ORLANDO, Aug. 3.—Eleven double-headers, each of vital importance in deciding fourth place in Florida State League play, are slated for presentation within the month, according to official schedule alterations released here today by League Secretary Peter Schaaf.

With Germany's Help

In spite of optimistic reports from high ranking diplomats who appear convinced that the Russo-Japanese conflict will not spread and that some peaceful adjustment of the situation will be found, to the layman it seems fairly evident that the situation is anything but broken out and that this one will be no exception to that which marked the conquest of Ethiopia or the civil war in Spain.

It is the fighting around Changkungfeng hill were an isolated incident between two countries whose relations otherwise were peaceful, the conclusion which seems to have been reached by the diplomats would be logical, but this outlook is but one of scores of similar skirmishes which the Russians, which have marked the Japanese expansion in Asia. Basically there is every reason in the world why the Japs and Russians should go to war with each other—that is, every reason which ever has existed for going to war.

Furthermore, the outlook for a successful war with Russia is not as hopeless for the Japanese, already bogged down in a war with China, as might at first appear. The Japanese have the psychological advantage of having decisively defeated the Russians in a great war which took place in 1905, and the Japanese have the added advantage of many trained veterans who have been learning invaluable lessons in the year-old war with China; whereas few of the Russian soldiers have ever smelled smoke.

But undoubtedly what the Japanese are depending upon more than anything else is the alliance with Germany. Of all the people who are on the earth, Russians are the most detested by the Germans. The Slavs and Germanic peoples have been enemies for centuries. The communist and fascist forms of government represent the extreme left and right wings of political thought. Hitler has said again and again that his ultimate objective is the Russian Union.

While treaties and alliances are none too dependable in this day and time, and the Japanese would be foolish to place too much reliance in a pact with Germany under ordinary circumstances, an occasion where Russia were seriously embroiled in a war with the Japanese would present just too good an opportunity to the Nazis for the German war lords to miss. Never again would they be likely to have such an excellent time to strike.

And so we believe that the diploma has something more than an ordinary incident to settle this time. The Japs are probably counting heavily on help from Germany and they will probably get it. While things for the moment are fairly calm in Europe, the chances are it will not be long before the storm. And almost any day now we may expect Germany to start stirring things up again.

### New Apprentice System Tried By California School

#### Thirty Students Are Given Places With Houses of Business

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif., Aug. 4.—"No experience, no job. So what?" Public school authorities here took this remark of a high school graduate as an indictment of educational methods. With growing frequency, it was being repeated by one variation or another by dozens of graduates.

Albert D. Graves, Superintendent of Schools, set out to do something about it. The result is a "work-and-learn" vocational program, which has placed 30 apprentices with business houses and industrial plants in its first semester.

Of these first products of the experiment, only two failed to make a satisfactory showing at once in the practical application of their training. Joseph M.

Sharp, Vocational Co-ordinator named by Superintendent Graves to direct the program, expects to place 100 boys and girls in apprentice jobs next semester.

Students work and study alternately under the system designed by Mr. Sharp. One day they spend in their classes and the next they work as apprentices in department stores, creameries, haberdasheries, offices, and countless other business places.

The Chamber of Commerce and service clubs are co-operating with Mr. Sharp by urging their members to employ apprentices wherever possible.

The system being used in San Bernardino stipulates that the apprentices remain under the jurisdiction of the school system. Employers hire the students at a previously established rate of pay, to provide the apprentice with the experience he needs, to find employment. In many cases the apprentice remains with the same firm on a permanent basis following his graduation.

During the apprentice period the schools award scholastic credit equal to that given for any other type of vocational training, and agree to co-ordinate in the classroom theoretical education and specific train-

ing in the business chosen by the apprentice.

Four major problems were encountered in instituting the program, Mr. Graves said. These were: Obtaining permission for the experiment from the Vocational Education Commission of the State Department of Education; securing further permission from the State Division of Industrial Welfare; getting liability insurance to protect the students; and selling the idea to the community so thoroughly as to insure its continued support.

A committee of 12 solved the fourth problem. Its members spread the theory of vocationalism among civic organizations, merchants, and businessmen, all of whom were enthusiastic.

During the first year of high school, the student is given tests to determine whether he is fitted for the type of work he has chosen, or to help him decide upon a vocation if he has not already done so. Broad, general courses are followed during the next two years. During the senior years the student devotes half his time to courses related directly to his chosen field and the remainder to working in that field.

## THIRST QUENCHERS

Sweet fruit punches are very refreshing on a hot day. To make them add one tablespoon of broken bark cinnamon, twelve whole cloves and one seal one-half cup of water for each cup of sugar. ## TO PROTECT RAINCOATS

Store raincoats away from the heat. When any tears appear in rubber coats mend them at once on the underneath side with rubber cement or place a piece of material under the tear and put it in place with a heavy glue.

## UNCRYSTALIZED SYRUP

Add a pinch of soda for each two cups of sugar to help keep syrup from crystallizing. Sprinkle the soda on top while the syrup is cooking and don't stir it.

## Crump Group Wins Victory In Tennessee

### Gov. Browning Goes Down To Defeat As Prentice Cooper Is Given Nomination

## Senator Berry Also Defeated Primary Culminates Bitterest Campaign In History Of State

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 5.—(AP)—The Democratic faction headed by National Committeeman E. H. Crump and senior United States Senator Kenneth D. McKellar, won a smashing victory over Governor Gordon Browning and junior Senator George L. Berry in yesterday's statewide primary.

Prentice Cooper, 43-year-old Shelbyville attorney and former state commander of the American Legion, was nominated for governor over Browning who two years ago received the greatest majority ever given a gubernatorial candidate in the state.

In the 1936 primary the Governor had Crump's support. This year Cooper had it.

Senator Berry bowed to A. Tom Stewart of Winchester, a district attorney who expressed 100 percent endorsement of President Roosevelt's policies.

Alton Richardson, 25, of Englewood, was slashed to death and scores of others, including J. Tom Taylor, candidate for Circuit criminal judge, were injured in violence that marked McKinn county's bloodiest Democratic primary in history.

Authorities were forced to close some polls. Richardson had attempted to interfere in a fist fight between five men at the polls when his throat was slashed.

He died in a hospital later.

Pulls at Clanton, Tenn., closed after election officers, C. S. Simpson, and Jake Burris, judge, both were beaten and stabbed. Both were in a hospital.

At Ft. Worth, fighting marked the voting and the jail was full. Taylor, who opposed incumbent S. K. Hicks, Circuit judge, suffered scalp wounds in a fight with John Rogers and Jim Carmichael, election officials, which resulted when Taylor demanded to be shown election lists. Carmichael suffered injuries about the face and head.

No arrests were made in this case, but two other arrests were made at Williamsburg in other fights.

At Athens, Visk Logan allegedly took an axe and tried to chop down several election booths. He was arrested on a charge of public drunkenness.

## Father Of Sanford Business Man Dies In His 95th Year

Edwin E. Randall, father of E. B. Randall, Sanford business man, died at 8:50 o'clock Thursday night at the home of his daughter, Mrs. George Randall, in Daytona Beach at the age of 95.

Mr. Randall, who was born in Windsor, Nova Scotia on May 14, 1844, came to Florida in 1888 and settled in Orange City. He lived in Sanford from 1894 to 1931, during which time he was engaged in the contracting and building business.

He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. George Randall, of Daytona Beach, and Mrs. Emma A. Schacht, of Leesport, and by Mrs. E. E. Randall, of Sanford, and three grand-children, Clarence H. Randall, Lakeland; Mrs. Robert Davenport, Daytona Beach; and Robert Schacht of Jacksonville.

Funeral services will be conducted at the Rogers & Westcott Funeral Home in Daytona Beach at 10 o'clock Saturday morning and will be in charge of the Rev. J. H. Caldwell.

## 15 Italian Sailors Killed In Blast

ROME, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Fifteen Italian sailors were killed and 20 injured in a fire-bomb explosion aboard the Italian Cruiser Quarto in the port of Pollenza, Island of Malorca, the government announced today. The accident occurred last Monday but was not included until today's communication. The Quarto had been on duty in Spanish waters for 18 months. Malorca is held by the Spanish insurgents.

## Daytona Beach In Mathias Day Of Ohio

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla., Aug. 5.—(AP)—This Florida east coast city, famous for its wide, smooth beach, was named 86 years ago in honor of the man who founded it two years earlier.

Mathias Day of Mansfield, Ohio, founded the city on the Atlantic ocean and the Halifax River in 1850. Two years later the Federal Writers' Project says Day and two other pioneers decided the community should have a name. They called upon other settlers for suggestions.

"Daytown," "Daytonia" and "Daytona" were recommended and the latter name was chosen. The section along the beach became a separate community later and was called "Daytime Beach". In 1924 the two cities were merged under the present name.

The "Beach" part of the name was retained because the city had become known all over the world for its fine ocean scenery, the wide smooth sands on which a number of land speed records were made.

## Building Here For July Hits High Figure

### Permits Of \$17,650 Exceeds Total Of Last July By More Than 15 Thousand

Building permits issued during July amounted to \$17,650 according to the monthly report of City Hall departments. Last year the same month saw permits issued to the amount of \$2,410, a difference of \$15,240.

The great increase of July this year over last July was due to a \$15,000 permit in the Yowell Company for remodeling, and for installing an air conditioning unit.

Seven electric permits were issued with fees amounting to \$10,000 for the same month, three permits were granted with fees amounting only to \$150, a difference of \$9,850.

Four plumbing permits were granted with fees amounting to \$100. For July last year one plumbing permit was granted with a fee amounting to \$50, a difference of \$50.

Police collected fines amounting to \$241 while last year fines for July amounted to \$368.65, a difference of \$127.65.

During July Police handled a total of 55 cases, 22 of which were for disorderly conduct. Sixteen were dismissed and four transferred to other counties.
