A MOTHER'S DAY MESSAGE

"When Jesus therefore saw His mother, and the disciple standing by whom He loved, He saith unto His mother, Woman, behold thy son! Then He saith to the disciple, Behold thy mother! And from that hour the disciple took her unto his own home." St. John 19:26-27.

Mother's Day in America is a comparatively recent institution. It should not be, however, for its origin is very ancient and the circumstances of its beginning are most sacred. Some of us believe that tributes to mothers began with Christ's consideration of Mary as He looked down upon her from Calvary. As we seek a faith "to live by" in these strenuous times it is worth remembering also that prior to Good Friday, it had been commanded: "honour thy father and thy mother." Christ reinforced this commandment and renewed its authority by His words from the Cross.

We see in the Holy Mother a pattern and example for all mothers. When Mary realized that she was to bring a new life into the world, and that this life was also to be the Light of mankind, she rejoiced so exceedingly her words have been preserved for us to this day: "My soul doth magnify the Lord, and my spirit hath rejoiced in God my Saviour. For He hath regarded the lowliness of his hand-maiden. For behold, from henceforth all generations shall call me blessed. For He that is mighty hath magnified me, and holy is His Name."

Every mother goes to Bethlehem in symbolical travail as did the Holy Mother. Every mother lives in Nazareth and observes with quiet pride as her son increases in wisdom and stature, and in favour with God and man. And where is the mother today, or any day, who does not treasure every toy and every tiny shoe used by her little ones, and who like Mary, does not keep all of her children's "sayings" in her heart? Yes, there are hours of waiting at Calvary, too. Note that Mary stood. She did not faint or sit or kneel or fall. She stood. While every dream vanished, while the sky grew ever darker, Mary stood, as all true mothers must. Though she had hoped He would become a King, she bowed in acquiescence to a Higher Will.

The will of God for mothers, and children too, is expressed in one word, Love. We may be very sure of God's one never-failing and everlasting purpose for us all, even though His love is so vast it passes man's understanding. Somewhere, and some time, our Christian faith insists, we shall find the "many mansions" and we shall see all tears dried.

A well-intentioned but ignorant critic of Nazareth once asked him, "Just what is your theory of relationship in a world? We feel as helpless as he did to express all our love for mothers even though we should write many pages. St. John realized his inadequacy when he closed his Gospel with this comment: "And there are also many other things which Jesus did, the which, if they should be written every one, I suppose that even the world itself could not contain the books that should be written." The thought of mother if she be the thoughts of God, and who can express all our love to God?

One of the cardinal teachings of the Church is the sanctity of family life, and every individual in the family. Marriage is more than a legal and physical union, says the Church, it is also spiritual union. Christian marriage is intended to last forever. All personalities in sacred and especially are we obligated when children are added to our home. We are solemnly bound to foster and inspire in every child's heart a deep and abiding reverence for the presence of God. Mother's knee is the first university—and perhaps the best university—any of us ever attend. Napoleon once observed: "Let France have good mothers, and she will have good sons."

We are not guilty of over-statement if we say that the strength of this nation depends upon the character of its homes. The home is a small model or seed-section of all society. Those who learn from this training-ground the principles of citizenship and the spirit of integrity go forth to serve and lead the nation. Too much cannot be said in behalf of the good that fathers and mothers can do in promoting the traditional virtues which in every age have produced victory for men and women. Love, honor, purity, loyalty and similar virtues are not only the best policy, they are also the rock-like cornerstones upon which all civilization is based.

War-time, with its anxiety and restrictions, shows new burdens of family morale on mothers. Our restrictions are not only for ourselves, and our children, but for our neighbors. Mothers offer mothers with an ingenuously simple but potent weapon which can be used to fashion home-centered recreation and to teach by example some of the holy principles of God and country.

25,000 More Axis Prisoners Taken In North Africa

lay, the northern hinge of the Axis defense line across the neck of the peninsula.

(The British radio said British armored units had captured Hammamet the southern hinge 28 miles south of Hammamet, but this was not confirmed locally.)

Three German divisional commanders and their staffs were among the 50,000 prisoners taken since Tunis and Bizerte fell Friday to the pellucid rush of Allied columns indicating the rapid demoralization of the Axis force.

(Recent estimates had placed the number of the enemy in Tunisia at 150,000 to 200,000 troops, and these captives would account for one-third or one-fourth of all the Axis defenders.)

Health In Army Is Said To Be Better Than For Civilians

ATLANTA, May 10, (Special)

Today's soldier in the U. S. Army has better health and a higher life expectancy than his comrades in the same age group back home in civilian life, according to Colonel Sanford W. French, Chief of Medical Branch, Headquarters Fourth Service Command.

Preventive methods have been made service men immune from several of the diseases which previously ran rampant through armies.

For instance, he pointed out, tetanus toxoid shots are given so there is no longer any fear of lockjaw, while typhus fever serum assures immunity from the plague which formerly destroyed thousands. Yellow fever, it has been proved so effective that no single case has been reported and typhoid fever cases are infinitesimal as compared to those in other wars, due to new sanitary methods.

Life-saving drugs, developed since the last conflict, are carried in the soldier's knapsack and can be administered by himself or another soldier, Colonel French stated. Another factor which has similar miraculous results is the much publicized blood plasma improved methods of treating burns are not only saving lives but also a lot of suffering, he said while a new mold drug "penicillin" has effected cures in cases of overwhelming blood poisoning.

Insect and Disease Control for the Victory Garden

Damage caused by sucking insects is very often not properly recognized because of the inconspicuous nature of the insects. Even though the damage inflicted by sucking insects is usually very inconspicuous, an infestation of such insects often means the end of the plant that has been attacked.

Control:— One part of black leaf (nicotine sulfate) and 2 parts of Paris Green to 400 parts of water is one of the best means of control if applied during the hot part of the day when the temperature is above 80 degrees F. If applied to tender plants as beans or tomatoes, this concentration should be lowered to avoid burning the leaves. If applied to plants that are well established, the concentration may be kept in check fairly well by a daily sprinkling, applied as a daily drenching, applied as a daily drenching.

There are many species of sucking insects of varying economic importance found infesting vegetable crops in Florida. Some of these insects are always present and may be expected to cause damage at any season. Others are definitely seasonal in occurrence and can be expected to trouble gardeners only at a particular season, irrespective of weather conditions.

The most destructive member of the sucking insect group is the aphid. Aphids are found on almost all plants, but only when the rainfall is below normal do they become a pest. Adults are 1/8 to 1/4 inch long, slender and silvery gray in color. The young are yellow. Both adults and young are found on the underside of leaves or on the growing buds of infested plants. Vegetables most frequently attacked in order of severity are: English peas, cabbage, cauliflower, celery and squash.

Symptoms:— Onions, peas, cabbage and cauliflower.

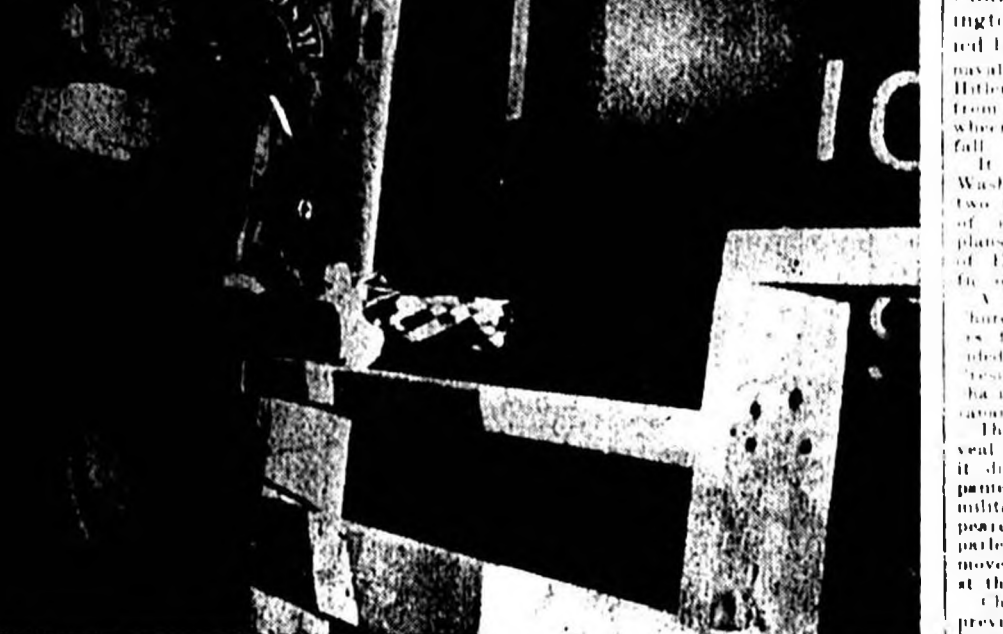
