

# Mosquitoes sprayed

ORLANDO - An area of Central Florida near Walt Disney World is being sprayed to kill encephalitis-bearing mosquitoes. State and local health officials issued an alert on Wednesday after six test chickens showed high antibodies for Eastern equine encephalitis, a deadly virus that attacks the brain.

That form of encephalitis primarily strikes horses and wild birds, but it can be transmitted to humans, state health officials said. A similar brain disease is caused by St. Louis encephalitis, also carried by mosquitoes.

The sentinel chickens testing positive were kept by the state Department of Agriculture in cages near Walt Disney World. Spokeswoman Jane Adams said the resort conducts its own mosquito eradication program. An 8-square-mile area of Orange. Osceola and Polk counties is being sprayed by the

### Jewel thief killed

MIAMI BEACH - A jewel thief armed with a silencer on his handgun was killed and a policeman wounded in a bullet-punctuated chase.

Miami Beach officer Ernest Febbraio, 48, was in guarded but stable condition at Jackson Memorial Hospital after a bullet broke his collarbone, police spokesman Howard Zeifman said. The suspect's identity remained a mystery today. He was

killed a few blocks away from where Febbraio was wounded, police Sgt. Priscilla Grandage said. Febbraio had tried to stop the suspect when he was shot. Other officers tried again to stop the suspect and another officer saw him fire at Febbraio, who had pulled alongside the

getaway vehicle. Other officers continued the chase through an upscale neighborhood before the suspect lost control of his car and rammed it into a curb. He pointed a gun at officers, who shot him to death, police said.

# Mayor pleads guilty to corruption

MIAMI - Former Miami Beach Mayor Alex Daoud pleaded guilty to four more corruption-related counts, putting an end to the federal racketeering case against him.

On Wednesday, Daoud agreed he had accepted a \$5,000 bribe from former CenTrust Savings Bank Chairman David Paul in return for approving a private dock for Paul's oceanside

The former mayor also pleaded guilty to money laundering. tax evasion and obstruction of justice.

Paul is facing a 100-count federal criminal indictment this September in Miami because of his failed savings and loan. The charges involve some deals with former Lincoln Savings owner Charles Keating Jr. as well as with the rogue Bank of Credit and Commerce International.

# Tax increase proposed

BROOKSVILLE - Homeowners in 16 counties would pay an average \$11 more next year under a tax increase proposed by the Southwest Florida Water Management District officials. The 32.6 percent increase would be the largest ever imposed

by the district. District officials say the money is needed to help local

governments and other water users pay for changes required to solve the area's pressing water woes. The tax increase will come partly from an increase in the

districtwide millage rate and partly from tax increases levied by the district's eight basin boards, which finance local water projects. Depending where a homeowner lives, the tax bill for a \$100,000 home with a \$25,000 homestead exemption could rise by as little as \$8.55 or as much as \$21.38.

That same property owner now pays \$30 to \$40.

# State penalized

# A federal fine of \$122.4 million imposed for food stamp errors

TALLAHASSEE - The state has been fined \$122.4 million by the federal government for having the highest food stamp error rate in the country, but Florida gets to keep the cash.

Lt. Gov. Buddy MacKay, the acting head of the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services, said Wednesday the money would be spent on improving technology and fraud detection, reducing turnover among workers and increasing the numbers of cases reviewed.

All along, we've asked for mercy rather than justice and today we've received it." MacKay said. "We are grateful for their evenhanded and fair decision."

U.S. Agriculture Secretary Mike Espy, in a letter Tuesday to Gov. Lawton Chiles. agreed to allow Florida to "invest" the money in programs intended to bring down the 1992 error rate of 19.68 percent.

Federal dollars account for all of the money paid in benefits. The U.S. Department of Agriculture found \$205 million in overpayments and \$51.8 million in underpayments in Florida last year. Money

The 19.68 percent error rate compares to a national average of 10.69 percent, HRS spokeswoman Melanie Mowry confirmed Florida's was the highest in the country in

HRS will try to reduce the fine through negotiations with the U.S. Department of Agriculture by underscoring the effects Hurricanc Andrew had on the welfare system and the 85 percent growth in food

stamp cases over the past two years. Much of the problem can be traced to the \$173 million HRS computer, which caused problems in the conversion of food stamp cases from the old system to the new automated one. The computer has been blamed for errors in Medicald and Aid to Families with Dependent Children as well.

Other reasons for the food stamp error were inadequate training, low salaries among workers and Hurricane Andrew. which increased cases about 50,000 a month from September through November.

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services is examining errors in the AFDC program, which could result in further federal fines.



# HRS, labor can't seem to pay their bills on time

# By Associated Press

TALLAHASSEE - The state had to pay some \$500,000 in interest payments last year because some agencies didn't pay their bills on time.

The two tardiest departments were Health and Rehabilitative Services — the largest government agency in the nation outside the federal government - and Labor and Employment Security.

And the departments are getting worse, not better, according to Tom Clemons, deputy state comptroller.

"In the last two weeks we seem to have been just deluged with calls from vendors of HRS and Labor saying 'Why haven't these people been paying us?" he said.

When state agencies don't pay their bills within 45 days, they must pay I percent interest a month. The total last year for all of state

government came to about \$500,000. Clemons

In a recent six-month period, HRS and Labor racked up \$85,000 in interest - and that's sure to increase this quarter, he said. Jana Walling, who directs accounting and auditing for state Comptroller Gerald Lewis.

wrote to the two agencies last week to tell them their rate of late payments is getting worse. Fifteen percent of HRS' bills and 37 percent of

Labor's bills were overdue during the first two weeks of June.

Other state agencies were late on about 5 percent of their bills. Responding to Walling's letter, the chief of

Labor's Bureau of Financial Management said payments were slowed temporarily by switching to a new computer system.

Most of the complaints against HRS came from the Tampa and Pensacola areas.


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



# Furniture company may convert depot

SANFORD — The old train depot building at 212 W. First Street in downtown Sanford may be converted to a furniture manufacturing facility.

A request for conditional use approval is being presented tonight to the Sanford Planning and Zoning Commission.

The application has been submitted for P&Z consideration by Debra Torres of Deltona.

Torres could not be reached for comment, but the application form indicated she intends to manufacture custom made furniture, and utilize some of the large building for storing and warehouse space.

The property extends north from W. First Street along N. Myrtle Avenue, for an entire city block to Fulion Street.

Sanford's Director of Planning and Development, Jay Marder, is recommending approval of the conditional use request to permit manufacturing of custom made furniture. He is also recommending that a stipulation be placed on the approval to prohibit outdoor storage and display of materials and/or merchandise/

The second item listed on the agenda for ionight's P&Z meeting include a public hearing to consider a request for a waiver of a one year waiting period, for property at 2501 S. Sanford Avenue.

On Dec. 17, 1992, Laknan P. Singh had requested permission to establish a retail and wholesale auto dealership on the property. P&Z denied the request, and recommended that the city continue to prevent automobile dealer sales from being established on this segment of 25th Street,

The matter was appealed to the commission in February of this year, but the commission also denied the request, which prevented any similar request from beging made for a one year period.

Marder is recommending that the request to waive the once year waiting period be denied. "based on the fact that there does not appear to be any significant change of circumstances regarding the site."

The P&Z meeting will begin at 7 p.m., this evening in the commission chambers of Sanford City Hall, 300 N. Park Avenue.

Williams and the Lake Doctors violated FIFRA by applying the chemicals Direx and Karmex to aquatic areas when the labels on the chemicals specifically prohibits their use in aquatic applications.

The statement also alleges that they had instructed applicators to hide the aquatic use of Direx and Karmex in the treatment of aquatic areas.

According to a report released yesterday by the Frazier's office. Williams faces a maximum sentence of five years imprisonment, a \$250,000 fine, plus three years supervised release.

As head of Lake Doctors, Williams would also be subject to sentences given the company, which are listed as a maximum of six years imprisonment, a \$700,000 fine, and four years of supervised release.

Sentencing is scheduled for August 30.

Originally 33 counts were in-

cluded in the indictment by a federal grand jury in Orlando. At the time, the Middle District court Indicated Williams could have received a maximum term of 86 years in prison plus a \$4,.33 million find.

A partner in the firm, Albert Johnson Semago, 44, of Bradenton, was identified in the original report, as also being charged. Yesterday's an-

nouncement of the guilty plea from Williams made no mention of Semago.

In Sanford, Lake Doctors had been contracted by the city to maintain the aquatic cleanliness of Lake Carola in Ford Melon Park and Lake Gem. It has also handled treatment of ponds at the Mayfair Country Club golf

In Lake Mary, Lake Doctors have been under contract for monthly maintenance of the lake immediately adjacent to the city

When the indictments were first handed down in mid-May, spokesmen from the two cities spoke favorably about the Lake Doctors' work, and reported having no problems with their operation.

project in North Florida earlier this year by the fish commission. A lake restoration of Newnans Lake near Gainesville would cost between \$4.4 million and \$12.3

Newnans Lake, according to the feasibility study, is about 7,400 acres in size and has muck that averages about 11/2 feet in thickness. Lake Jesup is 10,000 acres in size and has muck that is many times thicker. Snyder said based on the Newnan's data, he estimated a "drawdown" of Lake Jesup could reach \$20 million, far more than the \$3.5 million to \$6.5 million anticipated for the project.

In a drawdown, water is pumped out of a lake, either partially or completely, to allow the bottom to solidify. In many cases, a portion of the muck along the shore is then removed to allow a clean sand bottom for fish spawning. The proceedure is usually effective for several years, then must be repeated.

Although wastewater discharge from several sewage treatment plants has been renutrients from time to time, causing algae blooms which consume oxygen in the water. suffocating fish.

A drawdown has been the focus of the cleanup effort, although a "marsh flow-way" has also been considered for the lake. In a flow-way system. water from tributaries and sometimes the lake itself is pumped to a marshland which "scrubs" the water clean of its nutrients.

One locally-popular cleanup concept was to restore the circulation through the lake from the St. Johns River. Lake old-timers believe that before the state road department filled in one of two lake connections in 1951 during construction of the State Road 46 causeway, water in the St. Johns would periodically rise and flow into the lake. When the river level would lower, lakewater would flow back into the river, flushing the

Correspondence from the Army Corps of Engineers and St. Johns River Water Management District suggests the flow restoration would have minimal impact to the overall lake quality.

# Label TV shows for violence?

Television networks have tentatively agreed to begin warning viewers when violent programs are about to be shown. Efforts are expected to get underway this fall.

Classifications regarding the amount of violence on a TV show are to be displayed at the beginning of the program, and in published listings as well.

The networks say they are bowing to public and congressional pressure to identify violent programs. They have scheduled a meeting in Los Angeles next month to discuss the situation.

While many people object to violence on TV, classifying programs will make little change in what is watched by viewers. The reason is the extent of programs in which violence is presented.

If we allow the government to control TV programming, it is a violation of our constitutionally guaranteed freedom of speech.

Labeling programs with violence could have a domino effect. In addition to motion picture re-runs and made-for-TV shows, there are many others in which death and destruction are depicted heavily.

Ratings may also eventually be required on TV news broadcasts which certainly have their share of violence. Real-life programs such as cop shows would be affected. Children's carteons also have their share of

In calling for the identification of violent programs, the aim is to reduce the amount of violence on the streets. In effect, the government is determining that TV is one of the major reasons for the increase in crime.

Some people enjoy watching a show depicting-violence. Labeling-oi-network-pro grams won't stop them. They can merely change channels to cable stations, which would not be required to identify the

There are two ways in which to approach the problem. Programs with violence could be restricted to late time periods, possibly not before 9 p.m. By that time, parents may be home and able to control the TV set.

Another approach, which may be a better answer, would be for the TV networks themselves to begin reducing the amount of violence shown. We see this move as the most logical solution.

# Bosnia not the 'problem from hell'

Christopher, in a forgivable burst of exasperation, called the Bosnian crisis a "problem from hell." The expression is a colorful one and deserves appropriate use, but Bosnia is the

The Bosnian crisis is just another Balkan fracas among close neighbors who hate each other for reasons centuries old. Mr. Christopher is annoyed because he can't stop the killing, but he will quickly learn that being the world's only superpower doesn't guarantee that everybody else will bow down before us.

There is, however, a real "problem from hell," and one can only hope that it is getting more attention behind the scenes than Mesars. Clinton and Christopher have vouchsafed it in public, I am referring to North Korea's flat refusal to permit U.N. inspectors to investigate the sites where we have reason to believe it is manufacturing nuclear weapons.

Such inspections are required of all nations that have signed the Nuclear Nonproliferation Treaty - of which North Korea is one. Not long ago, however, its aging dictator Kim Il-Sung blocked certain vital inspections, and followed that up by serving notice, as required under the treaty, that North Korea would withdraw from it in 90 days.

The Clinton administration professed to take

North Korea would

change its mind before the 90 days were up. Sure enough, after a few handholding sessions with U.S. and U.N. officials, the North Koreans allowed themselves to be talked into not repudlating the treaty after all. The world, or those parts of it in communion with Warren Christopher, heaved a sigh of re-

But, significantly, North Korea did not back down an Inch on its refusal to let U.N. inspectors investigate the key sites. We are left with a situation in which

What to do? The first thing that comes to mind is Israel's successful demolition (by bombing) of Iraq's almost-complete facility for the construction of nuclear weapons, more than a decade ago. There was nothing Iraq could do but grin and bear it

But any similar attack on North Korea's production facilities would, it is feared, instantly result in a full-scale military invasion of South Korea by Kim Il-Sung's powerful army. This prospect brings to mind the three painful years the United States spent fighting him in the early 1950s, at the cost of scores of thousands of American lives. Obviously, neither Bill Clinton personally nor the American people in general have any appetite for a replay of that bloody

# Stop re-lynching Bob Wallach

MEMO TO: U.S. Attorney General Janet SUBJECT: Surveillance Report - A Re-Lynching in-Progress.

On the off-shore Island of Manhattan, N.Y., a handful of natives are committing a bizarre legal atrocity: They are lynching a man they lynched once before. It is not a pretty sight.

The perpetrators work for you, in the office of the U.S. attorney for Manhattan. The victim of their re-lynching is a fellow named E. Robert Wallach, whose worst transgressions, as near as I can tell, are that he:

(1) Was a liberal Democrat who was a close friend of Edwin Meese III, President Reagan's attorney general: and (2) was a San Francisco attorney who dared act like a Washington attorney - that is, bragging about having a highly placed friend and occasionally opening an official door. Washingtonians call it lobbying: It's legal.

The government's six-year mishandling of the case has been condemned by virtually all who examine its facts - from liberal journalists, such as myself, to conservative jurists. such as former Judge Robert H. Bork. I know Wallach as a source, a friend and a man who was a chronic name-dropper, which is no

In 1988, Steven Brill wrote in The American Lawyer a lengthy critique of prosecutorial abuse, entitled: "The Lynching of Bob Wallach." Later, Bork found the facts so outrageous that he handled, pro bono. Wallach's appeal of the conviction that resulted from his first lynching.

Judge for yourself. In 1987, then-U.S. Attorney Rudolph Giuliani, anxious to jump into electoral politics, wanted to boost his reputation by bagging Meese in the scandal of Wedtech, the Bronx, N.Y., tool and die company; so he tried to use Wallach as a legal tool to get Meese.

Giuliani indicted Wallach for "racketeering," then offered to reduce the charges if Wallach would provide evidence of wrongdoing by Meese in the case. But Wallach said he could not do that. So Wallach was prosecuted.

What racketeering? Just this: Wallach wrote two thank you letters to Wedtech officials for payment he labeled as legal work for their shipyard. He did write hundreds of pages of memos on other legal work for Wedtech. Wallach billed the shipyard account because.

he said. Wedtech officials asked him to, saying it was where their legal funds were available.

Lawyers in respected firms say they routinely bill that way if clients so request. But Giuliani prosecuted Wallach for defrauding Wedtech stockholders for the way his billing of just \$425,000 might have affected the price of stock. If Wallach had written a nonspecific bill "for services rendered" there'd be no case. The prosecution contends Wallach's main value to Wedtech was his friendship with Meese which is no crime.

For what amounts to spitting on the sidewalk, Wallach was convicted and sentenced to six years in jail. However, the conviction was set aside on appeal after the prime witness against him (who got a light sentence in exchange for his testimony) was

discovered to have perjured himself on his own gambling. The prosecutor, Assistant U.S. Attorney Baruch Weiss. was personally stung by appellate implications that he'd known of the perjury yet permitted it. Now Weiss is trying Wallach again for the same acts - this time calling it fraud and conspiracy.

Weiss is down to one prime witness. convicted ex-Wedtech official Mario Moreno, who has bargained for lenlency. The other day, in U.S. district

# Judge Ginsburg passes true test

The Senate Judiciary Committee assembled, Sen. Joseph Biden, D.Del., presiding, to advise and consent on the matter of the nomination of Ruth Bader Ginsburg as an associate justice of the United States Supreme Court.

Sen. Biden: Welcome, Judge Ginsburg. We have all reviewed your record as a student at Cornell, Harvard Law and Columbia Law: as a professor at Rutgers and Columbia: as an attorney arguing civil

rights cases before the Supreme Court; as a U.S. appellate judge here in Washington. Let me say, before we begin, that you have had a brilliant career. Judge Ginsburg:

Biden: There are a few things, however. which are not reflected in the record that I think we ought to discuss before we vote on your nomination. Let's hear it straight from the horse's mouth: Do you now have, or have you ever had, a cleaning lady for



whom you neglected to pay Social Security taxes?

Ginsburg: No. sir.

Biden: Lawn maintenance person, driver, baby sitter, paper boy, pizza delivery person? Ginsburg: No. sir.

Biden: Thank you. Sen. Thurmond?

Sen. Strom Thurmond, R-S.C.: Judge Ginsburg, I'm gonna' git right to it. While doing a background check on you, the FBI turned up information which leads one to believe you may have once tooted your horn in a hospital quiet zone. Any truth to that,

Ginsburg: I have no recollection of such a thing, senator.

Sen. Ted Kennedy, D-Mass.: Judge, have you ever torn off any mattress tags, Jaywalked, walked on sand dunes or taken more than two carry-on bags on an airplane?

Ginsburg: Give me a minute, senator. I seem to recollect walking across the middle of a street once at one in the morning when there was no traffic. That's about it.

Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah: Judge Ginsburg. you have a truly admirable track record, but these are important matters, so please bear with us. I have in my hand an FBI report which contains the statements of several of your neighbors, all of whom say you are a first-class human being. But one of them, an elderly gentleman who lives by himself, says he has watched you through his binoculars as you put out your trash. And he says you occasionally put your aluminum cans and glass jars in the regular trash, instead of the recycling bin. What do you have to say about

Ginsburg: I would say the gentleman is in error. I am a steady and fatthful recycler. scnator.

Sen. Howard Metzenbaum, D-Ohio: Have you ever used a handicap toilet stall? Ginsburg: No. sir.

Sen. Alan Simpson, R-Wyo.: Sorry to be a burr under your saddle. Judge Ginsburg, but my staff assistants have developed information from three different sources that you sometimes take more items than allowed through the express lane at the grocery store. Your response?

Ginsburg: Give me a moment, please, while I collect my thoughts. Yes, Senator Simpson. I will admit that on two occasions that I can recall in the past 20 years, I have gone through the 10-item line with 11 things in my basket. But that's if you count three cans of soup as three separate items.

Simpson: This could be serious. I may have to reconsider my previous endorsement of your nomination.

# U.S. free trade pact threatened

WASHINGTON - A U.S. free rade pact with Mexico and Canada, already having problems in Congress, faces new obstacles because of a court ruling that says its environmental impact first must be exam-Ined in detail.

The Clinton administration immediately said it would appeal U.S. District Judge Charles R. Richey's decision Wednesday on a lawsuit that had been brought by groups concerned that the trade agreement would hurt the environment, primarily along the Mexican border.

"We believe that the court's decision is not in the public Interest," U.S. Trade Representative Mickey Kantor told reporters following the judge's ruling. He said the administration would press ahead with submitting the agreement to Congress for ratification, as is allowed under the ruling.

Treasury Secretary Lloyd Bentsen said if Richey's decision were to stand it "could result in an inordinate delay" in getting the treaty ratified. The agreement; already approved by Canada, is scheduled to go into effect at the end of the year

Some lawmakers suggested that the court ruling may have been a fatal blow for the agreement. "My fear is that NAFTA is finished unless this ruling is overturned," said Sen. John Danforth, R-Mo.

An environmental impact assessment could take anywhere from six months to severalaccording to various experts. But even a six-month delay might cause the administration to lose momentum in gaining congressional approv-

The ruling "slows NAFTA down to a wagon train pace just when the White House was fixing to gun the engine and try

to run this thing through the Capitol," said Sen. Byron Citizen Action and Friends of the Dorgan, D-N.D., an opponent of the trade accord.

The administration has sought to deal with environmental concerns raised by the pact through a series of side agreements to the main accord before ratification.

But Richey in a 23-page optnion said the agreement negotiated last year among the three nations violates the National Environmental Policy Act because it lacks a formal environmental impact statement.

He ordered the Clinton administration to prepare a such a statement and said the environmental review "is essential ... to assess the present and future environmental consequences" of the agreement which would eliminates trade barriers in North America over the next 15

J. Michael McCloskey of the Sierra Club, one of three environmental groups that filed suit. called the judge's order a "crittcal decision" that will elevate the importance of environmental considerations in future trade

The Sterra Club, along with Earth, filed the lawsuit because of concern about the agreement's impact on the environment, especially along the courtriling. U.S. Mexican border where there already are severe problems with air and water pollution.

"I was a naive kid from New Jersey," Aqueno said from New Orleans, where he is now a performance artist. "I was in a state of shock, I was shattered."

He was one of hundreds investigated during the reign of the notorious Johns Committee from 1956 to 1965. Today, the vell of secreey that has shrouded it is to be lifted when 45 boxes of its files are made public.

Aqueno figures he was set up. He had picked up a young man at the local Greyhound bus station and driven to nearby woods when suddenly his car was blocked by two police cruisers.

He was fingerprinted and interrogated by investigators looking for names of other homosexuals. The next day, he was summarily dismissed from Florida State. He wasn't charged with any crime.

Gay activists say release of the records is especially important now that Florida, Colorado, Oregon and other states are being targeted by groups who want to ban laws protecting homosexuals from discrimination.

"People need to take a close look at the Johns Committee witch hunt," said Jeff Peters, a lawyer who heads a group called Floridians Respect Everyone's Equality, or FREE, "It should give people pause - do they want this kind of thing to happen in 1993?"

The Florida Legislative Investigative Committee was bern in the era of Sen. Joseph McCarthy's 1950s hunt for communists. Nicknamed for its chairman, state Sen. Charley Johns of Starke, the panel first tried to find communists in the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

But the NAACP fought back, winning a U.S. Supreme Court decision that prevented the committee from obtaining its membership lists.



# Feds Nazi-hunting unit is no stranger to controversy

WASHINGTON - Government Nazi hunters who accused John Demjanjuk of operating the gas chamber at a World War II death camp never have shied from controversy as they doggedly pursued those involved in the Holocaust.

They've embarrassed governments, been accused of presenting false evidence and been vilified by children trying to refute charges that their aging, respectable parents had anything to do with the torture and murder of Jews.

Through it all, the Office of Special Investigations also has had some brilliant successes and solved the mystery of how notorious war criminals Klaus Barble and Joseph Mengele eluded capture after the war. even revealing unpleasant truths about U.S. actions.

The efforts to identify Demtantuk, a 73-year-old retired Cleveland auto worker, has generated the most controversy about the way the Justice Department unit has conducted itself.

Demjanjuk, sentenced to die in Israel for crimes against humanity, has steadfastly maintained he was the victim of mistaken identity

A federal judge in Cincinnati appointed to review the case by an appellate court concluded Wednesday that there was now "substantial doubt" that Demjanjuk was "Ivan the Terrible" of the Treblinka concentration camp

But the judge said there was still sufficient evidence Demjanjuk had been a guard at another Nazi death camp in Poland

The Judge, Thomas A. Wiseman Jr., found that prosecutors didn't act in bad faith. "Although they were blinded to what we may now perceive to be the truth, they were not willfully blind. Wiseman said.

The Justice Department said it was pleased by Wiseman's recommendation that the matter be closed. But the Nazihunting unit faces another accusation of wrongdoing still unresolved.

The department's internal disciplinary unit is continuing to investigate allegations by Los Angeles stockbroker Radislav Artukovic that OSI presented false evidence that his father was a Nazi war criminal in Croatia.

Andrija Artukovic was extradited to Yugoslavia on the basis of evidence gathered by the Nazi-hunting unit that he committed war crimes while interior minister of the Nazi-puppet regime in Croatia. He died in 1988 in prison.

Since it was set up in 1979, the OSI has identified 88 people as Nazi collaborators. Of those, 45 have been stripped of citizenship 37 were either deported, extradited to another country or left volun-

A number of people have died and the rest of the cases are still in litigation

In one of its most stunning successes, OSI used a laser to lift the fingerprint of an accused war criminal from a 1940s-era document. The evidence was used to rebut the accused's contention that his signature had been forged.

Due to a windfall of information from archives in former Soviet-bloc countries, the unit

currently is investigating 400 people. Last year, it filed charges against 11 people, the most in a single year.

In 1987, the unit accused former U.N. Secretary General **Kurt Waldheim of complicity** in Nazi persecution while a young army officer.

At the time of the allegations Waldheim was president of Austria. Nevertheless, the Reagan administration placed his name on a watch list of persons barred from entering this country.

OSI investigations also produced revelations that embarrassed the U.S. govern-

OSI concluded that after World War II, U.S. intelligence recruited Barbie - a Gestapo chief known as the butcher of Nazi-occupied Lyons - as an anti-Communist spy and helped him flee to Bolivia to escape prosecution by France.

The release of OSI's report in 1983 was accompanied by an unusual apology to France by the U.S. government.

Last year, the Justice Department released a longawaited OSI report documenting how U.S. forces twice mistakenly released Nazi war criminal Joseph Mengele from custody.

Mengele, known as the "Angel of Death" for medical experiments he performed on children at the Auschwitz concentration camp, was believed responsible for sending 400,000 people, mostly Jews, to the gas chamber.

With the help of U.S. intelligence, the report concluded. Mengele fled Europe. Mengele lived in Brazil for 18 years until his death in 1979.



# Hill named Magic coach

ORLANDO - Matt Guokas, who coached the Orlando Magic to the NBA's most improved record last season, was replaced Wednesday by assistant Brian Hill.

The surprise move was announced less than four hours before the team added a player expected to help Shaquille O'Neal lead the club to championship contention.

Guokas, the only coach in the Magic's four-year history, was reassigned to the front office as vice president of basketball development. He insisted it's a job he sought and that the move was not related to his feelings about the team's draft

"People close to me asked, 'why now,'" said Guokas, who led the Magic to a four-year record of 111-217, including a 41-41 finish last season. "It's just time."

The Magic originally planned to announce the change July 8, but adjusted the timetable after ESPN reported that Hill, 45, would take over. "Rather than trying to play some charade.

which is not our style, we felt it was better to put

everything on the table," said Bob Vander Weide, Magic vice president of basketball operations. Guokas, 49, was fired in 1988 after 21/2 seasons as coach of the Philadelphia 76ers. He was hired by the Magic in 1989 and led the team to records

of 18 64, 31 51, 21 61, 41-41, The team's 20-game improvement last season was the best in the NBA and was inspired by the arrival of O'Neal, the first pick in the 1992 draft. Orlando defied the odds by winning the draft lottery again, but the front office and coaching staff reportedly engaged in a tug-of-war over what

to do with the top pick this time. "There are still some differences of opinion," Guokas said Tuesday. "We're not on the same page yet. That's healthy at this point. It's good to have different ideas on these things. But it might not be so good if it's still that way Wednesday

night. Guokas, Vander Weide and general manager Pat Williams all said the draft had nothing to do with the decision.

Vander Weide said he first discussed the possibility of moving the coach to the front office while Guokas was negotiating an extension of his contract last year. The subject came up again over lunch in Chicago three weeks ago.

"I said when we hired Matty that I couldn't think of a better coach for an expansion team.

And, he could have continued if he wanted to,' Williams said.

'He's gotten us through some rough years. You look at the other expansion teams and they've been through two or three coaches," the general manager added. "He could have taken us to the next level ... But I think he, as he approaches 50, thought this was a good transition."

Hill was a Magic assistant for three years after serving in the same capacity with the Atlanta Hawks for four years. Before joining the pros, he was the coach at Lehigh for eight years and an assistant at Lehigh, Montelair State and Penn

"He has paid his dues and is ready to step forward," Williams said, "He brings experience, knowledge and teaching ability to the job."

Hill committed to a three-year contract, while Guokas' new agreement with the club is for five



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

# Ear surgery blocks hearing loss

DEAR DR. GOTT: My son is beta-blocker because of your scheduled to have his tonsils and adenolds removed soon and cartubes put in. I've read that tubes can lead to a hearing loss further down the line. What's your

?noiniqo DEAR READER: I'm in favor of PE (pressure-equalizing) tubes in youngsters with repeated middle ear infections. The reason why some children are especially prone to such infections is unknown. But their lives are made miserable by the pain and hearing loss that accompanies these infections.

PE tubes, which are tiny plastic tubes inserted through each eardrum, relieve pressure and, in fact, preserve licaring that would otherwise be lost from the infectious. At the time the PE tubes are inserted to short operation under general anesthesta), otolaryngologists usually remove all or part of the lymph glands (tonsils and adenoids) that may block the natural vents (Eustachian tubes). which connect the middle-ear chamber to the area behind the

If your doctor has advised the surgery, have it done. Your son's hearing may actually be spared by the procedure.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've been taking blood pressure medicine, and my readings have been stable at around 110/70, My heart rate is in the 50s and 40s. Lately, though, I've felt faint. have had occasional syncope and suffer from ice cold extremities. What causes this and what should I do for control?

DEAR READER: You are over-medicated. The drug you are taking (which I'll guess is a

slow pulse) has done too good a job. Your blood pressure is much Too low; 140/80 would be more appropriate. This low, blood pressure will cause you to faint or feel lightheaded .. and. because of slow circulation, may lead to cold extremities, as well.





Because writers love to use deals in which taking a tempting finesse is fatal to the contract. However, when a vital finesse does work, you must be in a position to take advantage - as in today's deal.


South's sequence, an artificial two-club opening followed by a two-no-trump rebid, showed a balanced 23-24 points.

West led the club six: two, ace, five. Back came the club four. South, trying to generate a second dummy entry, put up the queen; but West defended well. playing low. He knew South had the club seven because if East had had the seven and four

remaining, he would have returned the seven, not the four. South had seven tricks.

Needing two more diamond with the king and returned the diamond 10. Now South had no way of generating a ninth trick.

Let's go back to trick one. Assuming the club-six lead is fourth-highest, when East plays the ace. West is marked with the king. South should unblock the queen under the ace, ensuring that the club jack will be a dummy entry. Now if East switches to spades, declarer wins in hand, cashes the diamond ace and uses dummy's cutries to play twice toward his Q-J of diamonds. If instead the defenders continue clubs or switch to hearts, declarer takes two diamond finesses.
