# TAX NOTICE TO OWNERS OF PROPERTY IN SEMINOLE COUNTY

IMPORTANT: "All owners of property shall be held to know that taxes are due and payable thereon annually, and are hereby charged with the duty of ascertaining the amount of such tax and paying the same before the first day of April of each year" . . . . Florida Law.

COUNTY TAX BOOKS CLOSE MARCH 31st.

Under the new law enacted by the legislature the following interest and penalties begin on April 1, 1945 on all unpaid taxes assessed for the year 1944.

# On Real Estate:

A penalty of 3% on April 1st with interest at 18% per annum from April 1st plus cost of advertising and tax sale, where not paid before tax sale.

# On Personal Property:

Interest at 12% per annum from April 1st plus cost of advertising and tax war-

# On Intangible Personal Property:

10% penalty added on April 1st plus 24% per annum, cost of advertising and Sheriff's costs on executions.

Under this new law all unpaid taxes for the year 1944 become delinquent on April 1, 1945 and the penalties and interest become a part of the taxes which are a first lien on the property assessed, except that intengible Personal Property taxes are a lien on all property owned by the tax payer.

Property owners who have not done so are urged to pay their taxes on or before March 31, 1945 and avoid penalties and costs.

Before them, the Baltimore Orioles of the '90's, on whose revolutionary methods all modern baseball strategy is based, should not have been forgotten. But the hitting power of the Babe Ruth Yankees would have made them tough opponents for any team of any era.
