GENERAL STRIKE OF AUTO WORKERS THREATENED



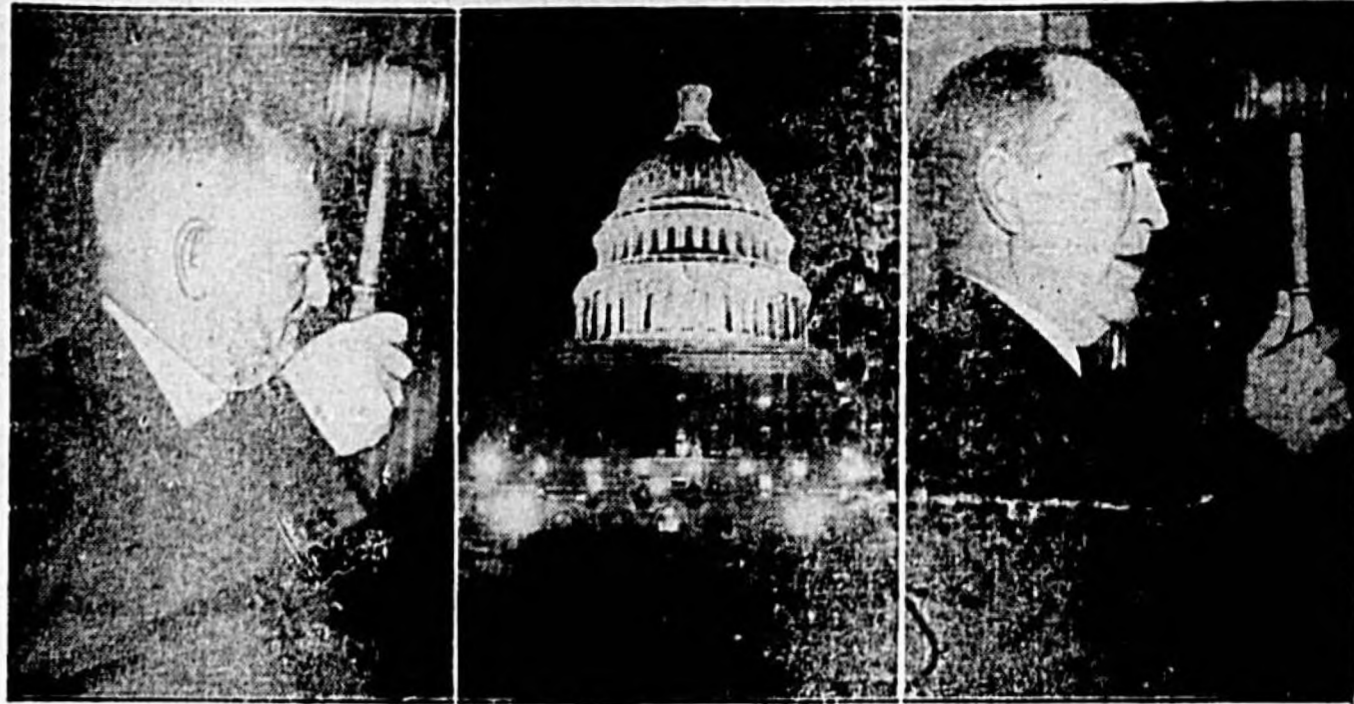

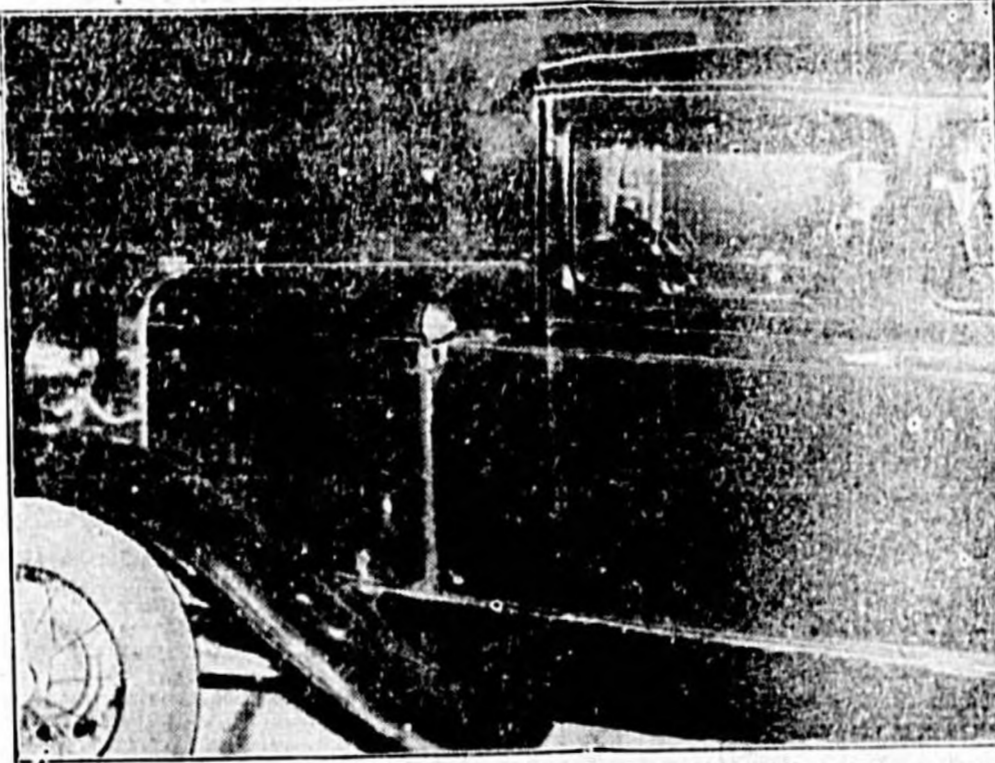

PROMISING FILM STAR'S DEATH TERMED SUICIDE



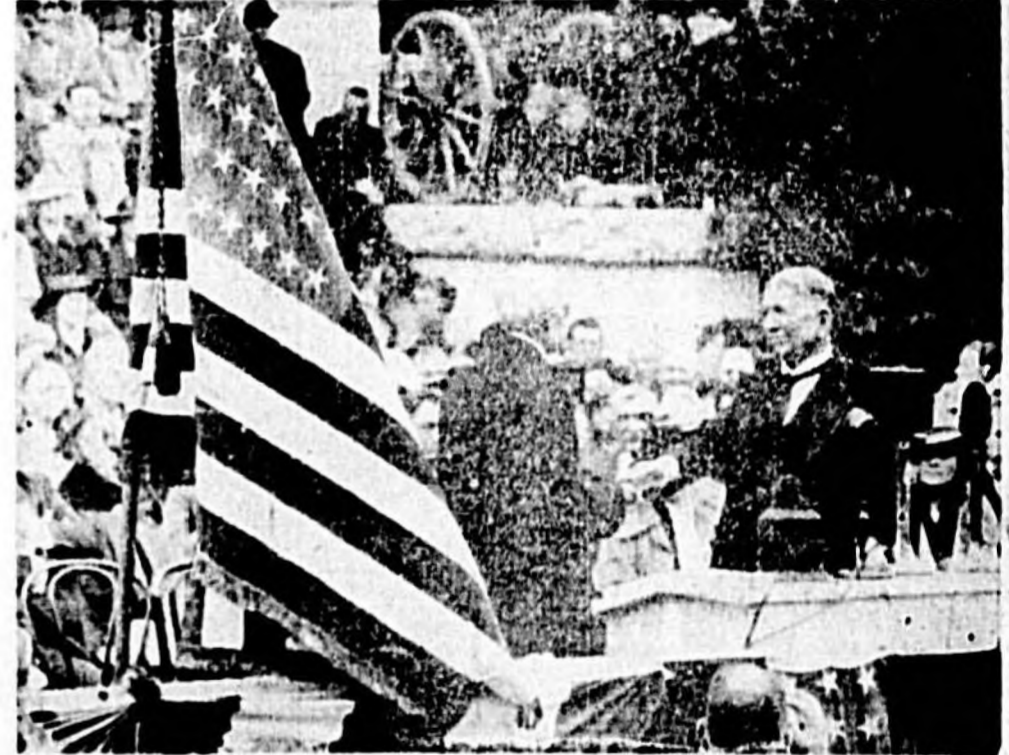

Highway Engineer Tells Speed Facts

AMES, Ia., Jan. 6.—(AP)—If you are in such a hurry that you drive your automobile at 70 miles an hour or faster, then your

time should be worth at least \$1.40 an hour or you are losing money.

Prof. R. A. Meyer, Iowa State University highway engineer, has figured out from a series of tests that gasoline expense increases about one cent per mile between the speeds of 35 to 70 miles an hour, while increased oil consumption and wear and tear on tires and motor adds another cent.

"If you drive a 70-mile trip at 70 miles an hour instead of the 35-mph. rate," the professor says, "you may save an hour's time but your expense cost for the trip goes up an extra \$1.40 to say nothing of increased danger to life and limb."

Florida Youths To Become Real Cops

PENSACOLA, Fla., Jan. 6.—(AP)—Pensacola youths have the opportunity of realizing ambitions to be a policeman without waiting to "grow up." In a move to curb a "growing" criminal tendency among youngsters, the Pensacola police department and the Pensacola trade

school collaborated in organizing a junior police department and an honor court to try juvenile offenders.

The department membership comprises boys under 16 who passed examinations. The policemen were required to take the oath administered regular policemen and they wear uniforms.

The 12 youths making highest marks in the examination were commissioned as members of the honor court and hear cases brought before them "by the junior cops."

Collapsible House Used By Traveler

MARION, O., Jan. 6.—(AP)—When Ross Showers of nearby LeRue goes traveling he carries his "hotel" on the rear bumper of his automobile. It looks like a piano box when he drives into a farmer's

yard to park. Then quickly it is transformed into a one-room house with 25 feet of floor space, a standard-size bed, a kerosene stove, two closets and electricity.

Showers' collapsible automobile house is the width of his car and 14 inches thick when folded. The materials cost him only \$11, he said, and is made of spare pieces of lumber, galvanized metal sheeting and "lots of hinges."

Counterfeit Money Better Than Real

CLARION, Pa., Jan. 6.—(AP)—Edward Trunk found a counterfeit silver dollar which he prizes more than any genuine dollar he ever owned. Trunk, owner of a hotel, picked up the bogus piece when workmen raised the floor to install a heating plant. One of the work-

Netherlands' Juliana Weds Nazi Prince

2,000,000 Dutchfolk Show Pleasure At Marriage Of Beloved Princess

33 Members Of Royalty Attend

Ceremony Is Lavish With Traditions; Golden Coach Used

THE HAGUE, Jan. 7.—(AP)—The Netherlands' royal maid, Crown Princess Juliana, became the bride of German Prince Bernhard Zu Lippe-Biesterfeld today amid the rejoicing of 2,000,000 subjects in this land of tulips and windmills.

First at the quaint town hall a civil ceremony, then in the historic, color-splashed Grote Kerk, Juliana and Bernhard pronounced their vows.

The princess, who is the sole hope of perpetuating the ancient House of Orange, stood in the center of a brilliant circle of bridesmaids. Quiet Bernhard, by royal decree, became "his royal highness, Prince of Netherlands."

Juliana and Bernhard rode from the palace to the town hall to the church in a golden coach drawn by eight horses in gay trappings. Cheering Dutchfolk lined the streets.

In the little hamlet of Oostergooie, the other betrothed, the name is Petronella van der Meer, was wed to Cahman Marinus van Sijta. She is the only other girl in all the realm to marry today because she and the princess were born on the same day in the same hour.

Thirty-three members of royal families, called the "family of the Netherlands," saw the queen's daughter and the German prince.

Volusia County Road Abandonment Rumor Gains In Strength

Sanford Militia Relaxes Vigil; Ouster Revoked

Cone Nullifies Mandate Of Sholtz In Daytona Trouble

A five-day period of vigilance by the Sanford units of the Florida National Guard has been relaxed today after Gov. Fred P. Cone signed an order yesterday revoking ex-Governor Dave Sholtz' ouster of certain Daytona Beach municipal officials.

Initially, midnight here about dusk Friday, militiamen were crowded into trucks and buses then taken to Daytona Beach where trouble had been expected when Mrs. Irene Atmstrong, mayor, object of the Sholtz ouster, barricaded herself and about 100 supporters in City Hall to prevent a Sholtz-appointed mayor and commission taking over city government.

The guard returned Saturday morning without having seen action, but since then has been prepared to move in on Daytona Beach at a moment's notice.

According to the Associated Press, Gov. Cone made the following statement regarding his nullification of the ex-Governor's ouster:

"I've signed orders restoring to persons who have not returned their applications, the communications bearing particular emphasis on the point that Jan. 15 is the final date for returning the bills."

County Agent Dawson said growers who did not receive one of the letters may feel assured that their applications had been received in his office and turned through the proper channels.

The County Committee affirmed an announcement by Mr. Dawson that Jan. 15 is the final deadline for receipt of payment applications. After that date, it said, no more approvals will be written.

25-Year Emblem Is Given Negro Fireman

New Troubles Hit GM Heads In Auto Strike

70,000 Men Now Idle; Fear Spreading Of 'Sit Down' Reaching Entire Industry

DETROIT, Jan. 7.—(AP)—New sit down strikes at the plants of the Briggs Body and Murray Body Companies here today and the Chevrolet plant at Flint, Mich., the iron foundry and small parts plants at Saginaw, and Bay City, Mich., added to the seriousness of the strike against General Motors Corporation.

More than 50,000 men already are idle and the new closings will boost the number by about 20,000. Governor Murphy of Michigan and James F. Doney, federal labor conciliator, were reported as encouraging progress toward settlement negotiations.

Some observers said if the strike continues to spread it may extend to the entire automobile industry.

Communist Activities Of Miss Smedley Oppose Kai-Shek Government

SIANFU, China, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Agnes Smedley, American, was reported today to be planning an important role in the campaign to establish a Communist empire in Northwest China openly opposed to Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's government at Nanking.

The movement, reported to have attracted the support of 200,000 members of Marshal Chang Hsiang-ling's former Manchurian army, together with Chinese Communist forces numbering 30,000, as emerged into the open with a burst of propaganda led by Miss Smedley.

Attorney Housholder Investigating Alleged Nuisance

As highway health program, to effect about 2,000 Seminole County school children in the primary, grammar and junior high grades, was in progress today under the direction of Mrs. Dorothy Lamb, school nurse.

Investigation of the plan is divided into two phases, one involving four points in which results are to be judged by the nurse, and the second, containing five points, to be judged by the teacher.

Mr. Lamb is to grade students on (1) normal or corrected teeth, (2) normal or corrected nose and throat, and (3) moccasins for two out of the three following: smallpox, typhoid and diphtheria.

It will be the teacher's duty to grade on (1) satisfactory work attendance, with absence excusable only in the case of illness, (2) good health habits, (3) well-balanced meals with no tea, coffee, etc., and (4) cleanliness.

Mrs. Lamb and the purpose of the program is to stimulate the pupil's interest in his own development and to arouse the cooperative effort on the part of the pupil, parent, teacher, nurse and physician in removing all impediments to fullest development.

The nurse said a similar program some time ago produced results which were exceedingly more satisfactory than had been expected.

Under the current plan, a student may make a maximum of 200 points. In order to win a blue ribbon certificate, he is required to score 150 points or more.

Employment of the family physician is being urged in correcting defects which the program may expose in Seminole County students, according to Mrs. Lamb.

Local growers in touch with the California situation said they had been unable to determine the exact extent of damage, since the falling cold had not given growers long enough to give growers sufficient time for an accurate estimate.

Several Seminole County celery growers were inclined to believe that if any produce were left in the delta section, it would be of poor quality, since they pointed

New Efforts To Localize War Is Made

German Moroccan Incursion Is Said To Threaten Gibraltar And French Colony

Spurred more than ever by authoritative reports of a German Moroccan incursion threatening both the future of Gibraltar and the French colonial border, Great Britain and France made new efforts today to localize Spain's civil war.

They called for direct action to keep foreign arms and men from reaching combatants.

French officials announced emphatically they could never permit Germany to gain a foothold in Spanish Morocco where thousands of Germans were reported to have conducted a virtual military and commercial invasion.

France and Britain heard that German-supervised fortifications are going up at Ceuta to rival those of Gibraltar, 16 miles across the straits.

In Madrid, Fascist invaders drove Government troops farther back through the outskirts in a new drive to capture the capital. The battle was described by both sides as one of the bloodiest of the civil war.

Pelican Goes Amphibious; Enjoys Automobile Ride

President Asks New Money Of Congress; Child Labor Law Sped

One Against 403!

WASH.—President Roosevelt, unheeding a dispute over curbing the Supreme Court, made a second brisk move today to achieve NRA goals by seeking to speed ratification of a child labor amendment.

One Against 403!

In letters to governors and governors-elect of 19 states where legislatures meet this winter and spring, he asked favorable action on the proposal pending since 1924. Only 12 more states need to act to make it the 22nd amendment. Twenty-four states have ratified it.

"It is clearly indicated that child labor, especially in low-paid unskilled types of work, is increasing," the President wrote. "I am convinced that nation-wide, minimum standards are necessary and that a way should be found promptly to speed the ratification of child labor."

Simultaneously with planning new, anti-union moves, Congress sped toward the White House legislation to tighten the neutrality law by forbidding munition shipments to Spain and the President promptly signed it into law.

Homestead Forms Are Called For By Tax Assessor

Tax Assessor Sanford Doudney today announced that his office is prepared to receive applications for 1937 homestead exemptions.

Further, he said, returns on tangible and intangible personal taxes should be filed for the year. Widows' exemptions and veterans' exemptions also will be accepted.
