## Florida Businesses

Trends in the size of age groups which make up Florida's population are bellwethers of markets for products and services, the Florida State Chamber of Commerce reported in its Weekly Business Review released yesterday.

Roughly, a little more than half of Florida's population is made up of persons in the 18 to 64 age group. This group is growing in numbers but is dropping in relation to the other groups and therefore represents today for less of the whole than it did in 1960.

A closer look brings out some of the fine points. For example, little ones under 5 years of age made up 11 per cent of the population in 1960 and 9 per cent in 1968. This group grew only 2 per cent during this interval.

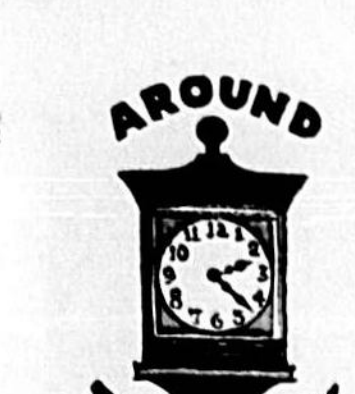

## State Aide Frowns On Training School

The director of State Industry Services has called the proposed creation of a labor training center a semi-welfare program and said he would not be involved with it.

Mayor Lee P. Moore, at a special meeting Thursday night, informed a group of 25 persons, including city commissioners, industrial commissioners and Seminole Chamber of Commerce officials, of a proposal from a "mystery" company to build a plant on a 50-acre plot at the Sanford Airport to employ 1,000 persons in two years.

He informed that three programs are now underway across the state and 20 are being considered. Howard's notice to local industries would be available if industrial and revenue tax-free bonds are available to provide construction money and a training school is established at the airport to train workers.

### Tots Build 'Reading House'

Jackson Heights Elementary School of Oviedo recently presented a program on the theme, "What Are You Building?"

The kindergarten students started the project by showing part of the strong reading foundation needed. Each class in turn presented their part in the program until the "Reading House" was completed, including lawn, flowers and shrubs.

Some of the basic steps in building a reading house are that children must come to know that learning is important, persistent, consistent, is of no value unless used, and is of great value when the learner sees a need for learning.

The building of the house begins with a progression of a picture story, beginning consonant sounds, rhyming sounds, consonant blends, compound words, vowel sounds and blends, root words, syllables, prefixes, suffixes, homonyms, homographs, dictionary skills, and parts of speech, complex syllables, and transposing in own words.

Learning to read is like building a house. You must have a good foundation because "reading house" must last a lifetime.

The first graders presented the rest of the foundation with the second graders presenting some of the framework. The third graders put up the walls, and the fourth graders put on a well insulated roof. The final touch was the adding of interesting ornaments, by the fifth graders and a lava flow and shrubs by the sixth graders.

With the "reading house" built, each builder must keep in mind that he should make his as strong as possible so that he can enjoy reading all his life.

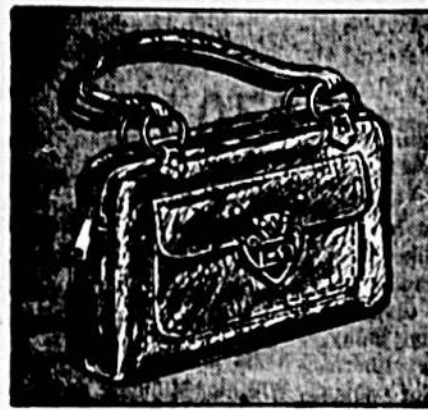

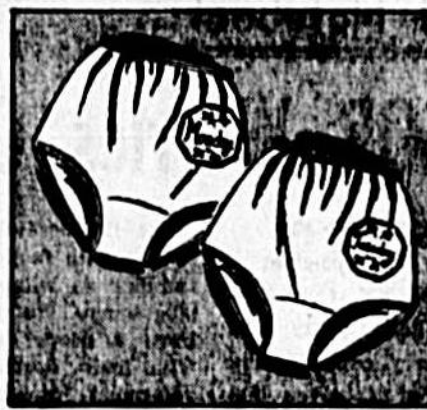

# Sanford's Airport-Industrial Growth Blocked

Seminole voters need to recognize what is happening to their wishes and interests in Tallahassee where the Seminole County legislative delegation leaders are giving short shrift to the needs for local legislation which brooks no delay.

The two men who now revealed their complete disregard for their constituents who live in Seminole County, where one of them does live, are Senator John L. Ducker (R) of Orlando chairman of the delegation and Rep. E. (Sandy) Pope Bassett (R) of Maitland, secretary.

For some time it has been evident to us that Representative Bassett is so influenced by what appears to be a hostile attitude towards the development of the North Seminole area, that the good sense and logic which we believe are his to command, if he wants to, have not been pressed into service.

Senator Ducker's opposition to industrial growth in Sanford is not concealed. It has been responsibly reported by those who have talked with this ultra-conservative Republican that his conviction is that

industrial growth should be blocked if not entirely negated.

In the most recent public display of such motivation by these two legislators there was so drastic a threat to our future that we believe it should be recognized now and dealt with by public opinion.

It was on Monday and in Tallahassee, Don Rutshel, director of the Sanford Industrial Commission which is charged with the responsibility of filling the vacated Navy Air Base with payroll-producing industries, and W. C. Hutchison, Sanford City Attorney, had gone there to ask for immediate consideration, by the delegation, of bills which were considered vital.

The legislators were very well acquainted with the entire background of what these Sanford officials were talking about. They had been at public hearings where the bills to establish a Sanford Airport Authority had been discussed and the issuance of revenue certificates by companies preparing to build plans at the Sanford Airport explained.

Yet so arrogant was their handling of the request for immediate action that it was difficult for us to believe that either or both would throw such a monkey-wrench in the machinery to build Sanford industry.

But it was done!

It was a cold, calculated action. Senator Ducker took refuge behind the formal schedule of the delegation. Sanford bills were not on the delegation's agenda until next week and, thus, would not be heard or discussed now.

Mr. Rutshel told the delegation that loss of a multi-million dollar air-craft oriented manufacturing plant could be the price paid if this local legislation was not acted upon at once.

Mr. Hutchison emphasized: "This critical legislation was thoroughly aired some time ago at a public hearing. Delay could be very, very costly. Time is of the essence."

The chairman of the delegation was unmoved. Further discussion of the Sanford bills stopped.

Orange County's proposed dog-leash bill was soberly taken up.

The future of our airport is of critical importance to all of Seminole County, indeed, all of Central Florida. Florida, with a population whose density will increase every year — is a development we should not have to take.

We trust that when the schedule allows our delegation to discuss our bills they will get quick consideration and favorable action.

This is said, not because we believe that belated action will restore the blighted political figures of Ducker and Bassett, but we are convinced that the entire delegation is still able to act logically and affirmatively!

## "Golden Spike"

If the world ever becomes a single global community, a large part of the credit will have to be given to transportation. National Transportation Week which is to be observed this year between May 11 and 17 will recall afresh the close kinship between human progress and expanding transportation facilities.

A striking element of the current transportation story involves the railroad industry. The rails this year are commemorating the 100th Anniversary of the first transcontinental rail line. National Transportation Week and the Golden Spike Centennial, as it is called, dramatize the part transportation plays in drawing people together into a single community of interests. Transcontinental railroads made the United States a cohesive whole, and as the years have passed, the role they have played has grown in importance.

It was on May 10, 1869 a spectacular chapter came to an end at Promontory Point, Utah. For it was there that the golden spike signaling the completion of the first transcontinental was driven.

The word "DONE" was flashed by telegraph across the nation. Philadelphia rang the Liberty Bell. One hundred gun salutes were fired in New York, San Francisco and Omaha. Chicago held a mile-long parade.

The rails today, however, need greater latitude in operations than they did a hundred years ago. Looking to the future, a rail spokesman observes, "population growth in the years ahead — and the concurrent production increases will demand the ultimate in efficient and economical use of transportation facilities and equipment. The answer," he said, "is inter-modal, stream-lined transportation companies offering across-the-board transportation services. The result would be the best possible transportation at the lowest possible cost. . . . Railroads recognize this — they want to get into the transportation business."

National Transportation Week and the message of the railroads for their centennial anniversary offers an excellent opportunity for the public to become better acquainted with our most basic form of transport — the railroads and the necessity of freeing them from regulatory laws that belong in the last century. The rails are a part of the transportation system on which the continued progress of civilization depends.

## Political Notebook:

### GOP Worries Over 1970

LEXINGTON, KY. (NEA) — The Republican party has reason to worry over bidding at least four of its seven big gubernatorial races in 1970. Yet the ripped-up Democrats may turn out to be the GOP's great ally in this effort.

Presently occupying 30 of the 30 governors' chairs, the Republicans have not enjoyed this much success since the early 1950s. Twenty-six of the 30 met here in their semiannual ceremony of mutual congratulation.

Keeping governorship control may not be easy in Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, Ohio, and Missouri, where the unpredictable Gov. Claude Kirk, today seem on the safe side.

Altogether, 24 of the 30 GOP gubernatorial races are on the block in 1970. About 16 of these may be fairly secure, the rest not.

Involved, of course, is much more than simply maintaining the present preponderance of numbers for the sake of show. Whoever controls most gubernatorial offices and state legislatures in 1971 will have the largest voice in the major congressional reapportionment which will follow the 1970 census.

The one-term limit in Pennsylvania bars Gov. Raymond Shafer from another try. Lt. Gov. Broderick may emerge as his best challenger, but his edge does not seem as clear as was Shafer's when he served with William Scranton. A swing state, Pennsylvania might be due for a shift. But, again, the Democrats' death of candidates could be the Republicans' most hopeful prospect.

HUP Secretary George Romney's Michigan successor, Gov. William Milliken, is a warmly admired figure. But some GOP strategists fear he is not achieving Romney's high visibility and needs to move around much more. A good Democratic choice teamed with the popular Sen. Philip Hart could make a formidable team.

With Gov. James Rhodes being out (he may go for the Senate), Ohio's GOP gubernatorial slot is wide open. There is some fear of a chaotic prairie, though this may simmer down later. Here, too, the Democrats have some name types, like John Gilligan, who could increase GOP difficulties.

Some Republican strategists believe that Gov. Nelson Rockefeller's assertion of interest in a fourth term and some do not. If he is in, his edge over a fuzzy Democratic field is sharp. If not, New York could tighten up, though a GOP advantage would be maintained.

In the lesser states, Republicans presently in command are concerned chiefly over Oklahoma, New Mexico, Minnesota and Colorado. But the Democrats' Kansas, Tennessee and Virginia (1969) might be seized.

### Sino-Soviet Border Events

WASHINGTON (NEA) — What happens on the Sino-Soviet border the next six months may be the most important event in the Vietnam war and when the Vietnam war is settled.

If the Moscow-Peking quarrel heats up sufficiently, the theory is that the two superpowers will be forced to make a deal.

This explains why some administration Vietnam watchers send a part of their time feeling the pulse of Mao Tse-tung's quarrel with Leonid Brezhnev.

It's not the open fighting over an island that interests these American watchers. They don't expect open war. What some are looking for is more subtle — a Chinese attempt to create a Vietnam in parts of the vast eastern Soviet territories populated by tribesmen.

In a number of areas, members of the same tribes live on both sides of the border — both Chinese and Russian. It would be relatively simple for the Chinese-trained men and women to infiltrate the Soviet Union's east, set up underground cells for disaffected Soviet citizens, and use the modern Soviet armies would be faced with the same sort of problems the U.S. and South Vietnamese and Korean armies face in Vietnam.

Since 1970, Mao has believed Russian techniques for the Russian approach to communism were the Russian way, time and again. We can see this in the power in China and in the Chinese Communist party. Over the years, Mao's strongest rivals will disagree on the way to deal with Russian backing or Russian connections.

After the death of Stalin, Mao has considered himself the leader of world communism. Here, too, Russia stands in his way.

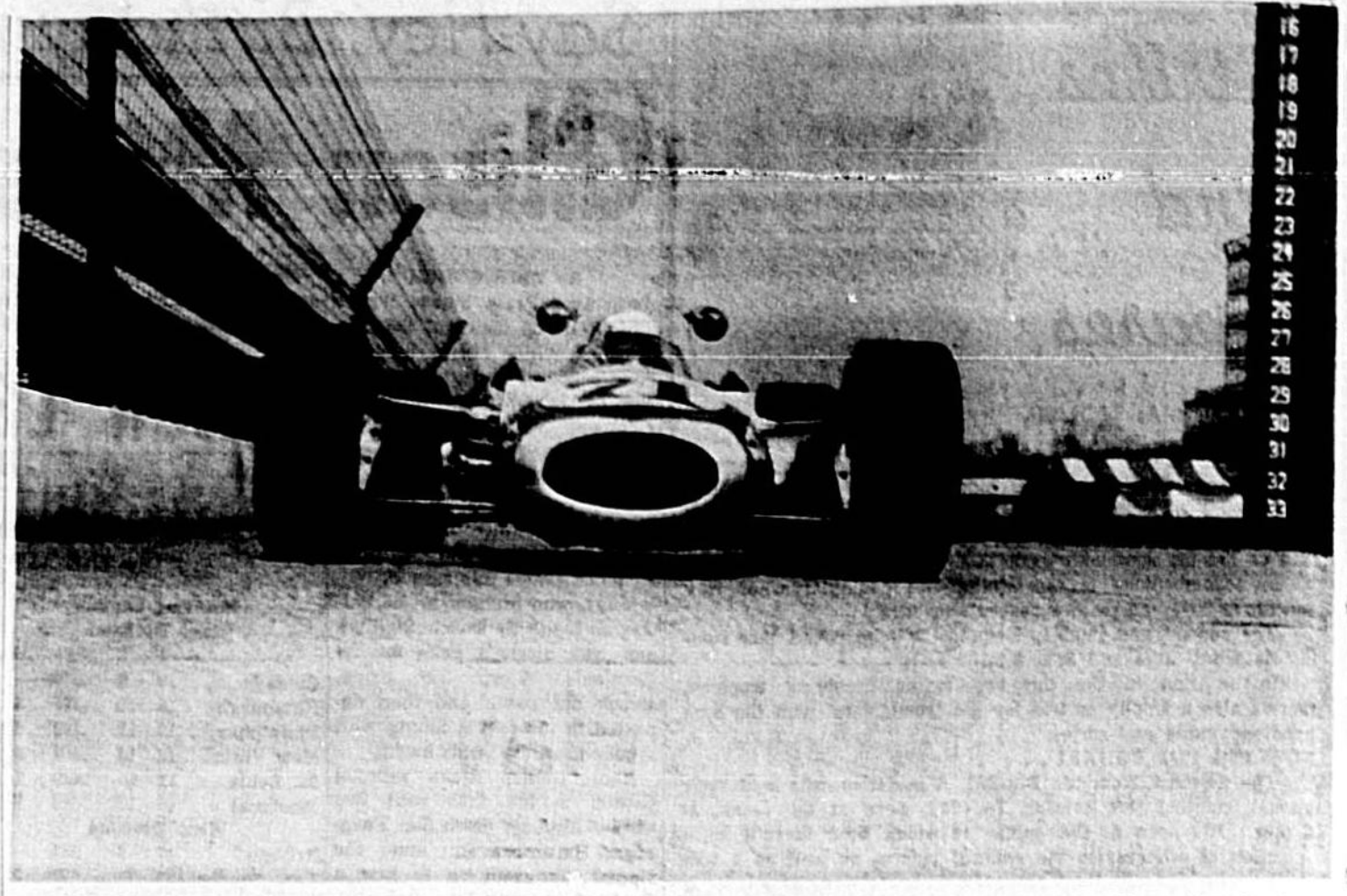

# Manpower Stabilized In Vietnam

WASHINGTON (AP)—American manpower in Vietnam has stabilized at 441,000, the highest level since the last three months and Pentagon officials say the U.S. troop level probably will never reach the authorized 449,500-man ceiling.

Some officers believe the number of U.S. personnel committed to the war will not exceed 443,000.

The chief reason for the leveling off in manpower, they say, is the progress of the war as viewed from the Pentagon—not any presidential directive to hold back on new deployments.

The U.S. Command in Vietnam handled the North Vietnamese spring offensive well, but battlefield casualties are dropping and the South Vietnamese military force is developing under an accelerated training program, military sources say.

As long as the situation does not worsen and there appears to be some progress in the Paris peace talks, they say the manpower level could remain where it is today, aside from minor weekly fluctuations due to rotation of troops. Between 40,000 and 50,000 replacements a month flow into Vietnam to replace those completing their tour of duty.

The 549,500-man ceiling was authorized by President Lyndon B. Johnson in 1968 after the North Vietnamese began their February 27 offensive which shook a rather complacent attitude concerning the war's progress.

The Pentagon's maintenance of a Vietnam force level 6,000 or 7,000 men short of the approved ceiling may be interpreted by some as evidence the Nixon administration will, as has been widely reported, begin withdrawing American units from Vietnam this year.

Officers already are expressing satisfaction at the progress of the South Vietnamese force's training effort.

In one major program, South Vietnamese units are scheduled to take over the battle gear held by 2,500 Americans, allowing deactivation of the U.S. units.

Other steps, expected to follow, are being taken to let the South Vietnamese assume more of the war burden. They involve letting South Vietnamese troops move into an area to free U.S. units for combat elsewhere.

There is also a program to let U.S. advisors forces, commanded by U.S. special forces troops along South Vietnam's frontier with Laos and Cambodia, are being turned over to South Vietnamese.

MIAMI (AP)—A gunman and a companion with a shiny knife performed the year's 25th jet hijacking to Cuba in Miami today after a four-hour stay on the runway.

A National Airlines spokesman said the two passengers who did not return identified themselves as "Mr. N. Marmon" and "Mrs. J. Gagnon."

The jet, a Boeing 727, was hijacked in Cuba, but the other 60 passengers and the crew of seven returned to Miami early today after a four-hour stay on the runway.

The hijacking was the 25th since the start of the year. The last one was in Miami Tuesday.

## Eggs Madeleine

How recipes travel! We've come upon an interesting poached egg and vegetable dish made by a French woman named Madeleine. But the dish isn't French. Madeleine's husband, born in South Africa, taught her how to prepare it.

When Madeleine came to New York to live she gave the recipe to a friend who passed it along to us.

Madeleine serves the egg dish for lunch. With a friend or two sitting by in the kitchen, she cooks while she talks. She also starts a pot of coffee brewing, sets the table and cuts a loaf of French bread into chunks. Sweet butter goes on the table. Lunch is ready! One confession we must make: Madeleine puts fresh tomatoes in her egg and vegetable dish. But because we found it convenient to use the sliced tomatoes that now come in cans—and think you may, too—this change in her recipe has been made.

If you have one of these poached with a non-stick coating, use it for this dish. It will look handsome when you bring it to the table and the lining will keep the eggs from adhering to the pan. A similar skillet would also work well.

**EGGS MADELINE**

2 cans (each 1 1/2 ounces) sliced baby tomatoes  
2 slices bacon  
1 cup green pepper, seeded and sliced into thin rings  
1 medium onion, peeled and sliced into rings  
1/4 cup thin celery crescents  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
4 large eggs  
Paprika

Put food for chicken bones and backs and veal knuckles into a soup kettle, add water, and bring to a boil. Skim surface until about 10 minutes. Add all other ingredients, reduce heat, cover kettle, and simmer.

Continuing: Brownie surface when necessary. When food is tender, remove it. It can be used in salads or dishes for other meals.

Continue: Continue cooking stock until liquid is reduced to two quarts. Strain it through cheese cloth and cool, uncovered.

### New Recipe: Green Beans With Fruit

Try our latest version of one of our favorite green bean recipes.  
Brown Rice  
Green Beans with Fruit  
Frosted Cake  
GREEN BEANS WITH FRUIT  
1 pound snap beans—trimmed, scrubbed and cut into 1-inch lengths  
1 cup boiling water  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 medium golden Delicious apple  
1 ripe but firm medium pear  
3 tablespoons butter  
Juice of ½ lemon  
2 tablespoons sugar  
Freshly grated nutmeg  
Boil beans, covered, with water and salt until tender—about eight minutes. Drain, cover and set aside in warm place. Pare apple and slice fairly thin. Pare pear, quarter and slice each quarter into thirds. In a 16-inch skillet, melt the butter; stir in apple and pear. Cover and cook over moderate heat, stirring a few times, just until fruit is cooked through—about five minutes. Mix in lemon juice and sugar, then beans and reheat; sprinkle with nutmeg. Makes six servings.

In a Dutch oven in the hot oil over moderate heat cook the onions, stirring almost constantly, for five minutes. Add pork, mushrooms and Seasoning Sauce. Cook stirring constantly until sauce thickens and clears. Add bean sprouts and pimiento. Heat, turning mixture over with a large spoon, until boiling hot. Serve at once over rice, topped with chow mein noodles. Makes six servings.  
Seasoning Sauce: In a one-quart measure or bowl stir until smooth: ¼ cup cornstarch with 1½ cup American-style soy sauce and 1 teaspoon sugar. Add a couple of crushed cloves of garlic. Add enough water to the saved mushroom liquid (see above) to make 2 cups and heat to boiling. Add 2 chicken bouillon cubes and stir to dissolve; add to cornstarch mixture.

### THE FAMILY LAWYER

More often than not, the relationship between postman and home owner is a warm and friendly one. But even into this sunny time a little rain must fall. Such as, when the postman gets hurt and sues the home owner for damages.  
As a general rule, the home owner is not liable if he is not guilty of any negligence. For example:  
A home owner was sued by a postman who suffered a bad fall when a rotting porch step suddenly caved in. But a court found no liability. The judge pointed out that, since the rot was visible only from underneath, there was no reasonable way for the home owner to have discovered the danger. By contrast, take the following case:  
A postman slipped and fell in the outer hallway of a home, because an excessive amount of wax had been applied to the floor. This time, there being negligence on the part of the home owner, the court ordered him to pay the postman's claim. In terms of sheer frequency, was the Number one hazard that the postman faces? A bite by the home owner's dog. Many thousands of on-the-job bites are suffered each year by mail carriers.  
In such circumstances, the home owner is usually liable if the state has a "dog bite law." Under this law, a dog's maker may be held responsible for a bite not only when he was negligent but even when he was not negligent in any way.  
If the state has no dog bite law, the home owner might still be liable—but only if he was somehow to blame for the bite.  
In one case, the owner of a vicious dog did take the trouble to post a "Beware of Dog" sign on his front door. However, when a postman rang the bell to deliver a package, the man opened the door and permitted the dog to dash outside and bite the postman in the leg.  
A court duly imposed legal liability on the postholder. The judge said posting the warning sign did not end his responsibility toward those visitors who, like the postman, had a perfect right to come onto the premises.
