The Best Defense

With every indication pointing to an early offensive by the Allied nations which would carry the war direct to the enemy, some grumbling is heard, largely from former isolationists, about undefended American seacoasts and submarine attacks on American ships in nearby waters. These people evidently would have our Navy bring its warships back from its major duties elsewhere and line our shores with soldiers in a purely defensive strategy.

But if there is any one thing which the war to date has proved, it is that the best defense is a good offense. French soldiers crouched for months behind their Maginot Line believing themselves secure while Germany mopped up in Poland, Norway, Holland and Belgium, and refused to carry the war to the enemy. Then when Hitler was ready, he picked a weak spot in the line, sent his armies crashing through and France was licked.

The same thing could happen to us if we followed the advice of the ostrich and looked upon the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans as our Maginot lines. All the navies in the world could not protect our coastwise commerce or protect our shores if the Axis powers are not attacked but are left free to attack us whenever and wherever it suits them best. All the armies America can raise could not prevent an invasion if our enemies are always permitted to concentrate the most men at a given point of their own choosing.

If the Germans can keep us on the defensive, they will soon start a new offensive of their own. They will sweep down through the Near East seizing the oil fields of Iran and Iraq—pushing on through Arabia to join hands with the Japs who will by that time have overrun India and be in control of the Indian Ocean. Meanwhile General Rommel will launch another attack in Lybia and push across Egypt to seize the Suez Canal.

With northern Africa firmly in their possession the Germans will then be free to concentrate on the western hemisphere. While the Japanese attack from the west the Germans would attack from the east, perhaps at the nearest point in Brazil, that great storehouse of natural resources whence we are hoping to get our rubber supplies, perhaps thousands of miles from there through Greenland, New Foundland and Canada, while the Japs pour down through Alaska.

This is the price of defensive action. Defense alone will never stop our enemies, but they can be stopped if they are attacked close to home. Let the British and Americans pour across the Channel into friendly France where they would find millions of fresh recruits. Let them establish a front in Flanders and threaten the homes of the Germans, and it would not take Hitler long to withdraw his troops from Africa and the Near East.

Let the United States bomb Tokyo, let the United States itself send powerful armies plunging down from Alaska to Japan, and there will be no need to worry about the defense of Australia. Japan will bring her troops back from Dutch East Indies. Do we want to relieve MacArthur in the Philippines? Then make the Japs bring their soldiers back to defend their own homes.

These submarine attacks on American coastal shipping and seaport towns may increase. There may even be bombing attacks on some American cities. These nuisance raids are designed to stir up the American public to demanding protection at home. They are meant to make us stay on the defensive, keep our Army and Navy at home. But our leaders are not being fooled by these tactics. They will give the enemy some of his own medicine.

Victory Suit

A "victory" suit for men made from only 2 5-8 yards of cloth—the average suit takes 3 1/2 yards—was shown in New York yesterday for the first time.

The most radical changes are in the jacket, which looks like a vest with sleeves. It has no collar, no lapels and the pockets are flapless. The pants are different, too. In addition to being cuffless, they have a much shorter waist and the leg widths are quite narrow.

Exhibited at a preview of the annual fashion show, the "victory" suit was shown to indicate what the nation's tailors can do if necessary. The chances that the average man will have to buy suits with neither collar nor lapels are still very small; most clothing makers regard this step as extreme.

In line with suggestions made by the war production board, most of the garments shown yesterday include fewer vests, fewer cuffs on trousers, fewer double breasted suits, no patch pockets and no coat belts.

This year's suits have been made with a view to conserving woolen cloth and at the same time providing civilians with the fullest measure of economy and the greatest comfort and individuality.

Among the garments shown for the first time was a "siren" suit of Scotch flannel in a black and white check with an overlaid of red, similar in style to the one recently shown by Prime Minister Churchill.—Wall Street Journal.

Carleton asserted that the nations of the world are assured security by a world organization they should organize. East and colonial armaments, continuously increasing, are a terrible burden on the people of the world. The economic energies which have long been going into armaments must be turned to the production of consumer goods for the raising of the standard of living.

At the end of this war the nations must be prepared to give up their arms and to give up their economic tariff policies and open their markets and the markets of the world to Europe to the nation of the world. In the end this will not be a sacrifice but a blessing that will manifest the progress of production and world trade.

Touching on the political trends in Continental Europe he asserted that the further spread of socialist regime in Asia and in Europe. It is true that we ourselves are moving in the direction of socialism, but we are not going so far as the people of Asia and Europe are going. The only thing that might prove to be a barrier to our cooperation with nations in the post-war world would be our people's understanding and preparedness for it.

The Best Defense

With every indication pointing to an early offensive by the Allied nations which would carry the war direct to the enemy, some grumbling is heard, largely from former isolationists, about undefended American seacoasts and submarine attacks on American ships in nearby waters. These people evidently would have our Navy bring its warships back from its major duties elsewhere and line our shores with soldiers in a purely defensive strategy.

But if there is any one thing which the war to date has proved, it is that the best defense is a good offense. French soldiers crouched for months behind their Maginot Line believing themselves secure while Germany mopped up in Poland, Norway, Holland and Belgium, and refused to carry the war to the enemy. Then when Hitler was ready, he picked a weak spot in the line, sent his armies crashing through and France was licked.

The same thing could happen to us if we followed the advice of the ostrich and looked upon the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans as our Maginot lines. All the navies in the world could not protect our coastwise commerce or protect our shores if the Axis powers are not attacked but are left free to attack us whenever and wherever it suits them best. All the armies America can raise could not prevent an invasion if our enemies are always permitted to concentrate the most men at a given point of their own choosing.

If the Germans can keep us on the defensive, they will soon start a new offensive of their own. They will sweep down through the Near East seizing the oil fields of Iran and Iraq, pushing on through Arabia to join hands with the Japs who will by that time have overrun India and be in control of the Indian Ocean. Meanwhile General Rommel will launch another attack in Libya and push across Egypt to seize the Suez Canal.

With northern Africa firmly in their possession the Germans will then be free to concentrate on the western hemisphere. While the Japanese attack from the west the Germans would attack from the east, perhaps at the nearest point in Brazil, that great storehouse of natural resources whence we are hoping to get our rubber supplies, perhaps thousands of miles from there through Greenland, Newfoundland and Canada, while the Japs pour down through Alaska.

This is the price of defensive action. Defense alone will never stop our enemies, but they can be stopped if they are attacked close to home. Let the British and Americans pour across the Channel into friendly France where they would find millions of fresh recruits. Let them establish a front in Flanders and threaten the homes of the Germans, and it would not take Hitler long to withdraw his troops from Africa and the Near East.

Let the United States bomb Tokyo, let the United States itself send powerful armies plunging down from Alaska to Japan, and there will be no need to worry about the defense of Australia. Japan will bring her troops back from Dutch East Indies. Do we want to relieve MacArthur in the Philippines? Then make the Japs bring their soldiers back to defend their own homes.

These submarine attacks on American coastal shipping and seaport towns may increase. There may even be bombing attacks on some American cities. These nuisance raids are designed to stir up the American public to demanding protection at home. They are meant to make us stay on the defensive, keep our Army and Navy at home. But our leaders are not being fooled by these tactics. They will give the enemy some of his own medicine.

Victory Suit

A "victory" suit for men made from only 2 5/8 yards of cloth—the average suit takes 3 1/2 yards—was shown in New York yesterday for the first time. The most radical changes are in the jacket, which looks like a vest with sleeves. It has no collar, no lapels and the pockets are flapless. The pants are different, too. In addition to being cuffless, they have a much shorter waist and the leg widths are quite narrow.

Exhibited at a preview of the annual fashion show, the "victory" suit was shown to indicate what the nation's tailors can do if necessary. The chances that the average man will have to buy suits with neither collar nor lapels are still very small; most clothing makers regard this step as extreme.

In line with suggestions made by the war production board, most of the garments shown yesterday include fewer vests, fewer cuffs on trousers, fewer double breasted suits, no patch pockets and no coat belts. This year's suits have been made with a view to conserving woolen cloth and at the same time providing civilians with the fullest measure of economy and the greatest comfort and individuality.

Among the garments shown for the first time was a "siren" suit of Scotch flannel in a black and white check with an overplaid of red, similar in style to the one recently shown by Prime Minister Churchill.—Wall Street Journal.

"Sergeant York" Is Only Movie Written From Congressional Record

By JACK STENNETT WASHINGTON, Mar. 4. — "Sergeant York" is the only movie ever written from the Congressional Record. As late as 1935, it was being written into the Record that Sgt. Alvin C. York of Fall Mall, near Jamesstown, in the mountains of Tennessee, could have made a fortune by exploiting his position of No. 1 hero of the World War—but chose only to pull in a few dollars for speeches and such when the Bible Class of the Church of Christ and Christian Union needed them to carry on. Until 1941, he turned down movie offers from the stage and movie that the most romantic miss ever had in widest fancy. But finally the need for funds to carry on his work in the Tennessee hill country drove the still powerful, silent bill-billy, to put his John Henry on a Hollywood contract.

When he did, there were two stipulations he insisted should be written into it. The first was that only the Bible Class of the Church of Christ should be allowed to play the role of Al York. The second was that there would be no act of God. York would be had, never to be seen again.
