11 Youths Arrested At Drinking Spree

Eleven teenagers, including several females, were arrested by Seminole County authorities late Saturday night and charged with possession of alcohol as a minor, after three cars were found parked in a field off SR 434 behind Mobile Manor trailer village.

Deputy Harold Smith reported he was found in an ice chest in one of the cars and several empty beer cans were found in the area.

Smith listed two of the teenagers as being nude and, according to arrest dockets, the group came from Winter Park, Maitland, Apopka and Bear Lake.

Records reveal all posted \$100 bonds on the charges and were released to parents.

Other weekend county activity included the arrest Saturday night of the Sanford owner of 11 Lo Bar, Highway 11-82, Fern Park, and a female bar employee on charges stemming from five arrests made earlier at the establishment.

Keith C. Putt, 42, bar operator, and Marjorie Draper, 28, Orlando, were released from county jail after posting bonds of \$2,500 and \$2,000 on charges that Putt maintained a gaming table and permitted gambling and Mrs. Draper acted as agent or servant in the operation of a gambling house.

Arrested earlier on gambling charges and released on \$100 bonds each were William John Carroll, 45, Patrick W. Riley, 39, Tony Lutz, 23, Joseph McDonald, 26, and Michael Rafferty, 24, all of Orlando.

The five men were apprehended by undercover deputies, who confiscated a deck of playing cards in the ferry against a backroom poker game.

'Action' Council Meeting Is Slated

The city of Casselberry might hold its first official public session since it was learned two weeks ago that Mayor Curtis Blaw would not resign present Police Chief Donald L. Brunley for another year's term.

The council, with the exception of assemblyman Richard Wira, has been almost totally unresponsive to a plea for an announcement that Blaw did not intend rehiring Brunley. Many of Casselberry's citizens have expressed their discontent over the situation through numerous telephone calls to council members and petitions since the mayor's decision came to light.

Wira verbally denounced the Mayor's intended decision and termed it "disgusting" while pledging to fight for Brunley's retention.

Three other councilmen, Louis Kirby, Thomas Napier and William Grier, have indicated they also will defend the present chief in hopes that Blaw will not reappoint another prisoner to escape from the Seminole County Jail on April 11, 1969; that he committed an assault upon Howard T. Bolden with a razor blade on July 8; and that he committed a sexual assault upon Norman Edward Sprunt on July 10 of the same year.

Blaw will reappoint the former Sanford police sergeant. Remaining completely silent on the issue has been council chairman Dr. Edith Deerr, who indicated she may comment on the situation when she has been officially informed that the Mayor will not reappoint another year's term.

Parole Violator Sentenced

Shadrick A. Martin Jr., blind innocent of a crime against nature by a Circuit Court jury last week, has been sentenced to 10 years in prison for parole violations.

Martin had been placed on probation for seven years when found guilty by a jury of shooting into a house in March 1968. Circuit Court Judge Roger Dykes, after hearing the testimony of witnesses, found Martin guilty of violating his parole.

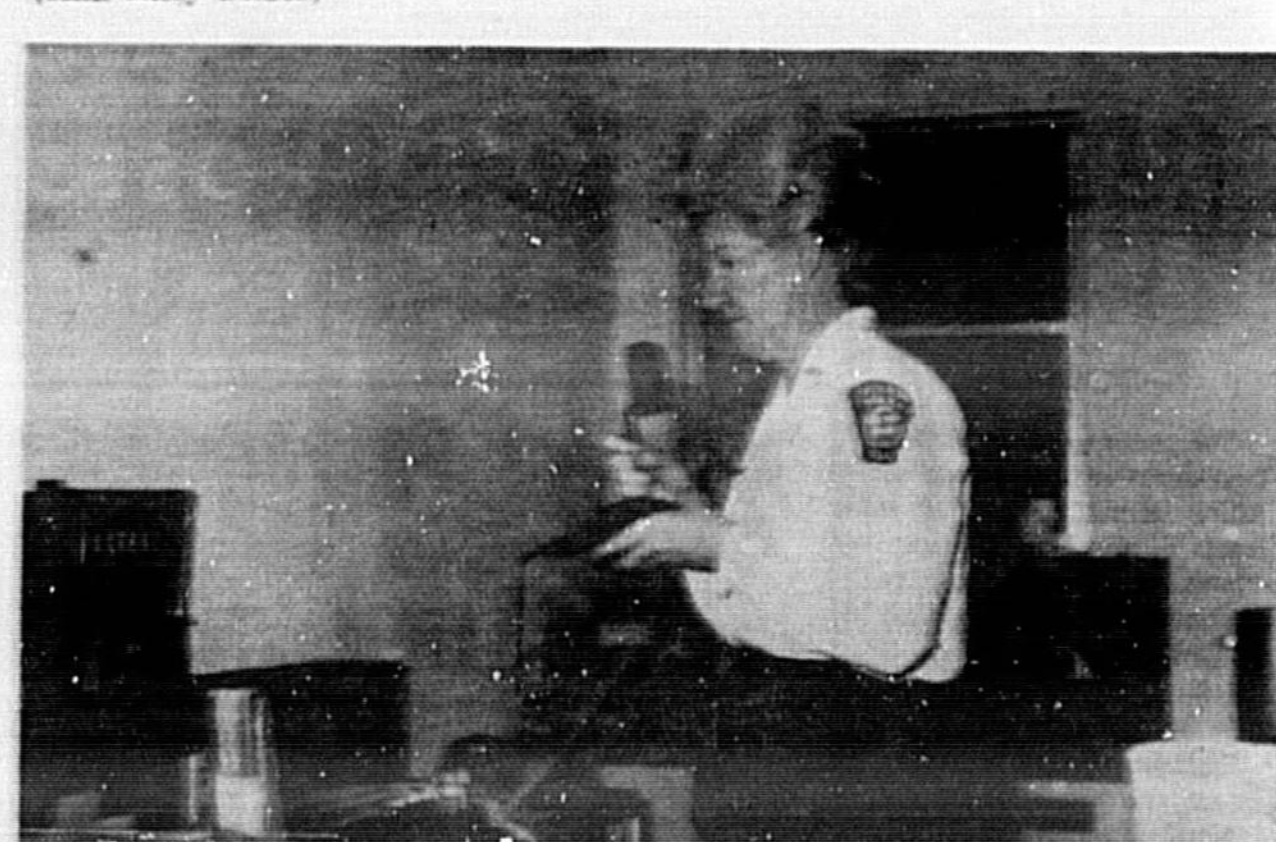

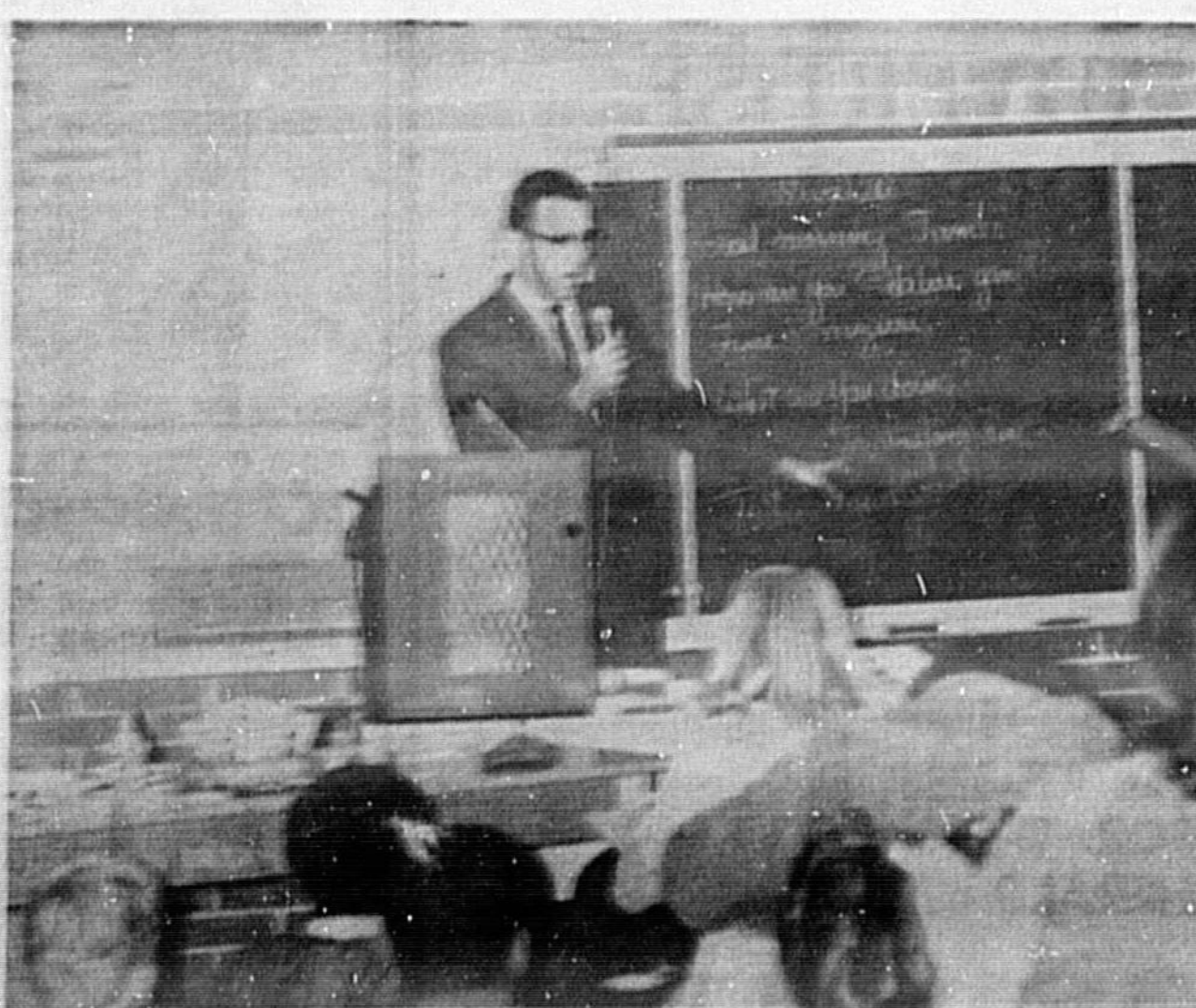

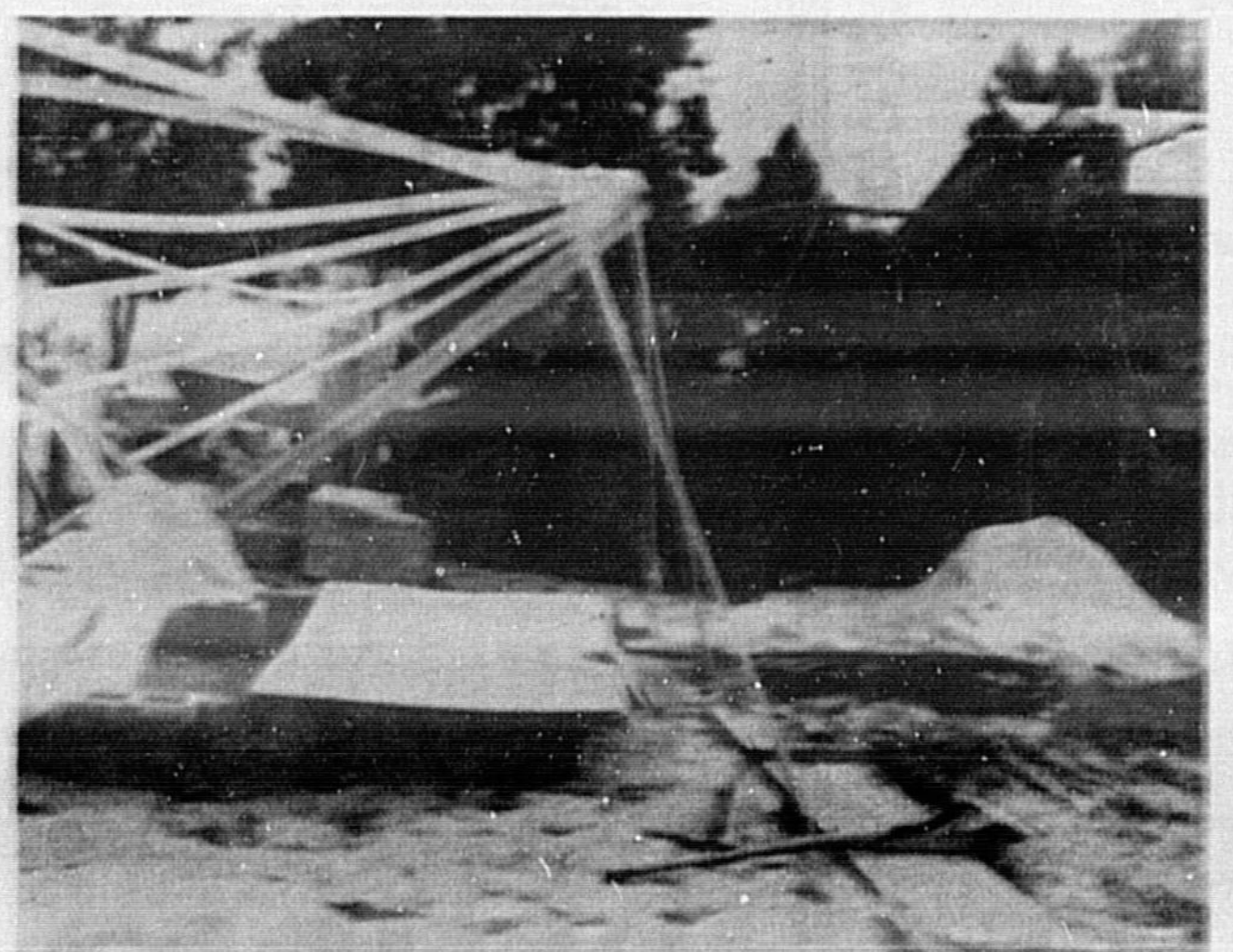

Breakfast Confab May Decide Issue Airport Authority Decision Due

A Friday 8:30 a.m. breakfast meeting at House of Steak between the Sanford City Commission and Sanford Industrial Commission was scheduled Thursday for the city commission meeting after Mayor Lee P. Moore advised the two groups need to get together to discuss implementation of Sanford Airport Authority Act.

Moore said, "We don't know what will come out of the meeting but the ball is still in the air on whether the airport will be operated by an authority or a city department."

The mayor said the situation is now more complicated by the resignation of Don Rathel, industrial commission director. Rathel announced last week his intention of leaving his committee position after Jan. 15.

The breakfast session between the two city boards resulted after Earl Faircloth, state attorney general, announced his decision on whether the city is required by law to implement the authority act as passed by the Legislature last summer. Faircloth stated there is nothing in the act to indicate that the Legislature intended to compel the city to activate the Sanford Airport Authority and the Industrial Development Authority in order to perform these functions and duties.

In view of this ruling, it is apparent that sentiment to implement the act is still strong in some city groups and their opinions along with views of appointment, also prevalent in some city groups, will be aired Friday before a permanent solution for operation of the airport and its industrial applications is achieved.

Cards Urge Release Of GI POWs

Sid Vihlen Jr., president of the Sanford-Seminole Jaycees, today announced plans for local Jaycees to send Christmas cards to North Vietnam officials, urging the immediate release of all U.S. prisoners of war.

According to Vihlen, the project is a nation-wide effort by The United States Jaycees to focus attention on the "inhumane treatment of American servicemen captured in Vietnam by the Communists."

Official sources indicate that more than 1,300 American servicemen are either missing in action or held captive by the Communists and 200 have been missing for nearly four years, a period longer than any American held prisoner during World War II.

In addition to local Jaycees participating in the project, all residents of Seminole County are urged to send greeting cards to "Project P.O.W. Box 2000, Washington, D. C. 20013. Inside the card you should list your name, address and a short message asking North Vietnam to release all American prisoners immediately, to immediately release the names of prisoners now being held and to afford prisoners proper treatment in the meantime.

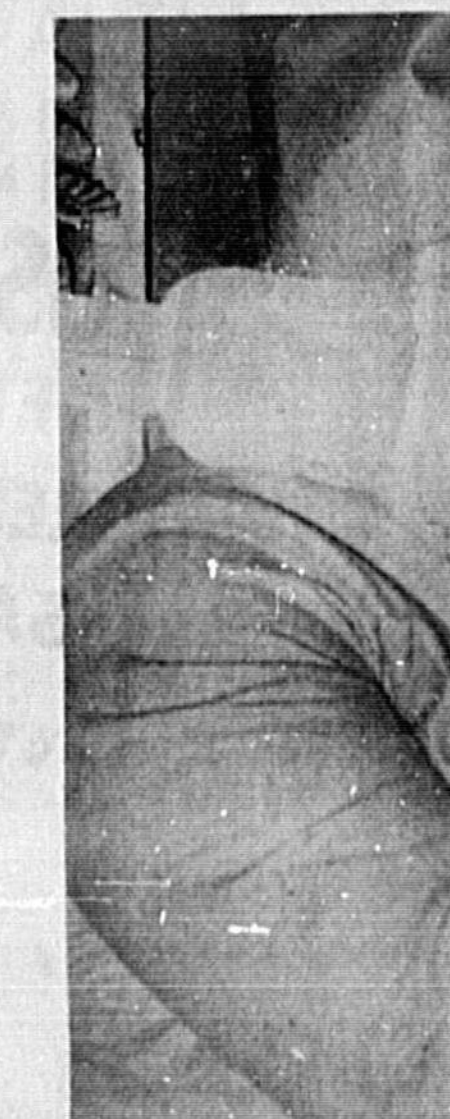
The mayor further stated that, in his opinion, 95 per cent of the expenses would be upheld in court, and that litigation would cost the city approximately \$1,000.

Councilman Alex Sabbarase queried as to how Swofford arrived at the figure of \$28 per diem for conference fees, and Swofford replied that based on a salary of \$7,500 per annum of an administrative assistant which other cities have, he figured the cost of his time spent in conferences to be paid at the \$28 figure.

Sabbarase then moved for dismissal of the suit, stating that the amount recovered would not justify the amount of expense involved to the city.

City engineer William Palm gave a progress report upon Phase 1 of the sewer system, stating that work was on schedule. Palm recommended partial payment to Orange Packaging and Construction Company of \$14,250, and to Bumbley and Stimpson of \$20,825.

In other business council adopted upon first reading an ordinance for annexation of Orange Ave. into the city and an ordinance for abandonment of Williams St. was presented for second reading by title only.

Confrontation Delayed

A head-on collision expected last night between Casselberry Mayor Curt's How and that municipality's council failed, after the proposed civil service board appointments were tabled until the next scheduled meeting. How has used the controversial board as one reason to justify his announced intentions not to retire the present police chief, Donald J. Brumley, whose term expires Dec. 31.

Several questions were posed to the mayor concerning newspaper reports that How would not reappoint city police head Brumley but the remarks brought only minor responses from the mayor and city council.

In other action last night, Council approved a \$2.50 per month garbage franchise with Central Service Corporation; reviewed and accepted insurance low bid for casualty coverage from Nationwide Insurance of \$7,387 for a three-year term and also approved Washington National Insurance bid for life coverage of \$1.15 per month per employee.
