SR 46 Bids Opened

State Department of Transportation is about to commence improvement of the balance of State Road 46 West, linking Mt. Dora and Sanford, it was revealed today by Douglas Stenstrom, chairman of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce long range planning committee.

SR 46 links with the principal northsouth traffic artery, U.S. 441, immediately east of Mt. Dora.

C. A. (Bill) Benedict, DeLand, district engineer for DOT, reported to Stenstrom that DOT has opened bids for widening and resurfacing SR 46 between the Seminole-Lake County line, the Wekiya River, and Mt. Dora, a distance of about 15 miles. The DOT just recently completed constructing a new highway for SR 46 between Interstate 4 and the Wekiva River, in Seminole County, a distance of 10

Benedict reported Leecon, of Leesburg, was apparent low bidder for the Lake County project with \$949,073. The work will consist of widening the present pavement from 18 feet to 24 feet, and the construction of eight-foot shoulders. The entire project will be resurfaced.

Awarding of the contract for the work is expected within 10 days or two weeks. Actual construction is expected to require about a year.

DOT is making a survey for Lake County in order that Lake County might acquire right-of-way for future expansion of SR 46.

Stenstrom also reported that contract has been awarded to four-lane SR 436 West to the Seminole-Orange County line, near Apopka. Contract was awarded to Ewell Engineering and Contracting Company, of Lakeland, on its bid of \$2,334,686 and allows for 360

working days. When this work is completed all of SR 436 in Seminole County will be four-laned.

Benedict also reported that the Osteen Bridge design report has been approved by DOT and the Federal Highway Administration. This means that all matters relating to the location, the design of the project and its effect on the environment have been completed.

Next step will be the actual drafting of the plans for the construction of the bridge and the road, estimated to cost about \$2 million. The drafting will require eight-10 months, with the project scheduled for awarding of the contract in the 1973-74 fiscal year.

Survey has been completed and right-of-way map is being prepared by DOT for improvement of SR 419, between Oviedo and Five Points.

Adair stated in a telephone conversation that he had taken water samples in the creek as late as Monday and found the turbidity to be within legal limits. This was before Monday's raging

rain storm. The situation was called to Adair's attention last week by a Herald staff writer. At that time he said that he was aware of the condition and had given a verbal warning to Van Hogie and Devlin, developers, to contain their dredging operations in such a manner as to prevent any run off from entering the Creek or the canal.

Another check is being made by the pollution officer today and if a break through is found, he will turn it over to the legal department in Tallahassee for action. If it is determined that a direct discharge into the creek is involved, the United States Army Corps of Engineers will take jurisdiction. The park at present is undeveloped. However the

county commissioners have plans to include bicycle and canoe trails, and other recreational activities. With the presidential contest failing to arouse public interest in the issues, and with the Nixon campaign encouraging purely partisan action while the McGovern last-minute effort falters, it is high time that the voters get around to the Congressional elections which will be taking place.

If the presidency, as the terms of Kennedy, Johnson and Nixon have disclosed, has expanded its powers, the opposite is true of the Congress. This year with some very important changes

in districts taking place, the votes cast for Representatives and Senators assume critical

This importance is far more than the obvious battle taking place as a desperate President. smug in his acceptance of reelection, pulls all the strings - he has powerful hands and strong reins - and drives for a Republican Congress.

Democratic dominance of both houses will be hard to change. But the coattail attraction of a President whose voter attraction seems to be getting larger rather than less as the Nov. 7th date looms ahead, cannot be minimized.

Evil Times? Look Back a Century

There are some who would just as soon skip the upcoming bicentennial hoopla and keep America's 200th anniversary observance short and sweet. For a nation plagued with crime in the streets, poultion in the air, corruption in politics and absorbed with guilt over its national sins and shortcomings to think of inviting the international community to some sort of "world's fair of freedom" in 1976 seems-well, downright

It was different in 1876, back when America was order-, blissful, uncomplicated, self-assured, back when the standard of living was low but the quality of life was high.
Oh, yeah? Forget it, says Albin Dearing, retired Army Violence in the streets? The United States in the 1870s, officer turned historian.

a nation of 40 million, had a crime rate perhaps twice that of today, he writes in Smithsonian magazine. The Irish were rioting in New York, the blacks in Savannah, the Chinese in San Francisco, the political clubs in Pittsburgh and the coal miners in Scranton. Corruption in high places? New Yorkers were discovering that Boss Tweed had mulcted them of millions,

Legislators were being bought and sold by powerful capitalists. Graft reached into the White House itself. Minority problems? About a sixth of the population was foreign born, largely unassimilated and unable to speak English. Thousands of children, as young as eight, were working 10-hour days in factories, mines and sweatshops. Urban blight? Traffic hopelessly clogged city streets by day, thugs roamed them by night. Prostitution plagued urban centers and venereal disease raged. Fire was a great killer, all but wiping out Chicago in 1871. The quality of life? Pneumonia and tuberculosis ravaged the population in winter, malaria and typhoid in summer, diphtheria, scarlet fever and smallpox in all

Oppression? Gangs of Ku Klux Klansmen whipped, tortured or murdered hundreds of blacks. Foreign entanglements? The U.S. Navy shelled the coast of Korea, with whom we were at peace. Breakdown in morals? Newspapers carried stories of daring women wearing men's clothing, footracing through New York's Central Park in practically no clothes, dancing the can-can in the New Jersey surf. At the University of Michigan, women demanded admission to men's classes. In Brooklyn, they invaded railroad smoking compart-

Generation gap? Young men went clean-shaven in contemptuous disdain for their elders' luxuriant muttonchop whiskers and handlebar moustaches, and when not racing on bicycles, sassed them with, "Aw, mind your Drugs? In 1872, Florida, New Mexico, Texas, Vermont and New Hampshire grew poppies for a thriving domestic

Air Strikes Probe Makes Us Wonder

There is a time-honored saying in the military that first and foremost you should cover your own self. This is also known as passing the buck and the buck has been zooming around at a frantic pace since Air Force Sgt. Lonnie Franks charged that Lt. Gen. John D. Lavelle ordered bombings of North Vietnam that were contrary to Nixon administration policy last fall. Lavelle, who was then commander of the Seventh Air

Force but has since been retired from active duty with a one-grade demotion in rank, does not deny that the raids took place. He admits that aggressive, planned air strikes were described in official reports as "protective reaction" operations to conform with the then U.S. policy which forbade American pilots from attacking targets in North Vietnam unless their planes were attacked first. Lavelle also says that Gen. Creighton Abrams, U.S. commander in Vietnam, and Adm. Thomas H. Moorer, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, knew what was going on. But both Abrams and Moorer vigorously say they didn't have the faintest notion that anything like this was
