

Was Nixon Warned About Korean Influence Try?

WASHINGTON (UPI) — House investigators said today they have documents showing U.S. intelligence officials warned the Nixon administration in 1971 that South Korea had plans to buy influence in Congress. Moreover, they said, American officials in Seoul reported President Park Chung Hee was involved in the planning and at one point had rejected a proposal to put his dealer Tonggun Park in command of the Washington lobbying operation.

Flynt In Critical Shape

ATLANTA (UPI) — Doctors at Emory University Hospital say Larry Flynt, the owner of Hustler magazine who was shot from an ambush eight days ago, has slipped into critical condition and is using a respirator to help his breathing.

Earlier in the week, doctors said Flynt, who has wounds in the abdomen, was trying to fight off an intra-abdominal infection and sepsis (bloodborne bacteria), and he had contracted pneumonia.

GM Aims To Halt EPA Probe

DETROIT (UPI) — General Motors Corp. has gone to court to stop an Environmental Protection Agency investigation into charges that emission tests of some 1977 Buicks were rigged.

The probe centers on allegations that certain Buick LeSabre models tested by Buick officials for an EPA emissions audit last December "were chosen... in a manner which may have caused the vehicles selected to be unrepresentative of normal production vehicles," in violation of EPA testing procedures.

Rain Ends; No Flooding

Rain ended today along the Eastern Seaboard as a storm moved northeast and out of the country, but the heavy flooding expected in the wake of the storm failed to materialize.

Despite unbroken ocean and river rising, the National Weather Service said cool air moving into the East was expected to prevent sudden melting of remaining snow and ice.

Oil Firm Claims Rout

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A spokesman for Amoco Oil Co., in Chicago said on March 7, their oil drilling rig Discoverer 311, was chased from one of the company's drilling sites in the Gulf of Suez between Egypt and the Sinai Peninsula by an Israeli gunboat.

The spokesman said an Israeli naval vessel approached and after a lengthy and heated discussion, ordered the ship to move two kilometers to the west. The ship moved and the incident was reported to the State Department, which expressed its interest and displeasure but made no formal protest.

Youth Life Support Cut

CHICAGO (UPI) — Craig Stech, 15, who doctors reported had undergone brain death after two electroencephalograms showed no brain activity, was disconnected from a respirator Tuesday after doctors at Loyola University Hospital were advised by the Cook County medical examiner they could not be held responsible for the youth's death.

Stech's parents had requested the boy be allowed to die, but hospital officials were reluctant to remove the respirator because charges of aggravated battery against James M. Stech, 47, of Chicago, could be considered to murder. Stech had been charged with beating and kicking Stech in the head a week ago.

Canal Pact Changes Sought

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Senators still undecided about the Panama Canal treaty introduced efforts to win changes in the agreement today on the eve of the first Senate ratification vote.

The first ratification vote was set for 4 p.m. EST Thursday, with the critical question on the treaty's transferring the Panama Canal's permanent neutrality. A second vote would come later in the agreement to cede U.S. control of the canal in the year 2000.

Union Panel Checking Out New Proposed Mine Pact

United Mine Workers of America negotiators in Washington said today they are studying the new contract - under scrutiny today of the UMW bargaining council - will end the 10-day-old coal strike, but reaction was mixed among rank and file miners who still must ratify it.

"From what I can tell, I think about 75 percent of the men will endorse it," said West Virginia miner Roger Hammack. "From what I've been told, it looks good to me."

"You may as well tell (UMW President) Arnold Miller to stop the hell in Washington,"

granted Ohio local officer Rick Sitter. "This contract doesn't sound any better than the last one. We'll probably have to reject this one too."

In Cranford, Va., three angry miners used a match to express their opinion of the new pact. Handed a copy of gray reports on it, they burned them.

Withdraw their view of the agreement, the 100,000 striking UMW miners were solidly in accord Tuesday on one point. Following their union leader's cry of "no contract, no work," they left the coal mine site in their second day of defiance of

President Carter's full-workday back-to-work order.

In Washington, the third contract so far proposed in the strike was before the UMW's 20-man bargaining council and they predicted a vote as early as Monday.

Key Points Of The Contract

The major points in the new coal miner contract are:

- Elimination of a work stabilization clause that would have imposed penalties against miners who had without strikes.
- Lowering, to a maximum of \$900 a year for working miners and \$150 a year for pensioners, the amount to be paid for doctor's visits and drugs under the health care plan.
- A guaranteed wage increase of \$1.00 an hour over the three-year period, boosting the average miner's wage from \$7.50 an hour to \$8.50. The figures include a cost of living adjustment.
- Immediate increase in pension to 87% a month for miners covered by the 1950 Pension Trust, instead of phasing in the hike over three years.

Union To Vote On Retention

The 17 Casaberry City employees, members of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners, Local 1768, will vote March 21 on whether to retain the union as its collective bargaining agent.

And employee union representative Otto Grammier, a city sewer plant operator, said today the vote will be very close. "It could go either way," he said, "but I predict it will be very close."

Grammier earlier said that the union would lose if the unionizing effort and would not spend any more money on the Casaberry effort pending the results of the election.

Meanwhile, Grammier who has represented the employees with the union for the past eight months and who has been employed with the City of Casaberry for the past five years, has resigned his post as sewer plant operator.

"No, I wasn't asked to resign. I've been planning to retire at this time for a long time. I'm 63 years old and eligible for social security," Grammier said.

Grammier's resignation letter to the city, accepted by Mayor Bill Grier, said he is retiring from the city's civil service on April 18. He requested vacation time accrued, making his last working day March 27, and the request was approved by Grier.

In late January, 28 city employees, who were members of the union, petitioned the Florida Public Employees Relations Commission (PERC) to order a new vote on whether the employees still want the union.

In letters to city employees this week, PERC notified that it will be mailing ballots directly to the eligible voting members on March 21.

The city's plan to levy a tax on sewer service by an ordinance adopted in 1971. The tax at that time was eight percent. Pland said the tax has since been lowered to six percent, then five percent, and now it is four percent.

He said the reductions came about when the city pledged to reduce utility tax as it began levying a property tax four years ago.

"We have consistently levied the tax since 1971," Pland said, adding the tax was levied before the PSC had authority to regulate utilities in Seminole County.

The PSC assumed jurisdiction after Seminole County relinquished control of county utilities to the state agency in late 1975-early 1976, Pland said.

"The tax on sewer service was set up in Winter Springs before the PSC had jurisdiction," said the mayor.

The ordinance adopted in July, 1971, was amended to reduce the tax from eight percent to six percent in 1976, amended further to reduce the tax to five percent in January, 1977 and reduced to four percent in October, 1977.

Pland said within weeks of the county relinquishing the city's jurisdiction over the utilities, the North Orlando Water and Sewer Corp. petitioned the PSC for a 10 percent rate increase.

The Scourge Of Terrorism

Terrorists have come to be regarded as a peculiar and awful scourge of our time. Yet, the truth is their bloody work has stained the pages of history.

Air travel, radio communications, sophisticated weapons and the ruthlessness of Marxist ideology have combined to give terrorism an effective modern dimension unknown in other ages.

Although the Weathermen and other groups have given a bitter taste of terrorism to the United States, the problem here does not compare with such trouble in Japan, Europe, the Middle East, and parts of Latin America.

The latest examples of such terrorism have been the seizure of 70 hostages by Moroccan rebels in The Netherlands and the Palestinian raid inside Israel in which 31 were killed. An Israeli retaliatory strike is underway today and the world awaits word of its extent, effects and ramifications.

In all continents, there is a commonality of terrorist methods: bombings, kidnapping for the release of imprisoned terrorists and for ransom that is used to finance terrorists' goals, bombings, plane hijackings and murder of political opponents.

In some countries, no prominent person dares go without bodyguards.

While no terrorist group has been linked with a government not its own, there is close cooperation among terrorists of different nations.

Many international terrorist contacts center with the PLO.

The Japanese Red Army was responsible for the 1973 Lod Airport massacre in Israel; German terrorists were involved in the PLO's plane hijacking that ended with the dramatic Israeli rescue mission at Entebbe, Uganda.

West Germany's Red Army Faction is known to have ties with the Japanese Red Army as well as the PLO, while the American Weathermen group is also linked to the British Republican Army.

Though the Weathermen have worked together on missions far from their home base.

Most of the weapons used by international terrorists come from the Soviet Union via Cuba, Africa or Middle Eastern countries. Paris is reported to be the clearing house for international terrorism.

A specter haunting the governments of all advanced nations is the possibility that terrorists will be able to acquire atomic weapons and then intimidate an entire city or state into submission.

Against this threat and other terrorism, the Dutch, Israelis and West Germans have organized specially-trained elite units of police or military teams.

Not many Americans realize it, but the United States is a member of this select group of prepared nations: two battalions of special Ranger units, the Black Berets, are ready for anti-terrorist action at home or abroad.

This is reassuring at a time when some countries are reported to be considering terrorist tactics as a means of surrogate warfare against another nation.

The terrorists, who have given a cutting edge to international lawlessness during the last 10 years, will grow as a menace to civilized society unless the nations, especially those of the Free World, come together and devise a united front against them.

This would include anti-hijacking methods, prompt justice arrangements and a constant front about not rewarding terrorist demands. Washington would do well to take the initiative in this.

Dr. Hickman's Rezoning Bid Turned Down

For the third time in just over four years, the Seminole County Commission voted to deny a request by Dr. James W. Hickman to rezone land between O'Brien Road and Atlantic Drive west of 25-86.

The proposal was rejected 5-2. Commissioners Bill Kirkland, Robert French and Dick Williams voted in favor of the rezoning.

Hickman told the commission he wanted to rezone the land from A-1 (agricultural use) to M-1 (very light industry). Approximately 40 acre residential lots are to be rezoned to allow for the construction of a new plant for Hickman's "M-1" (very light industry). "I'll tell you what the plant is," commented Mrs. Cheryl Risher, "we don't want fumes and noise."

"I just don't know how O'Brien Road can stand additional traffic," said Mrs. Pomeroy.

Commissioners John Alexander and Harry Stovall voted in favor of the rezoning.

"Would you object to a change to residential zoning?" Alexander asked the residents.

"Residential zoning would give you the same amount of traffic through there," Alexander said.

Kirkland responded that traffic would be more than doubled by the rezoning.

"One of the main problems you would have in this area with truck traffic is trying to get a road to handle the heavy traffic through there," commented Commissioner Bill Kirkland.

Kirkland said he supports the rezoning of residential land north of the road. However, he said he would support the rezoning if it were restricted with access to the south, through a well-landed area.



'Fever' Burns 'Em Up

WYOMING, Mich. (UPI) — The book version of the popular movie "Saturday Night Fever" apparently is a bit too hot for officials at a high school in the Grand Rapids suburb of Wyoming, Mich.

The book was banned from Rogers High School library shelves as "inappropriate reading" for the teenage students because of its four-letter words and explicit sex.

Principal John Pytman even said he thought the book should be burned, although there are no actual plans for such a move. Pytman did say, however, that the school will dispose of its three copies of the book.

"We've got two (copies) in our hands and we're after the third," said Pytman. "It has no place in our school. We've got a lot of good things to put into the library."

The book is bad enough that it ought to be burned," he said. The book, written by H.L. Hunt, is the author's current best-selling novel starring John Travolta. It was one of 800 paperbacks added to the school's library in mid-January under a \$1,500 state grant aimed at encouraging students to read.

A committee composed of parents and students selected the books to be ordered, but, as assistant school Superintendent Eugene Berens put it, "This one apparently slipped through."

It was a group calling itself the Interfaith Committee Against Blasphemy that persuaded high school officials to pull the books off the library shelves.

"I don't understand why they are pulling this unabridged version in the library where it would be available to 16-year-olds," said Rev. Wesley Mamber, pastor of the Church of the Nazarene.

Lease-Buy Agreement For Roumillat Legal

Did Seminole County commissioners act illegally in approving a lease-purchase agreement for the Roumillat building in downtown Sanford?

At least one Seminole County commissioner says they did. But the county's legal adviser says the agreement is perfectly legal.

The county commission voted 5-2 Tuesday to approve a lease-purchase agreement with the owners of the Roumillat Building. The total price for lease and purchase of the structure is \$90,000. The cost of the building is listed at \$80,000 and renovations to the third and fourth floors is listed at \$10,000. Modifications to the first floor and carrying costs bring the total to \$90,000.

Commissioner Harry Kwiatkowski raised the legal questions in opposing the agreement.

"I think there is a stipulation that anytime we are involved in something over \$2,000 we enter into something called bidding. To allow government to take advantage of the competitive situation," commented Kwiatkowski.

"My question is, are we violating the bidding process mandated by law?" Kwiatkowski asked.

Italy Rebels Grab Top Politician

ROME (UPI) — Terrorists today kidnaped former Premier Aldo Moro, Italy's most influential politician, and named down his bodyguards in a daring daylight raid that threw the nation into political turmoil.

Telephone calls to news offices in Rome, Turin and Milan said the abduction was carried out by the Red Brigades, an extreme leftist group that has claimed responsibility for many past killings, kidnappings and bombings.

Police said five or six gunmen opened fire on the 61-year-old Moro's limousine as the nation's largest political party was being driven to Parliament for debate on the installation of Italy's first Communist-led government in 21 years.

Five of Moro's five police bodyguards were killed in the hail of bullets and the fifth was seriously wounded in the lightning attack in Rome's residential Camillo Caccia district.

"The leader of Italy's largest political party, recognized by everyone as the most intelligent, most humane, most authoritative man in our republic is in the hands of criminals bent on destroying our democratic state," former Italian President Giuseppe Saragat said.

"This is no longer a guerrilla warfare but a real act of civil war," Saragat said of the kidnapping of the 61-year-old Moro's limousine as the nation's largest political party was being driven to Parliament for debate on the installation of Italy's first Communist-led government in 21 years.

Five of Moro's five police bodyguards were killed in the hail of bullets and the fifth was seriously wounded in the lightning attack in Rome's residential Camillo Caccia district.

"The leader of Italy's largest political party, recognized by everyone as the most intelligent, most humane, most authoritative man in our republic is in the hands of criminals bent on destroying our democratic state," former Italian President Giuseppe Saragat said.

"This is no longer a guerrilla warfare but a real act of civil war," Saragat said of the kidnapping of the 61-year-old Moro's limousine as the nation's largest political party was being driven to Parliament for debate on the installation of Italy's first Communist-led government in 21 years.
