Light Voting Predicted Today In State's Runoff Primaries

By JERE MOORE JR., TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Some hotly contested local races were expected to bring out moderate crowds of voters in a few areas of the state today, but the turnout in most places for the runoff elections was expected to be light. Secretary of State Richard Stone predicted less than 20 percent of the 3 million voters would go to the polls, fewer than the about 600,000 who voted in the first primary Sept. 12.

He had predicted 2 million would vote then. "This is as pessimistic as the first prediction was optimistic," Stone said, "I hope I am just as wrong." Some sharp name calling has been exchanged in the race for the 5th District Republican congressional nomination, one of three congressional runoffs on today's ballot, all involving districts created by this year's reapportionment. Charles Rainey, 40, of Clear-

water, and Jack Insko, 43, of Port Richey, also have been fighting over who has the backing of President Nixon. State GOP Chairman L. E. "Tommy" Thomas issued a statement Monday to say the Florida Committee for the Re-election of the President is neutral in Republican primaries and to specifically disclaim a mailer indicating the committee supported Rainey. Rainey and former Gov. Claude Kirk visited an Insko

rally in New Port Richey Saturday and Kirk said afterward he backed Rainey. In the 13th District Democratic race, State Sen. Lee Weissenborn, 43, has admitted knowledge before the Sept. 12 primary that his aides were preparing a counteroffer endorsement list. This has given impetus to the campaign of William Lehman, 58, a former school board chairman.

Lake County Improvement SR 46 Bids Opened

State Department of Transportation is about to commence improvement of the balance of State Road 46 West, linking Mt. Dora and Sanford, it was revealed today by Douglas Stenstrom, chairman of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce long range planning committee.

SR 46 links with the principal north-south traffic artery, U.S. 441, immediately east of Mt. Dora.

C. A. (Bill) Benedict, DeLand, district engineer for DOT, reported to Stenstrom that DOT has opened bids for widening and resurfacing SR 46 between the Seminole-Lake County line, the Wekiva River, and Mt. Dora, a distance of about 15 miles. The DOT just recently completed constructing a new highway for SR 46 between Interstate 4 and the Wekiva River, in Seminole County, a distance of 10 miles.

Benedict reported Leecon, of Leesburg, was apparent low bidder for the Lake County project with \$949,073. The work will consist of widening the present pavement from 18 feet to 24 feet, and the construction of eight-foot shoulders. The entire project will be resurfaced.

Awarding of the contract for the work is expected within 10 days or two weeks. Actual construction is expected to require about a year.

DOT is making a survey for Lake County in order that Lake County might acquire right-of-way for future expansion of SR 46.

Stenstrom also reported that contract has been awarded to four-lane SR 436 West to the Seminole-Orange County line, near Apopka. Contract was awarded to Ewell Engineering and Contracting Company, of Lakeland, on its bid of \$2,334,686 and allows for 360

working days. When this work is completed all of SR 436 in Seminole County will be four-laned.

Benedict also reported that the Osteen Bridge design report has been approved by DOT and the Federal Highway Administration. This means that all matters relating to the location, the design of the project and its effect on the environment have been completed.

Next step will be the actual drafting of the plans for the construction of the bridge and the road, estimated to cost about \$2 million. The drafting will require eight-10 months, with the project scheduled for awarding of the contract in the 1973-74 fiscal year.

Survey has been completed and right-of-way map is being prepared by DOT for improvement of SR 419, between Oviedo and Five Points.

On Armed Guards Schools Cautious

Seminole County School Board in a three-two vote Monday night made mandatory a motion by A. P. Bue Jr. that School Supt. John Angel must receive board permission before two security guards hired to patrol Seminole High School may carry arms.

The action has the effect of amending a previous board action which specified the patrol could wear items sufficient for their protection.

Because this was too vague and all encompassing, Bue advised he would seek to have the issue spelled out in more concise terms, even though Angel had assured the board that his intention was to have security personnel keep order using sticks and Mace.

Voting in support of Bue were Dr. Stuart Culpepper and A. F. Keeth. Opposing the motion and voting "nay" were Jean Bryant and Ray Slaton. By its action, the board takes the opposite view than that held by Sanford Police Chief Ben Butler and Sheriff John Polk.

Both lawmen in a meeting at the outset of trouble at the school told the board they would not allow their men still on temporary duty at the 13-12 grade facility, to remain unless they carry guns.

Sheriff Polk explained, "a 14-year-old can kill just as much as a 40-year-old," in advising of his feelings about guards carrying guns.

The men, when hired must receive 200 hours of police training before they will be deputized for duty and assigned to the school to prevent further violence that caused two students to be hospitalized during the first week of the new term for injuries received in a melee involving fighting high schoolers.

In another board action, an 18-year-old youth was expelled and becomes the first expulsion from Seminole High School this year after it was reported to the board the youth was guilty of

using profanity toward the principal and was insubordinate. A group of Eastbrook and Lake Howell parents were on hand again at attempt to coerce the board into using its entire funds to establish a portable middle school on Tusawilla Road.

Dr. Culpepper proposed that Lawson Elementary School at Oviedo be rescheduled as a middle school and the present Jackson Heights Middle School be rescheduled as an elementary school.

Later, Culpepper proposed using plans for the present Teague Middle School as a model for a new Eastbrook Middle School permanent plant. Culpepper also brought up the need for enlarging Jackson Heights Middle School to handle

the overflow expected there from Oviedo when the eighth grade is required to be located elsewhere since the space is needed for the high school 9-12 grades.

After much discussion of Culpepper's proposals, the board agreed informally that if the November referendum giving more funds to the schools is approved by the voters then the first priority is a new permanent middle school in the Eastbrook area.

First Witness Testifies In DeBose Murder Trial

The trial of Stanley DeBose, charged with the first degree murder of Vera Lee Mathis on Aug. 7, got underway this morning with the state calling its first witness, Joe Burton.

The case is being tried before a six-man jury, an innovation brought about by the abolition of capital punishment.

Assistant State Attorney Newman Brock outlined the state's case in his opening remarks, in which he noted the case is a "murder perpetrated by robbery."

Defense Attorney Ned Julian Jr. reserved his opening statements until later in the trial.

Burton testified he was living with the deceased on Aug. 7, and had been for 18 months

watching television and reading.

prior to that time. In what was to become a series of verbal blasts between Brock and Julian, when Brock queried the witness if he was aware Mrs. Mathis was a widow, Julian objected on the basis it was a leading question and would lead to a "chain of bad habits of leading questions."

Burton went on to relate Mrs. Mathis' home was adjacent to the store which she operated and in which she was allegedly hacked to death.

On the day of Mrs. Mathis' demise, Burton testified, she had planned a "country dinner" for some relatives, and he went in search of collard greens for the repast, leaving her in the store.

Burton said he was caught in a "hard rain" which delayed

his return and that later he attempted to get into the store. The door was hooked on the inside. He then rang the door bell to the house and, receiving no answer, proceeded between the store and the house and "boltered Vera Lee."

Brock then offered, out of the presence of the jury, the dying declarations of Mrs. Mathis. Burton said when "I got to where she was in a pool of blood between the counter and the

shelves. I asked her what had happened and she said, 'Stanley hit me.'"

Julian at this point, even though the statements were out of the jury's presence, objected. The court denied Julian's objection and another argument emanated, culminating in the court warning Julian, who argued the court's ruling, "Somebody is going to be in contempt of court. When I make a ruling you can appeal it."

Muddy Water Of Soldier's Creek Probed

Langley Adair, County pollution control officer, assured the Sanford Herald this morning that he is investigating complaints of muddy water pouring out of Soldier's Creek into Lake Jessup in the area of the proposed Seminole County park. Adair stated in a telephone conversation that he had taken water samples in the creek as late as Monday and found the turbidity to be within legal limits. This was before Monday's raging rain storm.

The situation was called to Adair's attention last week by a Herald staff writer. At that time he said that he was aware of the condition and had given a verbal warning to Van Hogle and Devlin, developers, to contain their dredging operations in such a manner as to prevent any run off from entering the Creek or the canal.

Another check is being made by the pollution officer today and if a break through is found, he will turn it over to the legal department in Tallahassee for action. If it is determined that a direct discharge into the creek is involved, the United States Army Corps of Engineers will take jurisdiction.

The park at present is undeveloped. However the county commissioners have plans to include bicycle and canoe trails, and other recreational activities.

Adair promised to report the progress made in clearing up the muddy water situation which has long been a source of annoyance to fishermen in the area; Soldier's Creek having been in the past, one of the better fishing spots in Lake Jessup.

F111 Pulled From Combat; F4 Phantoms Pound Reds

Base, 300 miles northeast of Bangkok, killing a Thai sentry and wounding two Americans and two Thais. One terrorist was reported killed, and one captured in the raid, the second in 24 hours against U.S. bases in Thailand. Udon Air Base, 200 miles southeast of Udon, came under mortar attack Sunday night. The U.S. Command refused to officially acknowledge the reports, which came from reliable sources, that the \$9 million F111 planes had been withdrawn from combat after the loss of one with two crewmen aboard Thursday. Less than a dozen bombing missions were flown by the F111s which had just returned to the war zone after a four-year absence, sources said. "We have no comment," said a Command spokesman, refusing to confirm or deny the reports. The informants also said that although the Command withheld reporting the F111 loss because a search and rescue effort was under way, the Air Force actually did not know where the plane went down and heard any emergency radio signals from the two crewmen which would have pinpointed their position. The loss of the F111 was common knowledge among newsmen, and had been reported by some Western news agencies from Bangkok as well as by Radio Hanoi last week. But the U.S. Command kept an embargo on reporters in Saigon, who were under penalty of being discredited. The U.S. Command issued only a brief statement on the loss of the F111, the fourth loss in the war zone since they first came to Vietnam in March 1968. Spokesmen refused to say whether the remaining F111s ordered to Southeast Asia would continue to be replaced and if the F4 wing they are replacing would continue its rotation to the United States as had been originally planned.

Mayor Lee P. Moore and Commissioner Julian Stenstrom questioned why the session was set at Howard Johnson's Theatre - in the Lounge at 14 and Lee Road intersection, when only Seminole is concerned.

Stenstrom "was concerned" since he felt the proceeds from the "dutch" luncheon should go to a Seminole eatery. "It's taking money out of the county," Stenstrom added. Mayor Moore mentioned the meeting at Monday afternoon's City Commission work session and wondered why the meeting was arranged outside the county. This morning, The Herald contacted Greg Drummond, County Commission chairman,

and writer of the invitation, to ask why Orange County? Drummond replied the Orange location was made for the convenience of the land developers. The commission chairman declined to disclose the agenda of the session but advised the press could attend. "Any advance information on this is being withheld," Drummond explained, "since I want it to be fresh."

WHERE THEY STAND THE ISSUES OF THE 1972 CAMPAIGN Vietnam War

REPUBLICANS: We will continue to seek a settlement of the Vietnam war which will permit the people of Southeast Asia to live in peace under political arrangements of their own choosing. We believe that the President's proposal — to withdraw remaining American forces from Vietnam four months after an internationally supervised cease-fire has gone into effect throughout Indo-China and all prisoners have been returned — is as generous an offer as can be made by anyone — by anyone that is, who is not bemused with surrender. We insist that, before all American forces are withdrawn from Vietnam, American prisoners must be returned and a full accounting made of the missing in action and of those who have died in enemy hands.

DEMOCRATS: Immediate and complete withdrawal of all U.S. forces in Indo-China and an end to all U.S. military action in Southeast Asia — with this proviso: We must insist that any resolution of the war include the return of all prisoners held by North Vietnam and other adversary forces, and the fullest possible accounting for the missing. After the end of U.S. direct-combat participation, military aid to the Saigon Government, as elsewhere in Indo-China, will be terminated, but humanitarian assistance will be offered to the people of Vietnam to help them repair the ravages of war.

But they are the only eleven that is as the Metro race has been turned into a two team battle between an upstart in recent years (the Wildcats) and the old perennial favorite (Edgewater).

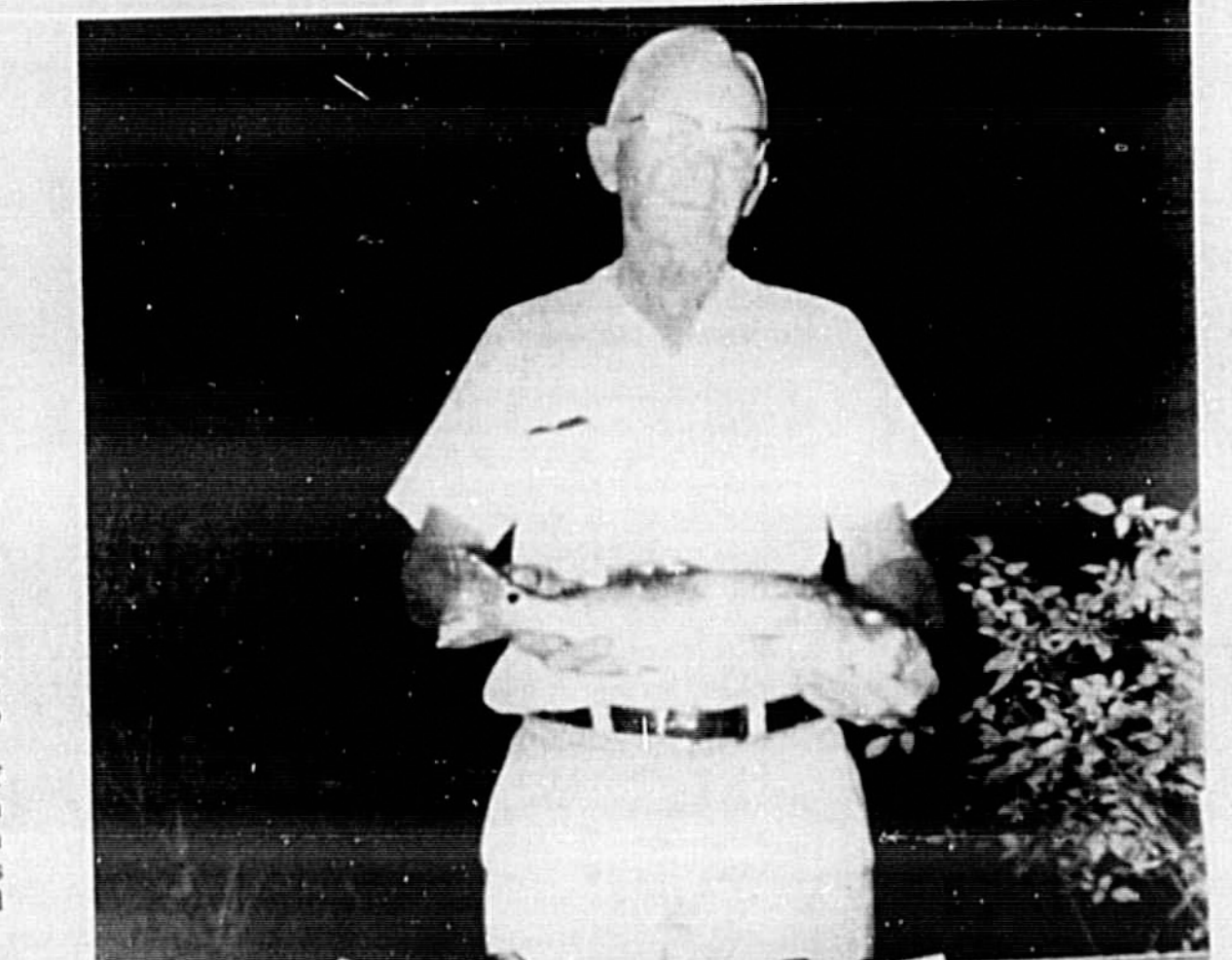

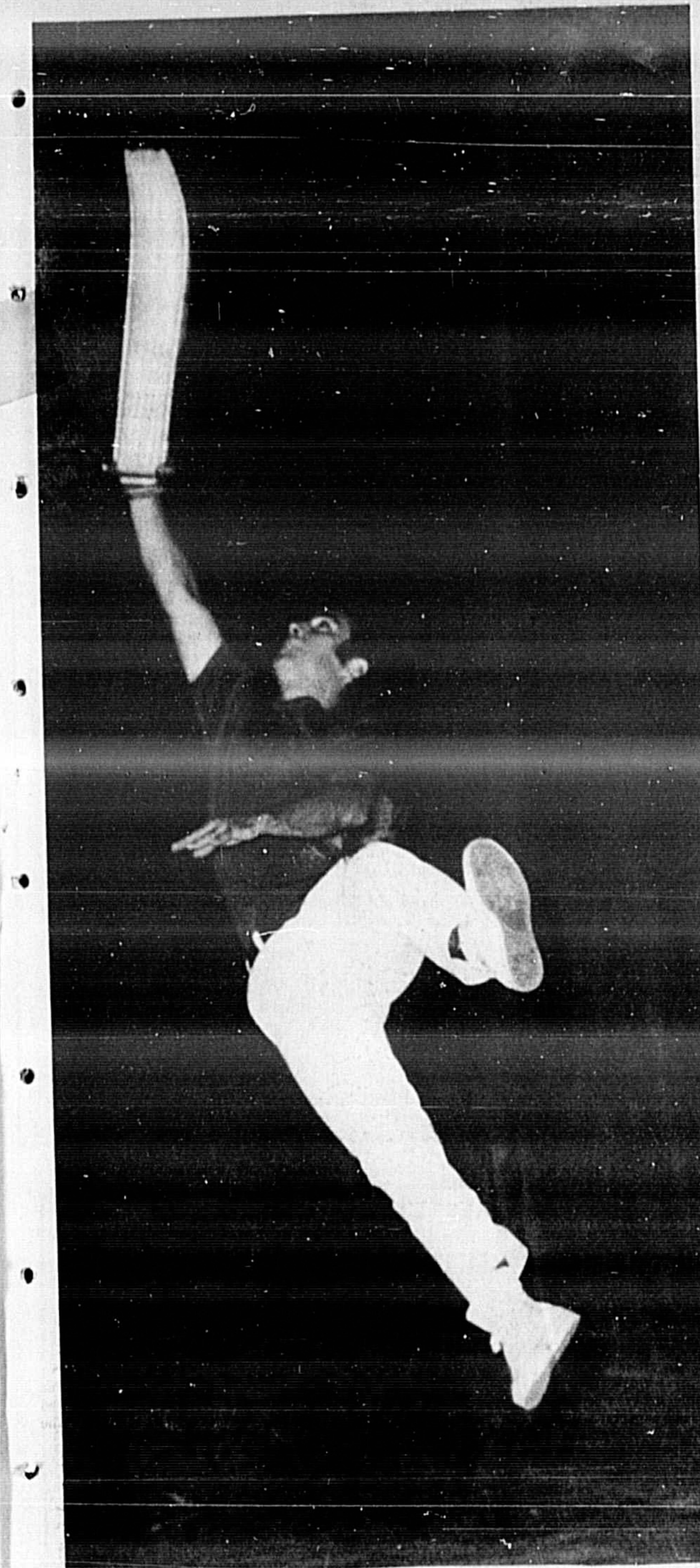

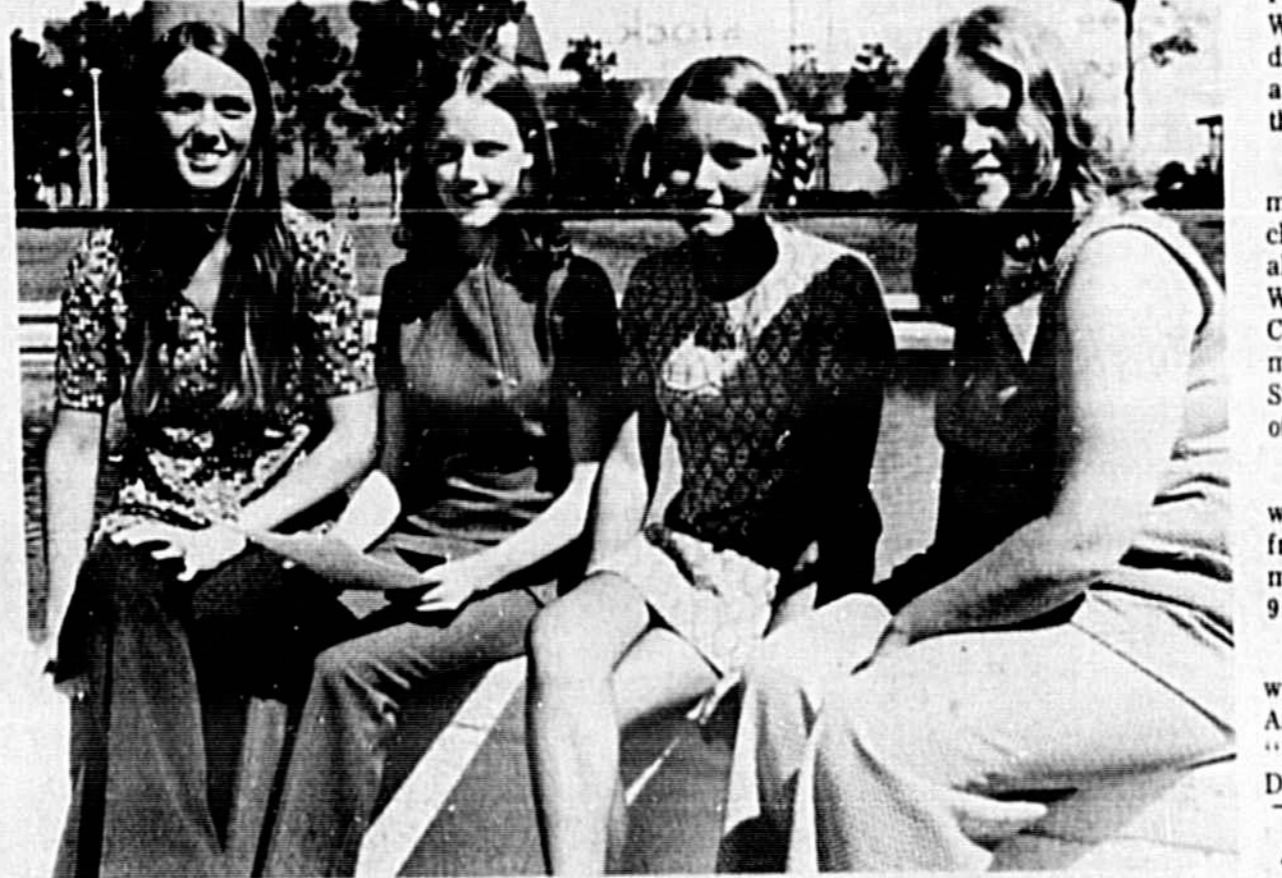
Small but strong would be an apt description of the four sororities at FTU. With some assistance from a variety of quarters, foremost from Dean Carol Wilson, the groups aim to increase their ranks during Rush. By so doing, they also will be able to add to the list of community service activities each and all have become involved in over the past several years.

The four groups at FTU — Delta Delta Delta, Zeta Tau Alpha, Alpha Chi Omega, and Tyes — have some identical objectives, but each also is out to what interest in its particular philosophy during Rush registration, which extends through Oct. 6. Women who sign up during this period receive invitations to the ice water teas.

As noted by Dean Wilson, the primary purpose of rushing is to provide answers to questions such as, "what does a sorority offer?" "How can it benefit me?" and "How can I benefit a sorority?"

The final step is the most difficult, admittedly. It's known as bidding, and that means, simply, that the groups extend invitations to those young women the sororities want to join their ranks. At this point the women receiving invitations either do or do not accept.

The basis for selection by a sorority is hinged upon a number of tangibles and intangibles. There's scholarship and the desire to become involved, and there's compatibility and enthusiasm, to name a few.

telethon; visits to Sumter Correctional Institution for dinner with inmates; and working with juveniles and their families through County agencies. And those are only a part of the whole picture. The sororities also keep a hand in countless campus activities, from cataloging records and tapes for the campus radio station (WFTU) to serving as tour guides, as aides during orientation weeks and with volunteer cleanup crews doing their thing for ecology.

'Weakest Link' Is Cited

WASHINGTON (AP) — Doctors were alarmed when they saw the burned and battered 17-year-old youth wheeled into the hospital emergency room.
On a bed he had climbed a utility pole in rural Georgia. The electrical jolt at the top burned his shirt off. The 30-foot fall broke his back and some ribs. One lung was punctured.
But the doctors' alarm multiplied when the ambulance driver boasted how he himself had handled the emergency. He dragged the youth 50 yards to

the ambulance, then rushed to the hospital without immobilizing the victim on a back board to spare possible aggravation from broken bones grinding and cutting through the youth's body.
The youth was relatively fortunate. He lost an arm to the electrical burn, but his other injuries mended without crippling damage.
But another 60,000 persons were not so fortunate last year. That's the number of heart attacks, accidents and other victims of sudden illness who could have lived if given proper emergency care, according to

the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.
"Emergency medical service is one of the weakest links in the delivery of health care in our nation," said the National Academy of Sciences in a March study.
The conclusion is echoed repeatedly in government reports and testimony before Congress.
The academy estimated more than 30,000 of the 25,000 ambulances in the country are of the horse, limousine or station wagon type "inadequate in space and equipment." The Department of Transportation



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Scribe Recounts Meeting With 7 American POWs

Seven men. All dressed in simple blue denim prison garb. All covered. All American. And they had something else in common: a powerful desire to come home.
I could reach out across the table and touch their hands. Yet the gulf between us was immeasurable. I was a free man, about to board a plane within the hour and wing back to the United States.
Not these men. One of them, Navy Cmdr. Eugene Wilbur, from Columbia Cross Roads, Pa., had sat across that table a dozen times in the past four and one half years, watching faces of free men flit by as he waited for his turn.
Wilbur and the six others

were all U.S. pilots shot down over North Vietnam and held in prisoner of war camps. I was escorted by a delegation of four American antiwar activists in Hanoi to escort home three pilots released by the North Vietnamese.
At the last moment of our ten-day visit we were summoned to a Government building in downtown Hanoi. We were ushered into a long room and saw tables crowded with beer bottles and glasses.
A few seconds later they came in, seven men with hands outstretched and faces beaming. They were more eager to see us than any other men I had ever met.
Two North Vietnamese officials sat in the room with us. Reporters and television cam-

Laser Replaces Scapel

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — An invisible laser beam that cuts more sharply than any scalpel has been used successfully to remove dead skin from burn victims and repair damaged internal organs in animals, medical researchers report.
Dr. James P. Fidler, director of the University of Cincinnati Medical Center's laser laboratory,

discussed his research team's new surgical laser at the opening of the College of Surgeons 50th annual clinical congress here Monday.
Fidler said the technique uses an electric arc to excite molecules of carbon dioxide gas until they send out a beam of intense, highly focused, and coherent radiation.

When aimed at tissue through a microscope, this laser beam's bursts of invisible light produces a spot of heat less than a hundredth of an inch deep, enabling it to cut more precisely than any scalpel, Fidler said.
He said experiments on animals give hope the laser will be useful in surgery.

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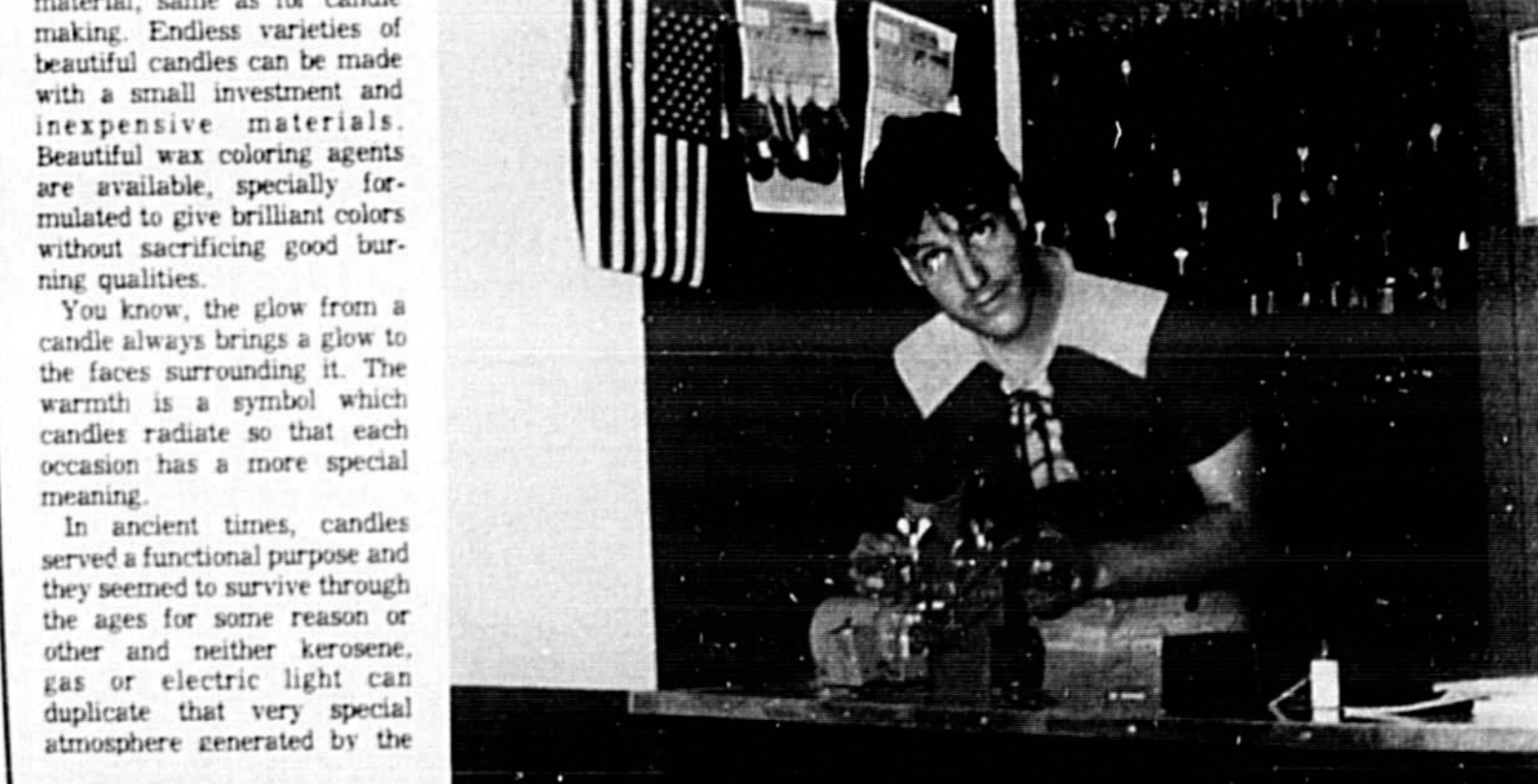

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JFK's Mother Killed Cape Bill

Canaveral Change Measure Blocked By Massachusetts Congressman, Friend Of The Late President

MIAMI (AP) — A personal telephone call from Rose Kennedy to Massachusetts Congressman Thomas O'Neill Jr., apparently helped to kill a bill to change the name of Cape Kennedy back to Cape Canaveral, the Miami Herald said today.

Clark Hoyt of the Herald's Washington Bureau said O'Neill in turn contacted Rep. George P. Miller, D-Calif., chairman of the Science and Astronautics Committee, and asked him to block the name-changing bill.

The measure to rename Cape Kennedy was pushed through

the Senate last July by Florida Sens. Edward Gurney and Lawton Chiles. Cape Canaveral was named Cape Kennedy in 1964 in memory of President John F. Kennedy.

The Herald said Miller could kill the bill by merely failing to put it on his committee's agenda.

"He (Miller) likes Tip

(O'Neill) pretty well, so that pretty well wipes it out," the Herald quoted an unnamed congressional staff member.

An aide to O'Neill confirmed Tuesday that the congressman did go to Miller and stop the bill. As of now, its finished," the Herald said.

But the aide, according to the newspaper, while admitting

that the mother of President Kennedy had phoned O'Neill, denied the Boston-area Democrat was acting on her behalf.

"He is doing this on his own because he was a friend of Jack Kennedy's and doesn't feel that, all of a sudden, we should start changing the names of places named after the late

president," the aide told the Herald.

Florida members of Congress, who say they are acting on the wishes of residents of the area, have been trying for several years to reinstate the name Cape Canaveral, first given to the region more than 400 years ago by Spanish explorers.

The Herald said Rep. Lou Frey, R-Fla., was so incensed Tuesday over the apparent killing of the bill that he threatened to try to change the name of Cape Cod, Mass., to Cape Kennedy.

Seminole Fastest Growing County

Seminole County is the fastest growing political subdivision like proportions within the United States, according to a report by the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council, released today by its

Oseola-Seminole-Orange committee chairman, Sidney Vihlen Jr., vice chairman of the Seminole County Commission.

Not only is South Seminole County expected to near double in size by 1975, as compared to 1970, but, according to Vihlen, "the south part of the county is becoming saturated (population-wise) and the trend now is shifting to the northern part of the county."

Vihlen elaborated by pointing out that the Greater Sanford area was estimated in April 1972 to have a population of 37,500 and that it is anticipated it will grow to 48,000 in 1975 and 72,000 in 1990.

Vihlen stated: "The Planning Council has been monitoring growth in the region and ... based on housing construction, school enrollment and utility hookups ... it has become apparent that our previously liberal projections should be revised."

He pointed out that presently there are 7,000 homes under construction in the Greater Sanford area alone. To further elaborate on the Sanford area

growth he indicated the proposed 1,200-acre (each) tracts of "Heathrow" and "Greenbelt" - slated for the Interstate 4-Lake Mary Boulevard intersection - as two prime examples of future growth.

The county commissioner recalled that in 1970 the Planning Council predicted Seminole County would grow from the 1970 census count of 83,692 to 98,000 by 1975. The 1975 projection was enlarged last year to an estimated 124,000.

Further, estimates for 1990 were increased from 148,000 to 172,000 while the projection for 1990 is 218,000 persons in Seminole County. Vihlen terms these estimates as "very conservative."

To recap, Vihlen pointed out Seminole as a whole is expected to nearly double from the 1970 census figure of 83,692 to an estimated 1975 population of 150,000 while Greater Sanford is

expected to grow from 37,500 last April to 48,000 in 1975.

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Nixon Has Plans, Too
McGovern: Can End War

Sen. George McGovern will announce on Oct. 10 a plan to end the Indochina war, he campaign aides say. It will be part of an intensive antiwar campaign by his supporters during the Columbus Day weekend.

McGovern "will tell America what Richard Nixon cannot tell you to vote against your own interests—to slash your own throats to vote against the labor movement," he said.

President Nixon has not scheduled any campaign appearances this week. Vice President Agnew campaigned for the ticket in Indiana and Montana. He planned to go today to South Dakota, McGovern's home state, and to Nebraska.

In Great Falls, he praised the administration's initiatives in farm exports, saying they meant "cash in the pockets of American farmers." He also said the Democratic Congress has acted on only six of 31 administration proposals on the environment.

The Nixon campaign organization Tuesday began dispatching 9.3 million letters to lists of voters in California, New Jersey, Illinois and Pennsylvania. A spokesman said the goal is to increase the Nixon vote by 2 per cent over what it would otherwise be.

American Party presidential candidate John Schmitz said in Atlanta, Ga., Tuesday his party will be listed on the ballots in at least 32 states and he has an "excellent" chance of winning in California, Michigan and Wisconsin.

The California congressman predicted the voters will turn to the American party in four years. "If Richard Nixon is re-elected, things are going to get so bad that people are going to remember who told them the truth in the first place," he said.
