Ford Hikes New Car Prices 1.6%

DETROIT (AP) — Ford Motor Co. announced Wednesday a 1.6 per cent increase in prices for its new models, which was reported by the General Motors division. The increase is an average of 3.84 per cent over the Chrysler Corp. boost. Chrysler, third largest of the automakers but first to announce its increase in prices for 1969 models, were reported studying Ford and GM pricing lists to determine whether to cut back on their costs. Ford said its list price increases would average 3.47. Earlier this week, GM announced an increase of 1.8 per cent or 240 per cent average, which was approved by President Johnson. The Chrysler increase was 2.3 per cent on an average. Earlier Wednesday Sen. George Nelson, D-Wis., said he had information compiled by auto workers, but labor costs in steel, aluminum, and copper have risen significantly. Commenting on Nelson's report before Ford announced its prices, Emil Mazey, secretary-treasurer of the United Auto Workers, said labor costs in steel, aluminum, and copper have risen significantly. "If you have a \$3,000 car, the labor cost would be roughly 30%," said Mazey. "If you're planning to what be termed 'tremendous profit' made by the auto companies, Mazey said, 'they could reduce the price of a car by \$100 and still make more profit than the average manufacturing concern in the U.S.'"

Seminole County will definitely take its case to build a new courthouse for the county today will be studied and the decision appealed probably to the Florida Supreme Court. Salvi's action, if forthcoming, would end the confusion in this matter. Sheriff Peter D. Rains Drench Miami Area

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — A tropical depression moving in from Cuba dumped torrential rains on southern Florida today while Tropical Storm Frances was born halfway between Cape Kennedy and Bermuda. North Miami Beach was soaked with eight inches of rain. Bayfront Park in downtown Miami had 4.6 inches and Miami Beach 3.9 inches. Other readings included Coral Gables, 2.89 inches, Miami International Airport 2.74, Homestead 2.72, Fort Lauderdale 2.47, West Palm Beach 4.59 and Vero Beach 2.13 for the 24 hours ended at 8 a. m. Key West had only .48 inch as the depression, sloped across the peninsula. Three high school football games were postponed Thursday night and the downpours left car drowning puddles in the Miami area. The bad weather area was along the extreme southern coast 50 miles west southwest of Miami, moving northeast at 10 miles per hour, with equally weak, up to 15 m.p.h., mainly to the east and northeast of the center. Small craft warnings flying from Cape Kennedy to Key West were expected to come down later in the day as the depression moved off the east (central Florida coast.

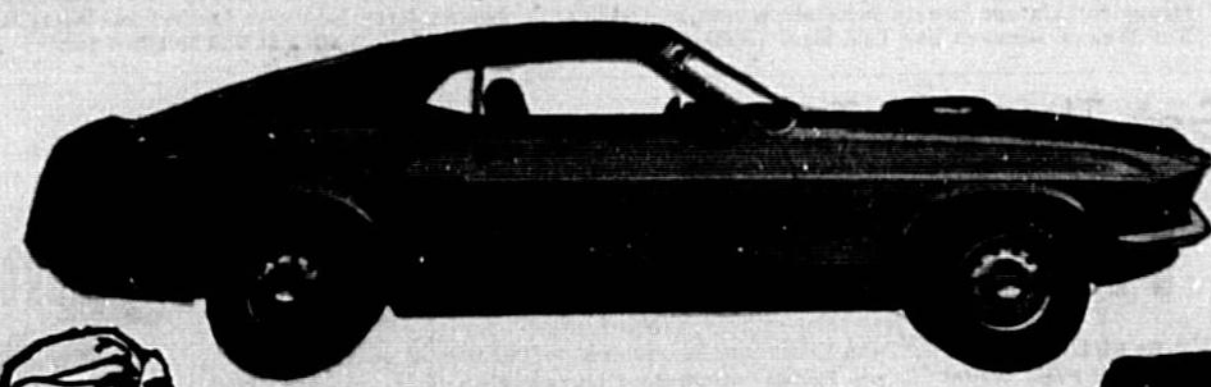

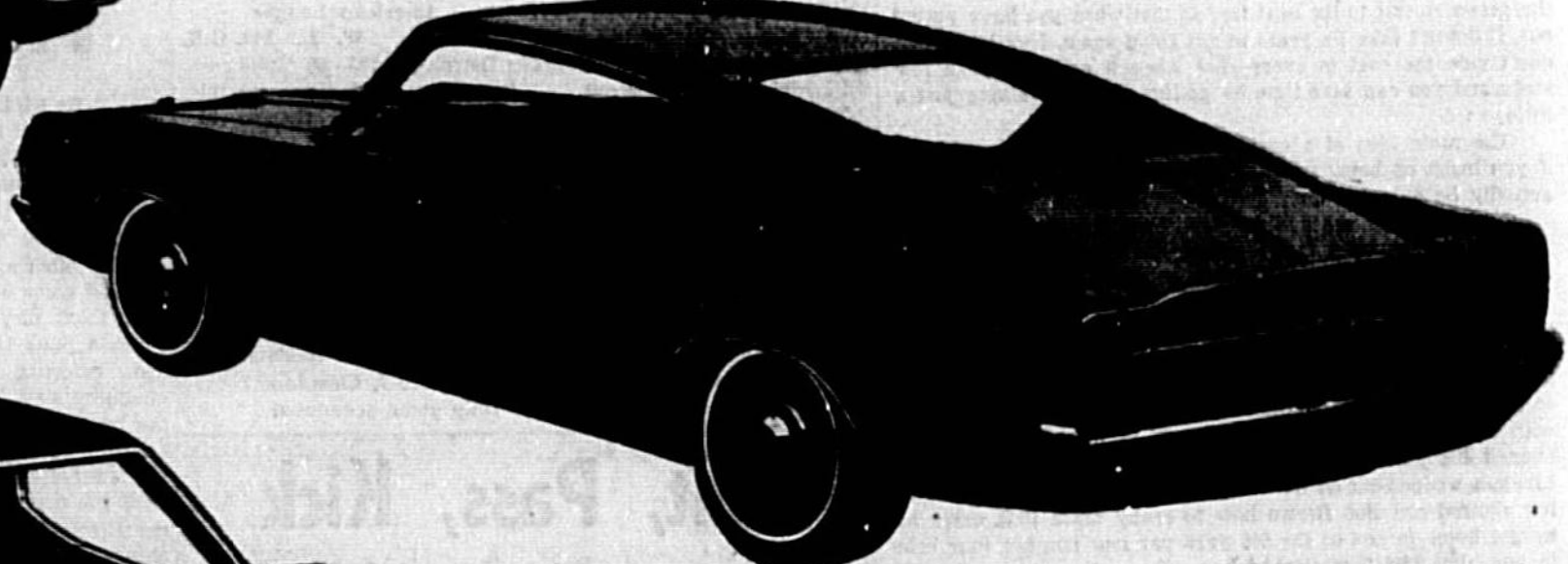

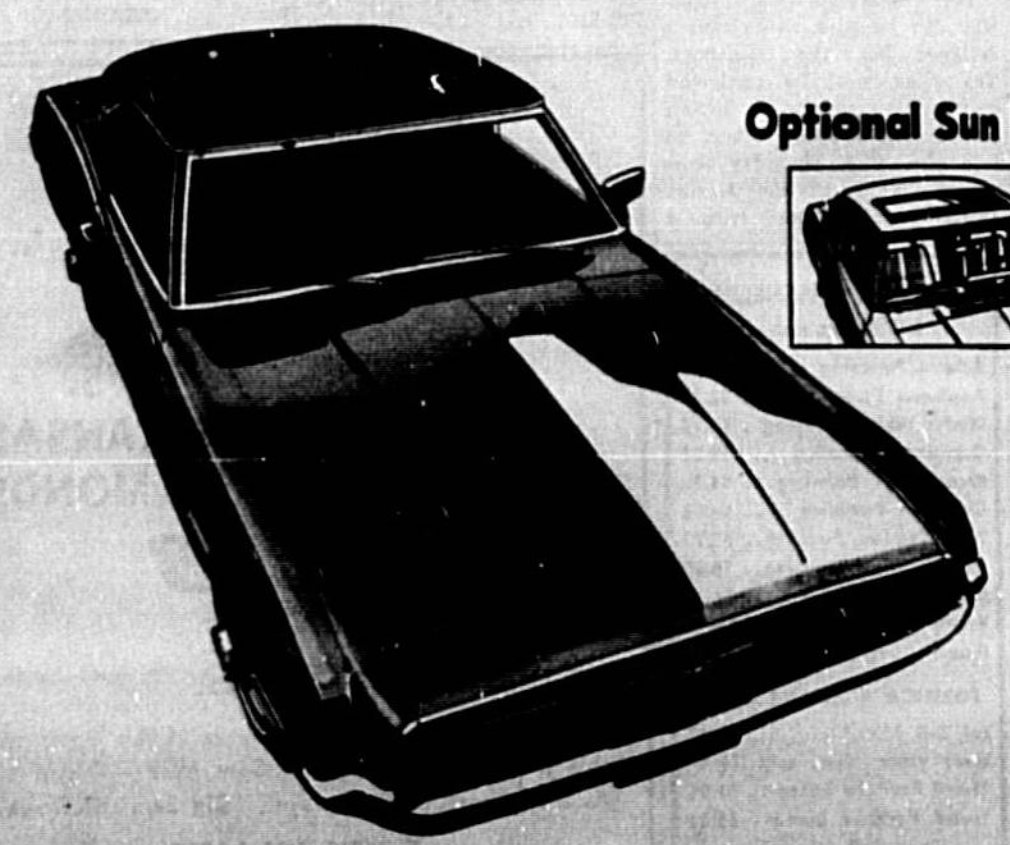

Foe Loses 276 Men In Suicidal Attacks

SAIGON (AP) — Enemy forces swarmed out of flooded ricefields close to the Cambodian border today and lost at least 276 of their men in almost suicidal assaults on two well-defended South Vietnamese frontier camps.

The two attacking forces totaled about 900 men, and in addition to nearly a third of their men, they left large numbers of rifles, machine guns, grenade launchers, radios and other equipment on the fields of battle.

The defenders reported 11 South Vietnamese killed and 100 wounded. Four American Green Beret men in one of the camps were wounded.

Confronting with the fierce ground assaults on the camps at Thien Ngon and Phouc Tan, west of Tay Ninh City, enemy gunners laid a savage barrage of rockets and mortar fire on the Special Forces camp at Katu, north of the provincial capital, which was the target of an attack Wednesday in which 133 of the enemy were killed.

The attacks in Tay Ninh Province and intelligence reports of other enemy forces maneuvering in the area brought massive B52 strikes. Of 10 raids by the big bombers in the past 24 hours, nine went into Tay Ninh Province and some 80 tons of bombs fell on the principal infiltration route toward Saigon, 70 miles to the southeast.

While Tay Ninh Province was the scene of the heaviest action, U. S. headquarters reported more fighting in the northern provinces and three helicopters and a U. S. Marine jet were shot down there. Four of the helicopter crewmen and two Marine fliers were killed, and two helicopter crewmen were wounded.

The loss of the three helicopters brought to 11 the number of choppers shot down in the past week in South Vietnam.

The Marine jet and two of the choppers were downed Thursday in support of U. S. Aerial Division troops who along with fighter-bombers, gunships and artillery killed 388 North Vietnamese regulars in a three-day running battle on the coastal lowlands of Quang Tin province.

Since the end of a two-month lull in the fighting in August, almost all significant combat has been in the northern provinces around Saigon and in the infiltration corridor northwest of the capital.

The frontal assaults on fortified camps along the border may be an enemy attempt to draw South Vietnamese and American forces away from Tay Ninh City and Saigon.

South Vietnamese headquarters estimated that about 600 men hit the Thien Ngon Special Forces camp, which was defended by South Vietnamese irregulars and about 12 American Green Beret advisers, and that another 300 hit the Phouc Tan camp, which was garrisoned by local militiamen and an airborne unit that had recently moved in.

The camp at Phouc Tan withstood similar ground and rocket attacks last Thursday and Friday in which 173 of the enemy and 14 defenders were killed.

Attacking again today in pre-dawn darkness after heavy rocket and mortar attacks, the two enemy forces charged the camps repeatedly.

PRAGUE (AP) — Czechoslovak leaders continued discussions today on their coming trip to Moscow, which is expected to produce agreement on a partial withdrawal of the half million Soviet-led troops that occupy this country.

Top Communist party and government leaders met into the night Thursday and there were suggestions that the Czechoslovaks, who up to now have shown some defiance in the face of the Aug. 20 occupation, were ready to make further concessions to Soviet demands. They hope in this way to salvage as much as possible of party chief Alexander Dubcek's liberalization drive.

"A vote in this part of the country... for Wallace is actually a vote for Humphrey," Nixon said, "because one thing is for sure, Humphrey cannot win these states, I can."

Meanwhile, Wallace headquarters in Alabama said reports of a romance between the former governor and a pretty blonde campaign worker were "false, untrue and calculated to damage" his campaign. Aides said she was dismissed last week because of her "erratic behavior."

The blonde, Miss Ja-Neen Welch, who runs an advertising agency in Indianapolis, Ind., said she had been traveling full time with Wallace on the campaign. She said, "I wouldn't object to being the next Mrs. Wallace."

Miss Welch said the dismissal statement "does not change my feelings toward the governor. I'm still very much in love with him."

Wallace's wife, Lurleen, who was elected as his successor as governor, died earlier this year. Humphrey took his campaign to the West coast, where he promised more prosperity for America.

The Democratic nominee said there were three recessions during the years Nixon was president in the last Republican administration. He said, "When Americans vote on property, I am confident they will give us a clear call for more of it."

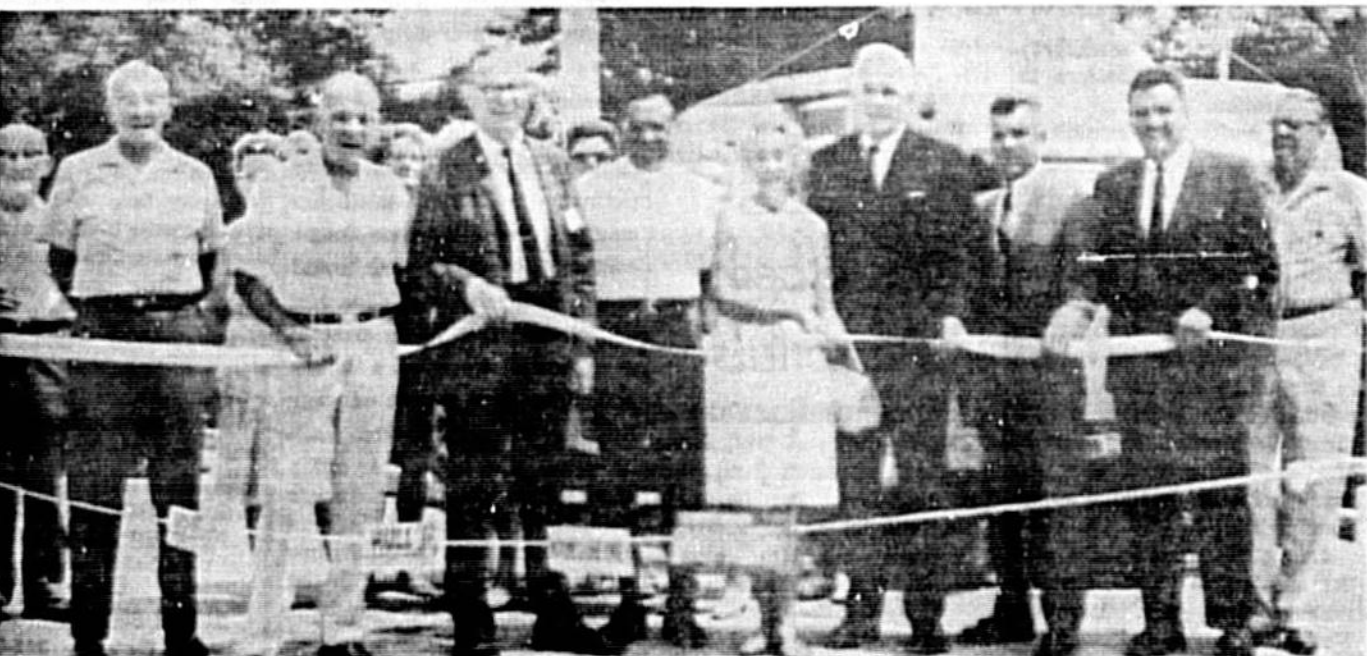

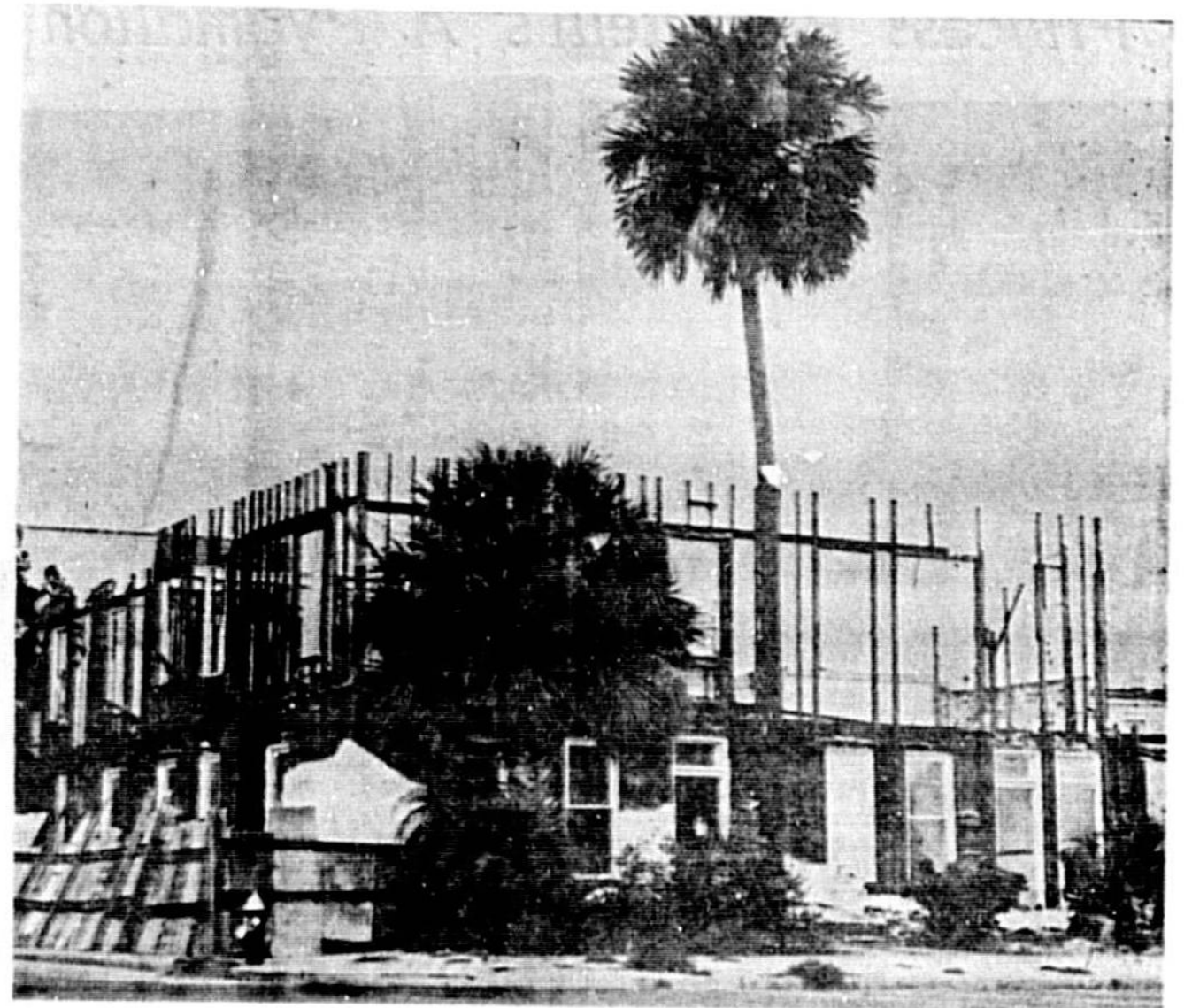

Yardner Corner

Time To Watch The Lawn

Many pests cease to be a problem with the change of seasons, but caterpillars are often troublesome this time of year. Two of these pests that threaten lawns are sod webworms and fall armyworms. Sod webworms differ from armyworms in size and feeding habits. Webworms feed mainly at night and their feeding becomes most noticeable when these caterpillars become full grown. Injured grass blades are notched, chewed into the sides of the blades and the blades are eaten back unevenly. A good way to search for sod webworms is to part the grass and look for the small "worms" curled up near the soil.

Armyworms

Armyworms grow to about 1 1/2 inches in length, or about twice the length of the sod webworm. They feed during the day and do not rest in a cured position. Toxaphene, Sevin, or DDT is excellent for controlling these pests. Other materials such as BHC, diazinon, and dieldrin give good control too.

Residents in Central and south Florida

Residents in Central and south Florida should still be on the lookout for chinch bugs this time of year. These pests are the most important lawn pest in the state, and they continue their destruction to St. Augustine only.

Now through November

Now through November is also the time to think about fertilizing your lawn. In north Florida, September is a good time to fertilize all lawns. 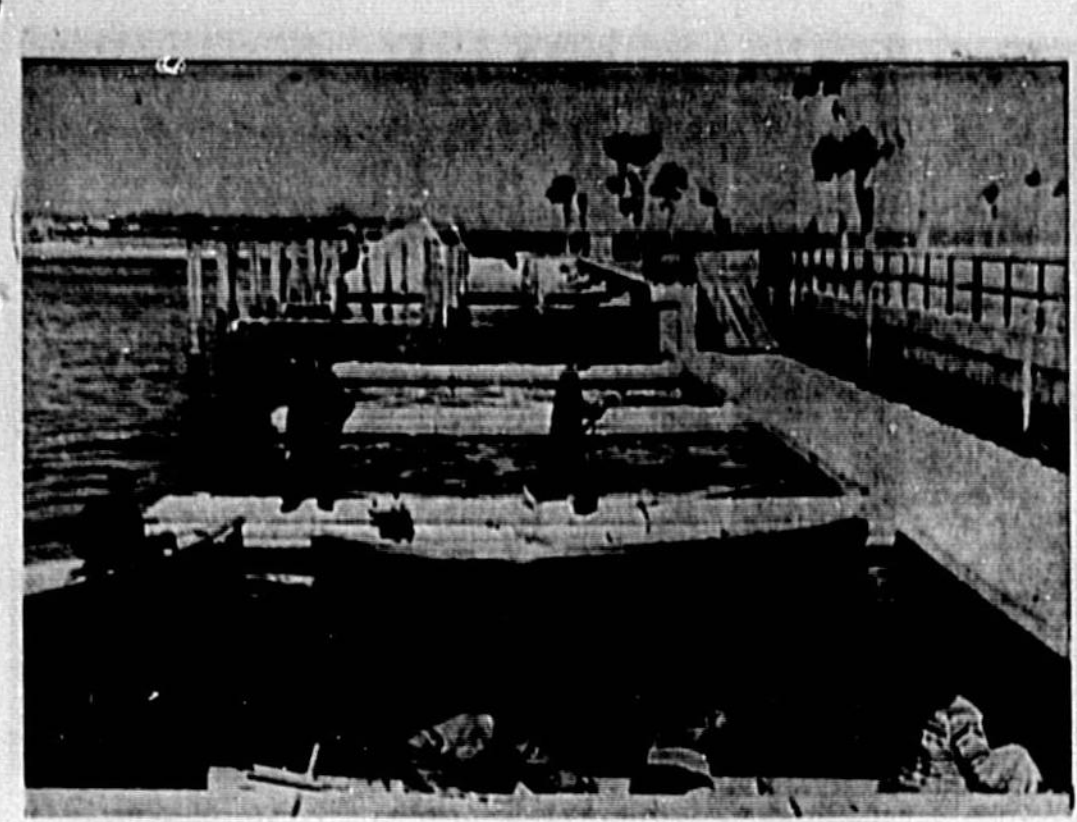

Signs Removed, Action Promised

A Sanford businessman, wife, Dot, were taken from two locations, on 13th Street and adjacent to Highway 17-92.

Meadors said the signs were removed Thursday between 6:30 p.m. and 7 p.m. by persons unknown but were returned Friday, in a battered condition, by city prisoners.

He added the posters were left unanchored and leaning on his property.

An attempt will be made today, Meadors said, to learn who trespassed onto his property and took the signs.

Risner added, "this is in accordance with the city's zoning regulations and only way to change the ordinance is to petition the City Commission."

The Herald checked with Risner's office today and was informed the zoning official was not in; however, an office spokesman said "all city crews had been instructed to remove signs for which no permit had been issued."

The spokesman also said Meadors' sign on 13th Street contained "obscene words."

Housing Team Due

A site review team from U. S. Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Atlanta office will be in Sanford Tuesday to take a first-hand look at the Georgetown area of city for possible application to agency for code-enforcement program, loans and grants to re-habilitate some 800 family units in northeast section of city.

City Building and Zoning Official Lynn Risner said today a three-man team headed by Russ Jacobson will be spending all Tuesday in the area looking at the 952 structures, which have been deemed eligible for the \$14 million housing rebuilding program.

The man from HUD spoke to a Citizen's Advisory Committee meeting Sept. 18, and explained how the federal program could provide three-fourths or 887,500 of the overall cost required to re-habilitate the lower standard homes; 13 of which are too far gone to repair.

ASC Elects Fred Dyson

Farmers have named Fred A. Dyson, former Sanford mayor and Seminole county commissioner, to serve on the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Seminole County Committee for three years.

Serving with him will be Edward H. Parker, Mattland, with two more years, and William G. Kilber, Geneva, with one more year. Alternates are Billy S. Piliot, North Orlando, and Elbert Cammack, Geneva.

The ASC county farmer-committee is in charge of local administration of such national farm programs as the agricultural conservation program and commodity price support loans.

The ASC county office at the County Agricultural Center is headquarters for the county committee, and serves as the farmers' local contact for business connected with participation in the programs administered by the committee. These programs encourage conservation of natural resources and increased farm returns by means of price supports and market supply-management.

Lyman Hi Contract Approved

Seminole Board of Public Instruction has signed a contract with Graham Construction Company of Orlando to proceed with building the new Lyman High School.

Action by School Board came after several change orders were instituted in plans for school, which lowered the mandatory requirements set by state to addition of four skylights and two water closets at an estimated additional cost of \$1,000.

This action also included the addition of a liquidated damage clause, which requires the contractor to finish construction within 120 days.

Sanford Housing Authority has received approval from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) on plans for the construction of 200 low-rental units, 100 of which will be for the elderly.

Based on cost of the present units, the new facilities will run \$2 million or better," Gordon Bradley, local housing authority director, advised.

Construction funds will be advanced by the Federal Government.

Approval of site selections has not yet been received from HUD. Sites closer to downtown Sanford are under survey for the elderly housing center, Bradley reported.
