

Graham Tells Of Labor's Origins

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Evangelist Billy Graham Monday night drew a parallel between America of two centuries ago and today with its lawlessness, crime, divorce, immorality and debauchery.

He also reminded the audience of \$2,441 in his 16th meeting at Coliseum that the labor movement "owes a great deal to Jesus Christ."

The worldwide trade union movement started "as a result of a great spiritual revival," Graham said. He said the heritage of labor unions comes "from the church and from the great Wesleyan revivals of the 18th century."

The world-crisscrossing evangelist described conditions in the 18th century as "a parallel in American society today. The lawlessness, the crime, the divorce, the immorality, the debauchery of that day are similar to the conditions of our own day."

When laboring conditions were at their worst in Great Britain, Graham said, "God raised up John Wesley, who preached a gospel which started social forms in Britain."

Contradiction Of Red China Hit

MOSCOW (UPI) — The Soviet Union, seizing on an apparent ideological contradiction, has charged Communist China with maintaining a foreign policy that dooms many overseas Chinese to suffering under "imperialism."

The official government newspaper Izvestia said Monday night the Peking regime was quick to advocate violence to unseat imperialism but showed "startling indifference" toward its own nationals in Hong Kong, Macao, and the Nationalist Chinese strongholds of Matsu and Formosa.

Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's doctrine of peaceful coexistence between differing social systems is one of the key points of dispute in the ideological quarrel between the two communist giants.

Peking maintains that no compromise should be made in the "bitter life and death struggle" with imperialism and that any nuclear war inevitably would end with a victory for communism.

Schools In Five Counties Mix

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Public schools in five Florida counties were scheduled today to open their doors to white and Negro students for the first time.

Indications were there would be no incidents when the school bell rang at Leon, Okaloosa, Volusia, St. Johns and Duval counties. Eleven other Florida counties already have begun desegregation.

Only a handful of Negro pupils was expected to enter white schools in each of the counties, and officials anticipated no trouble. Most of the students were registered quietly last week.

Pay Raises Go To 2.6 Million

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The federal minimum wage went from \$1.15 to \$1.25 an hour today, providing an estimated 2.6 million workers with pay increases ranging up to 10 cents an hour.

The Labor Department said that, in addition, a 44-hour standard week also went into effect today for employees in big retail and service establishments brought under the law in 1961.

The department estimated the raises would add \$365 million to employers' payrolls in the coming year.

Collections Up

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) — Collections of customs in the Port of Jacksonville amounted to \$623,291 during August, an increase of almost \$100,000 over the same month last year.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (UPI)—City police today surrounded three desegregated public schools, closed at the request of Gov. George Wallace following rioting that claimed one life, to prevent students from entering the buildings.

Bryant Praises Procedure In Florida Schools

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Gov. Farris Bryant said today the quiet desegregation of public schools in six Florida counties this week was due largely to the state's pupil placement law administered by local school boards.

Bryant said the state government was giving the local governmental agencies all the help they wanted. He said the state had not tried to "drive" the counties to any action, but when the counties had made up their mind on a course of action, the state had offered all the help possible.

On another subject, Bryant said he thought candidates for state office should abide by the letter of the Florida election law that requires them to start submitting to the secretary of state financial reports as soon as they have announced they were candidates.

Military Anger Flares In Open

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A scathing attack by retired Adm. George W. Anderson brought into the open today the resentment of many of the nation's professional military men over Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara's "new era" at the Pentagon.

Anderson told the National Press Club Wednesday he saw "alarming perils" in attempts to obscure the role of the military under the defense secretary's civilian leadership.

Both the White House and the Defense Department maintained silence on the speech by Anderson, who was dropped as chief of naval operations on McNamara's recommendation after only one two-year term.

Milk Hearing Called Friday At Tallahassee

Further efforts to solve the milk price dispute between state public schools and the dairy industry will be made Friday in a meeting at Tallahassee, it was reported this morning by Supt. R. T. Milwee, chairman of the State Superintendents school lunchroom committee.

Milwee will preside at a meeting of school superintendents, state officials and representatives of the dairy industry.

The State Milk Commission, under a statute approved by the last Legislature, fixed milk prices at the producers level which set the price at 7.2 cents per half pint to the schools.

The schools have refused to pay this amount. Milwee said it is hoped a compromise will be reached Friday.

Seminole County schools are serving milk with school lunches under an agreement with a local dairy, which will accept the price finally agreed on for milk already served. However, the dairy reserved the right to reject future sales if the set price is not agreeable to it.

Union, Phone Leaders Called

TAMPA (UPI)—Top union and company officials were called into joint session today with a blue-ribbon mediation team to try to work out a back-to-work agreement and to end the General Telephone Company strike.

The special team of mediators, led by State Public Utilities Commission Chairman Edwin Mason and Federal Mediator John Kenney, met in the office of Mayor Julian Lane this morning to discuss the stalemate in the strike which entered its ninth week today.

The team then called the negotiators into a session which began a few moments after 11 a. m.

The only acts of sabotage reported by the company this morning involved the cutting of cords in two day telephone stations.

Phone Service At Forest City Out

Winter Park Telephone Company reported early this afternoon that a 1,200-pair telephone cable has been extensively damaged by construction crews working on Interstate 4 at State Road 436 west of Altamonte Springs.

Approximately 1,000 subscribers at Forest City and vicinity have lost telephone service temporarily.

Telephone construction crews now are working on repairs to the cable. However, the company said due to the extensive damage the repairs may require 12 to 24 hours before service will be resumed.

Adams Also Eyes Governor's Seat

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Secretary of State Tom Adams officially announced his candidacy for re-election Wednesday, but left the door wide open for a crack at the governor's chair.

The action put Adams on the books as an official candidate for re-election in 1964, but it did not dampen reports that he is eyeing the governorship.

\$200,000 Road Construction Plan Set Up

A two per cent pay increase for all city employees was approved and a three-year \$200,000 road construction program was tentatively adopted by City Commission in special session Wednesday evening.

City laborers will receive slightly more than two per cent in the 1963-64 budget, City Manager W. E. Knowles informed Commission members.

He added that the new budget will include a reclassification of all police officers under the grade of chief to reflect a more comparable police salary. This provides for major increases in the lower police grades and gradually decreases in the upper grades.

Commissioners also are discussing a full "Kelly day" for city firemen. Presently, they are given a half "Kelly day." (Firemen work a 24-hour shift and are off duty for 24 hours. A "Kelly day" would allow them a full free day every 20 days.)

Knowles also informed the Commission that the new budget, if approved, would include added benefits to all under the city group health insurance.

The proposed budget includes \$105,000 for a street resurfacing program and \$95,000 for a new street construction program.

Commissioners postponed a second scheduled special budget session for tonight until after the regular business session Monday evening. The budget must be approved by ordinance by Sept. 23.

As reported previously in The Herald, the tentative budget is for approximately \$125 million with the same millage, 18, as in past recent years. Twelve mills are for operating expenses and six mills for debt service.

Knowles pointed out that while the city revenue will be up about \$175,000 over this present fiscal year, the millage remains the same because of an anticipated added \$80,000 in cigarette tax receipts and \$9,000 in ad valorem utility tax receipts.

"Naturally," the AAA said, "the more stacking or leg exposure the easier it is for motorists to spot and thus prevent an accident."

Stoddard Urges Charter Okay

Former Casselberry Mayor Carl Stoddard today came out strongly in favor of the proposed new charter and urged those citizens of Casselberry who have not already voted in today's referendum to make every effort to get down to the polls before 7 p. m.

Regarding the charter vote, Stoddard warned that "we are all holding a loose piece of string in our fingers and after it slips through, it will be too late to tie the knot."

New Licenses Now On Sale, Galloway Says

State and county beverage and occupational licenses for the year 1963-64 are on sale at his office in the court house, according to John L. Galloway, county tax collector.

"Notices have been mailed to all those who had licenses for the year 1962-63," Galloway said. He expects to sell approximately 2,000 occupational licenses and 200 beverage licenses.

Galloway pointed out that under present law holders of beverage licenses must present the license for the current year to obtain a new one for 1963-64. Also, if they operate within city limits they must obtain their city license and present same to the county tax collector's office before the state and county license can be issued. New licenses must be obtained by Oct. 1. If for any reason a beverage license is not renewed by that date, a new application has to be made to the Beverage Department and in addition a penalty is assessed.

Occupational licenses are due Oct. 1 and are required by all who practice a profession such as lawyers, doctors, certified public accountants, real estate brokers, architects, surveyors, engineers and any other profession. Also occupational licenses are required of all operators of businesses such as garages, beauty shops, repair shops, barber shops, shoe shine stands, brokers, loan companies, wholesale dealers, hotels, motor courts, trailer parks, manufacturing, processing, printing, packing houses, restaurants and cafes, contracting in any of its branches, etc. In addition a license is required for each and every coin operated machine of any description.

Galloway further pointed out that any one operating a place of business for a profit and permits dancing must obtain a license regardless of whether any charge is made for dancing.

It is a violation of the law to practice a profession of any kind or to operate any business or coin operated machine without proper license, Galloway stated.

Robert Schuman, 'Plan' Chief Dies

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Robert Schuman, one of the pioneers of European unification, died Wednesday at the age of 77.

A spokesman for the family said Schuman died Wednesday at his home in Sey-Chelles near his eastern French city.

He had been ill since he suffered a stroke in 1961. He almost died four weeks ago on suffering a second stroke.

Schuman devoted most of his working life to the ideal of European unity.

It was the "Schuman Plan" which resulted in France and Germany pooling their heavy industry and which led to the Coal and Steel Community uniting France, Germany, Italy, Belgium, The Netherlands and Luxembourg. Eventually it led to the creation of the Common Market.

Boating School For Lawmen Set

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Florida's new boat registration and safety laws will provide the backbone of a course for law officers to be started as soon as possible by the Florida Boating Council.

The council has decided to start the course itself instead of suggesting a course of study for the Sheriff's Academy here. The academy, now under construction, will take over the course when the council feels it has been perfected.

Councilman chairman Randolph Hodges said it is important to get the course started quickly since the new laws are now in effect.

Attending will be conservation and Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission officers as well as sheriff's department officers.

The preliminary course outline calls for 40 hours of instruction over a week's time. The council discussed condensing the course to three days.

In addition to new boating laws, the students will be taught water safety, boat handling, navigation, their responsibility to citizens in water safety and the relationship between state and federal laws.

Along with classroom instruction there will also be several hours of field demonstration at nearby Lake Bradford. The classes will be limited to 40 men.

Harold Parr, administrative assistant to Hodges in the conservation department, was given the job of preparing the course in detail. He said he felt it could be started in two weeks.

Students will be paid their expenses while in Tallahassee for the course.

Parr gave the council members copies of the new booklets on boating prepared by the Board of Conservation. He said 100,000 of each were printed.

Vitamins To Books

It seems that, just like people, books need their vitamins to be healthy, especially if they're old. So reports the Library Journal, telling of the work of Dom Mario Pisanti of the Vatican's Institute for the Scientific Restoration of Books. He has found that B vitamins re-

He claims it would be more durable, counterfeit-proof and is just what the vending machine needs to

make practically all of our purchasing automatic. So you must now select one of the following as your attitude: 1. Why can't they quit tinkering with everything? The old money was good enough — just not enough. 2. Why stand in the way of progress? Everybody knows we should expand the convenience of buying from machines. Let's issue money in the shape of graham crackers, pizzas or even liverwurst — just so we get crackin'. 3. Undecided.

Red, White, Blue

Americans these days are — or certainly ought to be — safety conscious when it comes to their favorite pastime, driving. Here's news that proves it's literally patriotic to drive safely. A survey conducted by the post office showed that accidents involving the department's trucks declined sharply simply as a result of switching from the age-old olive-drab coloration to the bright red, white, and blue colors so familiar today on our streets. In a three-year survey involving 7,000 vehicles, half painted olive drab and half red, white and blue, the red, white and blue trucks had 849 accidents; the olive drab trucks had 652.

Fifty o.d. trucks were struck from the rear; only 24 red, white and blue ones had that misfortune. The post office concludes that the patriotic colors are more easily visible, thus contributing to highway traffic safety in every American community. To what extent the olive drab may have reminded veterans of their army days, thus provoking vehicular attack, and how much the red, white and blue may have suggested the flag, thus commanding respect, was not investigated. Perhaps it's just as well. It's enough to know that safety is patriotic, as well as pleasing to the eye.

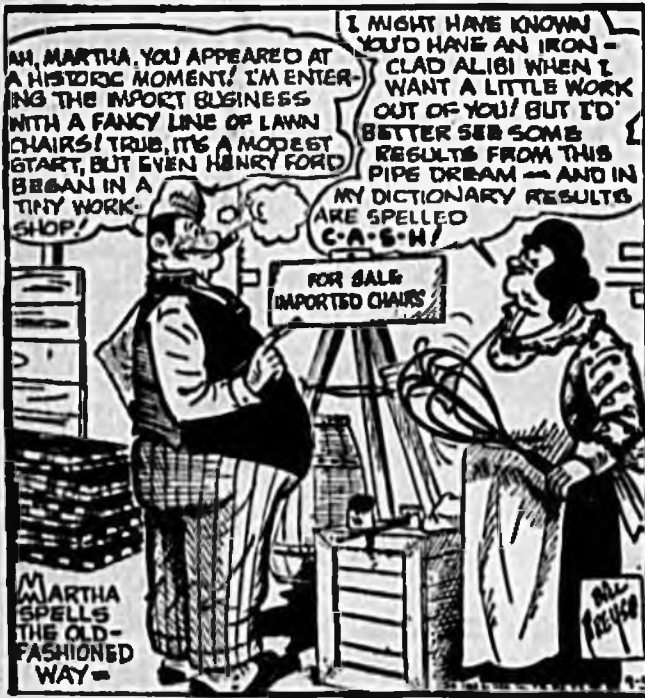
Phil Newsom Says . . .

Goulart In The Middle

Brazil's President Joso Goulart observes an important anniversary on Sept. 7. It was on that date two years ago that he took office after the sudden resignation of Janio Quadros and left Brazil leaderless and on the verge of civil war. Goulart has regained for office the powers stripped from it two years ago by a combination of conservative politicians and military leaders. But it has been a rough two years and Brazil, torn by extremists of both left and right, continues to march toward an uncertain future. The incumbent foreign

policy first proclaimed by Quadros has been maintained, and Goulart and a succession of foreign ministers have continued to cultivate friendly relations with the Communist world. Pressing Brazil to the right has been the United States, with occasional hints of a cut off of badly needed financial aid. Pushing to the left are the well-staffed embassies of Communist nations. Goulart himself has attempted a moderately leftist stand which has brought him under fire from both right and left.

By "empathy" the child thus relishes having an elf turn the tables on us adult giants!

Employers Liable For Domestic's Social Security

During the past year, almost 21,000 delinquent household employers were required to make back reports of wages they had paid to cleaning women, maids and other household help after their employees or ex-employees applied for social security benefits.

Based on the average of \$1,000 in wages covered by these delinquent reports, the Internal Revenue Service will be collecting about \$1.2 million in back social security taxes from these 21,000 employers, plus interest and penalty, said Col. Byron R. Patton, social security district manager.

Since the law holds the employer responsible for making the reports and paying the social security taxes due, the delinquent employer is liable for paying both the employer's and the employee's share of the back taxes. There is no time limit if no report was filed, Colonel Patton pointed out.

About 18 1/2 million men, women, and children are now receiving social security benefits each month, Colonel Patton said, and about three million persons apply for old-age, survivors, or disability benefits each year. The average household worker there-

fore probably knows someone who is getting social security payments and is thus likely to file a claim when she reaches retirement age or has to stop working because of disability.

If wages she has earned in household work covered by the social security law have not been reported to her social security account, the employer will be required, first, to make the report of wages, and second, to pay the delinquent taxes to the Internal Revenue Service.

A delinquent employer may also be discovered if the employee at any time asks the Social Security Administration for a statement of the earnings credited to her social security account and finds upon receiving it that some wages are missing from her record.

The address of the social security office in this area is 2420 North Orange Avenue, Orlando.

Dick Riemann, 27, of Yonkers, N. Y., en route to a San Francisco Bay area teaching job, said the Russians traveled in groups and did not mingle with Cubans.

He said they lived in a "walled city" of their own in Regla, a fishing village across the bay from Havana, and had their own "house of pleasure." The fortified area in which they live is off-limits to all but a handful of Cubans with special passes, he reported.

Riemann was one of 59 American students who spent seven weeks in Cuba as Castro regime guests. He said he "volunteered" for the trip "because I knew the type of group that was going and wanted to lend some balance to it."

Area Firemen Meet In DeBary

Accident Cost To State High

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—The National Safety Council says 1962 traffic accidents cost Florida \$242.46 million.

The council estimates the cost of traffic accidents by figuring wage losses, damages, hospital costs and insurance.

The council said Florida averaged 5.7 deaths per 100 million miles of travel, compared to the national average of 5.3.

Mexicans Hit Gun Smuggling

REYNOLSA, Mexico (UPI)—Mexican officials speculated that seven gun-running expeditions stopped near the U.S.-Mexican border in the past month may have been aimed at arming anti-Castro Cubans in Central America.

The latest attempt was halted when Mexican customs agents seized a truck carrying \$20,000 worth of ammunition in Ranchito, a small village near the border town of Reynolosa.

There was also a report some of the arms were destined for the Mexican state of Michoacan, the center of ex-President Lazaro Cardena's political movement to unseat the present Mexican government.

Mexican authorities said the truck seized was Mexican-owned, but carried a Texas license plate. They said the arms were smuggled from Texas.

The seizure was the sixth case of smuggling reported by Mexican and American customs authorities in the last three weeks, and the fourth in the last two days.

Earlier, authorities in Mexico City reported seizing 250,000 rounds of ammunition hidden in a station wagon.

Tampa Official Held For Bribery

Vada Pinson Charged In Assault

CINCINNATI (UPI) — Cincinnati Reds outfielder Vada Pinson was charged with assault and battery Wednesday night following his second skirmish in 1966 with a woman.

The writer — Earl Lawson of the Cincinnati Post and Times-Star — filed the warrant. He said Pinson "grabbed my neck and shoved me against a wall" of the Cincinnati clubhouse after a night game in which Philadelphia defeated the Reds, 3-2.

Pinson posted \$300 bond and was freed. He was scheduled to appear for a hearing in police court today.

The incident was touched off by a story Lawson wrote for Tuesday editions of the paper in which he said Pinson could win the National League batting championship if he would bunt occasionally.

At the time of the writing, Pinson was third in the league with a .322 average.

Pinson accosted Lawson on his way out of the clubhouse

after interviewing players for a story.

"He blocked my path and started waving the story I had written in front of me with profanity flowing," Lawson said. "I started to walk away and he grabbed my shirt around the collar. He pulled me toward him, ripping the shirt. I tried to walk away again and he pushed me up against the wall. I made no retaliation and said nothing. Then I called the police."

Pinson was visibly upset when police entered the clubhouse and advised him to go with them to the station to post bond so they wouldn't be required to get a warrant and take him forcibly.

Lawson signed the warrant at the police station and Pinson posted bond immediately and was released.

Pinson did not deny Lawson's accusation. He complained that the writer "always criticizes us when we're on the road, hoping we won't get to read it."

"My job isn't to bunt," Pinson said. "If the man (Cincinnati manager Fred Hutchinson) told me to bunt, I would. But he hasn't said anything to me about bunting. You don't drive home 86 runs bunting."

It is ironic that the advent of pay television could provide an odd twist to the baseball attendance question, for the very medium which did so much to create the predicament may bail out the suffering major league clubs.

Charging fans for seeing their heroes on screens at home is more than likely to drive them back to the parks.

Reports have the new pay television organization charging from \$1 to \$1.50 for individual programs. This in addition to a \$10 installation charge and a monthly fee of about \$4.

Why pay \$1.50 and be annoyed by uniformed and humorless announcers when you can see the game live from a bleacher seat for 75 cents and in the grandstand for \$1.00?

At least two eminent economists with a knowledge of what was called the national pastime have predicted that in 15 years there would be no more major league baseball. Few addicts will go along with that, but there are problems.

These are not confined to attendance, for big league games televised into their territory all but wrecked the minor leagues. This quite naturally severely curtailed the source of talent supply. This result is that in the last six years the major leagues paid \$45 million in bonuses to playing prospects and spent another \$10 million keeping the minor leagues in business.

The Milwaukee Braves again are suffering from the shorts. Houston isn't doing well. Cincinnati and Pittsburgh are off. Cleveland and Detroit are having bad years. Los Angeles is 200,000 paid admissions below a year ago and Washington is hardly setting turnstile records.

Clubs put up brave fronts announcing slight attendance increases from year to year, but the fact remains that only the two California National League clubs are ahead of their peak figures, unless you count the new Mets in New York.

With the pennant race settled early, even the proud New York Yankees will fall considerably below their 1,493,000 of last year.

Owners can't expect to give their productions to the public free, gratis and for nothing on the air and fill their parks too.

Making them pay will put a lot of customers back in the parks.

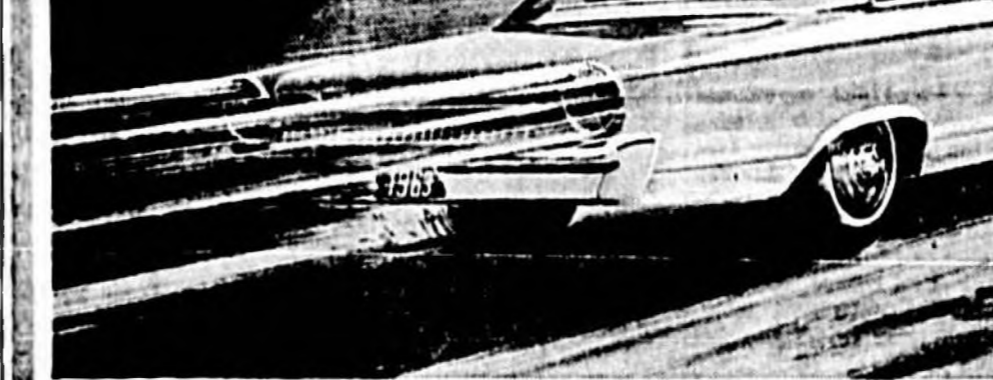

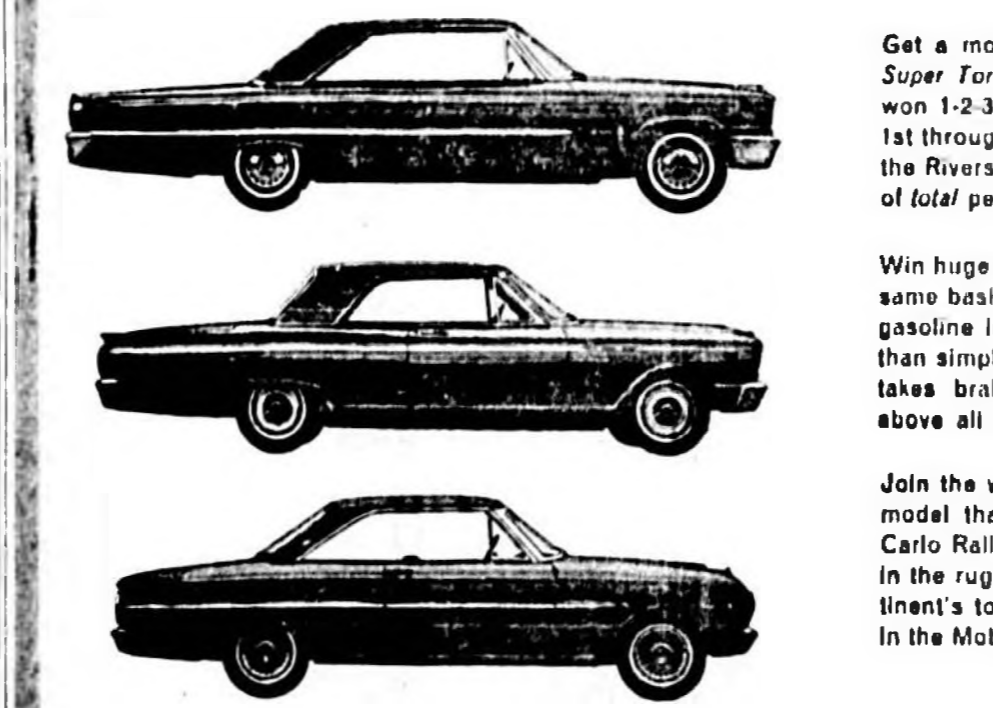

Here are several recipes using instant coffee. They sound good — try them soon.
COCONUT COQUETTES
Combine and let stand 15 minutes:
1/2 cup flaked coconut
2 tbsps. water
1 tsp. instant coffee
Blend 1/2 cup light brown sugar, firmly packed, and 1/4 cup butter. Add 3 tbsps. finely chopped nuts and the instant coffee mixture.
Spread on 4 English muffins, halved and toasted — broil until bubbly.
CRUMB TOP PUDDING
Prepare according to label directions:
1 pkt. vanilla or butterscotch pudding mix
Stir in 1 tsp. instant coffee and pour into 4 shotet glasses.
TOPPING
Combine and saute over low heat till browned and crisp:
1/2 cup fresh bread crumbs
1 tbsps. sugar
1 tsp. butter
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
Sprinkle over pudding and chill.
QUICK PIE GLAZE
(For Apple Pie or Gingerbread)
Combine and stir till smooth:
1/2 cup sifted confectioners sugar
2 tbsps. instant coffee
1 tbsps. boiling water
Spread over warm pie.
CHERRY COLA DESSERT
1 pkg. (3 oz.) cherry jello
1 cup boiling water
1/2 cup (6 oz. bottle) cola beverage
1 1/2 cups drained pitted Bing cherries
Dissolve jello in boiling water—add cola beverage—chill until slightly thickened. Then fold in cherries. Pour into 4 cup mold, individual molds or serving dishes.
Chill until firm—serve with whipped cream or prepared dessert topping, if desired. Serves 5.
ROSY GLAZED APPLES
1 pkg. (3 oz.) strawberry jello
1 pkg. (3 oz.) apple jelly
1 1/2 cups boiling water
1 cup cold water
6 large red baking apples (cored)
1 stick cinnamon
6 whole cloves
Dissolve both pkgs. of jello in the boiling water—add cold water. Starting at the end, pare off a 1 inch strip of skin around each apple. Place apples, stem end up, in a large skillet.
Pour jello syrup over apples in skillet, add spices. Place skillet over medium heat and bring liquid to a boil. Cover, reduce heat and simmer apples 15 minutes or until tender.
Remove cover, place skillet under broiler about two inches from heat — broil apples, basting frequently, for

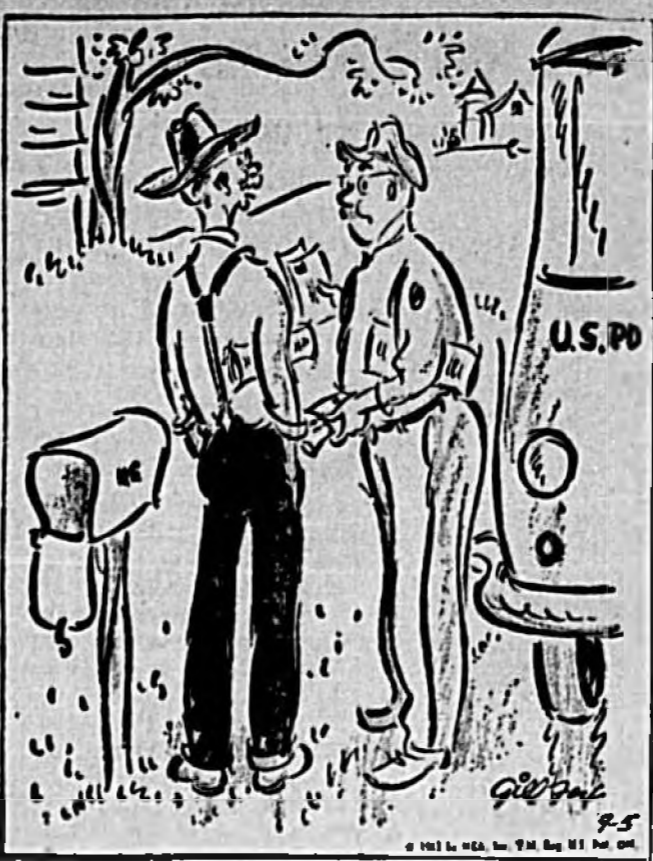

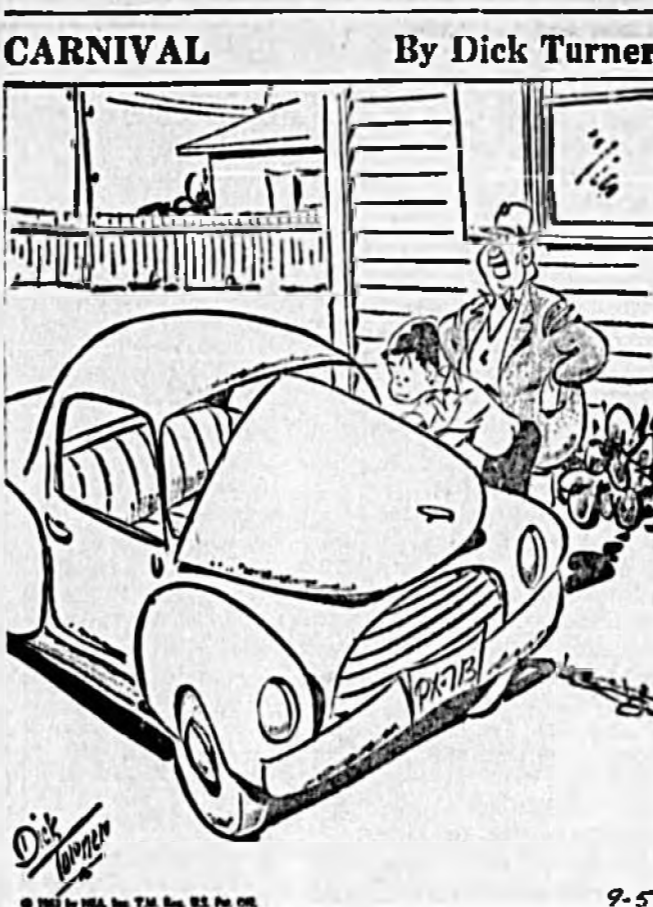

Slavia Youth Develops 40-Acre Tree Farm

By Bernice Kelsey... Jonathan Lucas, son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Lucas, of Slavia and a former student of the St. Luke's Lutheran School of Slavia, is an enthusiastic 4-H Club worker. Jonathan has been active in this work for nearly six years and has undertaken a project to try to give back what had been taken from 40 acres of land owned by his parents.

As the years went by the family increased which necessitated an addition to their home. The lumber to build this addition, as well as that in the original home, was supplied from this acreage.

When Jonathan started his 4-H work and learned the background he became very interested so he and his brother, Paul, started a tree farm, later joining the American Tree Farm System.

With the aid of his family, farm forester, and county agent he set the tree farm in motion. Arrangements were made with the Florida Forest Service and 6,000 slash pines were delivered from the Florida Service Nursery located at Chiefland. Their planting began at this point of delivery.

Since the first planting these original seedlings have grown to be 15-20 feet tall. By this time they had worked on different areas and sections. They began experimenting with the method of broadcasting long leaf pine seeds but due to dry weather the seeds failed to germinate so 3,000 seedlings were ordered.

In the spring the poisoning of the unwanted oaks were started and there the enthusiasm was rejuvenated. The boys used some of their own seedbed plantings. From this they used the seedling in the project required under the 4-H Forestry projects.

During the planting they found an abundance of wild life. Many times they studied the tracks of the animals, convinced that good planning and careful management would encourage the influx of wild life. A cover crop, such as partridge peas and mulberry trees, was planted, and bird feeders were made.

Going in to the sixth year in the forestry program, they are under the guidance of County Ranger Albert Harris, and they have cleared more lands. With this work the land will be ready this fall for the planting of a variety of 2,000 hardwood, 500 sand and long leaf pines.

They contacted Ben Wiggin, Seminole Soil Conservation District, and Harry Herish, Florida Game and Fresh Water Game Commission, who plan to work with them in the coming months. Herish states the area is a good habitat for wild turkey and gave them information on starting turkeys in the area.

It is the desire of Jonathan to plant many different varieties in order for there to be a good selection of trees. This land was designated a Tree Farm by the American Tree Farm Systems in 1959 and holds the number of 365.

Recently the boys invited some friends who had helped in the past and those who plan to help in the future on a tour. The following were invited: Harry Herish, Ben Wiggin, Albert Harris, Mrs. Herish and daughter, Sandy; Chuck Binder, parents, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Lucas; brothers, Paul Jr., Philip and Stanley; Jonathan personally guided this group.

both crewmen had been ejected near New Smyrna Beach Thursday while flying a routine training mission.

The bombardier-navigator, Aviation Jet Mechanic First Class Charles Robert Kelsey, 30, was dead on arrival at Fish Memorial Hospital in New Smyrna Beach.

Hospital officials reported the pilot, Lt. Col. Robert H. Lovelace, 31, suffered only cuts and bruises.

Both men were assigned to Heavy Attack Squadron 5 at Sanford Naval Air Station.

Captain James O. Mayo, commander of Heavy Attack Wing One, said today accident board members are investigating a hydraulic failure which the pilot reported prior to the ejection.

Lovelace cited the malfunction on a radio transmission to the Naval Air Station control tower shortly before leaving the aircraft.

Captain Mayo said it could not yet be determined during which stage of Kelsey's ejection and subsequent descent to earth the airman suffered his injuries.

Observers at the scene reported seeing both parachutes open after the two left the aircraft at about 24,000 feet.

The plane crashed at 4:50 p.m. in a sparsely populated area southwest of New Smyrna Beach, 1 1/2 miles south of State Road 40 near the Old Spanish Mission memorial.

Kelsey and Lovelace were undergoing transition training in the Vigilante. They were temporarily assigned to VAH-3 Sanford's training squadron.

Kelsey lived at 101 Fairway Drive with his wife, Mrs. Vala Dean Kelsey, and two sons. He is also survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles F. Kelsey of Columbus, Ohio.

Lovelace lives at 303 Tangerine Drive.

Kelsey, a 12-year veteran of the Navy, had served as an instructor in VAH-3 before entering Vigilante training.

Deputy Charles Fagan shortly after discovered the get-away car parked in the Public supermarket parking lot at Casselberry. It bore a St. Petersburg license plate and, Sheriff Hobby said, had been stolen Thursday evening at Orlando.

Also found in the parking lot, but not with the car, Hobby reported, was an overnight bag containing a small caliber gun and some clothing.

The bandit's description was passed by Sheriff Hobby's department to all law enforcement agencies in the East-Central Florida area.
