An 18-year-old Altamonte Springs woman was raped at her home early Sunday by a man who broke into the sleeping woman's house and awakened her by placing a knife to her throat.

County Detective Johnny Wright reported the woman, who lives in a duplex apartment with her sister, was alone in the house when a man described as black, 245-250 pounds and over six feet tall, entered and assaulted her.

According to Detective Wright's report, the man told the victim he had been watching her for sometime and promised he would be back.

The woman was removed to Florida Hospital and later transferred to Seminole Memorial Hospital where a doctor, upon examination, confirmed the report.

Kirkland Trial Opens

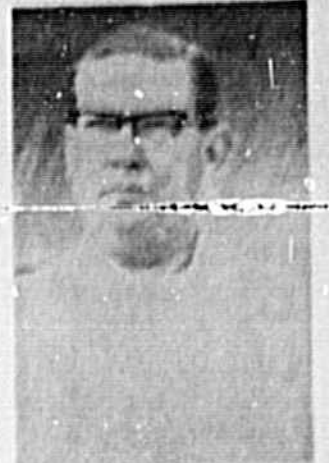
Orlando Attorney Faces Charges Of Lewd, Lascivious Assault

The oft-delayed trial of Orlando attorney Edward Kirkland, charged with two counts of lewd and lascivious assault upon a female child and crime against nature, began this morning before Circuit Judge Richard Muldrew.

The charges stemmed from an all-night party on Jan. 12-13, 1970, at the Regency Apartments in South Seminole County. Harlan Blackburn, charged in the same incident, was acquitted by a Circuit Court jury last June.

The venire, numbering 105, was qualified this morning, and over half called to another criminal trial in progress before Judge Tom Waddell.

An interesting aspect to the case is that each prospective juror is being interrogated individually, sequestered from the remainder of the venire. At press time, one juror was tentatively seated. Seated in the rear of the courtroom was Blackburn, who is expected to be a witness for the state.

5 Hearings Scheduled By County

County Commissioners face a lengthy session tomorrow, with five scheduled public hearings and three bid openings, in addition to regular agenda items and reports from various county attaches.

Listed on the agenda is a report from Road Supt. J. C. Lawender, regarding the Brantley Avenue widening at Lake Jessup. Commission Chairman Greg Drummond will report relative to traffic signal emergency repair program.

Judge Kenneth Monroe will appear relative to a revision of the court on June 1. In February, the judge proposed a revamp of the small claims court with judge's salary of \$3,600, clerk for \$4,500 salary, \$340 supplies, \$1,500 office expenses and \$189 for fixtures.

The commission approved a counter proposal of a \$6,000 annual salary to become effective at the beginning of the county's fiscal year on Oct. 1. Also approved was a 50 per cent increase in fees from the present \$3.5 range.

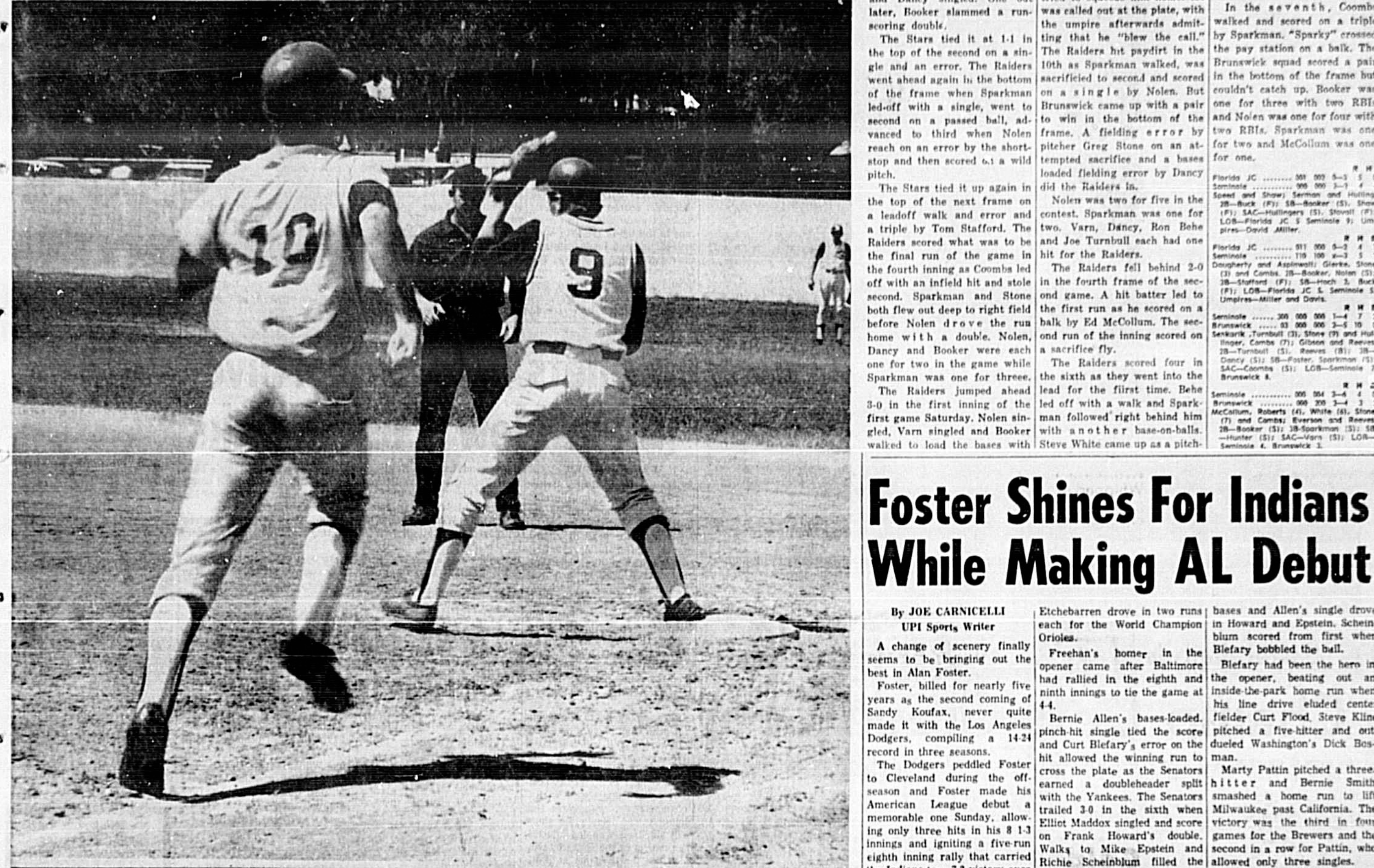
