While our own legislature and civic leaders are considering ways and means of reducing governmental costs, it is interesting to note the outstanding causes given by the Georgia Tax Association for high taxes in the excessive number of counties in the state, and the recommendation is made that certain counties should be consolidated with other counties, and in some cases city governments consolidated with county governments.

"That many of Georgia's economic ills are partly attributable to a superabundance of counties and that the burden of taxation is mainly due to the excessive cost of local government," says the report of the Georgia Tax Association. "In the conclusion of many informed persons who have given the matter serious study. Evidence of this can be found in the sentiment reflected by the daily and weekly press and in the recent reduction of tax rates in numerous counties and municipalities of the State.

"While any sudden and drastic reduction in the number of counties would be imprudent and unadvised, there is a rapidly growing sentiment that gradual consolidations would be greatly beneficial in promoting the welfare of state institutions and in enhancing the wealth and well-being of the people. With three times the number of counties of the average state in the Union, Georgia has a multiplicity of county officials, and a mounting cost of government which is causing increasing concern.

"According to the 1930 census, Georgia has 39 counties of over 20,000 population, 32 counties with populations of between 15,000 and 20,000, 35 with populations between 10,000 and 15,000, 45 with between 5,000 and 10,000, and seven of less than 5,000. The State's population, paid 24 per cent of the State's total tax. Eight counties combined paid 25 per cent, 39 counties combined 36 per cent, 50 counties altogether 21 per cent, and 83 counties combined 4 per cent.

"Fulton paid a total of \$1,456,883.36. Five counties paid less than \$5000 each. One hundred and thirty-seven received more from the common school fund than they paid into the State Treasury."

Dog Poisoning

An interesting story in a recent issue of Time Magazine shows how cruel the human being can become when aroused over some obviously trivial point. Cruelty to animals is detested by almost every normal person, and yet in this story there is a woman who had poisoned a number of dogs with arsenic, causing them to die in agony, because they annoyed her. Had she stolen the dogs, valued at five hundred dollars or more, she might have been sentenced to jail for ten years. But she killed them so she drew only a five dollar fine.

"One dark night last week," Time relates, "two men watched a house near Park Avenue, Manhattan. A woman came out, glanced about her, bent down, sprinkled a powder about each house corner, quietly disappeared indoors. The two men gathered up pinches of the powder from the sidewalk, took the pinches to a chemist to be analyzed. As they had suspected, it was arsenic.

"The two men, agents for the A. S. E. C. A., had been assigned to the Park Avenue district to catch poison-sprinklers who have been endangering the lives of expensive Park Avenue dogs. Neighbors in the immediate vicinity of the suspicious house had complained particularly. They said the dogs that twelve nearby dogs had died in agony. Two fine bird dogs, valued at \$500 each, had barely been saved.

"Summoned to court, the poison-sprinkler, Mrs. Helen Corel, housekeeper for one John J. Smith, realtor, first stated that she had been after rats. But after being questioned she admitted that she had indeed been poisoning dogs. She said she did not wish to kill them; she was only to keep the dogs in the country, or a large back yard. She had only means to discourage them from loitering. Her basement windows had to be washed twice a day because of them. Early in the morning and late at night and... during the day they were dogs in front of the house," said Mrs. Corel. "They bark and howl. We tried to grow plants in window boxes, but the dogs would not let them alone. The dogs of neighbors destroyed the trees and shrubbery in front of the house and the dogs' owners would not restrain them.

In the circumstances a great deal is being made over the efforts of the Hoover administration to put the general arrangements for the Washington Bicentennial Celebration in 1932 in the hands of a "name man." Michigan congressman, known for years as one of the fair-haired boys of the Anti-Saloon League.

He has long since been one of those to insist on an unreasonable partitioning of the municipal government costs between the United States Treasury and the resident taxpayers.

What seems to many supporters of the bicentennial observance is being of considerably larger importance than the necessities of the Hoover administration to find a soft spot for an Anti-Saloon League favorite is that the major purpose of the celebration itself should not be lost sight of in a wet-dry imbroglio. The fine, wide new Washington Memorial Highway, extending along the Potomac River from the Virginia side of the Lincoln Bridge will be as free as possible of billboards and hot dog stands. It is promised to be ready in time for such exercises as may be held at Mount Vernon.

Representative Room is planning to place a table or two in each school room, with a supply of books, a supply of paper and pencils. A booklet on school hygiene has been compiled and already is in distribution. The complete details, even as to ball decorations, costumes, etc., have been included.

"We have been in touch with a great many people," Col. Grant says. "The idea is that there will be a competition in every school, a competition in oratory, a competition in the writing of essays, a competition in drawings, and if they have any scripture classes, a competition in that kind of work, or anything else that they can use. We plan to use anything that would put into the hands of every child a feeling that Washington is a great example for him, and at the same time give information about Washington which will have a lasting impression and give them something to emulate, and for that reason we are working up this little book on Washington which will be handed with great care about his life and his example as a citizen, as well as his official acts.

"We are expecting that the holidays will hold a special coronation that year in which they will give scholarships or rewards of some kind, or honorary degrees for services that are following the example of Washington.

"So there is a tremendous opportunity by continuing interest on Washington and on his life to make better Americans out of the growing generation, and I believe it is worthwhile a real suggestion for a great deal of the official affairs that now underlie the government."

There are to be special celebrations throughout the country on all national holidays and such days of special importance as March 3, May 1, and July 4.
