

### Changes in People, Changes in Church

By REV. DAVID POLING

The past decade of church life has experienced enormous changes-perhaps more than any other time in a century. One may challenge such a grand, sweeping observation but it is apparent in almost every segment of the Christian church. And one need not lean on the social convulsions and controversies that have jarred the faith-

Consider the form and style of worship. Even the most secular observed would note the fresh, innovative forms of worship that are now part of congregational life. The broad selection of new music, the wide participation of group singing, the extensive use of all kinds of musical instruments (yes, guitars and drums) the appearance of the dance as well as drama. Liturgical forms have burst into new translations and the splash of color in banners. robes, and flags is everywhere evident.

Consider also the new styles of leadership. The rigid. tight conformity of the 1940/1950's which meant few whispers in church and fewer smiles has been submerged in a lighter touch, a more loving sensitivity to the presence of PEOPLE in the pew. The increasing participation of laity in the service, at points of leadership, and the broad inclusion of young people and children, have made many churches into a whole new experience of joy and Patterns of religious practice do fluctuate and wide

swings are almost the rule of any community that gathers people. It was surprising to learn in Trueblood's "Abraham Lincoln" that he was shot "while attending a theater on Good Friday." Holy Days and liturgical observation was not his style and probably not that of many of his friends. Says Trueblood, "Special days in the church year meant almost nothing to this man of the prairie, who voted to keep the legislature in session on Christmas

Perhaps the most dramatic change in church life is the freer life style that represents the mood and flavor of the younger congregations. Having been released from the negatives about drinking, smoking, and dancing, these Christian communities put their energies to work in dynamic, relating ways.

In a new book, "Come to the Party," Karl Olsson nails this point down when he says:

To live in the light is to admit that we are human and that, in spite of the presence of the Holy Spirit, we remain human. This does not mean that we are to presume on grace and to sin that grace may abound, for sin remains sin. But neither are we to construct a phony facade of piety which is designed to conceal our humanity. In our estimate of the current religious scene, at least in many of the main-line churches, this mood of openness and acceptance and joy is in the ascendency. Olsson gives a proper conclusion to our thought when he writes:

He is pleased to work through our ordinariness. He accepts us as people who fail and sin and need to be forgiven and restored . . . Nothing so alienates the church from the world as the pretensions of professional holiness.





For example, it should be apparent that President Nixon, a longtime champion of free trade, would not have taken the dramatic, attention-getting step of devaluing the dollar by 10 per cent and hinting at import quotas and surcharges as well as possibly higher U.S. tariffs if he were not critically concerned about the serious deficits in U.S. exports over imports.

Equally, it is apparent that President Nixon is not convinced that the 7.89 per cent devaluation of the dollar in 1971 was a measure strong enough to correct the trade imbalance, although many believe that it takes at least two years for the full impact of any devaluation to be

Forewarned, however, is forearmed. Moreover, the United States has more than 600 years of known coal supplies untouched by a miner's pick. Nuclear generation of electricity supplies only one tenth of one per cent of our total energy and only 10 per cent of our power needs after a full decade of development. We have yet to begin operating the first breeder nuclear reactor commercially.

Space Age Report

## 'Spinoff' Benefits Earthlings' Sea Hunt

The loudest criticism leveled against the nation's space program in the last decade is that too much money is spent on projects that have too little value to earthlings. Federal space agency officials have countered with long lists of so-called space technology "spinoffs" which benefit mankind in hospitals, in the home, the factory and the

business office. But this hasn't been enough for die-hard taxpayers who see their money somehow being frittered away on rides to the moon or around the world. Indeed, even scientists can't get together on whether unmanned, robot-type automated space vehicles equipped with sensitive instruments can do as good a research job as men in space.

Now the space agency has jumped a step ahead of the critics by combining space-age technology with oceanography in the constant search for proof that the seas are a major untapped source of food for a world in which millions still are nalf starved

The project has a lot of charisma, for one of the leading characters in this new drama of probing the oceans from space is the famed French explorer, photographer and oceanographer, Capt. Jacques Cousteau.

Cousteau's research ship, the Calypso, now near the bottom of the world on an Antarctic expedition, occupies center stage in the drama, called by the space agency a project "to see how space-age technology can be used in oceanographic investigations to define biologically productive ocean regions.

Some of the other leading roles are played by America's family of weather, navigational and earth resources technology satellites (ERTS) as they spin around the globe. So far, reports Cousteau in a message sent back to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration from the Calypso, the results of the space-oceanographic team have

"The space-age satellites have opened a whole new dimension to ocean resource monitoring," he says. Cousteau, aboard the Calypso, is in contact five days a week with Nasa's Ames Research Center, Mountain View, Calif. He transmits and receives information via weather and communications satellites and the Applications Technology Satellite (ATS) operated by the Goodard Space Flight Center, Greenbelt, Md.

The Calypso, cruising along the coast of the Antarctic Peninsula, measures chlorophyll and temperature readings of the ocean, then transmits the information via ATS satellite

John Arvesen of Ames and Dr. Ellen Weaver, an associate professor of biology at California State University, San Jose, match these measurements with ocean color and temperature observations from the earth resources technology satellite (ERTS-1), the Nimbus and NOAA weather satellites for a chlorophyll reading. A measurement of too little chlorophyll in the ocean

indicates a low food producing region. Extremely high chlorophyll content could be a sign of pollution. So Cousteau and his space colleagues at Ames are searching for ocean bottom areas with medium chlorophyll content - a sign of high ocean food productivity. Dr. Weaver, a former National Academy of Science

associate at Ames, emphasizes that another important figure in the space-ocean drama is the microscopic plant called phytoplankton. It is found throughout all the oceans and is the basis of virtually all food production in the seas, for it is the start of the food chain for all fish.

Eventually Dr. Weaver and Arvesen hope to develop even more advanced sensors to monitor entire oceans at a

A Onetime POW Recalls How It Was

WASHINGTON (NEA There is much psychiatric scare talk published these days by experts on prisoners of war. The danger is, this advice could make wives so cautious and analytical to-

ward their returning husbands that untold damage might; It took me perhaps 60 seconds to adjust to freedom. And zero seconds to adjust to my wife and child. I was a prisoner of the Japanese in World War II, in solitary coninement for six months, infected with disease most of the time, interrogated at length daily those 180 days.

Regarding the rations, being designed for smaller men. my weight loss was such that seven months after getting out of prison (despite six meals a day for an extended period afterward) I was required to sign medical-underweight waivers for active duty.

Six months is not nine years, or four, or even one. But the experience does give me some partial knowledge. Experts report that POWs try in prison to escape from reality, which makes adjustment to freedom difficult. am a quite normal human being-and I found that in the periods the interrogators were not grilling, I was preparing my mental defenses for the next session, reviewing my past life, studying what my aims and ambitions were, thinking what I wanted to do with the remainder of my years, almost as though I were in a cell in a monastery-even though I was firmly convinced the Japanese meant to execute a group of us, including myself, as an

The rigors of the prison cell and the prospect of death stimulated the most profound introspection. It led even to a detailed review of what I had learned in school and after. I am a better man for it. And I think I am typical. The problem of basic survival as a prisoner was so great—with running sores and meager medical attention with constant hunger so great that on one occasion I fer eted in a dirty crack in the floor for 20 minutes for one grain of rice which had fallen from my bowl, and with the mental juggling necessary to outwit and to outlast my interrogators-there was little time for despair or

Afterward, my inner pride at having survived without breaking gave me an inner confidence which has neven'

We go through life wondering if we would break in a crisis. All men must certainly have these doubts. When a disaster strikes, and we survive with dignity, we have something which is without price.

We must keep this in mind in welcoming these prisoners of war home-most have certainly proved themselves.



#### Political Notebook For Penn Central, Merely a Stopgap

The predictable Band-Aid-type legislation that ordered Penn Central strikers back to work for 90 days does not answer but merely postpones all kinds of questions relat ing to the future of rail transportation in this country. Not the least of these questions is the old, old one o eatherbedding on train crews.

The congressional resolution on stopping the strike also uspended the cause of it by restraining Penn Central from putting into motion the federal court-sanctioned plan of its bankruptcy trustees to eliminate what they say are unneeded employes-the second brakemen whose jobs like those of the coal-stoking firemen before them, have

been rendered unnecessary by technology. One would expect a strike which ties up railroad transportation in a third of the nation, which strands million of commuters, which forces the lay-offs of thousands of workers in industries supplied by the railroad and which would have cost an already bankrupt line an additional two or three million dollars a day for every day it continued, one would expect such a strike to have some fairly impressive-nay, overriding-objective in terms of the


nterests of the strikers. But the strike was not over wages. It was not over hours. It was not over working conditions. The issue was not even the compelling one of job security, for the trustees have assured the United Transportation Union (UTU) that none of some 5,700 surplus employes will be thrown out of work but will simply not be replaced when


Unless the Penn Central trustees are lying about this and no one has made such a charge, one is forced to wonder if what is really at stake is the determination of a union not to lose dues-paying members. If so, then what we have here is a union exerting vast disruptive power in furtherance of its self-interest as an

institution, quite apart from the interests of its members, to say nothing of the public interest Industry spokesmen claim that this is the case, and the facts of the strike do not contradict them, even though UTU President Al H. Chesser told a congressional committee that the union has made "endless concessions" to the Penn Central because of its financial situation that it

has not made to any other line. It is also true that while eliminating 5,700 jobs would save the company something like \$100 million a year, this is on paper only. It has been estimated that it would take about six years to accomplish the reduction of personnel through the process of normal attrition.

But even if the company could streamline its train crews immediately, so bad is its financial plight that even \$100 million would not help very much. The trustees have asked for a minimum federal handout of \$600 mil- 2 lion just to keep the railroad going for the next four years.
