

MORE POWER AND COMFORT IN NEW TYPE FRENCH CAR

Country Evidences Interest In Autos and Better Cars Presented for Average Driver. Common Sense Is Keynote

PARIS, Nov. 27.—France is at grips with the automobile fever. The annual exhibition with its 1,000 cars, 30 of which are American has stirred an interest that didn't need much stirring, and the far-sighted are worrying over the traffic problems of the future.

Better automobiles for the average driver are presented this season, although no revolutionary designs are offered. French mechanics are fewer, but the general common sense keynote of the show has not stopped the development of recent improvements, such as four-wheel brakes, the "servoflex" mechanism for them, and the long sought substitute for differential and gearshift.

More comfort in reasonably priced stock bodies and better power, perhaps, the salient points of the buyer. French cars long have been cramped for any man taller than 5 feet 6 inches, but the foreign trade and the trade of foreigners here have reinforced the demand of the French themselves for a little leg room, and this year they are getting it.

The typical, up-to-date French automobile, corresponding to the American \$1,200 to \$2,000 classes, now has four-wheel brakes, a fairly high-compression motor, about 50-horse power, a 50-horse displacement, ball-bearing drive, and a silence of operation that many of the best makers heretofore thought of no great importance.

Prices, as usual are higher. They went up with a bang last spring when the franc tumbled and stayed up and many factories gave them another little boost to celebrate the show.

However, on a gold basis, the best cars seem cheaper than in the United States, but their operation is far more expensive because of the higher cost of gasoline, oil, repairs, and the Frenchman's failure to look after his car himself.

France now has about 400,000 automobiles, or 1 to every 100 persons, but the one big, mass-production manufacturer of France, making a light moderate-priced car, advertises that he is turning out 300 machines a day and will produce 500 daily next year.

New Advertising Code Was Adopted Recently

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—The board of directors of the National Dry Goods Association has adopted a code for the truthful advertising of furniture, according to Lew Hahn, managing director of the association.

The code is in accordance with the "Name the Woods" campaign, carried on by the National Vigilance Committee of the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World, Mr. Hahn said. The same code has been put in effect by the Furniture Manufacturers' Association of Grand Rapids, Mich.

Before determining its course, the board of directors of the Dry Goods Association made a comprehensive study of conditions throughout the furniture advertising field to prove its practicability. The code consists of two rules which set forth that, in advertising, furniture in which exposed surfaces are of one wood, shall be designated by the name of that wood, and where the exposed surfaces are of more than one wood, the principal wood used shall designate the furniture.

Compressed Air Motor Popular In Germany

BERLIN, Nov. 27.—Compressor motors on automobiles are finding favor in Germany with drivers who want speed. This compressor attachment is similar to the supercharger as used for high altitude airplanes; compressed air is forced into the intake manifold and results in a supercharged fuel air feeding the cylinders.

The result of the compressor's action is an instant additional power impulse, amounting to more than fifty per cent of the normal motor performance. For instance, climbing a steep hill with full power and a motor slowly decreasing in revolutions, a compressor-equipped car will suddenly leap forward with a roar and pick up new speed, after the normal maximum limit has been reached.

Germans Add Ships to South American Trade

HAMBURG, Nov. 27.—Ocean travel between South America and Germany will be given a new impetus by the addition of three steamers to the South American fleets of the North German Lloyd and the Hamburg-South American lines.

These vessels are the Sierra Morena, the Monte Sarmiento and the Monte Olivia. The first mentioned left for Buenos Aires late in October, and the others will begin service shortly. Two of the ships will carry third class and steerage passengers only, an indication of the interest in emigrant trade.

DETROIT, Mich., Nov. 26.—Detroit sent its first ship to a distant foreign port Wednesday afternoon, Nov. 5, when the Steamer Onondaga of the Ford Motor Company's fleet sailed from the River Rouge plant for Buenos Aires, Argentina.
