The Second Sarajevo

It was twenty years ago today that Franz Ferdinand, Austrian archduke of the famous line of Hapsburg princes, went down from Vienna to Serbia on a "goodwill" mission and there in Sarajevo, in the presence of thousands of people, was first bombed, and later shot to death by a youthful student, Gavrilo Princep, thus precipitating the World War.

It is difficult to imagine today any group of nations firing at each other's throats over the death of an archduke. It would be like expecting the men of this country to face shot and shell, to lie in mud-filled, rat-infested trenches, to run their long sharp bayonets through somebody else's stomach, simply because an international banker had been killed.

But things were different in those days. An Austrian archduke was somebody. Austria demanded an apology, and retribution. Serbia apologized but insisted on the administration of justice in her own way. Austria declared war. Serbia took up the quarrel and ordered the mobilization of her troops. Germany declared war on Russia and moved her troops toward the Belgian border. France and then England, declared war on Germany. The big stretch was on.

While it is unthinkable today that the murder of anyone, much less an aristocrat, could cause so much excitement, it can hardly be denied that a match from another box would start a similar conflagration. Nations seldom go to war for the same reason, but neither do they have any difficulty in finding something to fight about when all other conditions are favorable. We once fought Spain because a defective magazine on the battleship Maine sent it to the bottom of the bay.

The world awaits today the second Sarajevo. It may be the elections in the Saar next year, or a collision between Russian and Japanese soldiers on the Manchurian border, or a German train wreck in the Polish Corridor, or the crash of a French plane spying among the Italian Alps, or the sinking of an English gunboat off Shanghai, or—who knows? an increasingly bitter exchange of diplomatic notes on the subject of war debts.

However this may be, one cannot escape the conclusion that the world today is ripe for another war. Our distracted statesmen are energetically conducting an impractical campaign of "saber-rattling," we believe they need to call it, or "thumbing your nose," in modern parlance. Ignoring the cries of taxpayers, political leaders are building up the armaments of the world to a fighting pitch. Disregarding the benefits of international cooperation, the various nations mark their boundaries with barbed-wire entanglements.

The tinder is ready. There are plenty of dry logs to pile on once the flame has begun to flicker. All that is needed is a match. Who will supply the second Sarajevo?

UNCLE SAM IN BUSINESS

The tide of American thought on the complementary ideas of government in business and business in government swings back and forth periodically. It will be remembered that a poll taken at the time of the election of Hoover to determine reasons why people had voted for him revealed that one of the strongest reasons was that he was a trained business man and would introduce business methods into the conduct of the government.

Mr. Hoover answered the description. He had been engaged in some of the biggest businesses in the world and had displayed much business capacity. He had been for eight years in charge of the Department of Commerce, the branch of the government having most to do with American business.

The Roosevelt administration represented another swing. Franklin Roosevelt never had been a business man. He was a combination of country gentleman and politician—something approaching the type which rules the nation in its earlier days. Jefferson, for example, was of that time.

With Roosevelt, there came into office the Brain Trust. This appeared on the surface at least, to be the induction into office of the precise opposite of the business man type. Avowedly the Tugwells, Molays, the Mordecais, and the Landises, were theorists. Professor Warren, the author of the gold devaluation, was typical. All had been in business.

Yet it is astonishing to note that never before in its entire history has the United States been so thoroughly and extensively in business as under the direction of this very Brain Trust. Uncle Sam has become landlord and merchant, money lender and promoter. He has gone into business enterprises on a scale never before approached.

Eugene S. Matthews, chairman of the State Railroad Commission, was returned to office over Lester J. Wells of Tallahassee in one group contest, while Jerry W. Carter, former State Hotel Commissioner, was given a landslide over State Senator Herbert P. Caro of Pensacola, in the other commission contest.

Matthews had 83,809 compared with 74,218 for Wells, and Carter 105,095 to 60,107 for Caro.

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Darrow Completes NRA Investigation And Quits His Job

(Continued From Page One) ushers not to return to Tennessee. Meanwhile at Chattanooga, Sam Campbell, Jr., president of the Campbell Oil Company, resigned as a member of the State Code Authority; took down his Blue Eagle and told his employees they would have to work 61 hours a week instead of the code limit of 48 and then changed his mind.

Campbell charged his action was forced because "a majority of the big oil companies over the country have violated provisions of the petroleum code and my company has suffered from this unfair competition."

"The government apparently has made no effort to enforce the fair practice agreement of the petroleum code," he added.

Late in the day, Campbell put his Blue Eagle up again and announced NRA officials had promised an investigation of the unfair practices he complained of. His employees also were returned to the code week of 48 hours.

Harriman hosiery mill officials blamed "persecution" by the NRA for closing of the mill here Monday, which put 653 employes out of work.

The mill's Blue Eagle was removed several months ago on charges that it refused to bargain collectively with employes. After long negotiations, the mill refused two points of a proposal by the NRA under which its Blue Eagle would be restored.

Those points involved re-employment of union workers who have been on strike. The mill charged in refusing that it would be forced to

discharge loyal workers to make room for the strikers. City officials moved to settle the controversy here yesterday. City council decided to send NRA Administrator Hugh Johnson a telegram asking for authority to appoint a committee of five with full authority to act. Mayor D'Armand said he was in favor of acceptance by the mill of the two disputed points in the NRA proposal.

NARCOTIC RING FLOODING U. S. VIA HONDURAS

Rise in Smuggling Revealed By Agent Of League Of Nations

NEW YORK, June 28.—A dangerously increasing flow of narcotics into the United States from the Central American republic of Honduras was described here Monday by Stuart Jenkinson Fuller, assistant chief of the Division of Far Eastern Affairs, Department of State, who returned to New York on the United States liner Leviathan. Mr. Fuller, who has been at Geneva for sessions of the League of Nations advisory committee on opium, said agents in Honduras are forging export certificates, buying large quantities of narcotics and are shipping most of the contraband into the United States.

In the last eighteen months, according to Mr. Fuller, Honduras has imported enough morphine to supply the legitimate needs of her population for the next hundred years. At least 100 kilograms, about 220 pounds, of morphine alone has been bought in Europe through the use of forged certificates during the last year and a half, Mr. Fuller stated. All of this narcotic has been sent to Honduras, then smuggled into the United States for illicit retail distribution to addicts, he said.

In its war on opium the League of Nations has uncovered alarming information concerning the growing use of heroin throughout the world, said Mr. Fuller. This drug, a hemp derivative, is grown more extensively in the United States than in any other part of the world, and is commonly known by the Spanish name "marimari," he said. The committee will delve into this situation when it meets at Geneva next November, according to Mr. Fuller.

International cooperation in policing the drug traffic has made it more difficult, but there are no indications yet that the traffic has been reduced appreciably, Mr. Fuller said. Illegal manufacture of morphine has increased greatly in China during the last year, he said, with most of the drug plants being operated by Europeans for

just as well in lots of small factories as in a few big ones," he said. Concerning unemployment insurance and old age pensions as substitutes for the present method of federal relief through handouts to the states, Mr. Hopkins said the President's message spoke for itself. Mr. Hopkins said he was not concerned with the details of old age pension and unemployment insurance system. It is not a matter of great importance, he said, how they are financed and what unit of government administers them.

He expressed similar unconcern about the set-up of a long range public works program. "Public works should be put on a long-time basis," he said. "They must be integrated with the economic situation and the needs of individuals. Whether this is done by the federal government, state or county is not so important. There should be the capacity to create any 1,000,000 jobs at one time and 2,000,000 at another, as they are needed." The unemployment insurance

system should be such that it pays benefits to every able-bodied head of a family who cannot get work, Mr. Hopkins said. Mr. Hopkins estimated that Congress left him with resources of \$1,020,000,000 to take care of the unemployed and destitute until it again convenes. He said he was of the opinion that this would be sufficient. In addition he has \$525,000,000 for relief in the drought areas, where 527,000 families now are on relief rolls.

1859 CLIPPING RECORDS BIRTH OF OCTUPLETS

Mother Of 2 Sets Of Twins Had 8 More Children Item Says

JEFFERSON, Ohio, June 28.—Birth of quintuplets to Mrs. Olivia Deane at Corbell, Ont., recently caused an international sensation. But this multiple birth won't sink into insignificance beside one that occurred south of here seventy-five years ago.

The story came to light recently in an old scrapbook which contains a clipping from the New York Tribune, dated Aug. 4, 1859, from Johnson, Trumbull county, Ohio.

"On the 2nd day of August," the clipping reads, "Mrs. Timothy Bradley gave birth to eight children—three boys and five girls. They are all living and healthy, but quite small."

"Mr. B's family is increasing fast. He was married six years ago to Eunice Mowery, who weighed 273 pounds on the day of their marriage. She has given birth to two pairs of twins and now eight more, making twelve children in six years. It seems strange, but nevertheless true, Mrs. B. was a twin of three, her mother and father both being twins and her grandmother the mother of five pairs of twins. "Mrs. B. has named her boys after noted and distinguished men

—one after the Hon. Joshua R. Giddings (Civil War congressman), who has given her a splendid medal; one after the Rev. Hon. Elijah Champlin, who gave her a deed to fifty acres of land; and the other after James Johnson, esq., who gave her a cow.

"Mr. Bradley says it is profitable to have twins, as the neighbors have clothed the brothers ever since they were born. Mr. B. is a poor, industrious laborer, who says he will not part with any of his children while he is able to work.

St. Louis Wins Easily From N. Y. Giants

ST. LOUIS, June 28.—(AP)—Brother Paul Dean registered his third victory of the season over the world champion New York Giants Tuesday when the St. Louis Cardinals went on a hitting rampage to take the third game of the series, 13 to 7. The triumph was Dean's tenth of the season as compared to only one setback.
