GERMAN PLANS WARSHIPS FOR POSSIBLE WAR

Will Be Most Formidable In The World In Proportion To Tonnage; Will Be Built Of Special Light Steel

Said To Fire 6 Inch Shell Every Second

Amazing Ingenuity Shown In Getting Utmost Combatant Power of Small Vessels

LONDON.—Warships, which in proportion to their tonnage are easily the most formidable fighting craft in the world, capable of firing a 6-inch shell every second, are being constructed in Germany, according to information reaching London through government channels.

Bound down by the Versailles Treaty to narrow limits of displacement, Germany's naval constructors are showing amazing ingenuity in putting the utmost degree of combatant power into relatively small vessels which are said to be packed with new features and of amazing deadliness. These ships, carrying enough oil to travel 6,000 miles with touching ports, and with a speed of 32 knots per hour, are of a design so novel, and embody so many new features, that it must be conceded, the German naval architects have lived up to their pre-war reputations.

Special Steel
Their hulls are built of a special steel, the formula of which is said to be unknown outside of the laboratories at Essen. It combined lightness with great strength, and weight has been saved by the use of electric welding instead of rivets.

With a displacement of 6,000 tons, a length of 554 feet and a breadth of 50 feet, the ships are driven by geared turbines of 65,000 shaft horsepower, working on high pressure steam from six oil-burning boilers. At full power the speed will be 32 knots at least but more is expected. When the ships are cruising the steam turbines will be cut out, and they will then run on their Diesel motors.

The armament consists of nine 6-in. guns of the latest Krupp model, firing 101-pound shells, and capable of a very rapid rate of fire, with a range, on their high-angle mountings, of 20,000 yards. Housed in triple turrets, three guns in each turret will be worked simultaneously, that is as a unit, loaded and fired as a three-barreled gun. At each broadside the ship will discharge nine 6-in. projectiles, and as eight or nine of these salvoes can be got off every minute, the rate of fire will be equivalent to more than one shell per second.

A Curious System
The first turret stand on the forecastle, while two others are placed diagonally astern, the second being at a higher level than the third. In this manner, should the cruiser be attacked, six guns could be kept bearing on the pursuer.

The curious system has been adopted, according to naval experts to facilitate the lay-out of the machinery and the magazines.

Besides the nine big guns, each ship has four 3.4 in. anti-aircraft guns and twelve torpedo tubes.

A considerable number of mines is carried by each ship, which are conveyed from the magazine to the stern, where just above the water line is a large hatch from which mines can be dropped into the sea. Special devices are fitted to eliminate funnel smoke, and all upper works on the ships are as inconspicuous as possible with the object of reducing the area of target.

Although these ships are nearly 2,000 tons smaller than the large cruisers of the Great Powers, they have a broadside of nine 6-in. guns while the average cruiser has only six. In addition, moreover, their speed enables them to avoid action with antagonists of superior gun power.

"Watch Princeton" Slogan Sounded In Eastern Circles; Roper Assembles Fine Team

PRINCETON, N. J., Oct. 18.—"Watch Princeton" is the slogan that is sounding up and down the football gridirons these brisk October afternoons, for the Tigers, although the "Big Three" is no more, are launched on what may prove to be one of the most successful seasons an eleven from Old Nassau has enjoyed in many a long day.

Admittedly green and inexperienced, the Princetonians are playing a canny game this fall, sound on defensive, conservative on offense but apparently always doing the right thing at the right time according to the approved Roper formula. There has been no effort by Roper and his two chief aides, Stan Keck and Al Wittmer to hurry the eleven along. Every stage in the development of the team has been no attempt to load the backs up with a mass of new plays in the early season contests.

They have all been reserved for the big November battles, but just the same the orange and black is forging steadily along, using simple and almost rudimentary formations but executing them with just as much exactness and precision as Knute Rockne demands of his "fighting Irish."

Bill Roper confesses that he is at his best coaching comparatively green men. "They'll do as you tell

them," he said the other day, "and none of them have developed the complex that makes them feel they know more than you do. That's the trouble with these all-vet. teams. They know it all and the coach knows nothing. Now this year's Princeton team is a smart, aggressive outfit but it is just thirsty for football knowledge and drinks up."

Everything you give them. What we're doing is to feed it to them slowly enough so as to avoid indigestion."

Of the team which trimmed both Harvard and Yale last season when Jake Slagle and Danny Caulkins were performing their magic efore the crimson and blue, 12 men have been lost by graduation or ineligibility, including the line from tackle to tackle and the two big scoring aces of the back. But with the exception of Slagle and Caulkins, Roper appears to have developed a team, better and stronger in every position than the 1926 eleven.

At last present indications are that it will be a much more capable outfit when it reaches its mature strength a month hence. The new Princeton line compares favorably even now with some of the best, the Tigers have ever had and the backfield is crowded with promising ball carriers, kickers and passers.

New Ruling Passed By National Body On Knockout Count

TOLEDO, Ohio, Oct. 18 (INS).—Although the members of the National Boxing Association, in session here, lauded the action of the Illinois Boxing Commission in refusing to rescind the decision of its referee in the Dempsey-Tunney fight, the association today had adopted a new rule governing the count over knocked down boxers, widely differs from the rule in vogue by the Illinois body.

A foreword carefully explains that the pamphlet has no political purpose, but you can't bamboozle official Washington, which has seen similar pamphlets before.

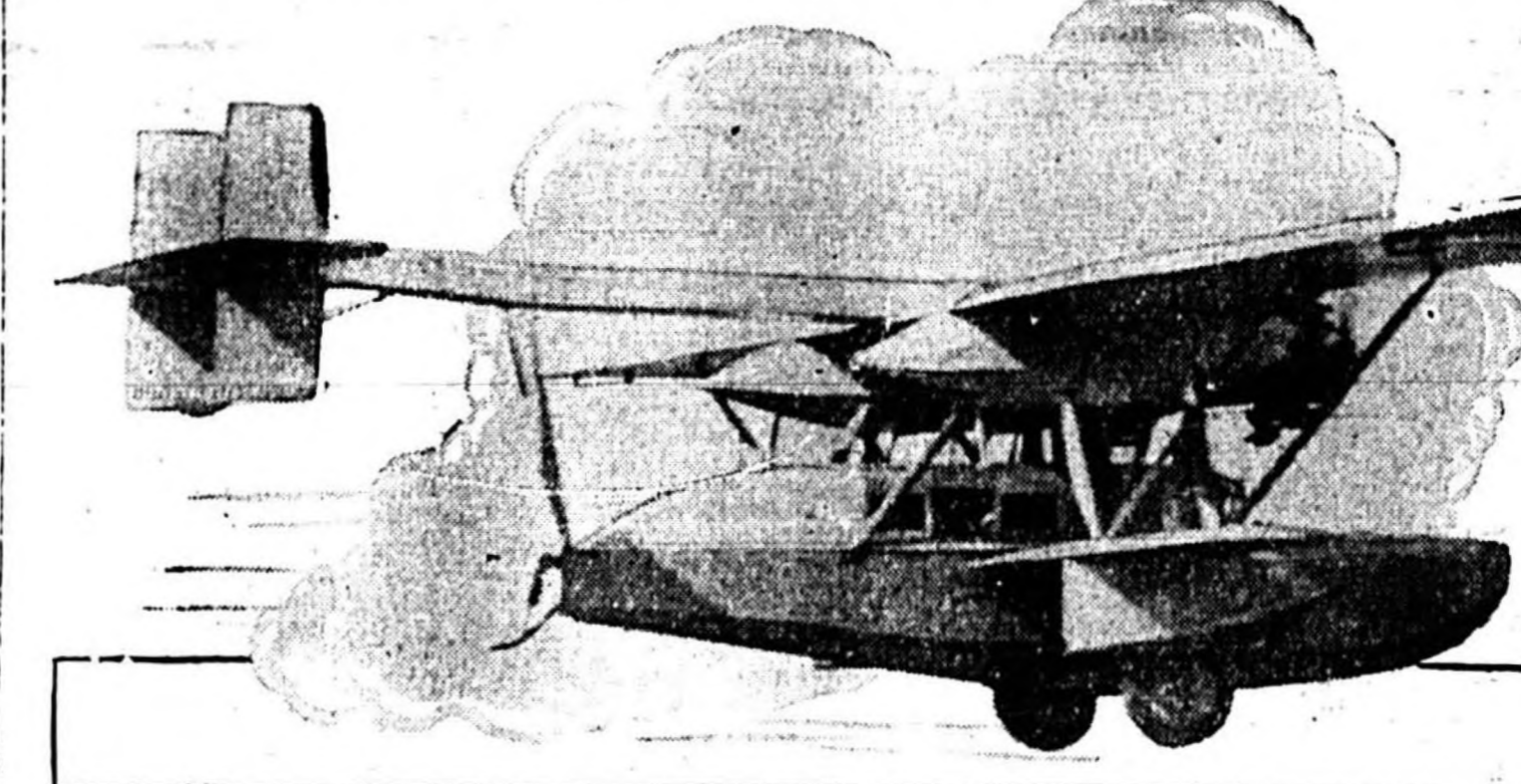
