

Fans Seem To Approve New Pick-The-Winner Contest Of Sanford Herald And Theatre

Little Known Teams Included In List Of 125 Selections

The Sanford Herald and Miami Theatre, now pick-the-winner football contest, is evidently meeting with the approval of local fans, for in spite of the short time allowed last week, 125 selections were turned in before noon Saturday.

Teams from coast-to-coast semi-professional football were among those submitted and for this reason approved difficult to ascertain who were the winners. At the time of this writing there still remain a few teams to hear from.

One of the entire group of 125 selections turned in only five, or 4%, assure winners. They are: Al St. John, Englewood, Calif.; Mrs. A. B. Johnson, Mrs. Eugene Esteside, and Mr. J. L. LaFever. Tickets may be obtained at The Herald any time Tuesday.

However, there are still 120 other eggs who might win. It all depends on how Cincinnati-Baltimore, Southern-Midwest, Texas Tech, and a few other big Western teams come out. These teams were not recorded in the New York, Chicago, and Toledo Jacks, semipro and Tuna newspapers. As soon as the correct scores of these teams are known, the rest of the winners will be announced.

In general, the Pacific Coast Tech., the Duke-Ashley, and the Weber Forest-Gene Washington games, upmost of the time, Chico, were eliminated for various reasons. Some of the schools did not reach The Herald office until Sunday, and those were not logical; still others had their teams mixed up. One person selected Harvard to win from Yale and of course those teams did not play. A few picked Michigan State to win from Washington. Washington did not play Michigan, but Stanford Michigan State, indeed Washington, U. of Missouri, the teams, both winners, and losses must be listed separately.

In tomorrow's Herald this weekly, pick-the-winner lists will be published.

Louisiana State Is Only Unconquered 11 In Southeast

25-Tom Airplane With Capacity Of 75 Reaches Miami

MIAMI, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Pan-American Airways' giant China Clipper, destined for trans-Pacific service, arrived to undergo final tests here Sunday, the eve of the eighth birthday of United's international air transport system.

Plating the 25-ton flying boat for its nonstop 1200-mile trip from Honolulu was Capt. Eddie E. Shantz, white-flame pilot regularly scheduled plane from Key West to Havana, Cuba, Oct. 28, 1937.

Today he was at the controls of carrying 18 passengers and crew of six on normal flights, and 24 passengers and one ton of mail for 2400 miles. Sleeping accommodations are provided for 18 persons.

Captain Shantz said the new Clipper responded to the controls easily as do the present clipper ships, although it dwarfs them by six tons.

The air vibration at the 130-mile average speed maintained was negligible and five passengers aboard the craft agreed.

With four defeats in the background, the Sanford Celery Feds still have a chance for a better than 50-50 break, as there are five games yet to be played—with Ocala, Orlando, Landen in Jacksonville, St. Augustine and Leesburg.

The game against Ocala is scheduled for Friday of this week, and the squad is to put in a hard week's practice. Coach McLucas told his bunch of players yesterday after the scrummage work on the field during the afternoon. The coach told them they must win this next game and that they will if every man works hard and doesn't let any grass grow under his feet.

Alaska Colony Mostly Housed Says Hopkins

163 Homes Have Been
Built And Nearly
All Families Are
Settled, Is Report

**Forty Families
Return To U. S.**
League Calls Colony
In The Far North
"Tragic Failure"

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.

The F. E. R. A. Matanuska Valley colony in Alaska, where pioneers of the depression from Minnesota and Wisconsin sought to make new homes this last summer amid confusion of government plans, has 163 houses built now and most of the colonial families are settled, it was announced by Harry L. Hopkins, Relief Administrator.

The pioneers were housed at first in tent village without proper tools, materials or skilled workers to put up the houses, according to previous reports from Matanuska. A race against the arrival of the rigors of an Alaskan winter had to be staged. Fearing real trouble, the F. E. R. A. sent up new managers of the project and made facilities for action available.

Now, 850 persons, of whom 500 are under the age of 21, are housed in permanent homes, the Hopkins report stated. News received by radio from Lieutenant Colonel L. P. Hunt, U. S. M. C. director of the Alaska Rural Rehabilitation Corporation, makes a happier picture of the situation than previous reports.

Meanwhile the American Liberty League called the colonization project a "tragic" failure.

"According to the plans as announced," the league said, "200 families, including about 1,000 persons taken from the relief rolls of northern Michigan, Minnesota and Wisconsin, were to be given an opportunity to rehabilitate themselves as homesteaders in the Matanuska Valley in Alaska. The 200 families, some of whom had little or no experience on farms, were shipped to Alaska, where they found confusion, poor planning, inefficient management, hardships, discomforts, and discouraging prospects. About forty of the families have returned to the United States. The Matanuska Valley is a fertile area, but the (Continued on Page Three)

Injunction Hasn't Stopped Slot Machines In Sanford

No Notice Received
Here To Put Them
Out Of Commission

Irish Sweepstakes
Pays To Americans
Nearly \$1,500,000

Slot machines are allowed to operate in the City of Sanford, despite the injunction prohibiting their licensing issued by Circuit Judge H. F. Atkinson in Miami several days ago. The injunction was served on Comptroller J. M. Lee in Tallahassee, and Chief of Police Roy Williams said that no notice of it has been received in Sanford, and the coin-operated devices—more than 20 of them—are permitted under provisions of a special licensing ordinance passed by the City Commission on Oct. 19.

Advices from the state capital say that serving of the court injunction on the state comptroller has halted preparations to license and tax the machines as proposed by the 1935 Legislature to raise an estimated million dollars annually for the state.

When copies of the temporary injunction, and Judge Atkinson's opinion were received at the attorney general's office, counsel for the comptroller immediately started a study of them to determine what procedure would be followed in appealing the case.

A decision was delayed, however, and Duval county officials were asked to send copies of the bill of complaint and the testimony on which the injunction was granted.

The new injunction followed claims by the City of Miami that operation of slot machines constitutes an evil influence affecting all the residents of a community. In recently holding the slot machine law valid, the Supreme Court said the machines, as such, were not lotteries, as are prohibited by the Constitution, but might become lotteries by the method used in operating them. This matter was left for decision, upon a specific case being presented.

William Lossing Dies Soon After Being Struck By Vehicle Early Last Evening

Nearly Two Million Dollars Impounded In South Carolina By Executive Order

DUBLIN, Oct. 30.—(AP)—American purchasers of tickets in the Irish hospital sweepstakes added \$1,423,900 to their winnings today when "Commander," "Third Man's Pal" and "Finalist" finished in that order in the Cambridge race at Newmarket.

Today's winnings added to previous allotments from the draw means that a total of \$2,729,000 goes to the United States.

Fracture of the skull received when he fell to the pavement after he was struck by a bicycle ridden by a 14-year-old boy early last evening caused the death within an hour of William Lossing, 69, a resident of Sanford for 10 years. Funeral arrangements, in charge of the Erickson Funeral Home, will be held Thursday at 2:00 o'clock at the First Christian Church, with the Rev. Herman W. Forbes, pastor, in charge of the services. The body will be taken to Tallahassee, Tenn., on the 4:10 train where burial will be made.

A coroner's jury impaneled this morning by J. C. Roberts, Justice of the peace, was advised by the sheriff's office and the police department, both of which investigated the accident, that Mr. Lossing was struck by a bicycle ridden by Tommy Jones, who was also painfully injured when thrown to the pavement. Mr. Lossing was walking along Sanford Avenue near the intersection of Geneva Avenue when struck by the wheel. He was rushed to the Fernside-Laughton Memorial Hospital, but died within an hour without regaining consciousness.

Sheriff J. F. Metcalf reported that witness of the accident said that when struck by the wheel Mr. Lossing lost his balance, tumbled backward and struck his head against the curb.
