

It is doubtful if any city in America has come through more trying times. And it is doubtful if anyone in Sanford has escaped his full share of trials and tribulations.

Some of us may not actually have lost our jobs but we have had to work doubly hard to retain the one we had. Some of us may not have been deprived of food for our tables but we may have suffered from nervous indigestion trying to obtain it. Some of us may seem to have had all the breaks but we doubt if our troubles have been any the less acute on that account.

Here in Sanford, and we suppose in most other cities in the world, we have not made our difficulties any casfer by continually fighting among ourselves. Since, the de-pression began we have not seen a single man stand up in public that he was not instantly greated with a hower of rotten eggs. These missiles did not always come from the people as a whole, or aways from the same group of people, but there were invariably enough of them to ruin our leadership.

People who are honestly trying to do a good job, in times like these, whether it be in some public office or in the more or less private capacity of banker, baker, or candlestick maker, should not be subjected to too much condemnation and ridicule. Such opposition tends to lower their efficiency, their spirit and their energy. And when the wisdom and strength of our leaders falter, everyone suffers.

We have heard so many people so severely criticized in the last few years for what seemed to be such trivial things! Because a city commissioner suggests levying a garbage tax in order to help operate the city while the people cry for greater municipal improvements, he is criti-cized, condemned, ridiculed and slandered and generally hadgered about from pillar to post until he longs to be

humble inconspicuous citizen without civic responsibilities What we need in this city is a "Good Neighbor Policy" ike the one President Roosevelt is trying to inculcate into our relations with South American nations. After all, we are neighbors here in Sanford and we cannot possibly make the condition of all of us any better by constantly fighting among ourselves, constantly knifing one another in the back, constantly spreading lies about each other in the hope that the other fellow will be reduced to our own level of spiritual and economic privation.




