Ervin said he has been informed that the FCC has ordered a hearing in Washington Oct. 22 on whether assignment of the station

whether assignment of the station operating certificate to Rivers is in the public interest.

Rivers has a six months option to buy the station which expires Dec. 2. Ervin said in a letter to the chairman of the FCC he hoped the final decision would not be be said if Rivers does not get the station by Dec 2, it would have "McBride unfettered" to operate it. He urged the FCC to two consideration "to the desire interested citizens to put the said radio station beyond the operation and control of Arthur B. McBride."
