

MIAMI (AP)-A Miami New survey indicates plenty of tour ists are with us but they're dol ing out their money more cau tiously on travel, vacation stays and race track bets. Miami Beach hotelmen said business is off 10 to 15 per cen compared to a year ago. One reported a faster turnover of rooms, with people who used to spend three weeks settling for two instead.
