Mr. Dawson stated that a PWA project has been approved by the President of the United States to build a green house in Sanford which when completed will be turned over to the Florida Experimental Stations at Gainesville for use by federal and state agricultural research workers who will attempt to solve the many problems of the truck grower.

He added that it is just possible that a portion of the green house could be allotted to the County Agent or his representative at such times when not being used by other workers for the purpose of propagating ornamental plant material. "Please remember," Mr. Dawson requested, "that this is merely a proposal and that the subject has not been discussed with those in authority."

There was a general discussion of how seed and cuttings could be furnished by Garden Club members and after being propagated the plants would be distributed to Sanford people free or at a nominal price. Dry Ice Well Owned By U. S. Out In Utah

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13. (AP)—The federal government owns a well of "dry ice" and has signed a lease for its development.

Secretary Ickes said that the well, producing almost pure carbon dioxide gas, was discovered in Carbon county, Utah, in 1924. Ickes said the lessee, the Farnham Domes Petroleum Company, and the operating company, the Carbon Dioxide & Chemical Company, believed the product could be shipped for use instead of ice in refrigerator cars.

The primary area, 559 acres, will bring the federal government a percent royalty. The secondary acreage, which is nineteen times as large, will bring in royalties ranging from 18 1/2 percent to 33 1/2 percent, depending upon production. Ickes said about 1,000,000 cubic feet of gas could be drawn from the 3,144 feet deep well.

public liability insurance as well. The Continental now has the City's automobile liability insurance.

Commissioner W. A. Laffer expressed the opinion that Sanford does not need public liability insurance, as in 20 years there has been only one claim against the City for damages and that was settled with the \$12 purchase of a pair of spectacles. This proposal that the workman's compensation insurance could be written if the City would also buy the public liability insurance which the Commissioners said the City does not need brought forth Commissioner Rhinholser's expressed opposition to "sweetening the pot." It also brought from Commissioner Vivian A. Speer a motion that the letters from the insurance companies, or copies of them, be sent the attorney general of the state and to the state insurance commission. The motion was passed without a dissenting vote.

Mayor T. L. Dumas made the observation, during the discussion, that the state fixes the premiums on workman's compensation insurance, but that a municipality cannot force an insurance company to write a policy if the company decides the rate is too low. "So what?" he said.

plied by Dunn showing Clearwater was charged \$5873 plus \$38 for expenses for the New York firm of Thomson, Wood & Hoffman; \$500 plus \$767 for L'Eglise & Shands, Florida firm; \$600 plus \$92 expenses for still another lawyer and the share of \$27,750 general fees for Thomson, Wood & Hoffman.

Dunn also admitted \$2500 had been paid J. C. Clements, Fort Myers lawyer, for lobbying in the state legislature, this amount being assessed against holders of the bonds of Lakeland, and Wilcox said "we expect to show still more payments to Clements."

The Fort Myers man yesterday admitted he had received \$6067 from bondholders committees in Sanford, St. Petersburg and West Palm Beach to lobby at the 1931 and 1933 sessions of the Legislature.

Simons testified he "approved" the payment to Clements, but said his own work had to do only with collecting and gathering of information. He denied any political activity.

Dying Pilot Saves Ship And Passengers

BAKERSFIELD, Calif., Nov. 12.—Fighting a falling heart in mid-air Capt. Donald Buckman, 34-year old Army pilot, raced 100 miles against death last night to bring to safety three passengers in a transport plane.

Capt. Buckman, air service supply officer stationed at March Field, Riverside, Calif., died a few minutes after he landed his plane. Physicians said death was due to heart disease and that he suffered an attack while in the air.

Capt. Buckman, stocky, heavy-set and his face twisted with pain, stepped out of the plane and collapsed in the arms of airfield attendants.

"I'm hurt," he gasped. Attendants carried him into the airport hangar, where he died.

Passengers in the plane, which took off from March Field yesterday afternoon, apparently were not aware the flier had been stricken until he brought the plane down.

Capt. Buckman said he had been seized with a pain in the region of his heart when he was over the Mojave Desert, about half the distance from March Field.

His body was taken back to Riverside by Army airplane.

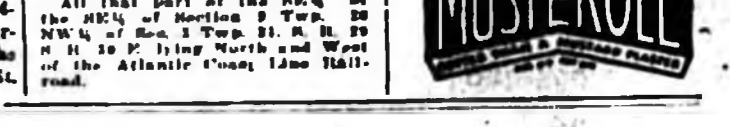

Forecasts Of Weather To Be Made Locally

5 Or 6 Stations Are To Be Located In Seminole County, Dawson Is Advised

Seen As Greatest Aid To Growers

Frost Warnings Have Never Before Been Made In This State

Frost warning service, long the exclusive property of California fruit and vegetable growers, is to be extended to Florida the first of December, and Seminole County producers will receive immediate and correct information from weather forecasting stations to be located in this county.

Five or six temperature taking stations will be set up in various sections of Seminole County and two or three of these will be forecasting stations. County Agent C. R. Dawson was advised today the information coming from Eckley S. Ellison, meteorologist in charge of the new frost reporting service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Gainesville. Mr. Ellison asked Mr. Dawson to locate the stations, and the latter will map the producing sections and indicate on it where they should be placed.

Temperature readings and weather observations will be made at all the stations, and forecasts will be made from two or three of them. Mr. Ellison advised the farm agent.

Mr. Dawson said today he is pleased with the extension of the department of Agriculture to establish so many of the new weather reporting stations in this section, as it will enable the farmers to receive prompt and correct forecasts as to weather conditions that might be expected.

Foe Of New Deal Wins Election In Bankers' Session

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 14.—A bitter critic of the New Deal won an executive office in the American Bankers Association in a clear-cut fight yesterday between friends and foes of the national administration. He is Orval W. Adams, vice president of the Utah State National Bank of Salt Lake City, who wants bankers to declare an embargo on government bonds to halt the "reckless spending" of federal money.

Adams' opponent, E. G. Bennett, president of the First Security Company of Oregon, Utah, a liberal who supports President Roosevelt, withdrew from the race. That ended an election fight that was forcing the bankers to vote their judgment on the A. D. administration.

Adams and Bennett were candidates for second vice president, who will succeed to the presidency in 1937 under the A. B. A.'s rotation system of office. Bennett won the endorsement of the non-lobbying committee, but Adams' friends nominated him from the floor yesterday, precipitating the first election fight since 1912.

Tremors Felt In Sanford, St. Augustine And Palatka

Described in Associated Press dispatches today as a "new wrinkle in the weather situation in the Sunshine State," a miniature earthquake was felt in Florida last night. It was more noticeable in St. Augustine and Palatka, but it was also noted in Sanford.

Mrs. Wallace W. Wright, living on Mellowville Avenue, said she distinctly felt the tremors between 10:15 and 10:30 o'clock last night. The tremors lasted about 10 seconds, Mrs. Wright reported, but they were not of sufficient intensity to do any damage.

Dispatches from St. Augustine report that two brief earth tremors confined to a small section in the northern part of Florida were felt at about 10:30 o'clock last night.

Palatka, west of St. Augustine, reported the shocks were felt there. Other points in the interior of the state and along the coast stated the disturbance did not reach them.

No damage was reported in the affected area.

The quakes came in two waves—the second the most severe. People hurried into the streets as the heavier shock came. Authorities began inquiries to ascertain if some unreported damage had occurred.

'Boy-Fact' Survey Is To Be Made By Boy Scout Council

Interesting More Boys In Scouting Is Aim Of Census

Complete census of all the boys in Seminole County is to be made by the Boy Scout District Council with the aim of increasing membership in Boy Scout or other activities. The census is called a "boy-fact" survey, and will be conducted in the schools, beginning tomorrow. It is to be done under the direction of Arthur Brannan, chairman of the council, with the co-operation of the schools.

Blanks circulated in the schools will be filled out by the boys, who will write in their names, home address, school and class, and church or Sunday school affiliation. Boy Scouts receiving the blanks will note their troop or patrol membership, and other information. Each boy will also be asked to name the most outstanding man in the church he attends and to tell why he makes the selection, and to express an opinion as to whether the man named would be a good leader for a group of boys and why.

Wilcox Closes First Probe Of Bond Situation

Congressman Asserts Adjusters Show No Regard For Actual Security Holder's

MIAMI, Nov. 14.—(AP)—Making the charge that a few bond houses control self-constituted municipal bondholders' protective committees that showed no proper regard for actual owners and exercised unlimited powers for themselves and others, Congressman J. Mark Wilcox late yesterday adjourned a three day inquiry today into municipal financing. His blanket indictment against the bondholders' committees was drawn by the congressman just before he adjourned the Miami hearing.

Just before adjournment, State Senator James R. Beacham of West Palm Beach, after testifying that city received the "cold shoulder" from its protective committee in efforts to adjust bond defaults "without concession," said:

"The coming of the bondholders' committee was the worst invasion of Florida since the carpathians."

It was Senator Beacham, former mayor of West Palm Beach, that Wilcox learned more about the lobbying activities of J. C. Clements, Fort Myers attorney, at the 1931, 1933 and 1935 sessions of the Florida legislature.

"Clements was my shadow," swore Beacham. "He followed me about, as vigorously opposing as I urged the various measures I introduced for the relief of Florida's municipalities. So well did he work that every relief bill was defeated in 1931."

An estimated 3,000,000 farm benefit payments will also be made during the year.

Four Persons Are Killed In Riot In Egypt

Anti-British Fracas Said To Be Caused By Opposition To Italian Sanctions

The second day of anti-British rioting in Egypt, partly stimulated by strong opposition to sanctions against Italy, today raised the death toll to four with 150 injured.

Gunfire from police, who faced a crowd of Egyptians opposing Great Britain's control, killed one of the natives as they marched on Cairo from Giza. More than 100 members of the strong Wafdist party who led the anti-British demonstrations were in hospitals as armed police guarded against further outbreaks.

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Pope Hopes For Sanctions Delay

Pope Pius was today represented as seeking postponement of economic sanctions against Italy. Sources close to the Pope said the Holy Father, strongly wishing maintenance of world peace, hoped the imposition of trade bans against Italy by the League of Nations' powers, scheduled for Nov. 18, would be delayed.
