Festive Day Topped By Fireworks Display Zoo Opening, Holiday Bring Thousands To Sanford

Seminole Boulevard, running along Lake Monroe in Sanford, had a busy traffic day on Friday, the Fourth of July. Crowds throughout the day moved between the opening of the new Central Florida Zoo and the holiday festivities at Fort Mellon Park in the city.

Zoo officials say that approximately 10,000 people went through the gates of the new zoo, located off U.S. 17-92 hidden in foliage greenery. Official grand opening ceremonies for the 21-acre zoo is expected to be held in 60 days.

Jack Horner, executive manager of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce, estimated that more than 20,000 persons in a "steady flow" visited the activities at Fort Mellon Park. The evening was topped off with a colorful 30-minute fireworks display.

The day at Fort Mellon Park was highlighted by keynote speaker State Rep. Bob Hattaway (D-Altamonte Springs), a frog jumping contest and two local rock 'n' roll bands.

A row of flag-draped, red, white and blue booths offered visitors fresh fish, cold drinks, hot dogs, corn on the cob and Bicentennial souvenirs.

More holiday activities were scheduled for Saturday with a sidewalk sale at the Sanford Plaza sponsored by the Sanford Plaza Merchants Association.

Horner had one word for the work and contributions that went into insuring a smooth operating day of activities — "outstanding."

Horner commended the Sanford Police Department for doing a "great job" in handling the traffic and always being "visible, available and ready."

Hattaway, making a five-minute noon patriotic speech, told the crowd that people need to "exchange contempt for consideration." Hattaway read quotations from slain political figures John F. and Bobby Kennedy and Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

"It's important to think about the brotherhood of man," the freshman legislator said. He called on Americans to develop a "bond of humanness."

The opening of the new zoo, a much awaited occasion, "passed" the crowd flow into Fort Mellon Park, according to Horner.

"The zoo released the crowds at a steady pace," Horner said. "The pacing of crowds helped maintain easier crowd controls." He also said there were "no incidents, no arguments and no problems." He said there were a couple of minor cases of heat exhaustion in the 80 degree weather.

Young Barbara Johnson of Sanford held the winning frog in the Junior Women's Club-sponsored frog jumping contest. Horner said Miss Johnson won a \$25 savings bond for having the frog which could leap the greatest distance in the shortest time.

The two rock bands — Society and Squash — played in the afternoon and evening and, according to Horner, "lived up" the day.

"They were rock bands," Horner says. "But they were good."

Horner also had a good word for Jay Warnick, of Lake Mary, the man who put the match to the fireworks.

The fireworks were purchased by the Downtown Business Association.

Horner said that most of the money raised from sales in the booths will be donated to charities. The people "weren't working for themselves," Horner says.

Elsewhere in the county's celebration of the 199th birthday of America, a parade moved through Geneva, and patriotic music and square dancing, performed by the Music Militia, filled the Civic Center in Altamonte Springs.

The Ovidio Jayces hosted Fourth of July festivities with a watermelon eating and seed-spitting contest.

He Finds Relaxation In 'Empty' Bottles

Why does a man spend 20 years of his life constructing a 350-foot long, five-foot high bottle fence cemented together by some 30,000 empty beer, wine and whiskey bottles?

Perhaps it was done to escape the "horrors" of a deep crater in his back yard search for good sand to mix concrete that he couldn't get out of the hole. But a quick call to his wife, Nola, and construction continued.

"Could be," mused 74-year-old Eric Sunberg, as he sits on a lawn chair in back of his south Seminole home.

"No one but a Swede would be crazy enough to do that," Sundberg says, pointing toward the intricately designed fence which runs alongside his Lake Brantley home.

There it sits. A work of art really, Sundberg's fence with bottles placed to reflect intricate designs when lights hooked up inside the bottles are switched on at night.

Shaking his head, the "Swede," as friends call him, says he remembers working the 3-12 p.m. shift as a bartender. Come morning, the "Swede" would hop out of bed early to begin work on his fence. Since he worked as a bartender, he thought he might as well find a use for the "empties."

A little digging in his backyard for sand to mix cement — and the "Swede's" 20-year labor of love began.

During those 20 years, Sundberg estimates he worked on his fence three hours per day. First, he would trace a design on paper. A few dabs of concrete, an appropriate number of bottles — his fence grew little by little.

Once, the "Swede" dug such a deep crater in his back yard search for good sand to mix concrete that he couldn't get out of the hole. But a quick call to his wife, Nola, and construction continued.

"What did Nola think about all this time spent building a bottle fence?"

"She never objected. Except...she thought I was crazy as hell, naturally," the "Swede" answered.

Sitting in the sunlight, the "Swede" reflectively knows that his fence was indeed a "creation," a way to occupy his spare time. In essence, a way to stay sane. To create in a philosophy based on nickels and dimes.

And, the "Swede" will tell you that, if you ask him.

Judge Strawn Tries To Simplify Orders

Do jurors in criminal cases actually understand all the judge's instructions before they retire to deliberate? Seminole-Brevard Circuit Court Judge David U. Strawn doesn't think so and preliminary research using controlled groups of veniremen bears this out.

Judge Strawn is spearheading an effort to get federal funding for a study to probe communication problems between judges and jurors.

Strawn said in both instances a notable area of concern centers on circumstantial evidence instructions. Despite court instructions that circumstantial evidence is acceptable, and under what conditions, many jurors answered questionnaires with the reply that it isn't legal.

The \$75,000 grant will be used, Strawn said, to repay FTU professors for time they've already spent on the project plus to fund a professional videotape production using actors in an "actual Band-E trial."

Annexation Laws Confusing - Even To Lawmakers

There are almost as many interpretations of the 1975 state annexation law floating around Seminole County as there are attorneys.

In recent weeks lawyers for Seminole cities have given completely conflicting opinions on whether the new law repeals the Mooney Bill.

The Mooney Bill is a special act affecting only Seminole County, sponsored when Gene Mooney was a member of the Legislature. The law requires personal notification of property owners within 60 feet of a tract proposed for annexation into a city and rezoning. The notification must be given to city and non-city property owners, alike.

One attorney expressed surprise recently when he found the new law appears to require publication on four different occasions of the entire annexation ordinance.

At the same time, a county official this week criticized the new law, insisting it neither requires planning by the cities for services the municipalities must provide to newly annexed territory nor forbids density changes.

The 1975 law, passed in the recent session of the Legislature, states in Section 171.0413 (b) "Except as otherwise provided in this law, the annexation procedure as set forth in this section shall constitute a uniform method for the adoption of an ordinance of annexation by the governing body of any municipality in this state, and all existing provisions of special laws which establish municipal annexation procedures are repealed hereby."

However, the new law in Section 171.042 (4) states: "The method of annexation provided in this section shall be supplemental to any other procedure provided by general or special law..."

The "Except as otherwise provided in this law" portion of (a) appears to except (4) making the procedures supplemental to existing law. This, it appears the "Mooney Bill" remains on the books.

As for publication in entirety of the ordinance of annexation, the 1974 law said of the annexation ordinance, "said ordinance shall thereupon be published once a week for four consecutive weeks."

The 1975 law says of the annexation ordinance, "said ordinance shall be passed after same has been published once a week for four consecutive weeks."

The difference in the two laws is that the 1974 one provides for advertising after ordinance passage with court remedies available, while the 1975 law requires publication prior to adoption of the ordinance.

The 1975 law only changes the numbering, not the provisions of the section requiring cities to prepare a report setting forth plans to provide urban services to any area to be annexed.

The exact wording of the plan remains the same.

Section 171.042 of the 1974 annexation law, prohibiting municipalities from increasing or decreasing the density allowed under a county plan for a period of two years unless the increase is approved by the county commission, remains part of the 1975 law.

Ashe Takes Men's Title

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Arthur Ashe moved impressively to a two-set lead then fought off a determined Jimmy Connors to win the Wimbledon men's singles title 6-1, 6-1, 5-7, 6-4 today, becoming the first black ever to hold the prestigious men's crown.

Ashe, serving and volleying with power and precision, breezed through the first two sets, breaking Connors' serve five times.

But then Connors battled back in the third set, breaking Ashe's powerful serve for the first time in the match to even the set at 2-2. Both players then held serve to 6-5, when Connors broke serve again.

NATION IN BRIEF

Ford Urges 'National Feeling' During Bicentennial Year

BALTIMORE (AP) — President Ford says he hopes the Bicentennial year will "become a true, national experience" and there will be concentrated study of the nation's history at every school where the American flag flies. Helping usher in the nation's 200th year Friday night at historic Ft. McHenry, Ford termed the Bicentennial observance "a celebration of liberty, freedom and democracy — wherever they exist." Ford stood beneath a duplicate of the original Star Spangled Banner at the fort where Francis Scott Key wrote the poem that became the national anthem.

Las Vegas Flood Continues

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — Holiday gamblers "walked the plank" to get into one of the Las Vegas Strip's most famous casinos, and others splashed barefoot through puddles after a flash flood hit the city on the eve of the Fourth of July weekend. Gamblers determined to get into Caesar's Palace lined up along a narrow ribbon of sidewalk to cross over a huge mud puddle into the casino by way of two small planks. About 2 1/2 inches of rain pelted Las Vegas in less than two hours, and when the rain stopped late Thursday night, two city workers were dead, hundreds of cars were submerged and houses were flooded.

Dakota Farmland Drenched

BISMARCK, N.D. (AP) — The National Weather Service says the threat of weekend thunderstorms could aggravate a flood situation which has already forced evacuation of many small towns in the Red River basin of North Dakota and Minnesota. Fed by drenching rains which have left more than a million acres of rich farmland under water, flood crests were expected today on the Red River at Fargo and the Sheyenne River at West Fargo.

President, Suharto Confer

CAMP DAVID, Md. (AP) — President Ford is continuing his series of consultations with East Asian leaders on the Indochina situation by meeting with Indonesian President Suharto. Suharto is expected to receive assurances from Ford at today's meeting of the American government's wish to continue to play a constructive role in Asia despite the Communist successes in Indochina.

Sanford Airport Stays Busy With 6,008 Flights In June

One indicator of the activity at Sanford's giant air facility is last month's total of 6,008 flight operations — or one every four minutes — bringing to 39,000 operations the total for 1975's first six months, an 11 per cent increase over the same period for last year.

Wife Robbed As Husband Hit By Van

A 37-year-old Sanford woman was being robbed of \$200 early Saturday morning at approximately the same time and within a block's distance of where her husband was struck by a van, the Seminole County Sheriff's deputies reported.

Archie McCormick, no age given, 2809 Grove Drive, Sanford, was hit by a van as he walked along SR 46 near Midway, according to reports. He was transported to Seminole Memorial Hospital where he was listed in good condition Saturday morning.

Meanwhile, sheriff's deputies continued their search for four black males who stole Shirley McCormick's purse containing the money, and pushed Mrs. McCormick into a ditch. She was not injured, reports say.

The double-barreled incident began at approximately 1:30 a.m. Saturday when the McCormicks were having an argument as they drove west on SR 46. Mrs. McCormick told police that her husband stopped the car and it got stuck in the sand.

Reports say that McCormick then took the car keys and started walking. Mrs. McCormick, after sitting in the car for a few minutes, decided to start walking home, deputies said.

A car with four black males stopped beside her and one of them got out and grabbed her purse and Mrs. McCormick searched him, reports say. Then one man held Mrs. McCormick while another man grabbed the purse. The men pushed Mrs. McCormick into a ditch and fled the scene in their car, reports say.

Florida Motorists Flaunt Law Requiring Insurance

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — About 876,000 drivers—more than 14 per cent of Florida's six million licensed motorists—are flaunting a law that requires them to have liability insurance, state officials say. Preston Cowie, assistant director of insurance consumer services, said that 14.4 per cent of the drivers involved in accidents between July 1, 1974 and June 30 of this year were not insured. Cowie said about five per cent of the licensed drivers are the hard core who will not buy insurance no matter what. He said he couldn't account for the other 10 per cent who have not complied with the law.

Solar Water Heater Saves

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — The average family of four that builds its own solar water heater can recover the \$228 cost with the savings on about one year's worth of electricity bills, state officials say. The average four-member family is paying about \$175 a year for hot water, and that amount is expected to increase, according to a pamphlet published by the now-defunct Florida Energy Committee. "Purchased in small quantities, the materials for the most elaborate pumped solar water heater in this booklet could have a retail cost of over \$700," the pamphlet says. "Many homeowners will be able to reduce this cost considerably through careful shopping." The Environmental Information Center, which prepared the publication called "How to Build a Solar Water Heater" for the energy panel, estimated the cost closer to \$228 for a family of four.

Miami Residents On Move

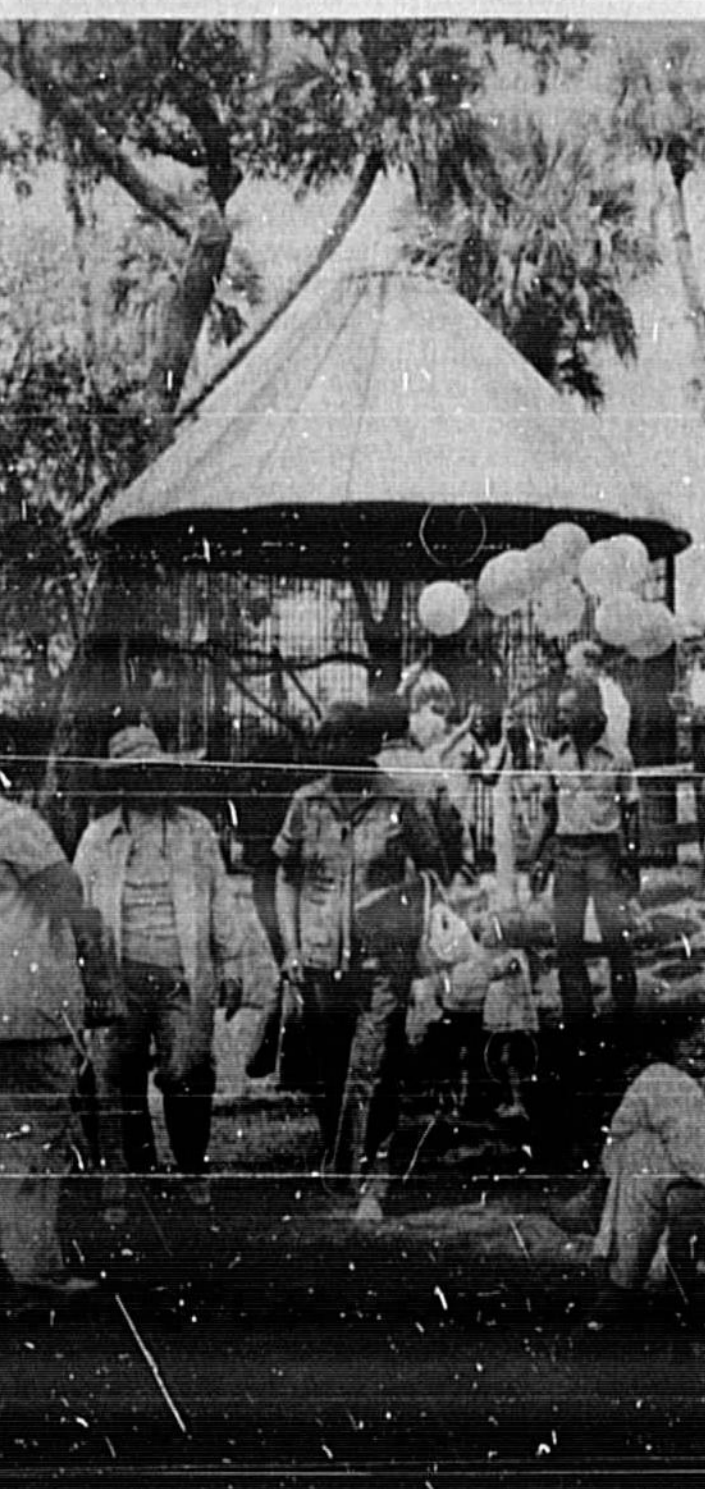
MIAMI (AP) — While northerners migrate to this subtropical resort city seeking a more leisurely and carefree existence, a record number of residents are moving away — victims, they say, of urban sprawl. "We want to get out of the big city," says the wife of an airline pilot who is turning his back on Miami and moving his family to rural North Florida. "We've been here 10 years, it's gotten overcrowded, and we've had enough." "For Sale" signs are displayed on 27 per cent of Dade County's one- and two-family homes, according to the latest quarterly survey by a major bank. That percentage represents 8,500 families, the largest number of residents on the move in eight years.

City Eyes Hearings

LONGWOOD — City officials are watching with interest public hearings being conducted by the Seminole County Commission on Sanlando Utilities Co.'s requested water and sewer rate increases. City Attorney Ned Julian Jr. is at the law books doing some research to prepare an opinion on whether the city or the county is responsible for regulating the rates within Longwood's city limits. Sanlando Utilities currently serves four Longwood subdivisions located north of SR 434 including Winsor Manor, Sleepy Hollow first addition, the Moorings and Devonshire. "City Council has given some consideration to the question of whether the utility as it operates in Longwood comes under the city's utility control ordinance," Julian said. Sanlando is requesting rate increases, ranging from 7 1/2 per cent to 24 1/2 per cent, to its single family home customers and an increase of 4 1/2 per cent to users of its water service.

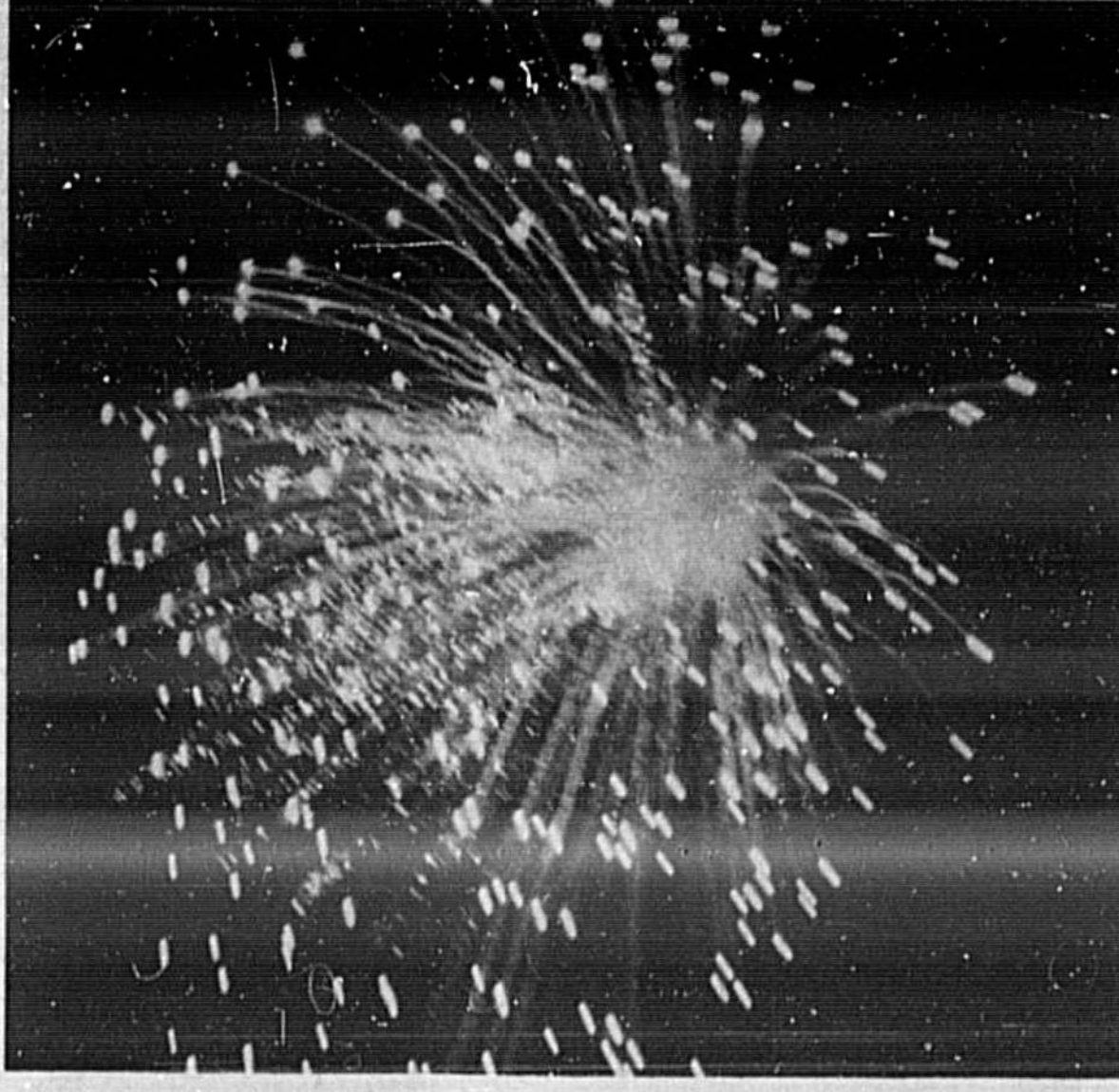
And the zoo visitors drove into the city for a stop at the Fourth of July celebration in the downtown area.

By nightfall, finding a parking spot along Seminole Blvd., Park Avenue, Palmetto Avenue and Sanford Avenue was a difficult job.

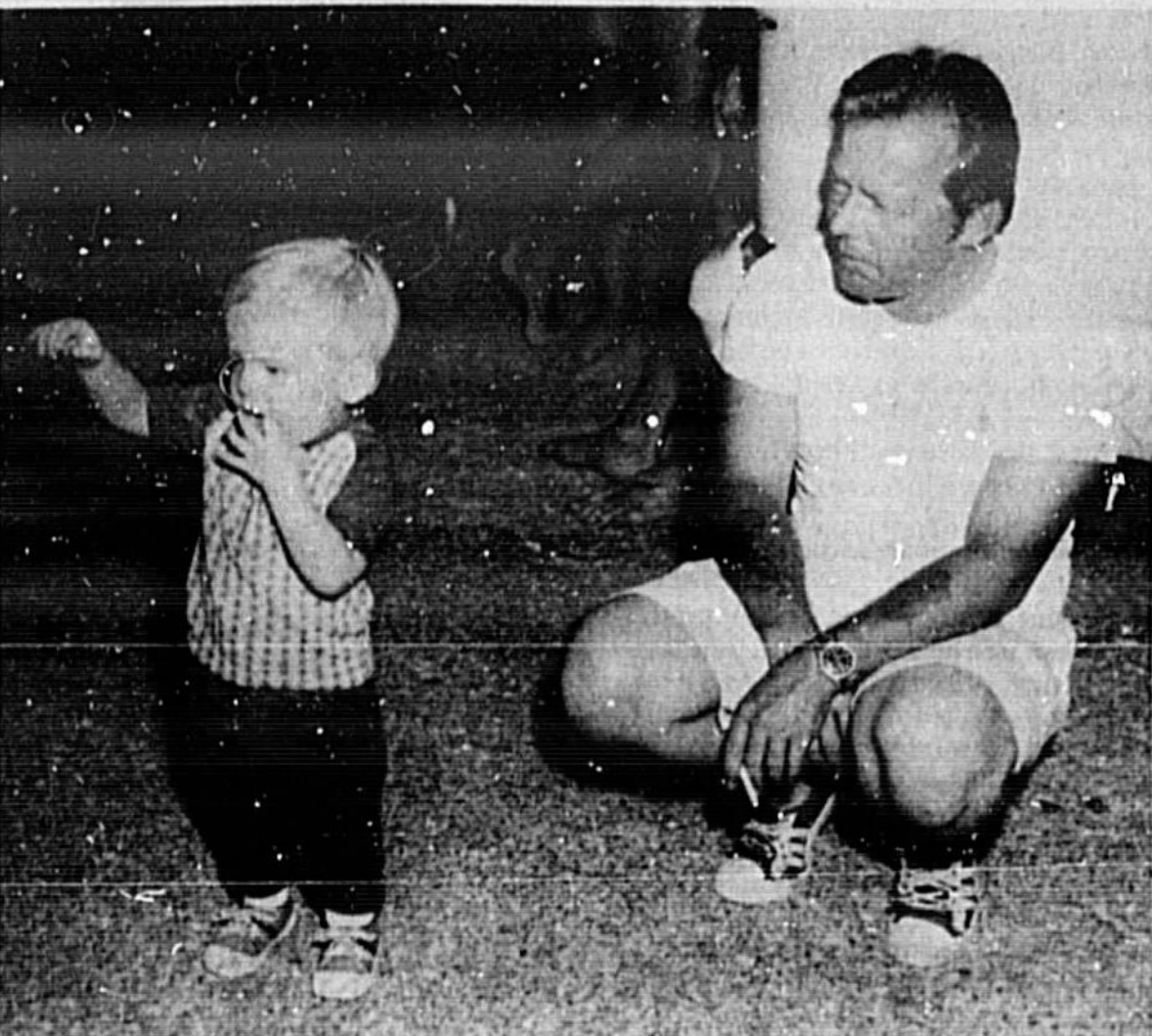

(Continued From Page 1A) "Comply with new rules and regulations" game with the federal government. Numerous revisions to plans, changes, updated cost estimates were made as federal laws changed again and again. The entire method of effluent disposal was changed from land spreading irrigation to secondary treatment with ultimate outflow into the serve, both Longwood and Altamonte was approved by the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council. In January, 1973, EPA awarded Altamonte a \$3,492,000 grant for the design phase of the sewer plant and a request was submitted to EPA for \$1.9 million for Altamonte Springs. In April, 1973, applications were made to EPA requesting a \$33,000 grant for the design phase of the sewer plant and a grant was approved, which the city accepted in July, 1973. In August, 1973, applications were made for grants for the construction phase and the required public hearing was held in September, 1973. In November, 1973 the completed plans and specifications for the interceptor were forwarded to DPC and revised applications for the construction grant, calling for more money, were submitted. 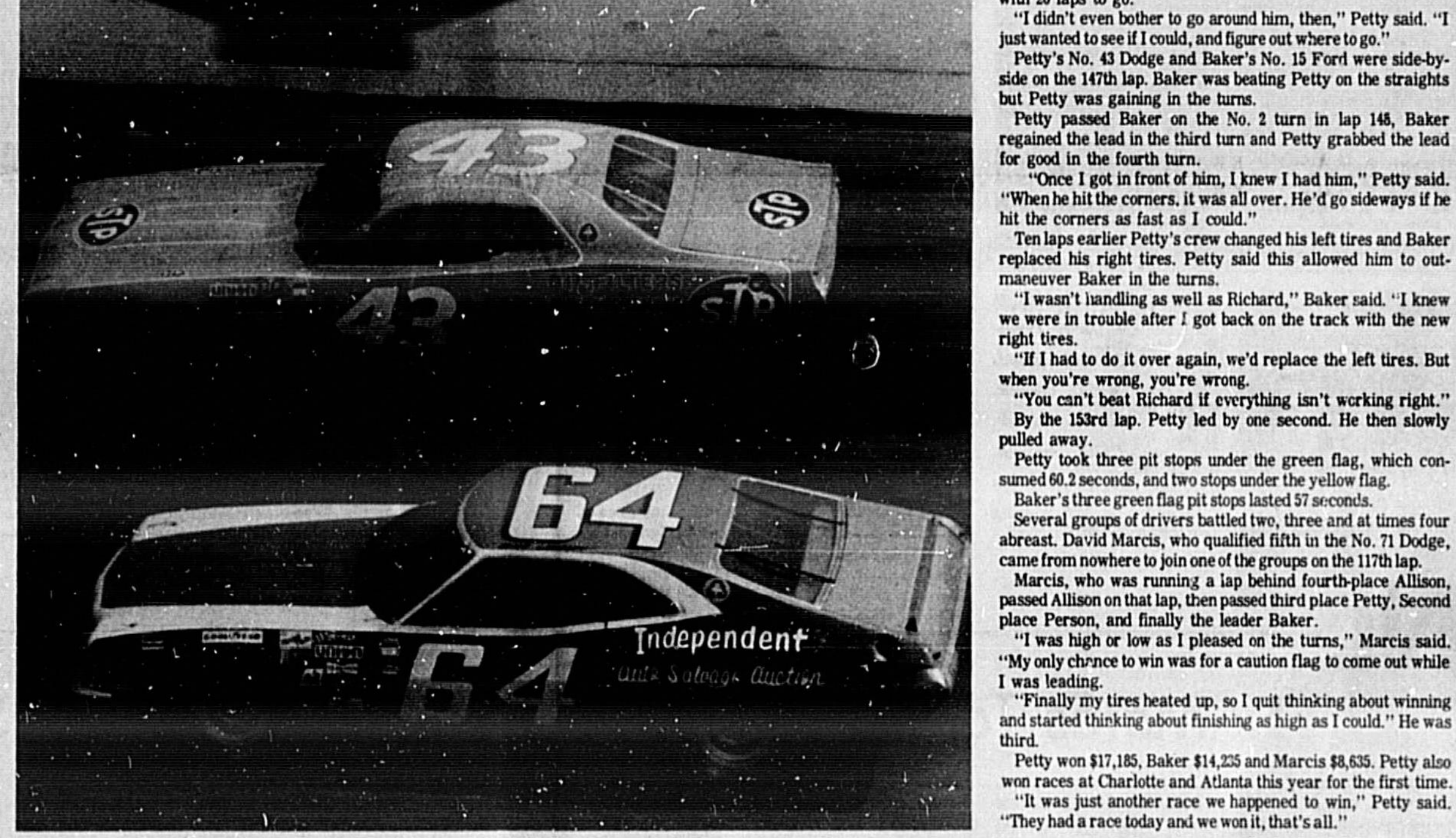
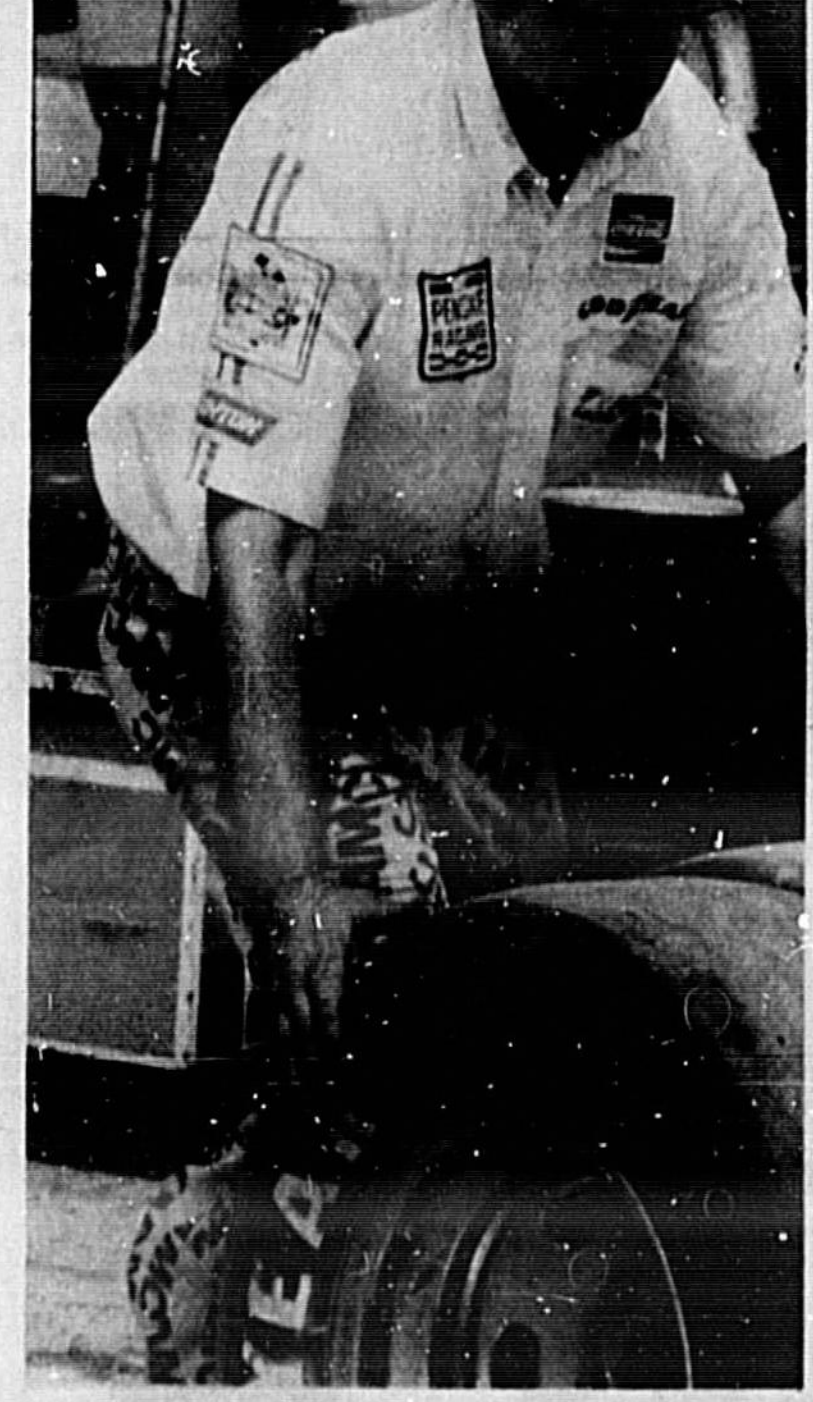

Ruffian's No Fool; Pleasure Run Today

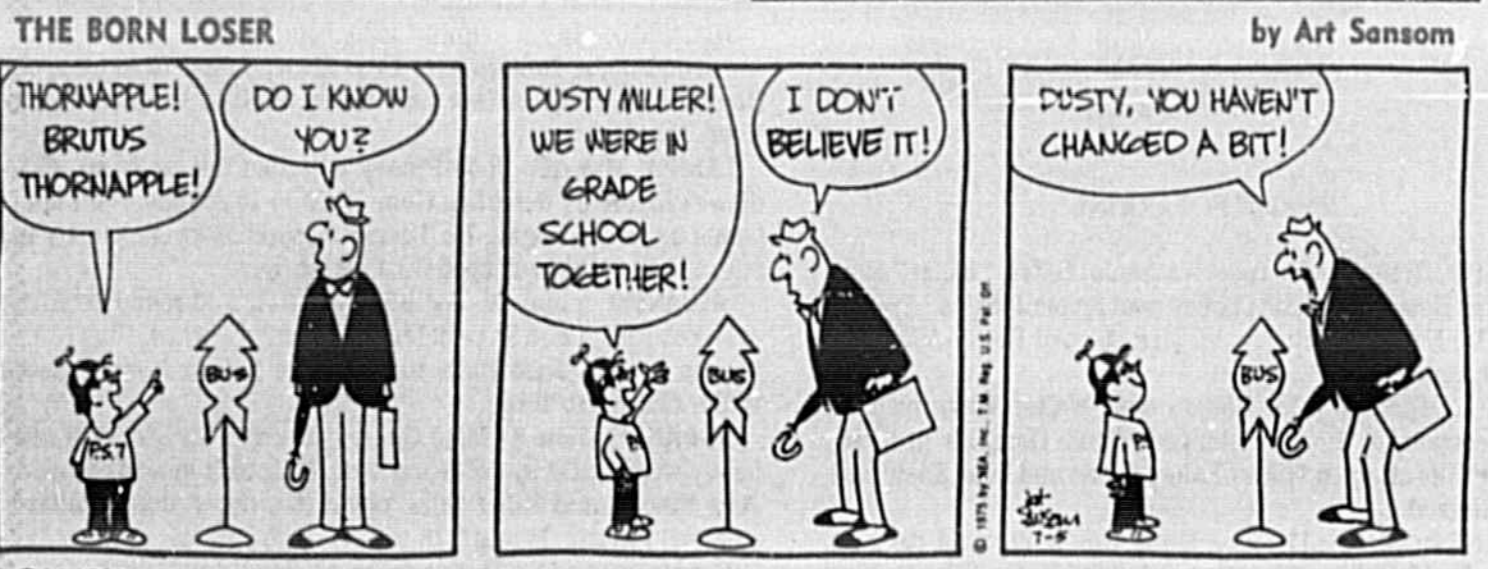
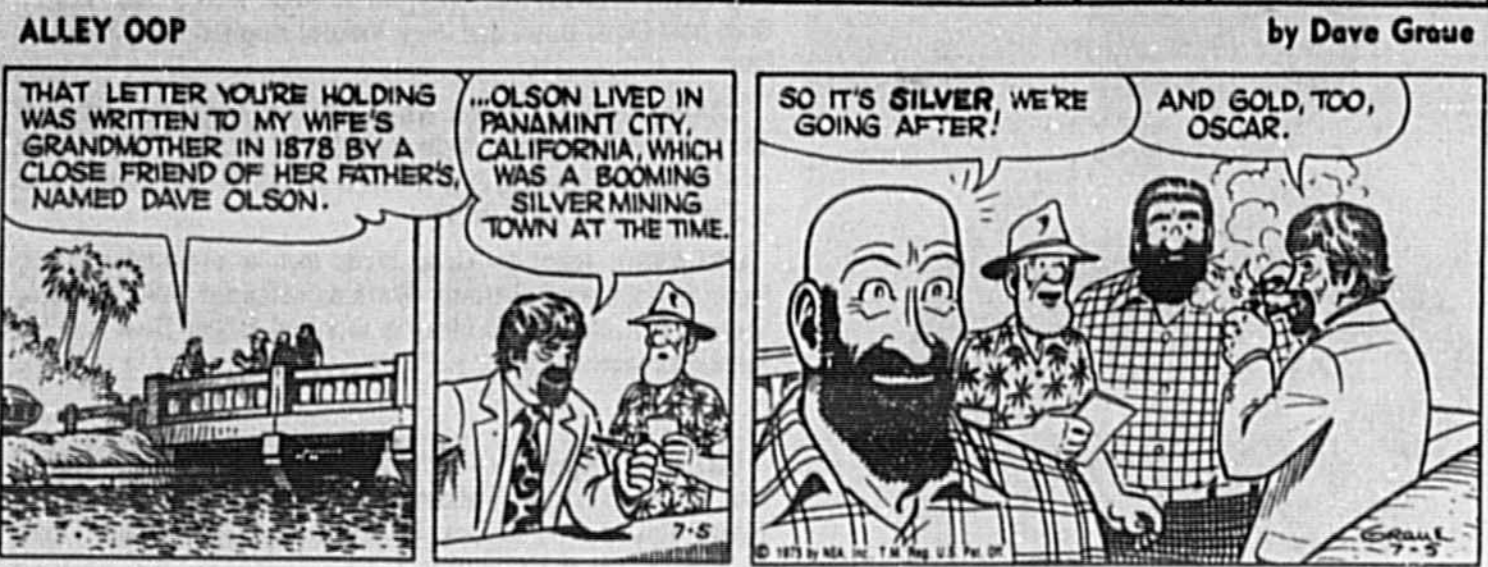
NEW YORK (AP) — Ruffian faces the supreme test of her famous career in a \$350,000 match race against Foolish Pleasure at Belmont Park today. The unbeaten 3-year-old filly, proclaimed by many as the greatest of her sex in turf annals, is favored to make it 11 in a row by whipping the winner of the Kentucky Derby in this battle of the sexes that has quickened the heartbeat of horse lovers. The 1 1/4-mile sports spectacular is expected to lure a record crowd of 85,000 and go down in turf history as one of the great sports spectacles. Post time is about 5 p.m. EDT, and the race will be nationally televised by CBS. Ruffian, known for her effortless style of running, has been on top all the way in each of her 10 starts. That is why she has been proclaimed by some as the greatest filly of all time. Still, because the daughter of Reviewer has raced only against her own sex, many believe she can prove her supremacy, only by beating Foolish Pleasure. It will be a stern test. "Ruffian's tough, but we're going to test her," Leroy Jolley, trainer of Foolish Pleasure, said. "The only way to beat her is to run with her. We'll test her all right."

McTear Ties Mark In 100-Meter Dash

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Led by world class sprinter Houston McTear and smooth-running Brenda Morehead, the American men's and women's teams held slight edges going into yesterday's final competition in the fourth annual Russian-American junior track meet. The men were ahead 64-53 and the women 36-26 after Friday's opening round in which four records were broken and three were tied. Temperatures in the 90s sent many Russian athletes scurrying for shade between events at the University of Nebraska's Ed Weir Stadium in Lincoln. McTear, 18, a high school senior at Baker, Fla., and a bright prospect for the 1976 U.S. Olympic team, was one of the athletes the crowd of 6,000 came to watch. Two months ago he ran the 100-yard dash in a world record-tying time of nine seconds flat. He was timed in 10.2 in the 100-meters to tie the mark set by Michigan State's Marshall Dill in 1972. Paul Jordan, 18, Philadelphia, heaped 53-9 to take the triple jump, some six inches better than the previous record by Russia's Mikhail Syegal in 1972.

The heart led gave South a good start toward making his contract, since the king of hearts was no longer a problem. At trick two South led his ace of clubs and got the bad news. "There was a sure trump loser." "Could he do anything to avoid losing two diamond tricks?"

South saw that he could with a lot of luck, but dummy's ace and king of spades and ruffed a spade. The spades broke. Then he cashed his second high heart, ruffed a heart and led a fourth spade. East did the best he could by ruffing, but South just discarded a losing diamond and was home with the bacon.

The bidding has been: 5

When you play that a reverse bid by opener is a one-trump force, you can get to be "Reverse happy."

Thus, South hoped to get to notrump and decided to bid his three-card heart suit with that aim in mind. We assume that if North had raised hearts, South would have played a heart contract with three in his hand and four in dummy. When North rebid three clubs, South abandoned the idea of notrump and jumped to five clubs.

Five clubs is the right final contract. West really should have opened a diamond instead of a heart into South's bid suit, but West didn't like to lead from kings and he held equals in

Twenty-Two Die On Florida's Highways Over Fourth

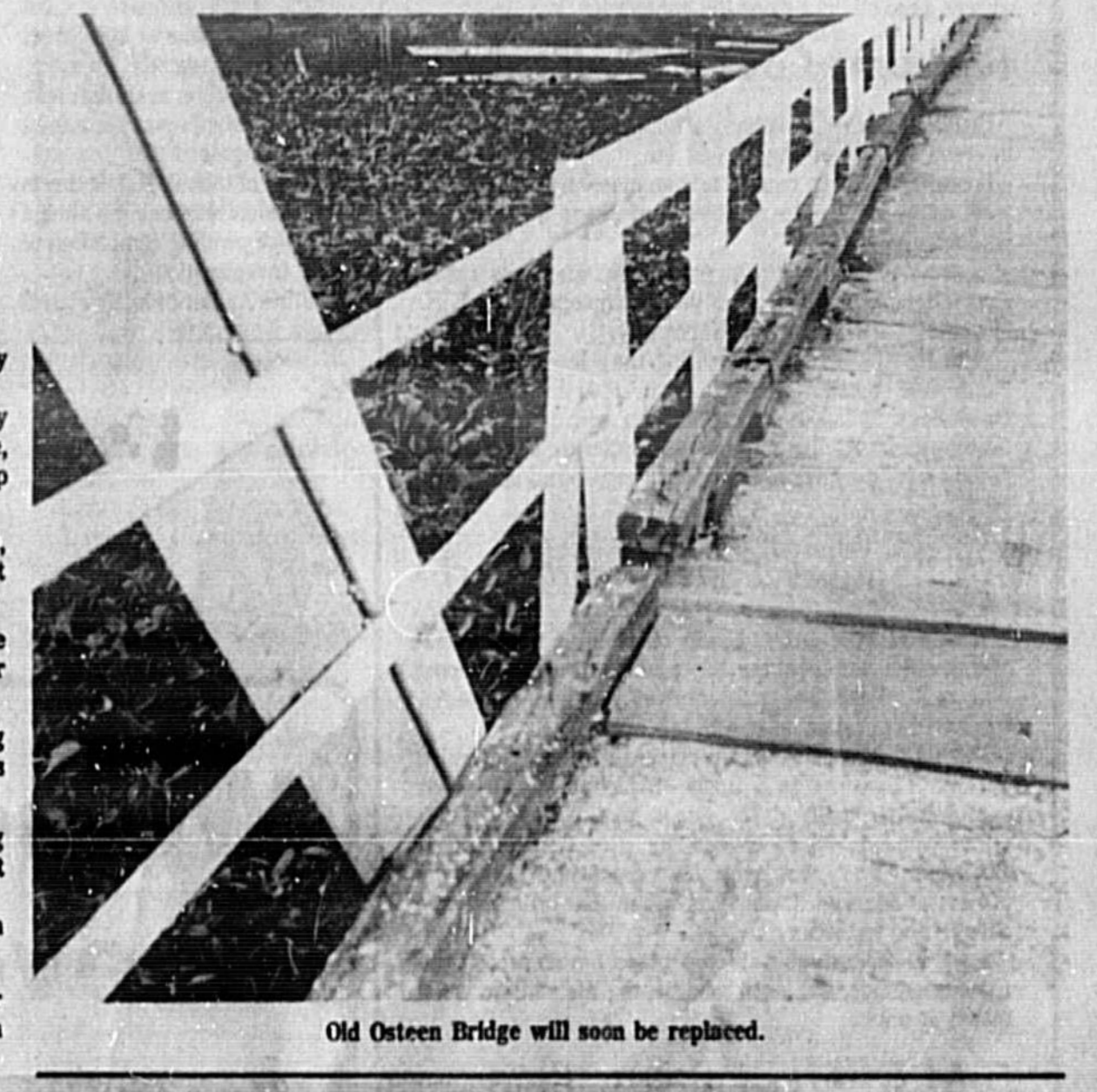

The deaths of a man and two teen-aged boys in a collision in West Palm Beach brought to at least 22 the number of traffic victims in the state over the Independence Day weekend, the Florida Highway Patrol says.
Troopers had predicted before the weekend started at 6 p.m. last Thursday that traffic mishaps would kill at least 23 by holiday's end at midnight Sunday.
Troopers said the triple-fatality came Saturday when one car clipped the rear of a second, then veered into a head-on collision with a third. The driver and two youthful passengers in the first car were killed.
The identity of the driver was temporarily withheld. Troopers said the passengers were Bryon David Hock, 16, of West Palm Beach and Harold Burt Cloud, 14, of Palm Beach.
A Friday accident in Brevard County had claimed two victims by late Sunday, troopers said.
They said truck driver Marvin McGehe, 21, of West Palm Beach, was killed when smashed by an oncoming car as he worked under the hood of his vehicle, parked in an emergency lane.
—Joseph W. Ray, 48, of Hollywood, was killed Saturday when hit as he walked along State Road 565 near Brooksville.
—Barbara Cooper, 36, of Harbor Oaks died in a two-car crash Saturday on State Road 93 in rural Columbia County.
—Gary Arthur Anderson, 20, of St. Cloud, Minn., was killed when his car hit a power pole Saturday at an intersection in Okaloosa County.
—John Debolt, 64, of North Largo, died Saturday when the car in which he was a passenger failed to yield the right of way and was struck by another vehicle in Pinellas Park.
—Lester Watford, 21, of Jacksonville, was crushed to death Saturday after his car went out of control and flipped times.
—William Lott, 22, of Okeechobee, died Saturday when he lost control of his car on a rural road near Highlands and it plunged into a canal.
—William Emerick, 20, of Lakeland, was killed Saturday when his car went out of control and smashed into a utility pole.
Friday wrecks killed six and a late Thursday accident claimed one victim, troopers added.

OSTEEN BRIDGE

Construction Work To Begin July 14

The state has issued the work order for replacement of the rickety Osteen Bridge and contractors may begin moving equipment in this week to begin the almost \$3 million job, an official announced today.
"That's good news," Doug Stenstrom said of the Department of Transportation's July 2 issuance of a work order to Hoodville, Duval Wright of Jacksonville.
Stenstrom, chairman of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce's Roads Committee, said by law work on the bridge must get underway 16 days after the work order is in the hands of the contractor.
News of the long awaited work order reaches Seminole after seven persons last year lost their lives in the murky waters of the St. Johns River after a truck ploughed into a slower moving van on the narrow, antiquated bridge called Osteen.
It was that accident and resulting news stories and lawsuits that prompted state officials in February to come up with a \$3 million appropriation to replace the bridge. Stenstrom says the job will cost in the "vicinity" of \$3 million. The exact appropriation was for \$2,615,000, he said.
Stenstrom said contractors may begin moving equipment in this week to replace the bridge. He said contractors informed him plans are to definitely begin the work at least by July 14.
Construction on the bridge was not expected to begin until August, but Stenstrom says the timetable has been moved up. Stenstrom predicts it will take about a year and one half to span the half mile over the St. Johns.
Officials on the Roads and Bridges Committee have worked more than 16 years to get the narrow structure replaced with a bridge which adheres to today's standards.
In October of last year, rescue and emergency crews worked for three hours on the narrow bridge to raise the van and free the bodies. Police said six children managed to escape death or were rescued after the van plunged into the river.
Following the tragic, life-taking accident, officials redoubled their efforts to induce DOT officials to replace the wooden bridge with a more modern, wider structure.
Then in February, DOT's William Benedict announced the state had allocated the necessary funds.
His announcement was greeted with acclaim by city officials. Notably Sanford Mayor Lee Moore, who was quoted as saying, "I feel like jumping up and down."
And City Commissioner Julian Stenstrom, Doug's brother, called the appropriation the "best news we've had as far as roads and bridges."
Officials say replacement of the Osteen Bridge has been the "toughest project" they were ever involved in.
Driving across the bridge can be a harrowing experience. Cars are required to reduce speeds when pulling onto the bridge.
And from beginning to end, cars must hug outside guardrails to keep from scraping the paint off oncoming vehicles.
Some motorists refuse to cross the bridge if a second car is spotted on the structure.
"You use discretion when you see a car coming," one driver commented. "And if it's a truck — forget it."

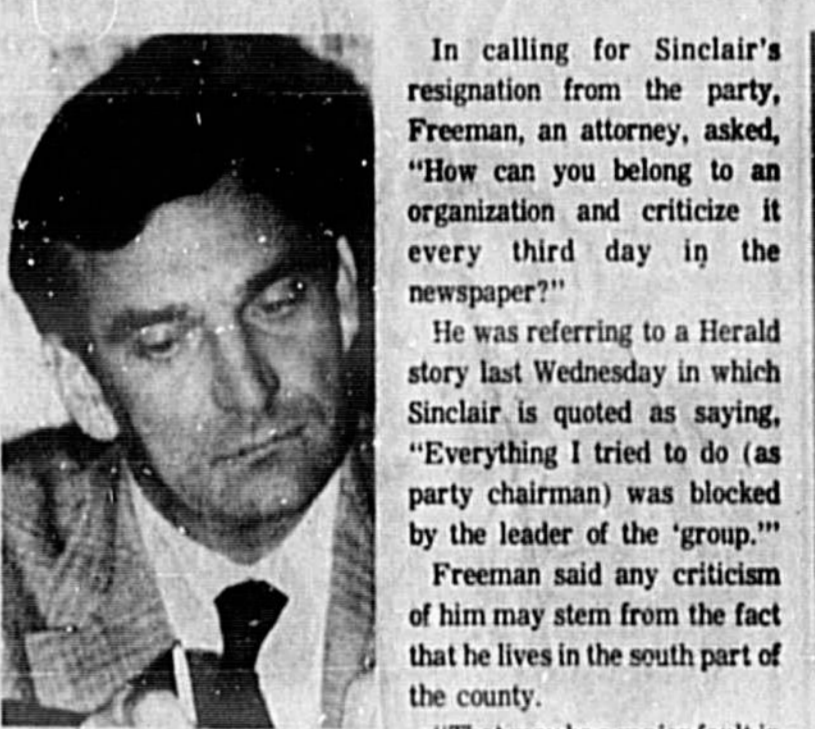

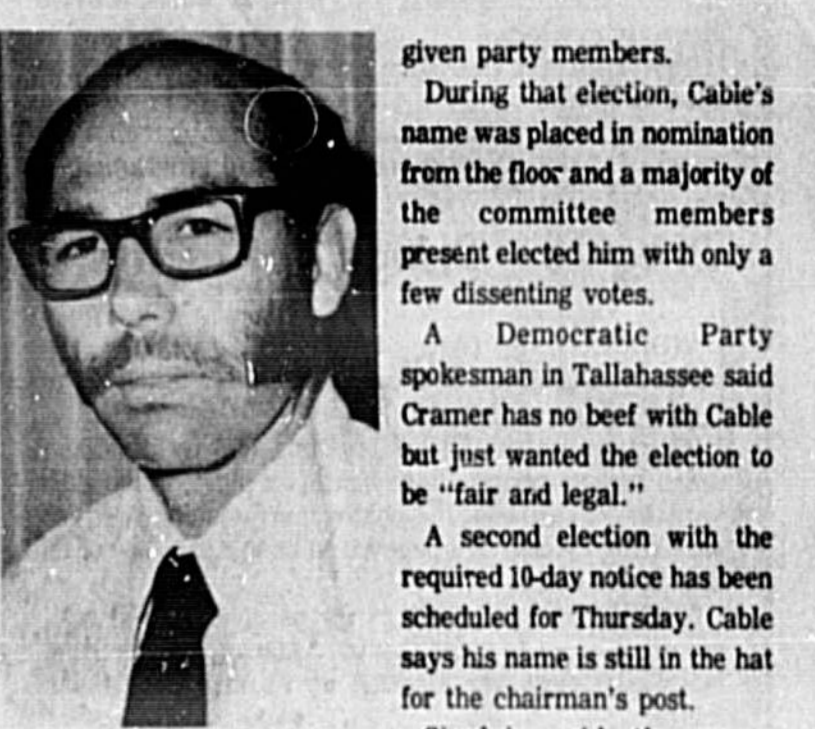
State Committee... Charges 'Sour Grapes' Freeman Refute's Sinclair Claims

Seminole County's Democratic State Committee, Tom Freeman, today called charges that the party is split with one faction or "group" trying to win power and seize control "sour grapes."
"I don't think there is any 'group.' Very evidently Larry Sinclair has a big case of sour grapes," Freeman said in response to Sinclair's charges that a "group" is attempting a takeover of the Democratic party in Seminole County.
Freeman also called for Sinclair's resignation from the party. Already Sinclair has stepped down as party chairman. In his resignation notice, Sinclair cited a "group" which is trying to win power. The "group," Sinclair said, was his main reason for stepping down.
A Herald source said Tom Freeman is the head of that "group," but Freeman disagrees. "I don't think there is any 'group.' It looks like normal politics," he said.

In calling for Sinclair's resignation from the party, Freeman, an attorney, asked, "How can you belong to an organization and criticize it every third day in the newspaper?"
He was referring to a Herald story last Wednesday in which Sinclair is quoted as saying, "Everything I tried to do as party chairman was blocked by the leader of the 'group.'"
Freeman said any criticism of him may stem from the fact that he lives in the south part of the county.
"That may be a major fault in some people's minds," he said. But, Freeman said, "I'm an elected officer, state committee man, and I represent that group — the whole group."
Freeman's comments follow Sinclair's statement last week that the temporary ouster of party chairman Rod Cable was

given party members.
During that election, Cable's name was placed in nomination from the floor and a majority of the committee members present elected him with only a few dissenting votes.
A Democratic Party spokesman in Tallahassee said Cramer has no beef with Cable but just wanted the election to be "fair and legal."
