Sanford eyeing lake water for reclaimed use

SANFORD - The officials turned out en masse Wednesday morning to inaugurate a pilot project to determine the level of treatment necessary to take water from Lake Monroe to augment the city's reclaimed water system.

The project may be the first of its kind in the State of Florida, and if proven successful, could become a pilot program for similar projects at various locations.

Taking water from the lake has been determined necessary during extended drought periods when reclaimed water supplies can be low and demand can be high. Such conditions can lead to an imposition of use restrictions as occurred this summer.

The SJRWMD prefers that the city use this alternative water resource as a back-up rather than precious groundwater. The district is a co-applicant with the city on a \$300,000 matching grant.

Officials from the city of Sanford, St. Johns River Water Management District and others included Jim Taylor of the University of Central Florida, Ben Fries and David Gierach of Conklin, Porter & Holmes, the city's consulting engineers, and representatives from Hayward/Xenon, Parkson/Dynasand.

While most reclaimed water systems consist of one or two types of uses, Sanford distributes unrestricted public access quality reclaimed water to sites including city parks, the Mayfair golf course, cemeteries, schools, residential and commercial.

Killer seeks clemency

A Seminole County topless dancer says she suffered from battered spouse syndrome before conviction in boyfriend's gruesome death

SEMINOLE COUNTY - A former topless dancer serving a 17-year sentence for the stabbing death of her boyfriend has asked the governor for clemency.

Michele Ashley Roger, 32, of Oviedo, was convicted of second degree murder in August 1994 for the Sept. 6, 1992 death of her boyfriend, David Richmond, 28.

Jim Richmond, the victim's father, who lives in Chicago, was informed Tuesday by the Office of Executive Clemency in Tallahassee and the Florida Parole Commission that Roger is seeking an early release claiming that she was battered by David Richmond.

"We want to do everything we can to stop this," Jim Richmond said. "We don't want to see her go free. The grounds of battery are inappropriate. In fact, the opposite was probably true."

Richmond said he does not believe Roger was abused or battered.

"She has never expressed any kind of remorse for what she did," he said.

Richmond said he will launch an extensive letter-writing and media campaign to prepare for the clemency hearing, which is scheduled for Sept. 17 at 9:30 a.m. Each family will get 10 minutes before the board, he said.

Chris White, chief of operations at the

State Attorney's Office, said though he has not seen Roger's clemency request, his office "will strongly oppose it barring some unforeseen developments."

"Norm Wolfinger (State Attorney) has felt very strongly about this case from the beginning," White said.

Gov. Lawton Chiles and his cabinet members, who act as the state's Clemency Board, will hear the request later this year.

At the time of the trial, the case received national media attention, largely because of the gruesome details disclosed during the investigation and Roger's family involvement in trying to cover up the crime.

During her trial, Roger said she stabbed Richmond in self-defense following an argument. She then left the Oviedo condominium the couple shared and traveled to her family's house. Will Roger, her father, admitted that he removed the body from the murder scene and disposed of the body by burning it, putting the bone fragments in a wood chipper and mixing the remains into concrete blocks. He later dropped the blocks off his boat into the Atlantic Ocean near New Smyrna Beach. Will Roger and his son, Ken Roger, who helped dispose of the body, were sentenced to two years of probation.

The case did not come to the attention of police until Roger confided in a fellow dancer, who assisted with the investigation and also testified at the trial.

In a similar case, Kimberly Soublille of Casselberry, also a former topless dancer in the county, was convicted of second degree murder in the 1987 death of her husband, Pierre. Soublille was granted clemency in 1993 on the grounds she was abused. Soublille graduated from Florida State University College of Law in May, however, she will not be allowed to practice law in the state.

Judge candidate suspended

A candidate vying for a seat in the Brevard Seminole 18th Judicial Circuit has been suspended from practicing law in the state.

The Florida Supreme Court has suspended Aaron Michael Brass for 10 days effective Oct. 9, according to the Florida Bar Association.

Brass, who is listed as a member in good standing, had been reprimanded in early 1997 for professional misconduct when he failed to appear for his client at a criminal trial. The judge withheld adjudication and ordered Brass to pay \$300 to the Salvation Army.

Record enrollment

OVIEDO - University of Central Florida classes began today with a record number of students.

Enrollment for the fall is estimated to hit an all-time high of 29,700 students, up from the 28,302 from the previous years, according to Dan Coleman, director of UCF's Department of Institutional Research and Planning Support.

"We're expecting more than a 12 percent growth at the branch campuses," Coleman said. The total number includes enrollment at the UCF branches at South Orlando, Downtown Academic Center, Daytona Beach and Brevard.

First time college students are also expected to increase from 2,562 last year to 3,100 this fall. The SAT scores and GPAs of incoming freshmen are expected to continue their study climb, in part because of the recruiting efforts of the new Honors College.

About 90 new full-time faculty will be added. The current estimated number of regular employees, including faculty, is about 3,000.

Lake Mary to finalize new police station

LAKE MARY - An ordinance approving the purchase of land on which to build a new police station is coming up for second and final reading before the Lake Mary City Commission tonight. Approval would resolve a search for a new location for the facility under way for several years.

Consideration for a new site has included the possibility of building a major public safety complex at the present Rinehart Road property, utilizing city owned property in the east side of the downtown area, and others. None of them proved practical.

Regarding the proposal to build at the present police station site, studies indicated the possibility of sinkhole conditions on the south and southwest portion of the property, and soil testing indicated the land may have been previously used as a dump, and might require an extensive and

expensive cleanup. The present police station building is also said to not meet the criteria of a possible expansion, as the building does not meet specified wind strength requirements, the air conditioning system is in need of expensive repair, and other matters.

Now, the city plans to purchase the Nazarene Church property at 171 E. Crystal Lake Avenue. The purchase price has been established at \$220,000 with the city also agreeing to waive a building permit fee of up to \$10,000 should the church rebuild in the city within the next five years.

Money for the purchase is to come from the General Fund balance, with approximately \$1,715,000 from the 1995 Community Bond Improvement issue which would help in the cost of building construction.

The final reading has been scheduled for tonight's commission meeting. Prior to the regular meeting, the commission will conduct a work session beginning at 5 p.m., to

discuss the proposed fiscal year 1998/99 budget.

The regular meeting will begin at 7 p.m., or as soon as possible following the conclusion of the work session. As of earlier this week, the following items are listed on the meeting's agenda:

Good sign for Chief Dillard - no one's jumping

Today we salute Sanford Police Chief Joe Dillard on being able to not have his name in newspaper headlines for the last couple of months. No news in Dillard's type of work is good news.

Mayor Larry Dale says the SPD is "getting better" - and that how much better it is will be revealed in several months after a study by George Hubler, an independent police management expert.

It was Hubler who uncovered flaws in the organization a year ago and prompted the city to take a hard look at what the SPD was doing.

Several years ago when he was Police Chief in Los Angeles, Daryl F. Gates said that it is important for the public to come to terms with what a police department does.

"Citizens ought to know they have a partnership with the police," he said. "When an officer stops a citizen, the citizen should not mistake signs for discourtesy. He should cooperate. At the same time, the officer must absolutely explain - with courtesy why the person was stopped."

"Judgments against the police come too quickly, too harshly, too often," Gates said. "The public is too quick to jump from the particular to the general, are there are al-

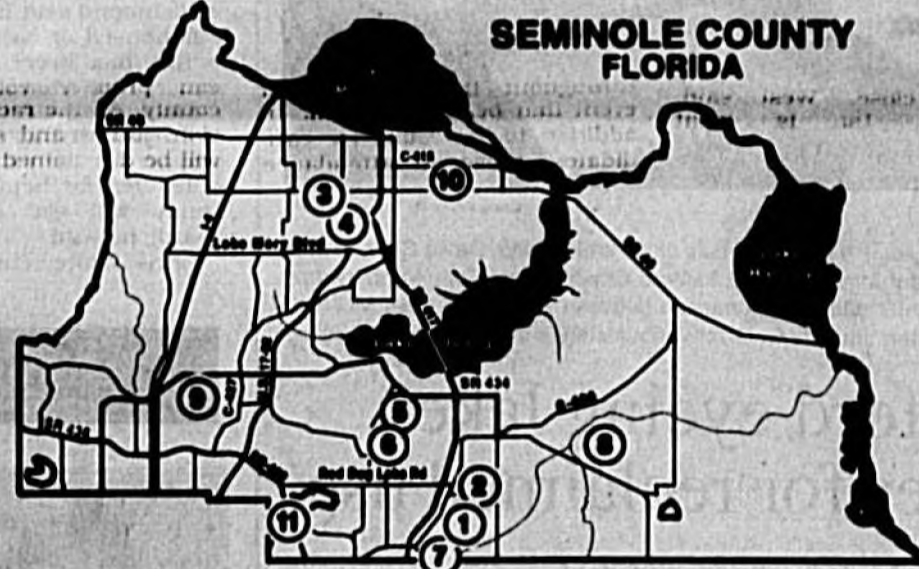

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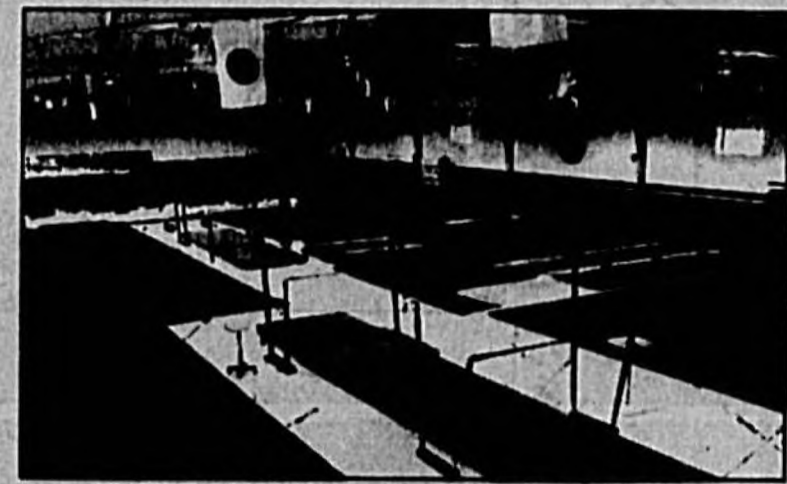

The time is drawing near. The signs are in the ground and the brochures mailed. Study the issues and be prepared to vote.

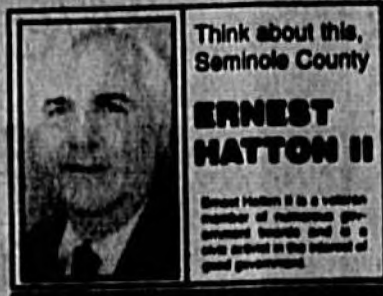

Should that not be in place prior to the referendum? It may not be a bad idea to have the county attorneys and those who wish to defend the nudity issue to arrange to put all of this in written form since it's been a major part of the presentation of this issue? If this can be accomplished I think there will be overwhelming support from the public. If

not, have we been misled?

We have heard a great deal about the nudity issue. The truth is that every county commissioner, and most other citizens, would like to see more stringent standards. How many really believe that the Orlando metropolitan area can grow and prosper without mass trans-

portation!!

If we had our way we would not want anyone to move into the area, now that we are here. Wake up, that is a dream. Families are arriving every day. This is going to be very large metropolitan area and we need to plan for it now. If we do not, our children may have a hard time getting to work, college, or anywhere.
