

Stewart Says:

London Newsmen Had Advance Word On FDR-Churchill

ACCORDING to accounts from London, newspapermen knew in advance, all about the plan of Prime Minister Churchill and President Roosevelt for a conference at sea, but the British censor wouldn't let them publish it. In this country there is no censor, and I publish whatever I try to get. I have prevented Washington's newspapermen from publishing the news of the conference, but I have published their suspicions.

but only suspicions were available; our capital's newspapermen couldn't get anything definite until after the historic confab was all over.

Even then, apparently, the original intention was to have the news come initially from London.

That is to say, a London cable, received here on the afternoon of the same day that the meeting occurred, conveyed the information that Major Clement Attlee, British lord privy seal, was to broadcast a tremendously important announcement which Americans would do well to tune in on, with their radios, at 9 a. m. Washington time, on Aug. 14, the day following the Roosevelt-Churchill get-together.

Well, evidently it occurred to somebody in the know, that it would be a little too raw for words to make the United States dependent upon London for first advice concerning OUR president's chat with Winston Churchill on the former's so-called "vacation cruise."

Anyway, Presidential Private Secretary Steve Early scrambled hastily around and, at midnight, (Aug. 14-15) several hours after receipt of cabled tidings of the coming Attlee statement, notified the Washington correspondents that he'd have something vitally interesting to tell 'em at 8:30 in the morning—just in time to beat Attlee by about 30 minutes, though not soon enough to get into print with it ahead of Attlee's broadcast.

Of course extras were issued as fast as type could be set and brass could switch out the papers. Nevertheless, I've heard some growing among Washington correspondents.

The boys' thesis is that Britain seems to be having a lot to say concerning American publicity, which they consider is none of John Bull's business.

That's not long ago the war department circulated Yankee military post commanders thusly:

"The director of British censorship, western hemisphere, has brought to the department's attention several letters written by United States army personnel to individuals in foreign countries in which mention was made of matters pertaining to military establishments. While the cases reported appeared to be the result of indiscretion, measures must be taken to cause this practice to be discontinued. All personnel of your command will be directed to omit all reference to matters pertaining to the national defense in personal letters written by them, especially to foreign countries."

Colonel William A. Smith, commander at Fort Devens, Mass., noted his copy of this circular on the fort's bulletin board, which is how it happened to get into the newspapers.

It wasn't played up very prominently at the time, but, in connection with the Attlee matter, it began to be considerably commented on by capital correspondents.

Recent British Angle They don't take the position that we shouldn't be exercised relative to leaks that may be useful to potential enemies of Uncle Sam, but they're decidedly resentful of the suggestion as coming from a BRITISH "director of censorship."

Moreover, he's a director for the "WESTERN HEMISPHERE."

"Does that include the United States?" the scribes are asking.

They've been urged to censor themselves voluntarily and they're pretty good about doing it. 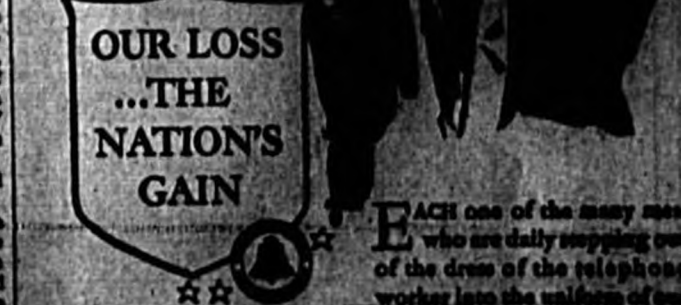

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10 Days Are Left For Buying On Easy Credit
WASHINGTON, Aug. 20—(AP)—The public, it was learned today, still has at least 10 days of easy installment credit ahead of it. The federal reserve board, which is formulating restrictions on line payments, was reported authoritatively to favor a September 1 effective date and to be considering an industry plea for postponing it until September 15. The nature of these restrictions is expected to be made public tomorrow, but they are also believed by responsible officials to follow closely tentative rules made public last week. The tentative regulations provided a minimum one-third cash down-payment and a maximum limit of 18 months to pay the balance on new and used automobiles, airplanes, boats, outboard motors and motorcycles; 30 per cent down and 18 months on refrigerators, washing machines, trunks, vacuum cleaners, electric dishwashers, air conditioning units, and radio sets; 15 per cent down and 18 months on oil burners, stokers and furnaces, water heaters, plumbing, and complete air conditioning systems; and 18 months' credit limitations on cash loans under \$1,000 and home renovation loans. All other items would be unaffected. Cash and regular charge account transactions also would be exempt from the initial rules.

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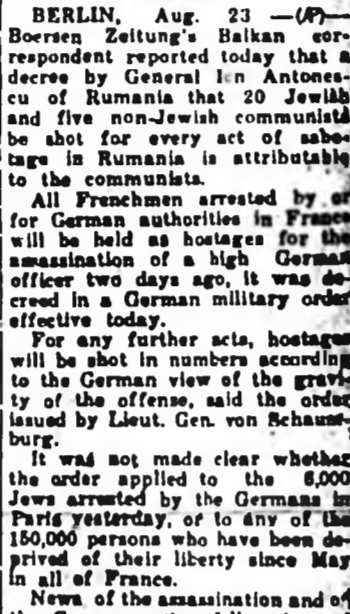

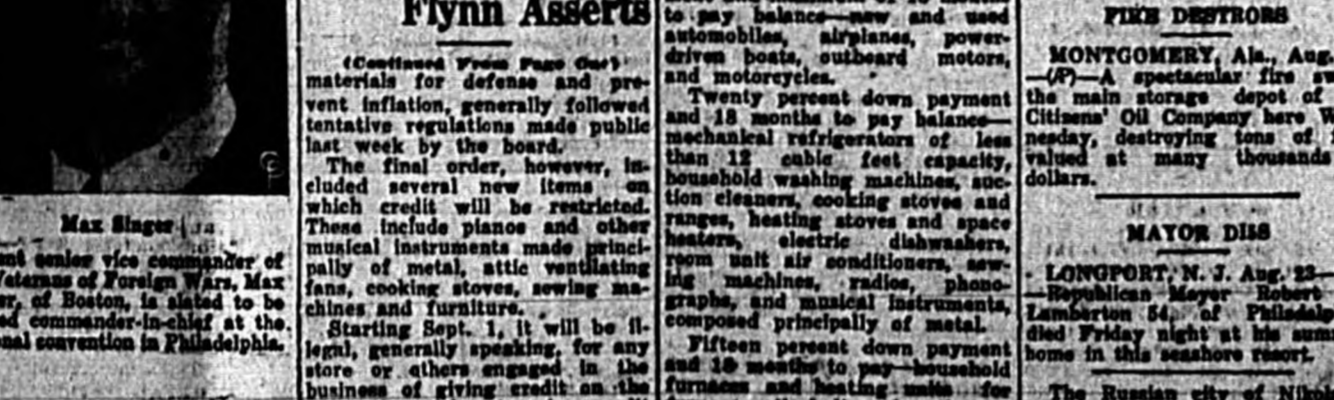

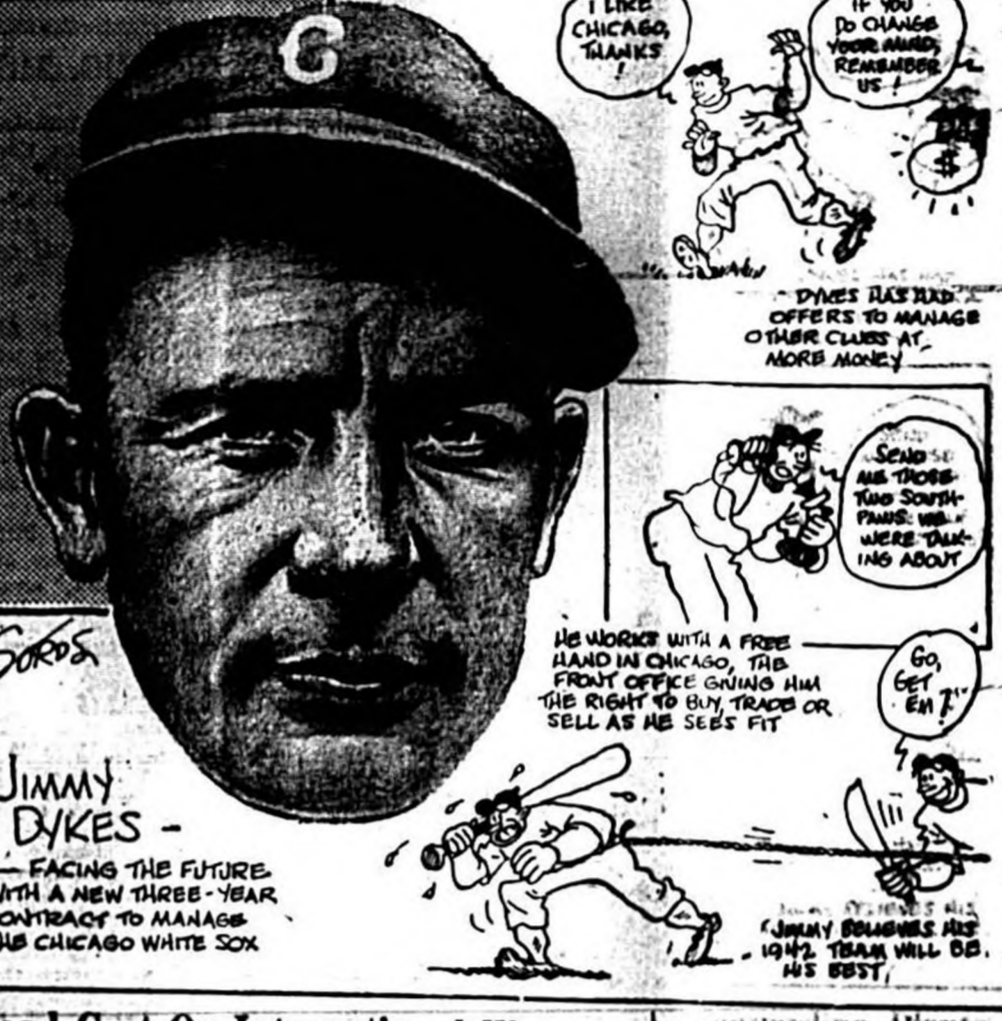

Suggestions For Farm Are Given By Research Men

(Editor's Note: Information in this column comes from workers of the University of Florida College of Agriculture in Gainesville.)

To rid a dog of fleas, rub kerosene or pyrethrum powder into the hair on his back from head to tail. Washing the dog with a pyrethrum soap, leaving the lather on him for an hour or two, will also kill the fleas.

To keep fleas out of the house, keep the dog outdoors. If fleas do invade a room, close the room tight, sprinkle about five pounds of naphthalene flakes on the floor, and keep the room closed for 48 hours. Fumes from the flakes kill the fleas. If the room or porch cannot be closed tight, spraying a good pyrethrum spray into the floor cracks and corners will kill the fleas.

Lawns that need additional food usually will respond to an application of from five to 15 pounds of cottonseed meal every 1,000 square feet once a month. Heavier fertilization should be applied in late winter.

Keep the poultry house and nests clean. Infested with mites, spray thoroughly with a strong disinfectant or with a solution of kerosene and kerosene. Mites on eggs before maturity may be due to fungi that attack them in the rainy season when they begin to roil. The variety of figs for Florida is the Celeste.

Some normally molt in the fall. From eight to 12 weeks through the molting period, that start molting in early summer usually require from six to eight weeks to get back to normal.

GAINESVILLE, Aug. 23—(Special)—Florida farmers would do well to guard against crostalaria spectabilis poisoning of their animals from now on through this fall, suggests Dr. R. E. Becker, dairy husbandman with the Florida Experiment Station. This particular species of cover crop, widely grown, is poisonous to animals, he says, and they should not be allowed to eat it.

Crostalaria poisoning is especially apt to be noticed after a frost when green vegetation is killed and the animals are seeking something to eat. Dr. Becker says that following the early frosts more animals were lost from this of last year than ever before.

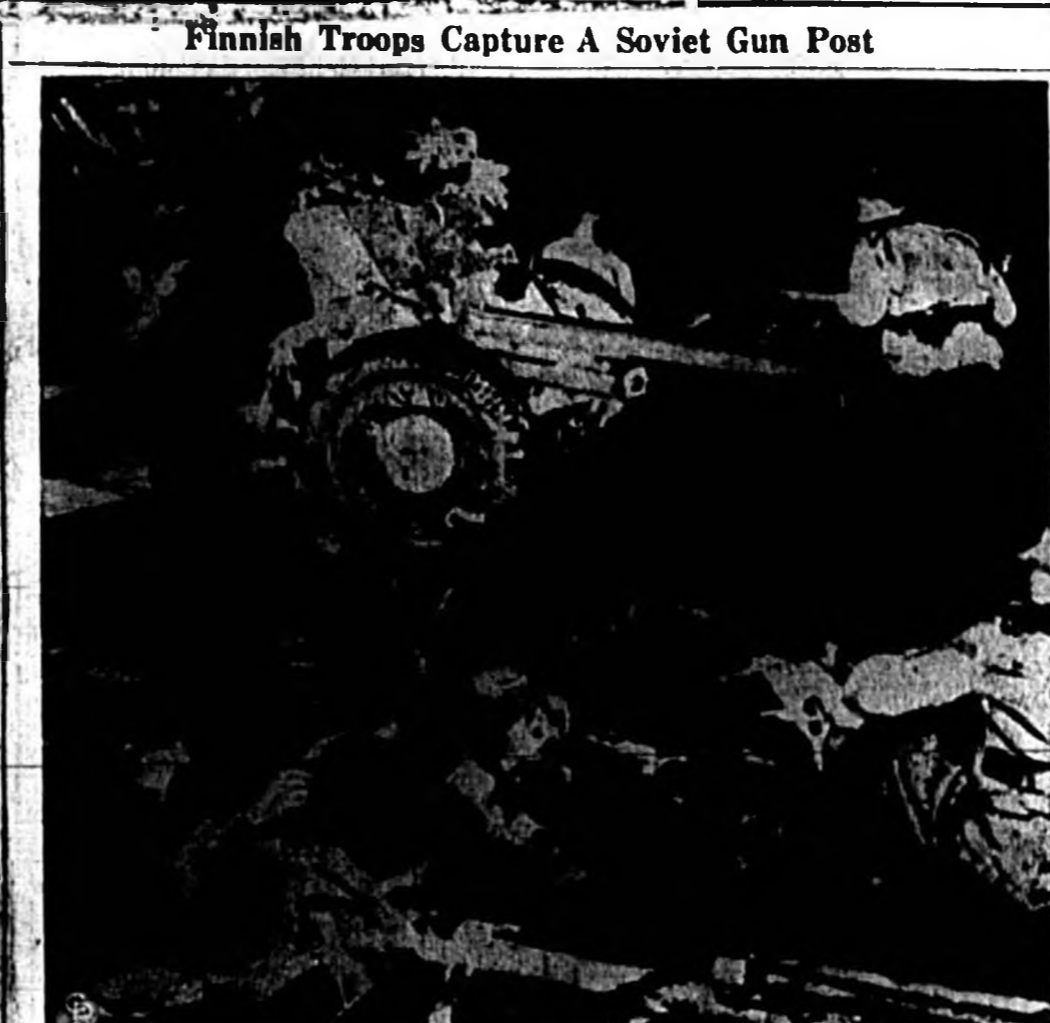

One army possibly would move from Baghdad, the capital, 100 miles north along a Mosul oil field railway to the oil at Khanaqin, then swing northeast for the 250-mile march across mountains and plateaus to Teheran.

A second drive was expected farther south from Basra, at the head of the Persian Gulf, where a march of 150 miles eastward over the good highways of that region would place the British in a position to intercept all of Iran's southern routes.

Whether the Russians, occupied as they are against the Germans, desire to take part in any military operation against Iran was not known here, but roads from the Caucasus into Persia are wide open and the weather is reported to be excellent.

JACKSONVILLE, Aug. 25.—Defense industries still offer few jobs to unemployed women, State WPA Administration Wilbur E. Harkness reported Sunday.
