Germans Prepare To Retreat From Vital Stronghold

Nazis Claim Victory In Donets Basin; City Of Kharkov Is Now In Flames

A Stockholm dispatch reported today that the Russian industrial city of Kharkov is in flames with the Germans preparing to retreat from this vital stronghold. The Germans claimed, however, that the Russians were thrown back in the Donets basin east of Kharkov.

Axis reported increased activity in the Libyan desert today, as Italian disclosed a renewal of aerial patrol activity over the north African front.

The fiercest fighting of all raged in an unidentified sector of the southern front, the Red Army newspaper Red Star said last night.

Trying to relieve several units from a grave predicament, the Germans threw in every weapon of war, but were repulsed and lost another settlement, Red Star related, and added that the Russian advance there was continuing.

The story was similar on the central front, where Red Star reported the Russians encircled a German garrison in an important town after several days of battle in a blinding blizzard.

A dispatch from that front said that the Germans were trying to smash the Soviet units with munitions and food by plane and that captured orders showed the commander of the 101st German rifle division had already reduced his men's rations.

In the Siberia Russia sector of the front, the German newspaper reported that the German army, 50,000 strong is perishing.

Reserve gathered with difficulty for his so-called spring offensive, but sent instead to aid this army find themselves encircled with those they are sent to relieve, it was said.

For example, it said, the 25th German infantry division, which arrived from France about the end of January, has now lost 45 percent of its men, and the fifth Jaeger division, brought from France in February, has lost more than 50 percent.

Chinese Troops Stand In Way Of Burma Invaders

Stilwell, In Charge Of Chinese Forces, Promises Offense

The Associated Press Chinese troops under United States leadership continued to menace the Japanese advance in Burma today, the east branch of the Burma road, according to British military advice.

China's Chief of Staff, General Joseph Stilwell, announced he has been placed in command of U. S. forces in China, India and Burma, and promised an offensive.

He said, "We won't be satisfied until we see American and Chinese troops in Tokyo together."

A communique issued at Chungking yesterday revealed that the United American Volunteer Group pilots, whose fighter planes knocked down more than 200 Japanese bombers near Rangoon and over the Burma Road, were now using bombers and that they have "blinded" Japanese troops and mechanized forces and shot down a Japanese plane.

Accompanied by British bombers, the AVG pilots blasted and strafed Japanese airfields and landing fields Wednesday, including a big field at Moulmein, and these raids are believed to have been necessary for 25 Jap planes, a communique issued at General Sir Archibald Wavell's headquarters in New Delhi reported.

Chinese troops, however, may not be the only force to look up the conquered Burma delta and dig upon the native population for armed recruits, battleships, British imperial, look up new defensive positions well south of Rangoon.

A London spokesman said this involved the abandonment of the Burma road, above Hanoi on the Burma road.

The authority also announced that it will require comparative oldsters to sign for war production work.

MacArthur Ordered To Leave Batuan, Organize Offense By U. S. President

WASHINGTON, Mar. 20 (AP)—President Franklin D. Roosevelt today ordered General Douglas MacArthur to leave Batuan and organize an offensive against the Japanese in the Philippines.

The president said that MacArthur should be in Manila by April 1, and that he should be in a position to lead an offensive against the Japanese in the Philippines.

Nelson Opposes New Legislation On Labor

WASHINGTON, Mar. 20 (AP)—Donald M. Nelson, War Production Chief, and Robert P. Patterson, Undersecretary of War, opposed new war legislation Thursday, while the Administration endeavored to obtain labor consent to a sweeping double-pay law for Sunday and night work.

Meanwhile, Representative Smith (D Va.), for years a critic of the closed shop and the wage-hour law, took a view directly contrary to that of Nelson and Patterson.

He told the House Naval Committee that the country is running the war effort, or labor.

Hill Will Head Naval Relief Campaign Here

James R. Stockton of Jacksonville, State chairman of the Florida Citizens Committee for the drive to raise funds for the Navy Relief Society, announced today that Mayor W. C. Hill had accepted the chairmanship for the Navy Relief campaign in Sanford.

"I want to highly commend the patriotism of Mayor Hill for his generous offer to help with this great cause," said Mr. Stockton. "There is no better way to show the men of the Navy now fighting on the far-flung battle fronts of the world that we are behind them."

Mr. Stockton stated that the Navy Relief Society has always pleaded that no widow, orphan, child or family of Navy, Marine or Coast Guard personnel would suffer hardship without receiving assistance.

"To the men who are fighting and dying today, this pleader means much—we must make it come true," said Mr. Stockton.

He went on to state that this is the first time that the Navy has needed outside help to perpetuate the functions of the society. Always in the past the Navy has cared for its own, but with the tremendous increase in personnel today, it is impossible for them to do it all. The Navy itself is conducting its own drive and will raise much of the fund, but we must give it a helping hand.

"President Roosevelt has urged the people of the country to assist their utmost to make this drive a success. I am sure the people of Sanford under Mayor Hill's leadership will respond to help the Navy to help in our victory drive," declared Mr. Stockton.

BUFFALO, N. Y., Mar. 20 (AP)—Rumous sections in Northern Erie County were inundated Thursday night as flood waters from Tonawanda Creek retreated westward after spreading destruction in the Batavia area.

State highways and county roads, some under 18 inches of water, were closed to traffic, acres of farmland were flooded, and cellars were filled with water. Warnings were issued, however, and considerable perishable property was moved to higher ground.

TALLAHASSEE, Mar. 20 (AP)—The campaign lines for Florida's primary elections drew tight today as the deadline for qualification of candidates is at midnight tonight.

Effectively, men and women had entered the lists as candidates for the six seats in Congress.

They are running for Congress at large, a new post this year, five in the second district, four in the fourth district, and two in the fifth district.

Only Congressman Jackson Lakeland and Mike Cason are unopposed.

Besides the candidates for Congress, aspirants for two State Railroad Commission posts, 20 State Senate seats, all 60 seats in the State House of Representatives, county commissions and county school boards must qualify either with the secretary of state or their circuit court clerk by midnight tomorrow.

Yesterday's qualifiers were: H. P. West Palm Beach for Congress from the fourth district and W. H. Brewster, Dade City for the State Senate from the 29th district, which includes Tava and Sumner counties.

Propaganda Stories

Indicative of the type of Axis propaganda which is being circulated in this country for the express purpose of creating opposition to the war effort is the story which comes from Nashville, Tenn., to the effect that a woman there received a letter from her son in a Japanese prison camp.

The letter stated that though he had been captured by the Japs, he was all right and was being well treated. He concluded with the request that she save the stamp on the envelope for his stamp collection. Knowing that he had no stamp collection, the mother removed the stamp and found under it a message that the boy's tongue had been cut out by the Japanese.

Now this is the story that circulated throughout Nashville and was reported in Detroit and Washington as well. It may have been repeated in a dozen other cities. But efforts to trace it to its source have proved unavailing and attempts to locate the mother or identify the son have only met with failure. The Nashville newspaper has offered a thousand dollar reward for proof of the story.

It stands to reason that the whole thing is a fake because the federal censor in Washington says that no mail whatever has been received in this country from American prisoners held by Japan. Furthermore it is hardly likely that writing such a message underneath a stamp would conceal it from the Japanese censor, or that any American boy would under the circumstances take such means of communicating such news to his mother.

Undoubtedly the story is a Japanese propaganda trick and the purpose is fairly obvious. Atrocious tales tend to depress American morale and might arouse the mothers of some soldiers to protest against sending men to Australia or anywhere else to fight against the Japanese. The Japs would like to have us keep our armies at home until the Far East has been thoroughly conquered and the Japs are ready for a full scale invasion of the United States itself.

The American people should not be misled by enemy propaganda and they should not assist the propagandists by repeating such stories, the truth of which they cannot prove.

Accidents Increase

Despite the effort urged upon the public for added care in driving and decrease in speed to conserve tires and gasoline, automobile accidents show a slight increase for the first two months of the year, as compared with January and February of 1941, according to the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company.

Nevertheless the public health for these two months, as judged by the death rate, is continuing the remarkably low record set during the latter part of 1941, the company says. This rate of 8.0 deaths per 1,000 of population is 5 percent below the previous minimum recorded in 1940. This report says that the mortality from colds and respiratory diseases, which are usually prevalent early in the year and responsible for raising the seasonal death rate above the yearly average, have reached record low figures. In the case of pneumonia this may be attributed to the spreading successful treatment of this disease with sulfa drugs.

An increase in accidents generally is recorded, which may be set down to the added industrial activity. Some of these accidents are directly traceable to the war effort.

It is almost a misdemeanor to own an automobile today. In the beginning we were taxed when we bought one, probably because we could afford to buy it.

Then they told us that if we wanted good roads to run on we would have to pay a tax to drive the things so they could use it to build said good roads.

They built some, but the money piled up so fast that practically every state department started dipping into it for other purposes.

Then the personal property tax assessor began to take a look and he reached for his bit. The cities noticed these carryings-on and decided upon a me-too policy and took a piece of whatever money was left in our pocket.

Then somebody else discovered that the things won't run without gasoline and oil, so the federal government carved a piece out of these two ingredients and the state hopped on.

About that time it was found that an automobile wouldn't run without a person driving it, so it was decided that before we could drive it we had to pay for a license to do it.

Then came the Ickes hobgoblin warning to slow down or else.

Now it's tires—and 10 years in jail if they are bought the wrong way.

There are, at the last count, 106 direct and indirect taxes and penalties which we must pay before we drive an automobile around the block.

It got so that we couldn't leave an automobile on the street or hardly anywhere else, and about the only thing we could do when we stopped running it for a few minutes was to hold it in our laps.

By a process of evolution, however, the thing is being resolved and all petty troubles are practically over.

They are making it practically impossible to buy one.—Kansas City Journal.
