General Motors Continues Efforts To Move 'Sit-Downs'

DETROIT, Jan. 27.—(AP)—Nearly 40,000 employees were called back to work in 10 Chevrolet plants today in Indiana and Michigan which had been closed as a consequence of strikes in other General Motors units.

Another subsidiary, the Fisher Body Corporation, recalled 8,500 men to work in Michigan tomorrow.

Before the world's largest automobile producing company started this back-to-work movement, more than 125,000 of its employees were idle. Seventeen plants were closed by strikes and the company said it would not reopen them until the disputes with the American Automobile Workers Union was settled.

Commissioner Busy On Inspections Of Sanitary Measures

City Commissioner W. R. Dupre, as the committee on sanitation, was active today in personal inspections of sections in the city in which an ordinance, adopted Monday night, will meet fully apply.

The statute required that certain steps be taken to eliminate epidemic dangers that might arise from sewage disposal.

Small contributions are to be made by each occupant of a residence where sanitary measures will be taken. WPA labor will be used in the operation, the expense to citizens being only the actual cost of materials.

Commissioner Dupre is being accompanied on his inspection tours by C. A. Holloway, district health officer for the State Board of Health.

Other advertisements are to tell that "the best things in Florida are free."

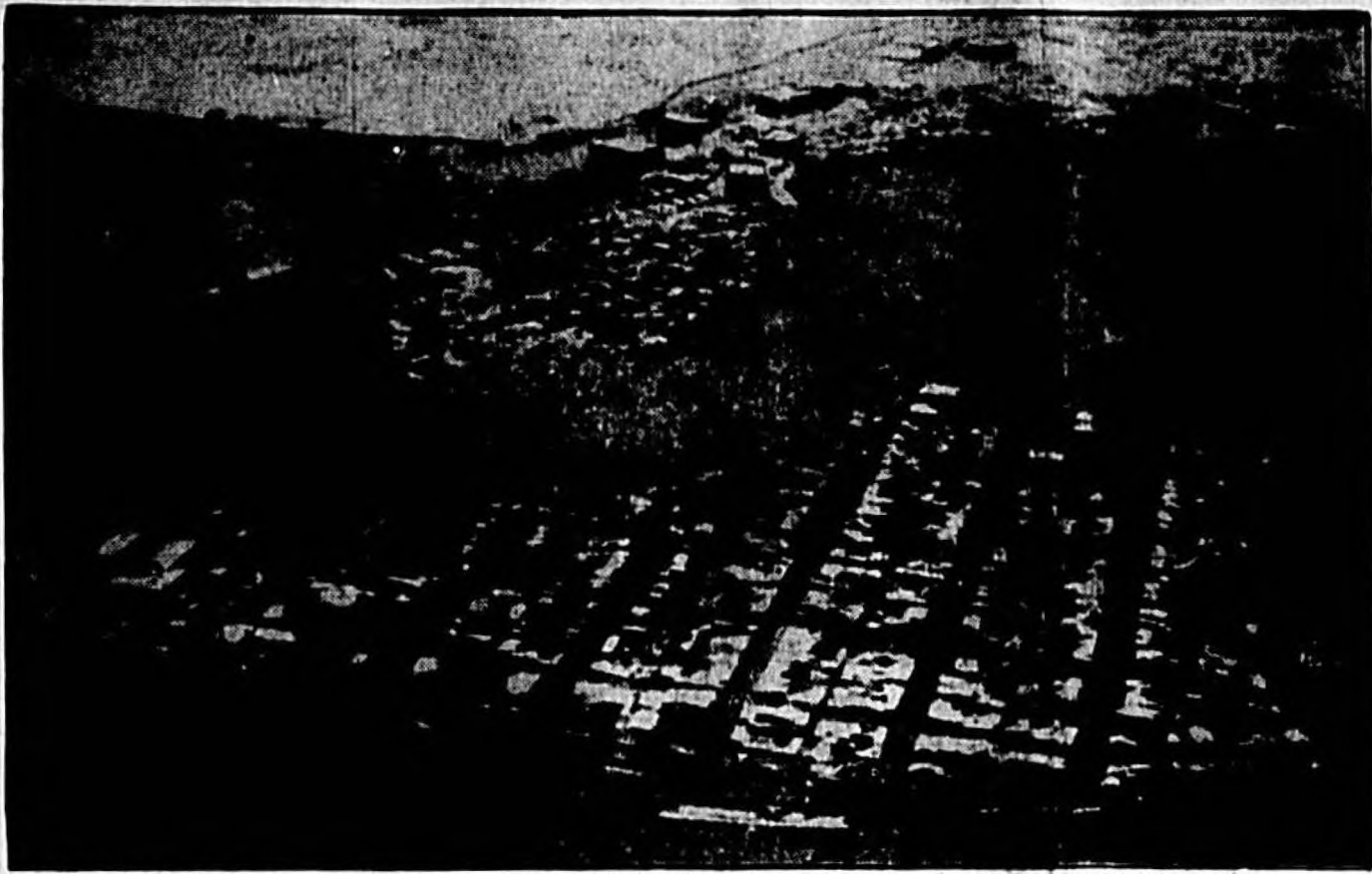
City Committee To Confer With Flynt On Beautification

Capt. Bartlebaugh said his ship is the only privately-operated one of its kind in the south. Eight passengers is the capacity of the ship.

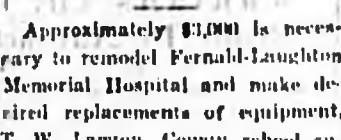
Broken Spring Is Cause Of Accident

Wood-Carving Exhibit At Seminole County Fair Attracting Attention

Among the most popular exhibits at the Seminole County Fair are some examples of wood carving by Ernest Warther, master carver of Dover, Ohio.

This exhibit, which was seen by hundreds of Sanforadians yesterday and Monday, consists of 16 locomotive models, showing the progress of this steam locomotive from the Sir Isaac Newton machine which would not run, to the giant locomotives of today.

All of the models in the exhibit are carved from wood and ivory. Even the tiny bell cords on the engines are carved from ivory. No nail or a piece of metal is in the display. The two largest locomotives in the exhibit are carved from cost Warther \$313.

Lawton Announces Examinations For School Instructors

Examinations for Seminole County public school teachers will be held here Feb. 4, according to a statement released today by T. W. Lawton, County school superintendent.

All instructors are not required to submit to the tests the school head explained.

Ohio River Sprawls Along 1,000-Mile Area Of Almost-Buried Villages

200 Are Dead In Louisville

Six Cities Fear Pestilence From Rationing Of Water

The Associated Press Compulsory evacuation of hundreds of thousands, embracing all persons living within 50 miles on both sides of the Mississippi River from Cairo, Ill., to New Orleans was ordered today by the army high command at Washington if necessary.

The might of flood-purged waters of the Ohio River swept on to threaten new heights of disaster. Thirty-five thousand motor trucks were mobilized to carry out the greatest exodus in history.

Secretary of War Woodring, acting swiftly in America's greatest emergency since the World War, announced headquarters for the push evacuation would be established at Jackson, Miss.

The order was issued when army engineers decided that \$100,000,000 levee system built along the Mississippi after the 1927 flood could not take care of the water soon to be dumped into the Mississippi by the Ohio River at Cairo.

The Ohio sprawled over a 1,000-mile graveyard of almost buried towns, villages, and farmsteads from Paducah to Cairo.

The dead are now 137 but many are missing. The homeless army swelled to 730,000. Property damaged (Continued on Page Three)
