

## Mosquito Experts: Future Hopes Dim

Herald Staff Writer

Sanford may be in for some bad news next week when entomology experts from the University of Florida at Gainesville onfer with officials of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce on ways to solve the blind mosquito problem. The experts say there is no known way of eliminating the

midges, which are blown into downtown Sanford by the millions each year, and there are no known sources of federal grant money to finance a five to 10-year basic research program to find a way to get rid of the midges. I know of no federal program to do research on them," said-

Dr. Donald Hall, a mosquito expert at the University's Department of Entomology. Department chairman Fowden Maxwell and other members of the department will meet with chamber officials next Thursday. "We have no research base at this time to deal with the

problem," said Dr. Maxwell, "but there are some things that can

be explored if we can find the resources to do it." The entomology department works with the Institute of Food and Agricultural Science (IFAS), a consortium of university and government officials, which handles agricultural research in Florida.

"Even if money were available from the federal government, there are no answers to the problem of blind mosquitoes at this time," said Da. Hall. "To find an answer we'll need a long-term

basic research program that would take five to 10 years to accomplish. There are no short-term, easy answers." There is no known way to control midges except "to make in-

secticidal soup" of Lake Monroe, the entomologist said. Adult mosquitoes lay eggs which hatch at the lake bottom. The eggs hatch into larvae, which shed their external skeletons and become pupae. The pupae become winged adults, which rise from the lake and are blown by the millions into downtown Sanford. The winged adult lives less than 10 days. Since midges don't bite

or transmit disease, they are not considered a health hazard by the felieral or state governments. "You could try the National Institutes of Health or the military if they were regular (biting) mosquitoes," Dr. Hall said. "Butthose agencies haven't investigated the midge. "Frank Wilson, who directs the Polk County Mosquito Control District, explored the problem thoroughly last year, and he didn't

## Liddy: He'd Do It Again

WASHINGTON (AP) - The years in prison softened Gordon Liddy's voice, shrunk his physique, made him less cocky and overbearing. But they didn't change his view of Watergate: If his president asked, he'd do it again. "When the prince approaches his lieutenant, the proper response of the lieutenant to the prince is 'flat voluntas tua," Liddy said Thursday. The Latin phrase means:

"Thy will be done." Liddy, the Watergate planner, a lieutenant?
"Yes. I would not rank myself as a captain." It was Liddy's first day home and he devoted bours to interviews. He wanted to talk about the two federal hastitutions where he spent most of his 52 months im-But G. Gordon Liddy knows more about Watergate and

as said less about it than anyone else, so the questions A. I can, but I won't. Q. Can you tell us what you were looking for? A. I could, but I will not.

For choosing not to, Liddy got the stiffest prison sentence of any Watergate figure, 6-20 years, plus an extra 18 months for refusing to testify before a grand jury. Only resident Carter's intervention and the parole board's pproval got him out of prison now.

"I undertook willingly a risk," he said. "I knew what I was doing and I accept the consequences, good, bad or indifferent. There could have been some very favorable consequences for me. I would have accepted those without gainsaying them ... it's five years, it's just a chapter.



#### Mosquito War **Moving Ahead**

Thanks to the latest initiative by the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce, the blind mosquito war is on again. A task force has been formed and a key first step taken this week that we are sure will lead-once and for all-to a solution of this an-

Task force director John Krider and Chamber president Tom Hunt met with Seminole County Administrator Roger Neiswender on the matter. Out of the session came a little light.

First, we learned that officials of the University of Florida will be here Thursday to discuss the problem and perhaps help design a basic research program. This could lead to a search for federal funds to carry out such a program. That's a promising development.

Second, it was learned from Mr. Neiswender that the county commissioners also are interested in finding a solution to the blind mosquito problem.
"The commissioners will want to see a viable solution and what it would cost," he said. "I know they'd listen."

We'll take Mr. Neiswender at his word. It could just presage a change of approach by the county commission from the one hinted earlier by Commission Chairman Dick Williams.

Upon learning of the latest chamber effort, Chairman Williams was quick to repeat an old refrain: The blind mosquito problem, he declared, is a "localized problem."

Translated: Sanford—the mosquitoes breed here, so they're your problem.

We still disagree with this myopic view. That's why Mr. Neiswender's comments are so en-

couraging.
Mr. Neiswender said something else even more encouraging following his meeting this week with Messrs. Krider and Hunt: "We've got an investment with the courthouse here and we're in-

vesting further in the downtown area with the Mr. Neiswender hit the proverbial nail on the proverbial head. That's precisely what we noted

As the county seat for Seminole County, Sanford is in a different position than are other communities or municipalities. It cannot be shunned cavalierly in its efforts to obtain county funding or assistance with programs or projects.

The problem of drug abuse among adults in Seminole County is growing, those involved with the problem say. And, last year alone there were 65,000 individual prescriptions filled for such drugs as Valium, Librium and

half adult, according to statistics, Those involved with the problem sum it up this way:

Hodges, director of the Drug Action Committee of Seminole County. -"Ever since tranquilizers came on the scene there has been abuse. "Prescription drugs are a greater problem to women than alcohol," says Hodges, "while men more often use
