Army Engineers Seek Huge Fund For Waterways

Only \$888,000 Of New Work Planned For Rivers Of Florida

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—(AP)—Army engineers reported today that \$2,960,000 could be profitably expended on Florida rivers and harbor projects during the fiscal year beginning next July 1.

There were only three items totaling \$888,000 of new work for Florida—\$200,000 for the intracoastal waterway from Jacksonville to Miami, \$114,000 on a side channel and basin at Palm Beach and \$574,000 on the Okeechobee drainage area.

All the rest amounting to \$1,802,000 is for maintenance of existing improvements. A number of other projects, although already authorized by Congress, were not provided for in Schley's estimates for fiscal 1941.

But this program was endangered by the sharply restricted budget estimates for rivers and harbor work.

Altogether, Schley's list contained work for fiscal 1941 totaling \$42,778,669. The budget estimates for rivers and harbors were only \$70,174,090, less than half the cost of the program.

Last year, the President's budget allowed \$60,000,000 for this purpose, but Congress boosted the appropriation to \$103,818,410. The engineer corps had asked \$170,707,710.

17 Charged As Plotters Of Revolution

FBI Chief Implies Arrested Men Are Merely Nucleus Of Nationwide Group

NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—(AP)—A plot to smash the government of the United States and replace it with a dictatorship through a violent and assassination was charged today against 17 New York members of the "Christian Front."

Edgar Hoover, FBI head, announcing the disruption of the alleged plot, implied the 17 now under arrest were merely a nucleus of a nationwide conspiracy. One of the 18 men arrested during the night, an FBI agent in charge of the New York bureau, confirmed the release, but declined the comment.

Agents were searching many localities for caches of arms such as the "small arsenal" they found in New York City in the course of a continuous six-month investigation.

Lafayette scoffed, "I don't think the United States government is in much danger from 17 guys like these."

Federal officials declared the arrest of the 17 merely "scratched the surface" in the terrorist plot to overthrow the government.

"More arrests" were predicted by authorities who said the FBI "virtually was forced" to act now because investigations indicated a series of bombing outrages were imminent. Checking of the alleged plotters indicated they had been sending ammunition and arms to the outlawed Irish Republican army.

War shoulers fell heavily across northern neutral nations today arousing fears that Scandinavia and the low countries might be engulfed in two wars.

Belgium and the Netherlands massed about a million men on their eastern frontiers as a precaution against a German attack. They indicated these measures were inspired by reports of German troop concentrations opposite their borders.

Scandinavian apprehension grew from reports of German aggression there were signs the nations were ready for a new round of moves. Stolen Plans Reveal Giant Plane Being Built For Army

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—(AP)—The Army airplane plans which recently were stolen, but recovered, were for a secret new bomber which will be the world's largest, it was learned today.

The plane itself, a craft of more than 70 tons, believed capable of a round trip, non-stop Atlantic flight, is nearing completion at the Santa Monica, Calif., plant of the Douglas Aircraft Company, and will be given its first test next summer.

The fact that plans for the army plane had been stolen but recovered by "C-men" was disclosed last week with publication of testimony of J. Edgar Hoover before a congressional committee.

Hoover did not identify the plane, but authoritative sources said it was this huge, experimental bomber, on which all corps and commercial engineers have been working for 18 months.

At least one foreign government was said to be interested in obtaining the stolen designs. Details of the expedition to crack the code were not disclosed.

It is reported weight of over 70 tons compares with 11 1/2 tons for the Atlantic Clipper which can carry 48 passengers. Its wingspan compares with 138 feet for the Douglas DC-3.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—(AP)—President Roosevelt today informed congressional leaders he would send a communication to Congress shortly on extending aid to Finland.

The United States' own defense has continued to occupy the House naval committee, and Admiral Stark testified the navy needed submarines larger than those of some foreign powers because underway operations might be required in the south Atlantic.

The Senate committee approved the nomination of Murphy, Johnson, and Biddle. Both Houses considered routine matters.

J. Edgar Hoover and his G-Men have unearthed a plot to overthrow the United States government and have arrested 18 members of the so-called "Christian Front."

Now comes the report that Hoover was not so much interested in lotteries and the lottery capital of the state as he had been reported to be in sabotage, espionage, and subversive activities of one kind and another. That may also be correct, but that activity is reported to have been beyond the scope of the G-Men.

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Florida's Highway Accidents

While highway accidents were decreasing throughout the United States as a whole last year, they actually increased in Florida. This could not have been due to the fact that Floridians are any worse drivers than the natives of other states, but rather to the fact that Florida lags behind other states in the matter of traffic ordinances and safety organization.

According to the State Chamber of Commerce, 529 persons were killed in Florida last year. More than 18,000 persons were injured, 4,600 of them permanently. Altogether there were 79,350 automobile accidents in this state, an increase of one percent over the previous year, while the decrease in the rest of the country amounted to ten percent.

"No valuation, of course can be placed on lost lives and human suffering," says Walter L. Hays of Orlando, chairman of the safety committee of the State Chamber of Commerce, "but the hospitalization cost of these accidents is conservatively estimated at \$810,000 and the property damage set at more than \$3,000,000. A large percentage of these costs is borne by the people of Florida, both in their taxes and in increased insurance premiums. Some of these days we must do something definite for safety. We cannot allow this terrific toll to continue to mount. Legislation and regulation will help, but they alone cannot solve the problem."

Safety must be sold, Mr. Hays declares, sold just like groceries or merchandise in a store. Floridians must be "sold" the idea and truth that safety is their responsibility. And Mr. Hays proposes a revolutionary new plan for that job of "selling." He suggests that a "safety sales-manager" be set up in an office at some central point in the state. Then each city government and each county commission will appoint one of its members as a "safety commissioner," who will appoint other local leaders to his safety council or committee.

For the benefit of candidates, and would-be candidates for political offices, Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt has prepared a list of Do's and Don'ts, which should be of special interest to some of our local aspirants, on how to win votes and influence elections. Since Mrs. Roosevelt, so far as anyone knows, has never been a candidate for any political office herself, her advice deserves particular consideration.

But for better or worse, here they are:

- 1. Never make a speech unless you have something worthwhile to say.
2. Be conciliatory, never antagonistic, toward your audience.
3. When you are a novice, write out the first and last parts of your speech.
4. Never read your speech; refer to notes.
5. If you have to dodge a question, be frank and say "I don't know" or "I haven't formed a definite opinion."
