New York, a mostly black and Hispanic jury sparked angry protests from the Jewish community when a black teen-ager accused of stabbing a Hasidic scholar was acquitted late last YCBL

In Memphis, a judge's decision to try a black congressman with a white jury bused in from the suburbs outraged the black verdicts.

on juries. In 1930, Clarence Darrow, the legendary trial lawyer, described Irishmen and Jews as "more sympathetic and lenient to a defendant" as compared to Englishmen and Scandinavians, "whose passion for the enforcement of law and order is stronger.'

But it wasn't until the 1970s, after the Supreme Court ruled jury lists must reflect a crosssection of communities, that psychologists and sociologists began to investigate the matter.

The retrial of Lozano underlines this sensitive issue of race and juries and bears some truth to the contention that ethnic backgrounds do affect

The suspended officer is set to go on trial for manslaughter in Orlando this May following a legal ping-pong match over what Florida city's racial makeup will produce a fair and just jury pool. Florida legislators last week passed a law requiring judges to consider the demographic makeup of communities before moving trials to different cities. The Lozano trial was moved five times between three cities.

In Georgia, jury lists currently are computed to match state population exactly, by age, race and sex, to ensure that everyone is equally represented.

However, the most radical proposal has come from Minnesota, where the state Supreme Court is considering quotas on grand juries, requiring each 23-member panel include at least two minorities.

Macomb County Prosecutor Carl Marlinga and Kevorkian's lawyer, Geoffrey Fieger, asked Judge Mark Switalaski to dismiss the inquest. In return, Mrs. Gale and Nicol agreed to be interviewed by Marlinga and were given immunity.

Marlinga will decide whether to pursue charges against Kevorkian based on their sworn statements.

Gale died at his Roseville home after inhaling carbon monoxide through a mask. He suffered from emphysema and congestive heart disease.

Marlinga reopened the case Feb. 25 after receiving a document an abortion foe said she found in Nicol's garbage.

The document - Kevorkian's report of Gale's death - indicates Gale panicked after the mask was placed over his face and asked that it be removed.

Kevorkian's attorneys have claimed that the document is a first draft in which Kevorkian made mistakes and that it was corrected and retyped. A different copy of the document was found in Kevorkian's Royal Oak apartment.

Mrs. Gale has said all went according to plan in her husband's death.

The inquest had been called to determine whether the death was accidental, suicide or homicide.

Kevorkian was charged with murder in his first three assisted suicides, but charges were dropped when judges ruled Michigan had no law against the practice. A ban is now in place.

Also Monday, Fieger filed a lawsuit on behalf of Mrs. Gale against Lynn Mills - who fished the document out of Nicol's trash - and several other abortion foes. "She's a garbage-picking lunatic," Fieger said of Mills.

# LETTERS **Alcohol statistics**

Citizens have a right to expect the truth from governmental agencies. However, estimates of the extent of alcohol problems, and of the number of problem drinkers, are systematically inflated by the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA), the federal center for Sub-stance Abuse Prevention (CSAP), and others who have a vested self-interest in misleading the American public. The velfare, if not the survival, of the alcohol agencies depends largely on promoting the widespread belief that alcohol problems are enormous, that they are growing, and that they are a serious burden on the economy. While such agencies typically state as fact that alcohol is reponsible for half of all traffic deaths in the United States, this statistic has no solid foundation. That figure includes all traffic fatalities in which anyone involved (passengers, for exam-ple) has consumed any alcohol at all. The most accurate estimates, however, from the unbiased national Academy of Sciences, are that roughly one-quarter of fatal accidents are caused by Intoxication. Similarly, estimates of the number of auto accidents in which alcohol might be involved in any way (passenger, pedestrian, etc.) become transformed into statistics on the number of accidents that are actually caused by drunk drivers. In addition to exaggerating the extent of drinking problems, alcohol agencies also distort the costs of alcohol abuse by besing estimates on questionable assumptions, by confusing correlation with causality, by looking only at costs while ignoring the economic benefits of alcohol, and by not using sound accounting principles. However, the agencies' seriously flawed and inflated estimates are routinely presented to the American public as factual knowledge. Estimates by independent researchers of the number of people who have experienced any drinking problem within the previous three years as well as those of the number likely ever to experience a problem in the future have been transformed into agency assertions of the actual number of problem drinkers. And this in spite of protests of the researchers to the distortions and misuse of their data. The motives of the alcohol agencies are clearly apparent. One is an attempt to justify the existence of jobs while the other is to expand bureaucratic budgets and power. dent Clinton was elected on a pledge of change. One of his first changes should be to make certain NIAAA. CSAP and other governmental agencies are responsible to truth and to the best interests of the American people. # Extending sympathy to the smoker

I am not a smoker. But I truly sympathize with recent 250 percent tax hike imposed on tobacco those who dare to light up these days. They very well may be the most oppressed minority group in this country.

As recently as two decades ago, smokers could take a drag almost anywhere they pleased airplanes, restaurants, offices. Then, in 1972, the surgeon general declared secondhand smoke a health hazard. In the ensuing years, 46 states have passed laws either restricting or banning smoking in public places.

Nowhere are smokers more besieged than in California. At the same time that Sacramento is cutting health programs for the poor - no more wheelchairs or hearing aids or outpatient drugs - it is lavishing \$24 million on radio and TV commercials that portray smokers as only alightly less anti-social than serial killers.

Meanwhile, the California Assembly is considering a complement of anti-smoking bills. The most odious - at least from a civil libertarian perspective - would outlaw smoking in all public and private buildings, except residences. Say you own a filling station. You couldn't even smoke in your own office. Say you checked into a hotel. You couldn't smoke in the privacy of your

double cigarette taxes. This would follow a nightmare."

To find a more Draconian treatment of smoking, one must go all the way back to the 17th century, during which period several popes made it a policy to excommunicate smokers, while in China, Turkey, Persia and Russia smokers'were executed, flogged or had their noses slit.

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The anti-smoking crowd knows that an outright prohibition of smoking would probably be found unconstitutional. So what we are observing in California and other states is a backdoor campaign by the anti-smoking lobby to effect a de facto ban on smoking by exploiting the government's power to tax and regulate.

The anti-smokers figure that if state legislatures raise tobacco levies high enough and place enough restrictions on when and where people can take a smoke, people will begin to find it too expensive or too inconvenient to light up.

This very-near insidious anti-smoking crusade was given a recent boost by a shockingly irresponsible Environmental Protection Agency report. EPA declared that secondhand smoke is a leading cause of lung cancer in non-smokers. causing some 3,000 deaths a year.

EPA's finding is a clear example of bad science being used to justify politically correct policy.

# JAY D. HAIR World Bank funding should halt

Heating a house in the dead of winter while leaving the windows wide open is about equivalent to the World Bank's record of promoting environmentally sound development in poorer nations. The money keeps pouring in to spark Third World economies, but things aren't getting better, and in many cases, they're worse.

The Clinton administration has the means to force change. It can close down the spigot of U.S. contributions and urge other donor nations to do the same unless the bank's secrecy, failure and counter-productive projects are reformed. The remedy is harsh, but not disproportionate to the waste of resources. both financial and natural, now countenanced by the bank's actions.

The tragedy of this is that with \$20 billion in annual loans, the World Bank is the principal source of financing the industrialized world provides to nations in desperate need of assistance.

Three ongoing examples, including two involving the Global Environment Facility which the bank runs in coordination with U.N. agencies, illustrate the problems.

- The environmental fund is preparing to spend \$5 million to protect some of the extraordinarily rich coral reefs in Egyptian waters along the Red Sea. Certainly, that sounds like a worthy objective. "Sweeping development based on exploitation of its wealth of marine life for tourism" is damaging the recis, an executive summary of the plan reports. But wait. Where is all the tourist pressure coming from? Well, one source is a separate \$250 million World Bank plan aimed at promoting tourism along the very coasts the environmental fund effort is supposed to protect.

- In the Congo the environmental fund is pushing a \$10 million grant to, among other things, build roads into a pristine rain forest to begin developing a tourist trade. Plausible perhaps, if carried out sensibly. But it's really only the sugar coating over a \$20 million World Bank loan plan designed, according to project documents, to bring "forestry exploita-tion back to life." As it turns out, again according to bank documents, the loan deal has to be balanced with a grant to keep the overall interest rate within the Congo's means. In effect, an environmental fund grant is to be the balt used to close the larger World Bank loan.

-- Last summer, in response to worldwide criticism, the World Bank commissioned a review of the massive \$10 billion Narmada Valley dam building plan in India. Its construction will likely displace 240,000 people. according to the review, or well over twice the number the World Bank had originally said would have to leave their homes. The review panel found that reacttlement of those displaced "is not possible under prevailing conditions."

The panel warned of "compelling evidence" that the project "will not operate as planned." The U.S. member of the bank's executive board bluntly told his colleagues that a decision to continue the project "will signal that no matter how egregious the situation, no

matter how flawed the project, no matter how many policies have been violated, and no matter how clear the remedies prescribed, the bank will go forward on its own terms." But that's exactly what the executive board voted to do by continuing Narmada funding.

An internal World Bank audit, leaked to the press in Novem-ber, adds to the evidence that the bank is paying for envi-ronmentally and socially destructive projects in grim contravention of the

strategies it is supposed to promote. The audit found that of the projects completed in 1991, the bank's own staff ranked 37 percent of them complete failures. Most of the \$1.6 billion devoted to the environment was used to give a green tint to bad projects. The audit revealed that the heart of the problem is that the bank's staff is more driven by pressure to keep the loan money flowing than by hewing to standards that will produce successful projects.

There are three essentials to reforming this meas. The bank must end its secrecy, involve the people it seeks to benefit and stop ignoring its own environmental policies. The proceedings and documentation of bank projects need a heavy dose of sunshine. These are public projects financed with public monies. They should be opened to the widest possible public scrutiny, especially by those whose lives are influenced by the bank's actions. Projects should be developed with the coordination of the people ultimately involved, not just government ministers eager to secure loans. The bank has no lack of sound environmental policies committed to paper. Now the commitment must be made to enforce them.

To make the point, the administration can ask Congress to vote down this year's pending \$1,3 billion in appropriations for the World Bank. Then it can urge other industrial powers to follow sult.

We've had executives tell us they bought tickets just to get rid of us. We knew if we ever got them there, they'd be hooked.

Springfield realtor Carol Jones had the idea of buying several hundred tickets and giving them away, and several of the group followed her lead. "We told them to talk it up over coffee," Wynn says. "When the men are standing around talking about sports, pull out a couple of tickets and say. 'Here - come.'"

Darleen Anderson, owner of Springfield fitness centers, remembers when it wasn't always casy to give the tickets away: "One man laughed in my face. The only experience he'd had with women's sports was his daughter's team in high school, when they were more worried about how their hair looked. He went to a (SMSU) game and then came back and apologized. He said he'd had no idea they were playing at that level."

Word spread and more men began coming to Lady Bears games. Soon they were buying season tickets. The SMSU women made it to the NCAA Final Four last year and sold 3,552 season tickets for 1992-93.

The Lady Bears had the highest average attendance of any women's basketball team in the nation this season, drawing more in one game than six of the women's teams in the Missouri Valley Conference drew all season. Another MVC women's team, Southern Illinois - with 24,000 enrolled to SMSU's 20,672 - averages just 531 a game.

# Fed likely to hold steady credit course-for now

WASHINGTON - Federal Reserve policy-makers meeting privately today aren't likely to change interest rates but they probably will begin maneuvering over the timing of rate increases later this year. economists said.

"The seeds of conflict have been planted and will be planted further at this meeting," said economist David Jones of Aubrey G. Lanston & Co., a government securities trader in New York.

Currently, economic growth is too well entrenched to warrant another reduction in interest rates, he said. At the same time, the projected growth-dampening effects of President Clinton's deficit-reduction plan probably will prevent policy-makers from raising rates now.

However, at some point, prob-

Then the outward harmony among policy-makers will be shattered and they will divide into camps - "hawks" favoring tight money and higher rates to contain inflation and "doves" concerned about keeping rates low enough to keep growth going.

"Some think if you wait (to raise rates) until you see the whites of inflation's eyes, it's too late. But others, like (Fed Chairman Alan) Greenspan want to remain in the good graces of the administration," Jones said. Economists anticipate that Clinton's program, after providing the economy with an initial

boost, will start to pinch growth with higher taxes and a reduced deficit. That argues for keeping rates low to stimulate economic growth by encouraging borrowing and spending by businesses and consumers.

"The Clinton plan will be a drag on the economy. ... If the Fed were to raise interest rates now, they may just have to lower them in a year," said economist Paul Getman of Regional Financial Associates in West Chester, Pa.

On the other hand, recent government price reports show a pickup in inflation during January and February. That would argue for an increase in shortterm interest rates, to dampen demand and keep price presaures down.

# **FBI worried** cultists are fit for battle

WACO, Texas - Federal agents are pleased some of David Koresh's disciples have left the Branch Davidian compound, but they're worried that those still holed up are more fit for battle.

Thirteen adult members of the doomsday cult have left the compound since the standoff began in a bloody shootout 24 days ago. Most of them. however, have been elderly or infirm. No children have left since March 5.

"It does appear that so far the ones who have been released are those who do not necessarily supply them with any benefits to accomplish what they want to accomplish." FBI agent Bob Ricks said Monday.

"The elderly and those people, if there were in fact another breakout of hostilities, those people would probably not be involved."

Four federal agents were killed in a gun battle that erupted Feb. 28 during a weapons raid by the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms. At least two cultists were slain.

Although nine adult cult members left the compound between Friday and Sunday after-noon, Ricks said the FBI had been led to believe more were coming out; 79 adults and 17 children were believed still inside.

"We were hoping to perhaps see a turnaround with the release of the children and release of those people who are of younger-type age who would pose a threat to us," Ricks said.

As a result, he said, "We are still continuing to take defensive measures because we believe the nucleus of control and power within that compound remains."

The FBI and ATF pruned brush and debris around the compound to make sure it could not offer cover for cult snipers. Before dawn Monday, the FBI blared monotonous Tibetan chants on loudspeakers to annoy the cultists.

# Abstinence day set to thwart teenage sex

YGRK. Pa. — A long walk in the park. Lingering over a candlelight dinner. Working out at the gym until midnight.

Could activities like that keep teen-age minds off sex?

The Teen Pregnancy Coalition of York County hoped so Monday, declaring its first Great



Sex-Out Day to impress on unmarried teen-agers the joys of abatinence. It gave out brochures suggesting such

alternatives to sex as baking cookies, taking moonlight walks and "holding one another close."

The aim was only partly to keep teen-agers -and older people, for that matter - in their own beds. The coalition also wanted to call attention to teen pregnancy and encourage discussion of

the problem in homes, schools and churches. "We're just hoping that this piques people's interest enough so that they'll think about it." said Lois Backus, executive director of Planned Parenthood in York.

The coalition, a 6-year-old group composed of government and private social-service agencies, estimates that teen-agers accounted for 21.3 percent of all births in the city of York in 1991, one of the highest rates in the state.

Nationwide in 1990, 12.8 percent of babies were born to mothers under 20, according to the National Center for Health Statistics.

Blue-collar York has only about 42,000 residents but all the problems of a big city, such as high AIDS infection rates and homelessness, Backus said.

Joe Fay, chairman of the coalition, said York's birth rate might also be high because the area is strongly anti-abortion and residents are not general inclined toward open, frank discussions about sex.

# Allen: Soon-Yi initiated nude photos session

NEW YORK — Woody Allen's nude photos of Mia Farrow's college-age daughter were in-troduced against him in the celebrities' bitter child-custody case.

In testimony Monday, Allen defended the half-dozen snapshots of 22-year-old Soon-Yi Farrow Previn, calling them crotic, not porno-graphic. He said the photos were Previn's idea, though he arranged the scene. Allen said he told her: "Lay back on the sofa

and give me your most crotic posses. Let yourself go.

The half-dozen photos that led to the falling-out between the filmmaker and his leading lady were introduced by Farrow's lawyer, Eleanor Alter. The 57-year-old Allen said he struck up an

affair with Farrow's adopted daughter after his relationship with Farrow had become "joyless, sexless." He said he considered Previn an adult, unrelated to Farrow's other children.

"I screwed up." he said under questioning from Farrow's lawyer. "I caused this thing to happen. OK. but don't seek vengeance on me through the kids.

Allen wants custody of their 5-year-old son. Satchel, and their two adopted children, Dylan, 7, and Moses, 14. He claims Farrow is an unfit mother.

Allen said he had wanted to break the news gently to Farrow about his affair with Previn, but her discovery of the snapshots made that impossible.

# Judge may be Clinton's pick for FBI chief

**BOSTON - President Clinton reportedly wants** to replace embattled FBI Director William Sessions with a Massachusetts Judge and longtime friend.

The Boston Globe and The Wall Street Journal said today that the president's top choice is Superior Court Judge Richard C. Stearns, who met Clinton in 1968 when both were Rhodes scholars at Oxford University.

The newspapers said Stearns has met with White House officials to discuss the job.

Sessions, accused of ethics violations, will probably be asked to resign soon, the newspapers said, citing unidentified government sources.

However, the Journal said Sessions would not be removed until the three-week armed standoff in Waco, Texas, is resolved.

Only the president can replace the FBI director. Clinton spokesman George Stephanopolous said Monday there were no immediate plans to remove Sessions.

The Justice Department said Attorney General Janet Reno had not yet made a recommendation to Clinton on the allegations against Session.

Stearns. 48, graduated from Harvard Law School and served as a state and a federal prosecutor before becoming a judge in 1990. He has worked with the FBI on terrorism cases,

A Jan. 15 Justice Department report accused Sessions of misusing his office. Among other things, he has been accused of ordering staff members to do private work for him and using government transportation for private trips.

He said top Justice Department officials under President Bush were biased against him.

# Don't slam the phone down, just say magic words

WASHINGTON - If telephone solicitors are driving you to distraction, there's an easy way to keep them from calling. But the words "I'm not interested" won't stop the phone from ringing.

Just add the words, "Please put me on your no-call list," and legitimate telemarketers should stay away for five years. It's the law.

Besides that, "legitimate telemarketers don't want to talk to people who don't want to talk to us because they won't buy anything," said Jon Hamilton, president of the American felemarketing Association, which is meeting in Washington this week. Nevertheless, the telephone connection is the lifeblood of the industry. So if a consumer simply say my "I'm not interested," the telemarketer interprets that as, 'You've called me at a bad time, I MIGHT be interested," said Hamilton, president of TCI Inbound, a telemarketing firm in Wilmington, Del. Federal Communications Commission attorney Suzanne Hutchings agreed that the telemarketers have a good point. "We don't want to get into the position that consumers have to say magic words," she told association's sixth annual conference on federal legislation. But consumers who tell telemarketers, "Get lost," for example, are not being specific enough under the FCC rules that enforce the Telephone **Consumer Protection Act.**

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# Indians duo die in boating accident

WINTER HAVEN — Two Cleveland Indians pitchers died and a third was in serious condition when a relaxing day on the lake turned into tragedy when a fishing boat rammed a dock.

Steve Olin, 27. died instantly in Monday night's accident on Little Lake Nellie, near Clermont in Central Florida, and hospital officials said Tim Crews, 31, died early today at Orlando Regional Medical Center.

Bob Ojeda was seriously injured. The three had gathered with their families at the lake where Crews leased a house. Monday was the team's one scheduled day off during training.

"They had been fishing apparently and were traveling back toward shore around dark." said Vinard Hitt, spokesman for the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission, which is investigating the accident.

Crews was piloting the 18-foot open bass boat when it sped into the dock, knocking out pilings and coming to rest about 100 feet beyond, Hitt said. He added that investigators routinely check to see if alcohol is involved in such accidents, but there was no immediate word.

The Orlando Sentinel reported that a resident heard the boat strike the dock, which extends about 250 feet into the water. She called the Lake County Sheriff's Office at 7:52 p.m.

Jetia Heinrich rushed outside with her cordless phone, saw the boat floating and called to the players.

"I kept screaming, I kept screaming, but they wouldn't answer," she said.

Firelighters on the scene said the men hit the dock almost at head-level. Olin was killed instantly.

"Steve was one of our own," said Bob DiBiasio, vice president of public relations for the Indians. "We grew very close to him and his family. This is very tragic."

Crews, pronounced dead at 5:40 a.m., was airlifted to Orlando Regional Medical Center with a damaged lung and a "very serious head injury," said spokesman Joe Brown.

The Indians said Ojeda, 35, was operated on for head lacerations and was expected to recover fully. He was in stable but serious condition this morning at South Lake Memorial Hospital in Clermont. His wife, Eleanor Ojeda, was at the hospital; as were four Indians coaches.

The accident happened 25 miles north of Winter Haven, the Indians' temporary spring home since Hurricane Andrew ravaged the club's new permanent site in Homestead.

Olin came up in the Cleveland organization in 1991 and emerged as their best reliever last season.

Selected in the 16th round of the 1987 amateur draft, he is third on the Indians' all-time saves list. Last season, he led the team with 29 saves. He was 8-5 with a 2.34 ERA.

In 48 games in 1991, he had 17 saves. He joined the Indians in 1989 and was 1-4.

Crews, who also came from Los Angeles as a free agent this year, was 0.3 with a 5.19 ERA in 49 games with the Dodgers last season.

Ojeda came to the Indians as a free agent this winter. Last season, he was 6-9 for Los Angeles with a 3.63 ERA. The left-handed starter began his major-league career in 1980 with Boston.

While with the New York Mets in 1988, he cut off the upper portion of his left middle finger with an electric hedge clipper while gardening at home.

Ojeda was expected to be in the starting rotation, while Crews was a strong candidate for a bullpen job.

Sieven Robert Olin was born Oct. 4, 1965 in Portland, Ore. He played at Portland State and was named the team's outstanding pitcher in 1985 and 1987. He graduated from Beaverton (Ore.) High School.
