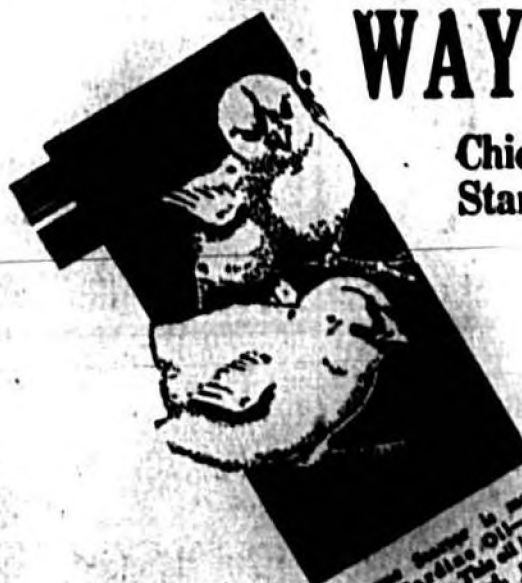

League Calls Colony In The Far North "Tragic Failure"

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—The F. E. R. A. Matanuska Valley colony in Alaska, where pioneers of the depression from Minnesota and Wisconsin sought to make new homes this last summer amid confusion of government plans, has 163 homes built now and most of the colonist families are settled, it was announced by Harry L. Hopkins, Relief Administrator.

The pioneers were housed at first in a tent village without proper tools, materials or skilled workers to put up the houses, according to previous reports from Matanuska. A race against the arrival of the rigors of an Alaskan winter had to be staged. Fearing real trouble, the F. E. R. A. sent up new managers of the project and made facilities for action available.

Now, 850 persons, of whom 500 are under the age of 21, are housed in permanent homes, the Hopkins report stated. News received by radio from Lieutenant Colonel L. P. Hunt, U. S. M. C. director of the Alaska Rural Rehabilitation Corporation, makes a happier picture of the situation than previous reports.

Injunction Hasn't Stopped Slot Machines In Sanford

No Notice Received Here To Put Them Out Of Commission

Slot machines are allowed to operate in the City of Sanford, despite the injunction prohibiting their licensing issued by Circuit Judge H. F. Atkinson in Miami several days ago. The injunction was served on Comptroller J. M. Lee in Tallahassee, but Chief of Police Roy Williams said that no notice of it has been received in Sanford, and the coin-operated devices—more than 20 of them—are permitted under provisions of a special licensing ordinance passed by the City Commission on Oct. 19.

Advices from the state capital say that serving of the court injunction on the State comptroller has halted preparations to license and tax the machines as proposed by the 1935 Legislature to raise an estimated million dollars annually for the state.

When copies of the temporary injunction and Judge Atkinson's opinion were received at the attorney general's office, counsel for the comptroller immediately started a study of them to determine what procedure would be followed in appealing the case.

A decision was delayed, however, and the county officials were asked to send copies of the bill of complaint and the testimony on which the injunction was granted.

The new injunction followed the claims by the City of Miami that operation of slot machines constitutes an evil influence affecting all the residents of a community. In recently holding the slot machine law valid, the Supreme Court said the machines, as such, were not lotteries, as are prohibited by the constitution, but might become lotteries by the method used in operating them. This matter was left for decision upon a specific case being presented.

Legal Way To Issue \$3 Auto Tag Is Sought

Nearly Two Million Dollars Impounded In South Carolina By Executive Order

COLUMBIA, S. C., Oct. 30.—(AP) Governor Olin Johnston concentrated today on finding a valid method of putting \$3 automobile tags on sale after ousting an inimical road administration, placing its 2,000 employees on probation, and impounding \$1,871,352 in highway funds under a military edict.

The flat \$3 fee would apply to all privately owned cars, now licensed at an average fee of \$5 annually, and to trucks of not more than one and one-half tons, a size largely used by farmers hauling their produce to market.

The 36-year-old executive had promised to give South Carolina \$3 tags, as Governor Eugene Talmadge had done in Georgia, in his campaigns and made an unsuccessful effort to have the Legislature enact them in a form acceptable to him.

There were unconfirmed reports that members of the disbanded commission might seek court action on grounds the governor had usurped a legislative function if he provided \$3 license by executive action.

Colder Weather Is Predicted By End Of The Week

The Associated Press Winter weather covered most of the West today as the East remained unseasonably warm.

Maybe, this report will write "finis" to the old coin rivalry which has been consuming considerable newspaper space the last week. For here is what appears to be the oldest coin ever minted in the United States.

E. B. Stone, living on Cameron Avenue, Sanford, brings to The Herald office a piece of alloy money about the size of a half dollar issued by the then Colony of Massachusetts in 1652, and that's 283 years ago. Working on the old coin is plainly legible, and this names the piece of money as the "Pine Tree Shilling." The face of the coin shows a pine tree.

Another coin only 121 years old (a half dollar) owned by E. L. Irvin, 1216 West Thirteenth Street, looks much like the 60-cent piece in circulation today, though there are only 13 stars on it. It was minted in 1814.

Concession To Mussolini Is To Be Talked

Latest Peace Plans Will Be Discussed By The League In Geneva Tomorrow

France, Britain Will Co-Operate

Campaign Planned In Mediterranean To Enforce Sanctions

LONDON, Oct. 30.—(AP) Concession to Mussolini to end his invasion of Ethiopia, high British sources said today, would be discussed at Geneva tomorrow when the League of Nations' sanctions staff meets to fix the deadline for imposing economic penalties against Italy. Sir Samuel Hoare, British foreign minister, who will go to Geneva to survey the possibility of peace with Premier Benito Mussolini, declared, however, that any basis of peace must be "an honorable settlement of the dispute acceptable to the three parties concerned, the League, Italy and Ethiopia."

At Paris, Laval was reported by cables close to the foreign office to have let Mussolini understand that peace terms must come from H. Duce and be submitted to the League of Nations.

Simultaneously, French officials declared that British and French navy, army and air leaders were preparing a campaign of full scale sea-sweeping in the Mediterranean to operate under the sanctions' article of the League covenant.
