PORTLAND MAINE HAS NEW AIRPORT COSTING \$750,000

New England Is Making Huge strides in Carrying Out Policies of Promoting Improvements in Aviation

BOSTON, June 22.—(INS)—Aviation experts and enthusiasts are printing with pride for the aviation and airport policies of New England. Only a few years ago, airports were a novelty in the section. Today, practically every city has at least one, and towns and even villages are rapidly acquiring the habit.

Through the initiative of the Chamber of Commerce of Portland Me., that city will soon have a new airport of 220 acres. It is expected that the port will be completed next month.

The new airport was acquired by members of the Chamber of Commerce, its expenses also being underwritten by them. The total cost of the field is estimated at \$750,000, of which 10,000 represents the cost of the field. The field will be open for public use on a commercial basis, the city having no objection with it. It will be fully equipped according to the most modern standards.

Aerial Carnival
An aerial carnival for June 23 at the new airport at Beverly, Mass., has been arranged by the flying enthusiasts of the North Shore.

A private airport has been established at Plainville, Mass., which it is expected the cities of Attleboro, Wrentham, and Plainville will aid in developing.

Preliminary steps toward a first class airport for Bar Harbor and Mount Desert Island, Me., were taken at a recent meeting of the Board of Trade at Bar Harbor. The first airway beacon in Providence, R. I., will be in operation soon and will be visible from 10 to 80 miles.

Even the newspapers have gone "in the air." A Boston paper recently established a branch of the Boston Airport, the first New England newspaper to do so.

Orders Big Plane
Only recently, the new Guggenheim Aeronautical Engineering Institute at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology was dedicated with elaborate ceremonies which were attended by national, state, and education representatives.

(Continued from page one)—and what they intend to fight for—is a plank that goes at least as far as the Republican platform in naming the Eighteenth Amendment. They will be satisfied with nothing less and they are going to demand a good deal more in the resolutions committee.

On the contrary, it was said by Governor Smith's friends here, there will be no insistence from New York on an out-and-out wet plank. There is no doubt, they say, that Governor Smith would like to see his party endorse his own views of the desirability of amending the Volstead Act. He said as much in his letter to the Jackson Day Dinner in Washington last January. But the governor's representatives in Houston will make no serious fight for such a plank here, principally because they realize the futility of it.

Their real fight is to prevent the radical dries from building a broad dry platform upon which Governor Smith could not stand without stultifying himself.

The Smith representatives here point out that no candidate for any office could run on a platform of not enforcing the law. Therefore, they say, even a platform that pledged the party to "rigid enforcement of the Eighteenth Amendment" by name, could be accepted by Governor Smith because he has repeatedly asserted in his state papers that so long as the present prohibitions laws are on the statute books they should be enforced. In the final analysis, then, according to Governor Smith's spokesmen in Houston, any platform declaration on prohibition that is short of an endorsement of the "moral righteousness" of prohibition itself could be made to do.

It is this "moral righteousness" aspect of prohibition that the radical dries are going to insist upon. Their principal weakness, from the standpoint of practical politics, is that they have no outstanding leader. In other years the fight was made by William Jennings Bryan. He is gone, and there has appeared no one yet that seems capable of filling his shoes. There are candidates galore for the post, but none of them seems equipped with the evangelical fervor and the canny political capacity of the great competitor.

ENGLISH CROWN BESTOWS HONOR UPON EDUCATOR

Professor Craigie of Chicago Is Knighted by Crown of England For Work Done in Completing Huge Dictionary

CHICAGO, June 21.—(IN)—Professor William A. Craigie, lexicographer of the University of Chicago, has been knighted by King George of England for his monumental task in completing the Oxford Historical Dictionary.

will be welcomed on his return here from England by leading intellects of the mid west.

In addition to the honor bestowed by King George, the Chicago professor received the degree of Litt. D. of Cambridge University, England, and the same degree at the University of Oxford, at the annual Eneanea, a colorful ceremony which is part of the Convocation. The distinction of getting the Litt. D. from both Oxford and Cambridge the same year is almost unprecedented. It was said.

Professor Craigie, who was Oriel Professor at the University of Oxford between 1902 and the time he came to the University of Chicago in 1906, was editor-in-chief of the Oxford Dictionary from 1923 to the time of its editorial completion.

Started in 1858 The Dictionary was started in 1858 and it has taken the time of hundreds of workers over a period of 70 years to write the

history of every word recorded in the English language, living or dead, from the time of "Beowulf" and the seventh century. Professor Craigie and an army of volunteer workers have finished the work, which has been described as "The greatest effort since the invention of printing." It contains a record of 414,825 words, with 228,000,000 letters and figures for the whole.

Thirty years ago it was announced that 5,000,000 quotations had already been collected. The letter S alone has 57,000 words. Almost one-fourth of the main words are obsolete. Professor Craigie has been responsible for one-sixth of the total Dictionary.

At the University of Chicago Professor Craigie has been a work for two years on a Dictionary of American English similar to the Oxford Dictionary.

"American Language" The Dictionary will treat American as a separate language and will record its individual growth

According to Professor Craigie American inventiveness and the strange and rich conditions which faced as pioneer have brought forth in the three centuries of American cultural independence great changes of expression and usage which require a separate Historical Dictionary.

Professor Craigie is already a Litt. D. of Cambridge University and LL. D. of St. Andrews University, Glasgow. He is an authority on Scandinavian languages. Old Icelandic, Old Irish, Lithuanian, Rumanian, Greek and Anglo-Saxon and one of the foremost dictionary makers in the world.

After the American Dictionary is finished he will start on a Historical Dictionary of Middle English.

New Boston Yards Employ Every Modern Device For Fast And Efficient Work

BOSTON, Mass., June 22.—With formal dedication exercises at which public officials, representative shippers, and officers of other railroads gathered as guests, the two big new Boston yards of the Boston and Maine Railroad, in Somerville and East Cambridge Areas, into which have been incorporated during the past 14 months of construction every modern device for fast and efficient classification, placement and forwarding of new England's freight in and out, were opened today.

The program included close-up working demonstrations of the several details of the modern car retarder system,—with electric pneumatic retarders and switches, loud speakers, teletype machines, pneumatic tubes and flood lights with which the inbound and the outbound yards are equipped.

The brief speaking program included only short addresses of welcome by Governor Alvan T. Fuller, of Massachusetts, and President George A. Hannauer of the B. and M. Railroad.

Modern Yards

These modern classification yards which concentrate in two yards operations formerly scattered through nine yards cost the railroad \$4,000,000, or twice as much as the yard north station which is now under construction here.

The new yards have already demonstrated that they can render hours of faster service to and from New England industries, it was announced. Three cars a minute has been established as the classification speed on a volume of business which is now running at the rate of 1,000,000 cars a year.

The yards not only serve to speed up shipments, but by more efficient practices cut the costs of operation by more than \$800,000 a year, railroad officials said. The retarders also serve to decrease the damage to cars and contents, with consequent savings both to the shippers and the railroad; and serve as well to avoid the loss of

WASHINGTON, June 21.—(INS)—Efforts to use the wire of news distributing agencies in Missouri for public utilities propaganda were disclosed to the Federal Trade Commission today by J. P. Sheridan, secretary of the Public Utilities Information Bureau of that state.

Referring to one agency in correspondence with Mayor J. S. S. Richardson, who had been appointed public utilities information director in Pennsylvania, Sheridan expressed the belief that its wires might be used.

Sheridan was requested by Judge Egbert E. Healy, chief counsel for the commission, to furnish a full collection of all publicity stories distributed. Sheridan disclaimed any knowledge that high officials of the utilities group had exerted influence upon executives of newspaper organizations to get publicity distributed or published.
