Production To End For F-111 Aircraft

WASHINGTON (AP) — It is now official: The Pentagon will end production of the troubled F-111 aircraft at a maximum of 536 planes—less than a quarter of the number originally proposed six years ago.
Gen. James Ferguson, head of the Air Force Systems Command, told the Senate Armed Services Committee Wednesday the Pentagon will spend no money on F-111 production beyond the budget year ending in mid-1972.
This, he said, will round out payments for four F-111 fighter wings, although there is some doubt whether Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird will approve purchase of the final 40 planes of the fourth unit.
All but six test models among the 223 ex-rational F-111s have been grounded for intensive X-ray and sonic inspection as a result of the crash of the 120 F-111 at Las Vegas, Nev., last December.
Officials found the Nevada accident was caused by a steel flaw which caused a wing to break off.
Laird has said he will await the outcome of the Air Force inspection before committing himself to the final 40 of the fourth fighter wing.
A decision to buy those 40 is expected by the end of the fiscal year beginning next July still will mean a reduction of 121 planes and about \$1 billion under the Air Force's planned buy last year.
Altogether, the Navy and the Air Force once proposed buying 2,411 F-111s with the approval of then-Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara in March 1964.
It was expected at that time each model would cost about \$2.8 million. With one program reduction after another, however, the price of one F-111 fighter has risen to almost \$9 million, according to latest official figures.
McNamara had looked upon the F-111 service as a way of adapting one base plane to the needs of both services.

3 Skyscrapers Bombed

NEW YORK (UPI) — Powerful bombs ripped through the office of major corporations in three mid-Manhattan skyscrapers early today, shattering walls, windows and plumbing. No one was injured.
Police, who had been warned that bombs were set to go off in the buildings, evacuated the night workers but were unable to find the explosives in time.
The circumstances and results of the bombings were "very similar" to another triple bombing last Nov. 11 that hit other offices in Manhattan, a police official said.
A special delivery letter received in United Press International's New York Bureau today said a group called "Revolutionary Force F" was responsible for the bombing attacks against the large corporations.

Woman Suspected In Latest Bombing

CAMBRIDGE, Md. (UPI)—National Guard troops stood by today as police searched for a white woman suspect in the \$100,000 bombing of the courthouse where H. Rap Brown originally was to have been tried on indicting to riot charges.
Gov. Marvin Mandel, of Maryland ordered strict security measures—including a state police guard around the capitol in Annapolis—Wednesday when he received reports of the Dorchester County Courthouse bombing—the second within 48 hours associated with the trial pending in Bel Air, Md., 85 miles north of here.
State's Attorney William C. Yates won a change of venue for the trial on grounds the proceedings would create tensions in Dorchester County, the population of which is 33 per cent Negro. Harford County, in which Bel Air is located, has an 8.5 per cent Negro population. Defense attorneys object to the shift.

Winter Park Telephone To Transfer Facilities

Altamonte Springs residents will witness the influx of some 100 new residents Monday after the transfer this weekend of three departments of the Winter Park Telephone Company to their new facilities next to City Hall on S.E. 427.
Beginning Friday, March 12, 11:00 a.m. EST on the city's special emergency number—911. A man with a deep voice said bombs were set to go off at 1:40 a.m. in the Somooy Mobil Building at 110 E. 42nd St., the IMB Building at 425 Park Ave. and the General Telephone & Electronics Building at 700 Third Ave.

'Drug Addiction Up Among Youth'

Nixon Ups War Against Narcotics

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon, announcing a \$30 million increase in federal research and education efforts to fight narcotics traffic, says "drug addiction among school-age youth is increasing at an alarming rate."
In a statement issued Wednesday, Nixon said:
"Although appropriations for drug education and training have grown sixfold between fiscal 1969 and fiscal 1971, the situation calls for much greater effort."
He called for \$125.5 million in education and research funds for the fiscal year starting July 1, up from \$105.8 million in the current budget year.
One feature of the Nixon drug program will increase available money for marijuana research by the National Institute of Mental Health to \$23 million in fiscal 1971, compared to \$16 million currently.
Dr. Stanley F. Yellin, director of the Institute, said researchers are convinced that marijuana "is not an innocuous drug" and can lead in some cases to toxic psychosis and disrupt patterns of thought, speech, and memory. He acknowledged, however, he knew of no documented case of the drug causing a single death.
When asked if marijuana represented a more serious problem than alcohol, Yellin said:
"We don't have the answer as yet. Both drugs have negative effects."
Nixon announced plans to spend \$3.8 million through the Office of Education to train teachers and other school personnel in the fundamentals of drug abuse education. When spread among all the states, however, grants to each will be quite modest, ranging from \$40,000 to \$210,000 each.
The President also has ordered the creation of a National Clearing House for Drug Abuse and Education, "giving the public one central office to contact." Initially staffed by only 15 employees, its first-year budget will be less than \$700,000.
One of the first undertakings in May will be distribution of a new book on drug abuse. It will be called, "A Federal Source Book: Answers to the Most Frequently Asked Questions About Drug Abuse."
Another effort will involve expansion of an advertising campaign aimed at preventing drug abuse. Animated cartoons aimed at pupils in the elementary schools, and designed for television use, are being prepared. Other commercials, advertisements and posters are being designed to reach high school and college students.
In his statement, Nixon said: "There is no higher priority in this administration than to see that children, and the public, learn the facts about drugs in the right way and for the right purpose through education."

Solon Pushes 18-Year Vote Age

WASHINGTON (AP) — After guiding his constitutional proposal through a key floor test, Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield says he is pushing for a quick decision on his bid to lower the voting age to 18.
"I'm going to stick with it until I get a vote," Mansfield told newsmen Wednesday after the Senate's 62-21 rejection of a move to table and thus kill the amendment to a bill extending the 1965 Voting Rights Act.
The tabling motion was offered by Sen. Russell B. Long, D-La., who said afterward he recognized the vote as an expression of the will of the Senate in lowering the voting age.
The Democratic leader had wanted a final vote Wednesday but was set back momentarily when Sen. James B. Allen, D-Ala., proposed his series of amendments to the proposal.
Mansfield said he detected no signs of a filibuster in the making. He said he hoped for quick passage of the amendment and the voting rights measure so the Senate can take up the nomination of Judge G. Harrold Carswell to the Supreme Court.
Adoption of the amendment, upheld by the courts, would extend the franchise to an estimated 16 to 17 million young people.

A Novel Way To Save Taxpayer's Dollars

Governmental leaders in Seminole County, Jacksonville and Duval County and other municipalities in that county with the exception of 3-4 minor beach cities.

The two men appeared before the Central Florida Development Committee to expound their views and to relate the savings with the merger. They will be invited in the near future to journey to Sanford and discuss the matter as it pertains to Seminole County, enfolded Sanford, Oviedo, North Orlando, Altamonte Springs, Casselberry and Longwood and the county government into one municipality, with one full-time mayor and a five-member commission.

What a saving to the taxpayers! All duplicating and overlapping procedures would be eliminated. Daniel said it is only logical that when cities

adjoin each other taxpayers can benefit by consolidation of services.

He said consolidation had served to equalize both services and taxes in rural and urban areas of Duval.

One telephone call now can bring any emergency service — police, firemen or ambulance," he said.

"When communities have common needs, why can't they work together for their mutual benefit?" he asked.

Daniel described consolidation as the instrument "which enables us to plan in an orderly way for growth."

"The duplication of government services creates greater waste, graft and inefficiency," he added. "The ultimate solution of urban problems has got

to be solved by us, the people who make up the urban population.

"Unless we face up, federal government intervention will follow."

Daniel described reorganization of government in Duval as a "quiet revolution of free Americans, exercising the power of the ballot box to completely restructuring local government."

He said it grew out of obsolete, duplicating and inefficient government in Jacksonville and the county.

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School Tax Hikes

Ohio educators have been accused of adopting "shock tactics" to force voters to approve more school taxes.

In its simplest form, the tactic involves forcing a local school board to grant immediate teacher pay raises which the system cannot afford. The taxpayers are then warned that the schools are in desperate financial trouble. If this fails to move them to vote for higher school taxes, the schools actually go broke and close down. No picket lines are needed.

This happened in Youngstown, Ohio, where in 1968 the school system closed its doors to 28,000 students when it ran out of money. After having defeated a tax levy six consecutive times, voters finally approved it.

The charge is true, says William E. Henry, director of Information Services of the Ohio Education Association.

"Shock tactics... coercion... call it what you may, the simple truth is that closed schools bring tremendous pressure on taxpayers of the community to vote more money for school operation," he writes in Today's Education, official journal of the National Education Association.

He denies, however, that it is a plot by teachers to bankrupt the school districts. Rather it is because they are concerned about quality education.

Teachers are weary of "subsidizing" the schools by foregoing salary increases and by accepting larger classes and making do with outmoded teaching materials and out-of-date textbooks.

"Rather than mislead the public that teaching and learning can continue under such circumstances," says Henry, "today's teachers, backed by his professional associations, has taken a stand. He has said, in effect, that he will not operate an inadequate program."

It is indeed a pity that reasoned presentations of a school's needs and dispassionate pleas for funds so often fail to impress the taxpayers. But while "shock tactics" have their uses, they also have their limitations. The public has a famous capacity for getting numb to shock.

United They Stand... In Theory

European teen-agers are decidedly less nationalistic than their parents, if one survey both a consensus make.

Donald Ingelhart, professor of political science at the University of Michigan, interviewed a representative sampling of 2,000 German, French and British youth between 15 and 20 years old and their parents. One question he asked was: "If a United States of Europe were created now, should your country join it?"

While 40 per cent of German teen-agers said "yes," only 37 per cent of their parents did. French teen-agers and their parents were closer together with figures of 48 and 46 per cent respectively in favor. In Britain, the "yes" figures were 46 per cent and 21 per cent.

However, in all three countries, both groups reacted less favorably to the key question: "Should the government of a united Europe have the right to decide major issues if its decisions overruled your country's?"

WASHINGTON (UPI) — It is common knowledge the Department of Defense budget will get a rough going over in the Congress this year and next and probably for some years to come.

What is not so well-known is that military strategy, spending and procurement will get an even rougher going over from nonmilitary men in the administration.

Key men on President Nixon's White House staff are convinced there is a great deal of waste in this nation's defense budgets. There is more than a suspicion that for all of the billions spent, the United States is not as well prepared as it should be for the dangers of the 1970's.

It is known also that Defense Secretary Melvin Laird and Deputy Secretary David Packard agree.

The administration's critical analysis will come from a committee of men from the State Department, the Central Intelligence Agency, the Council of Economic Advisors, the Budget Bureau, the White House. It will have two Department of Defense representatives.

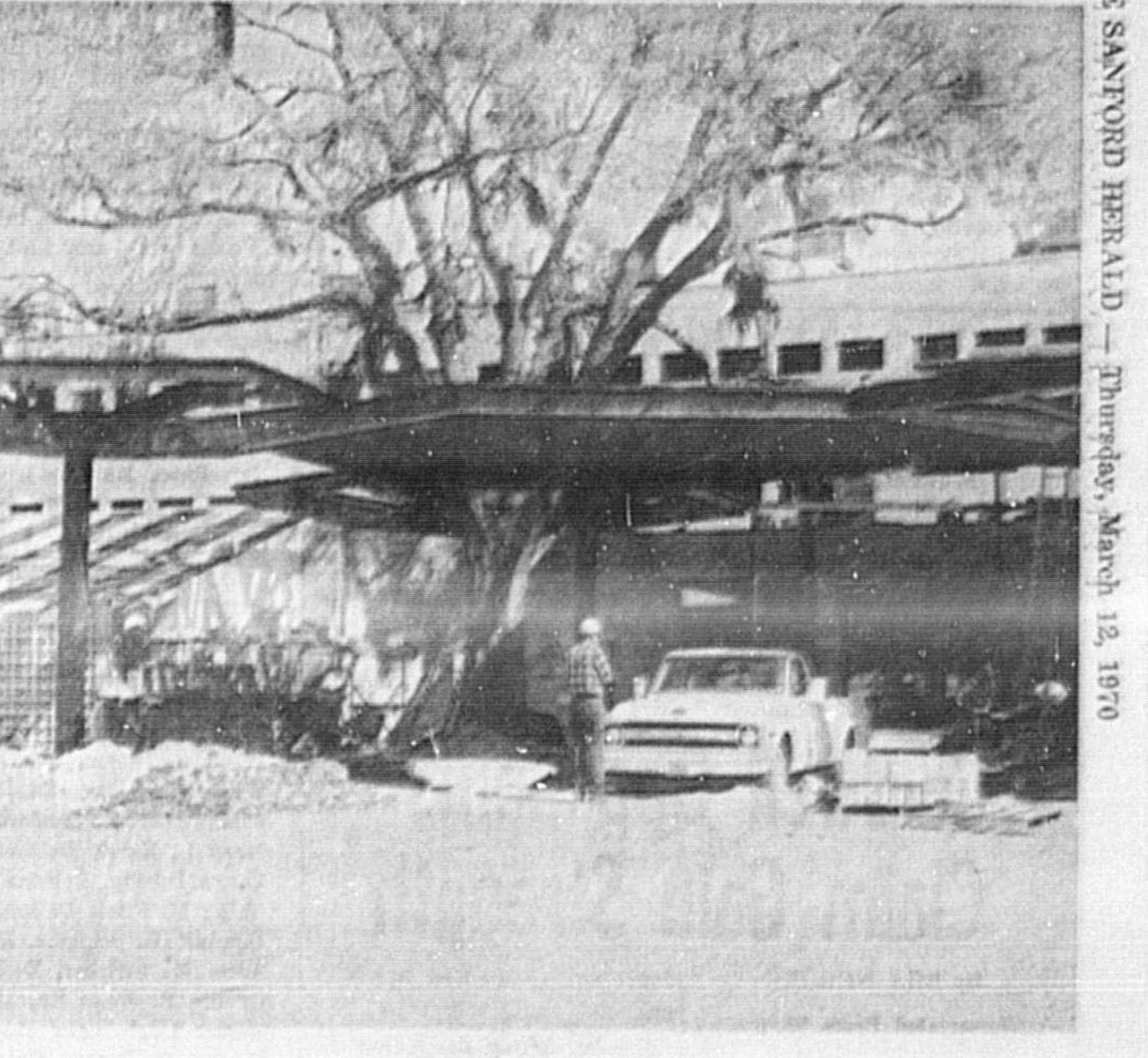

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Private Notes Appear In Press

White House Leak Irking Aide

Washington (AP) — Daniel P. Moynihan's private papers to the President have suddenly become public as press releases—and the White House is getting concerned.

Press Secretary Ronald L. Ziegler said "the major investigation" has been ordered to reveal the source of the leaks that for a second time within 10 days put a Moynihan confidential memorandum to the President in the hands of the public.

But Ziegler termed it unfortunate that a member of the President's staff could not communicate with the chief executive privately without risking disclosure of the contents of his advice.

The latest disclosure Wednesday touched off a wave of speculation that Moynihan might be the victim of a Byzantine-like intrigue spawned by enemies within the administration.

Asked in a recent interview if it was possible, the publicist, Moynihan said he would not release any information that would be a reflection of the policy of "benign neglect" toward the administration.

"That's a possible explanation, of course. But I've been in government most of my life and there's hardly a day for the newspapers in this country in which some government document that's internal is not published and discussed upon in some way or another.

"The great danger in the Moynihan case is the effect disclosure can have on the flow of information to the President.

GI Combat Deaths Drop In One Week

SAIGON (AP) — The total of U.S. combat deaths in Vietnam dropped to 88 last week, a reduction of 22 per cent from the previous week's three-month high of 113. But the wounded total jumped 77 per cent, from 460 to 803.

The U.S. Command's weekly summary of casualties raised the 100th number of Americans reported killed in action in Vietnam to 40,843 since Jan. 1, 1961. A total of 269,099 Americans have been reported wounded, 1,883 are listed as missing or captured.

The two-man ship was on a reconnaissance mission over the Gulf of Tonkin when it was hit and crashed. One of its crew members was killed.

He went to the closet and brought out a box about the size of a steamer trunk. It was labeled "State Visit."

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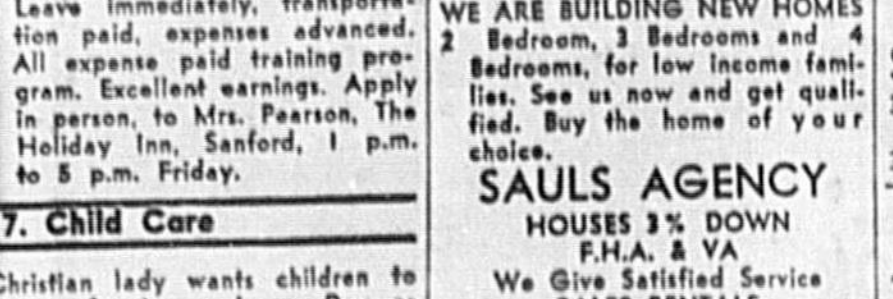

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Retirement Complex Site Rezoning Wins Approval

Approval has been given by county commissioners for rezoning of property north of Lake Ada, south of Lake Leslie and west of U.S. 17-92 from A-1 to R-1. Purpose of the change is to allow multiple family use to allow erection of Christian Village, a retirement complex which will include 1,000 no-bedroom units for residents who must be 62 to qualify. Another requirement is an income under \$5,000 per year.

Before presentation, the developers verbally reached an agreement which would secure enough right-of-way to be done on the east and south boundaries of the property which will provide an access road to Lakewood Junior High School. Commissioner Dan Polham questioned a polishing pond possibly draining into Lake Ada and sewage leaking. How a new concept in "convenience stores" . . . the rural convenience store. This store will sell fertilizer, etc., as well as groceries.

A petition to rezone from A-1 to R-1 of a vacant plot of Palm Shadens and north of Highway 434 from A-1 to R-1A. Purpose of the change is for development of Sweetwater Acres by Husky Development Corporation.

Opposing the rezoning was Attorney G. A. Speer who stated that there were no sewer facilities in the area, only septic tanks and cisterns, and that camping in the property had reached a saturation point.

Hutchinson replied that Speer was a recreational area for himself but no one else. However, commissioners agreed that there is a pollution factor to be considered and that "tents are currently stacked almost on top of each other between Lake Ada and Sweetwater Acres."

It was stated that a drainage ditch was in the Mullet Lake park area and that possible illegal dredging was being done on county property. Commissioners plan to check the dredging operation and location. Attorney Speer stated that zoning trailers to locate on property permanently. County Commissioner John Alexander said that there must be a zoning of the situation of this area, and that possible rezoning might be instituted by the County Planning and Zoning Board.

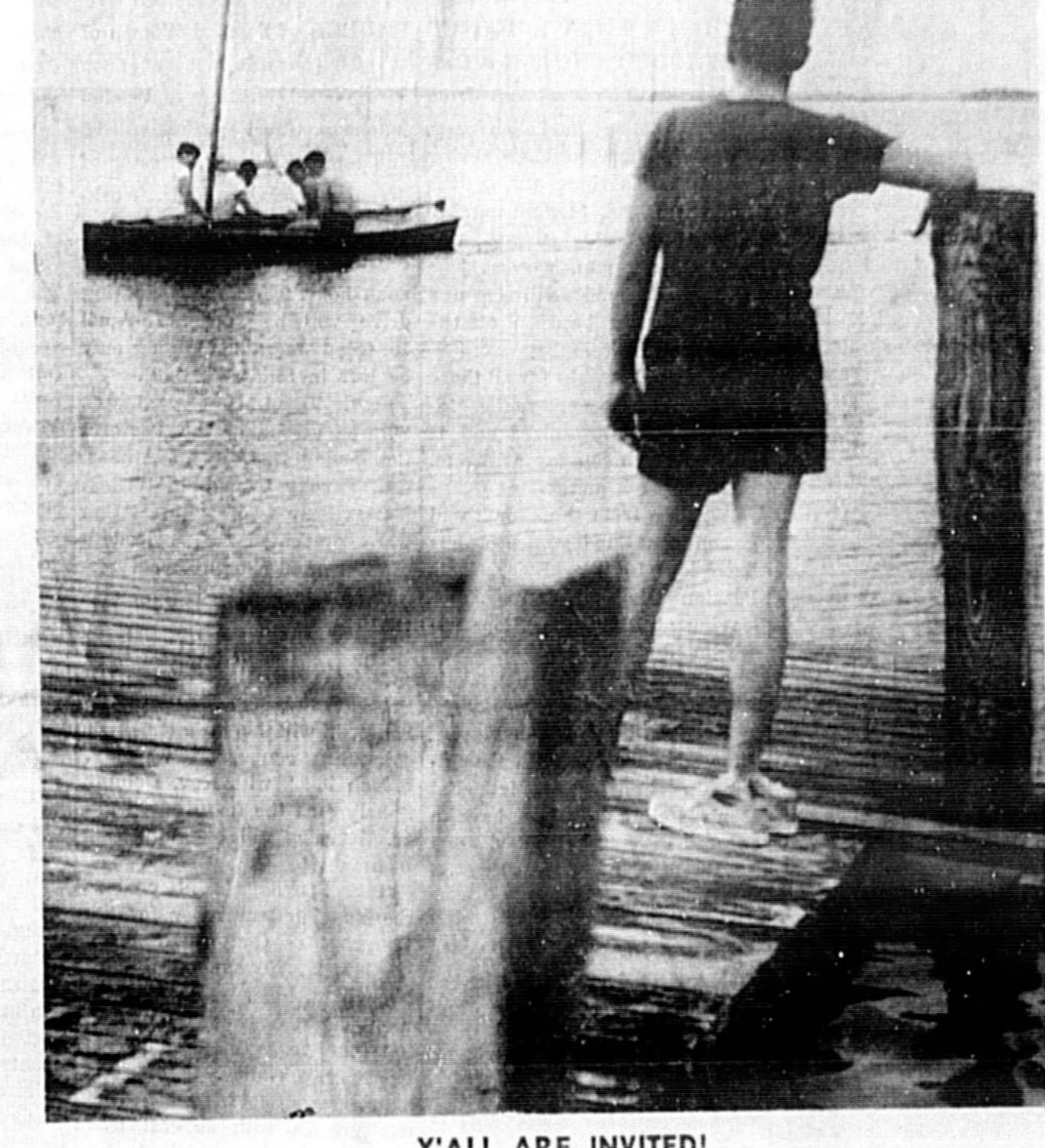

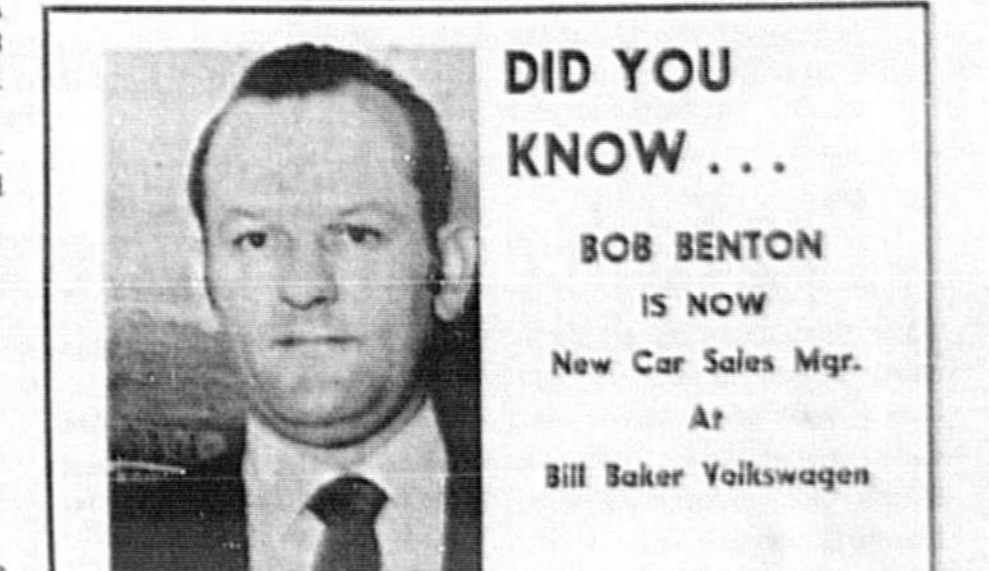
