

Annual Exodus To Florida On Trains Clogged 7,000 From New York Area Leaving Daily; New Record Seen

NEW YORK CITY, Dec. 6—(AP)—The annual exodus to Florida is on. It commenced so early this year that tourist authorities readily admitted that last year's record migration and spending figures are certain to be shattered this vacation season.

At present, 7,000 persons living in the New York vicinity, it is estimated, are leaving daily for Florida's sunny resorts. That figure is expected to swell by several thousand more two weeks prior to the Christmas holidays. Transportation scarcity probably prevents thousands more from passing a holiday amid the orange blossoms.

Railroad officials said yesterday they are now carrying about 3,600 passengers a day on nearly a score of Florida trains leaving the city—thirteen of them de luxe through specials. An increase in the number of trains will be added Dec. 12, regardless of any prolonged coal strike, they asserted.

Except for a few upper berths and chair car accommodations, all space on the Atlantic Coast Railroad and the Seaboard Air Line Railroad, the two principal lines to the state, is filled until Jan. 2. As many as 180 telephones blink simultaneously each morning when the Pennsylvania Railroad opens its reservation switchboard and files out a few cancellations of choice space.

The situation, of course, is even worse on the air lines. Reservations began mounting early in September at the Eastern Air Lines, which now operates four teen planes daily to Miami and plans to put several more into service Dec. 1.

The air line has long waiting lists for plane space, with regular passenger manifests already filled until after the first of the year.

In Florida itself, the gaming centers, hotels, night clubs and horse and dog tracks are waiting with open arms for the holiday well, who are expected to spend over \$1,000,000,000 before the season closes April 15.

"The Miami Herald," in a recent article, said that 4,000,000 persons visited the state in 1945, spending nearly \$1,000,000,000. The newspaper predicts this year's population influx and monetary spree will certainly exceed last year's.

Many hotels at Palm Beach, Miami and St. Petersburg opened Nov. 15—a full month ahead of the normal time—to accommodate the visitors. However, New York representatives of many Florida hotels declined yesterday to predict a record season.

According to Harry M. Paulsen, president of the American Society of Travel Agents, the Florida holiday season will be "sway active."

"People have money, and a desire to go places will allow them to spend a tremendous lot of it," he said. "The urge to keep up with the Jones should make Florida's season very prosperous."

(Continued from page 1) clause has been adhered to in the past. But House's proposal would change that line-up to three Republicans and two Democrats.

Reece has interpreted the bipartisan clause to mean that the party in power in Congress should hold a majority of membership in these agencies. Some observers, however, look upon this political hair-splitting as the opening wedge to the coming battle between the Chief Executive and the new Republican Congress.

Republican committeemen attending the National Committee meeting now being held in Washington interpret the demand this way: They say their Chairman obviously is serving notice on Mr. Truman that unless he names Republican members to such agencies as the Federal Reserve Board, the Federal Security Agency, the Commodity Credit Corporation and maybe the National Housing Agency.

The Reece proposal came as a surprise to the meeting, which Republican leaders had expected would cover merely routine matters. It had been planned to defer any statements on national policy. Chairman Reece did propose cooperation with the Executive branch but at the same time he declared it was quite probable that differences between the President and Congress would crop up—so he made it plain that the Republicans intended to follow their own program in any event.

Reece made it clear, however, that the National Committee does not choose candidates but that they get nominated. Nevertheless, the members indulged in the time-honored practice of speculation on presidential possibilities for 1948 in the usual hotel lobby gatherings. Frequently mentioned was Harold E. Stassen, who is in Washington following developments of the committee meeting.

Friends of Stassen on the committee observed that the former Minnesota governor's strength in the Republican party has increased as a result of the November elections. Replacements in committee memberships and new members expected to come in through changes in state governorships have benefited Stassen.

Death Toll In Atlanta's Fire Climbs To 120

Smoke And Fumes Believed Cause Of Inquiry Is Begun Most Of Deaths

ATLANTA, Dec. 9. (AP)—An Atlanta newspaper, The Journal, today said three officials are believed "in general agreement" that a cigarette carelessly thrown into a mattress stored in a third floor hallway started the Wincoff Hotel fire.

The newspaper says an open stairwell 10 or 15 feet from the point of origin permitted the flames to sweep upward through the entire 15-story building, and the paper adds that investigators attribute the heavy loss of life to flimsy doors on the rooms.

ATLANTA, Dec. 9. (AP)—The Wincoff Hotel fire death toll climbed to 120 today as city and state investigations were ordered into Saturday's disastrous fire.

Fire Chief C. C. Strayton said that most of the deaths resulted from asphyxiation because smoke and fumes had no way to escape from the building. Strayton said 17 firemen were injured, most of them from fumes, as they attempted to fight their way through the smoke-filled passageways.

The Salvation Army, known for its quiet efficiency, took on just about the dirtiest job in the aftermath of the fire and worked around the clock identifying the almost unrecognizable bodies of

3 Year Old Girl Burned In Accident

Father Throws Can Of Gasoline Ignited By Backfire; Hits His Daughter

Little Pelma Gore, three year old Chuluota girl, died shortly after 3:00 o'clock this afternoon at Fernald-Laughton Memorial Hospital from severe burns, due to having been accidentally showered with flaming gasoline. Her father, Edward Gore, is still confined to the hospital with severely burned hands and arms.

A three year old girl was critically burned shortly before noon today when she was accidentally drenched with burning gasoline contained in a quart can which was flung by her father, Edward Gore of Chuluota, after the gasoline had become ignited as he was attempting to start the motor of his V-8 Ford sedan, parked in the vacant lot behind the Sanford Buick Company.

According to Fire Chief M. N. Cleveland, who investigated the accident, Mr. Gore, when he flung away the burning can of gasoline, did not know that the child was standing behind him. Mrs. Gore, at the time, was reported to have been at the wheel of the car operating the starter and the motor backfired.

Screams of the child sent many bystanders and nearby workers to her aid; blankets were taken from the Ford and put around her to put out the flames. A Fernald-Laughton Hospital where she was treated by Dr. O. E. Back, her condition was reported to be critical. Mr. Gore is an employee of the Ox Fibre Brush Company.

Europa Sinks During Storm At Le Havre

LE HAVRE, France, Dec. 9. (AP)—The former German luxury liner Europa is resting on the bottom of the harbor at Le Havre today. The liner sank after breaking from her moorings and crashing into the wreck of the sunken French liner, Paris.

The 49,000 ton ship was turned over to the French and rechristened Liberte after the war.

The French News Agency says the liner broke loose from its moorings at the French line docks during a storm. It was swept across the harbor basin where it smashed against the bulk of the Paris. A huge hole was torn in the side of the former Europa at the level of the engine room. The ship sank in the basin four hours later. Experts said they hope the ship can be refloated.

All persons aboard the Liberte were taken ashore and no life is missing.

Sanford's offensive line, led by Willis Anderson, did a fine job of blocking the Fletcher defense. The Sanford offense was in excellent control of the game.

48 GI Loans Are Made In Seminole

A total of 48 GI loans have been made by lending agencies to World War II veterans in Seminole County. George B. Anderson, County Representative, announced today. Two business loans amounting to \$2500 averaging \$1275 each and 46 home loans amounting to \$172,201 with an average of \$3,743.50 each, make up the total.

World War II veterans in 57 northern and central counties of Florida had borrowed approximately 27 million dollars from lending agencies through the VA by Nov. 30, Anderson reported.

GI Families Arrive In Germany By Air

FRANKFURT, Germany, Dec. 9. (AP)—A big transport plane dropped down out of the skies here today and unloaded the first wives and children of American military personnel to arrive in Germany. The crowd of mothers and children, 42 in all, rushed out of the plane into the arms of waiting soldier husbands. The children ran around the airfield taking their first look at Germany.

Thousands of other wives and youngsters have traveled to Germany by sea but the plane was the first of a series of regularly scheduled flights for the dependents of American personnel.

Hope Ends In French Submarine Search

TOULON, France, Dec. 9. (AP)—The discovery of an oil spot on the ocean's surface ended hope for 16 men aboard a French submarine which had been missing since Thursday. The underwater craft, a former German U-boat, was on a test run out of Toulon when it disappeared. Search planes and vessels discovered an oil spot 300 yards across over a depth of 800 to 1,000 yards, and naval authorities said that samples of the oil leave little doubt that it came from the missing submarine.

17-Day Strike Ends As Miners Return; Walkout Cost Each Striker Over \$150

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9. (AP)—The Supreme Court announced today it will review a case involving the right of foremen to join unions and bargain collectively with employers. It also decided to review the John L. Lewis contempt case. The high court will hear arguments by both sides on Jan. 14.

Now that the strike is over, experts figure that the 17-day walk-out cost each miner about \$152. The New York stock market registered gains up and down the board today on the strength of the coal strike settlement.

Nineteen days ago, 100,000 soft coal miners were told by John L. Lewis that their contract with the government had become a scrap of paper. Almost to a man, they obeyed the new instructions implied in that notice. They walked out of the mines and began a strike which seriously upset the nation's economy. But Saturday they were told to go back to work, the order coming again from John L. Lewis. Today they were obeying that order just as faithfully as they heeded the signal to walk out on Nov. 20. They stopped back to their jobs this morning and resumed production of desperately needed coal.

Speed heading the back-to-work movement were the miners of Pennsylvania and West Virginia, the nation's two most important coal producing states. Early reports from these fields showed the miners for the most part had accepted fully with the back-to-work order, but it may take the industry two to three weeks to get back to normal.

Among the mines that reopened today were some of the big steel companies' mines owned by United States Steel, Jones and Laughlin and Republic Steel.

In the Pittsburgh steel-producing area, only a couple of mines failed to open, but work is to be resumed there as soon as the miners get official notice from the union.

Lewis, meanwhile, continued to mark time, his hopes now resting with the nation's highest tribunal. The Supreme Court has been asked to hear the Lewis case, to decide whether the new contract of contents is so good that the union and the heavy fines slapped on Lewis and the union are proper.

The White House is keeping its silence about the Administration's success in smashing the soft coal strike. Presidential secretary Charles Ross was asked at his regular news conference today if there was anything new on coal, but Ross merely smiled and declined to comment. Neither would he comment on developments leading up to Lewis' decision Saturday to order the soft coal miners back to the pits.

MIAMI, Dec. 9. (AP)—Governor Millard F. Caldwell is going to head the "King Orange" parade through downtown Miami on New Year's Eve, it was announced today. The Orange Bowl Committee said that the parade will consist of 65 units, bands, floats and marching groups, with the Orange Bowl Queen, Mary Delma Brier, as the parade's climax.

The floats will be in the theme of the 1947 Orange Bowl Festival of "Pan America." Ten floats will pay specific honor to Latin American countries.

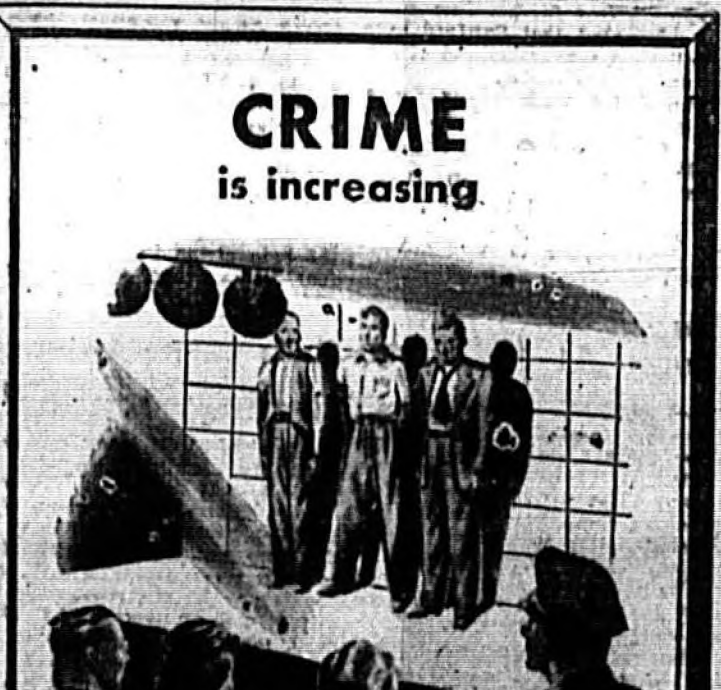

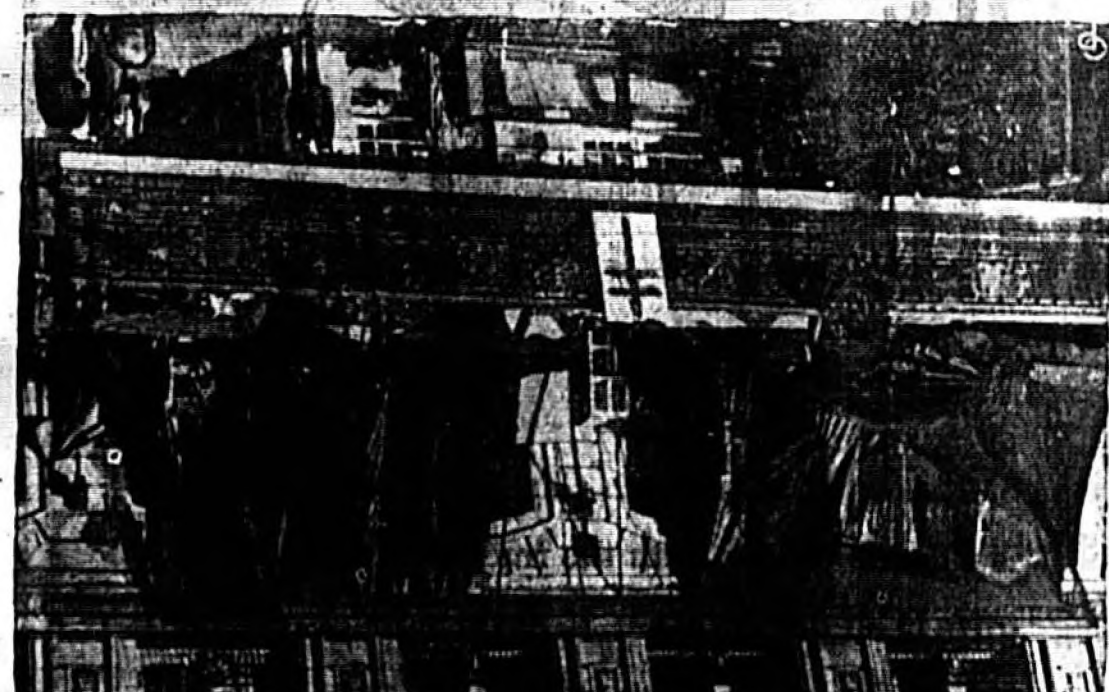

These Women

"Help us, Emily!" pleaded young Dr. Joseph Wales on a bleak afternoon a few months before Christmas, 1907. "Otherwise we'll have to turn out those poor sufferers to die."

For the last hour, he and his cousin, Emily Bissell, Wilmington, Del., social worker, had been reviewing the dogged daring experiment of a group of Wilmington doctors who sought to cure tuberculosis, the No. 1 killer, of the times. In an age when people believed the white plague doomed its victims to certain death, they had assembled eight charity patients in a little shack on the banks of the Brandywine for which they paid Alfred duPont a dollar-a-year rent, and were trying the effects of fresh air, rest, and the right food. The patients were making progress, but the funds had run out. So Dr. Wales appealed to his cousin for help.

That's how the Christmas tuberculosis stamp was born. Most people would have quailed and quit before the problem. What Emily Bissell did started a ball rolling that has amassed in 39 years \$165,000,000 which has been used to battle the disease back to seventh place among the killers. Today both the annual stamp sale and the battle are conducted by the National Tuberculosis Association. This year the fight is being waged with renewed vigor because tuberculosis is still the biggest killer of young people from 15 to 35, who are working to acquire an education, start a career and build a home.

Only \$300 were needed to carry on that early battle on the banks of the Brandywine, but Emily Bissell racked her brain for days before she found an answer. "Then I remembered a story by Jacob Riis of a Christmas stamp that originated in Denmark," she recalled recently. "It was sold to raise money for a sanitarium for tubercular children. I thought, 'Why not get out a stamp to raise money for the same?'"

So she began. She waded through a forest of discouragement. Many considered fresh air a threat in those days of closed rooms. Others were horrified at the idea of coughing "Merry Christmas" with the most effective killer of the times. Still others said a penny stamp could never raise enough to make a difference.

But Emily Bissell continued to chase her trail and people began to help her. She drafted the crit-

At the end of the season they had brought \$5,000—ten times the goal. Last year they raised \$15,500,000. The funds are used to educate the public, operate clinics and nursing services, train personnel.

Most of the money amassed by the stamps to fight tuberculosis has come from the "little people" who could give from ten cents to a dollar apiece. Miss Bissell has pinned her faith on them since the days of the first sale when a grinning little newsboy pushed into the office and dropped a penny on the counter. "Gimme one," he said, "Me sister's got it!"

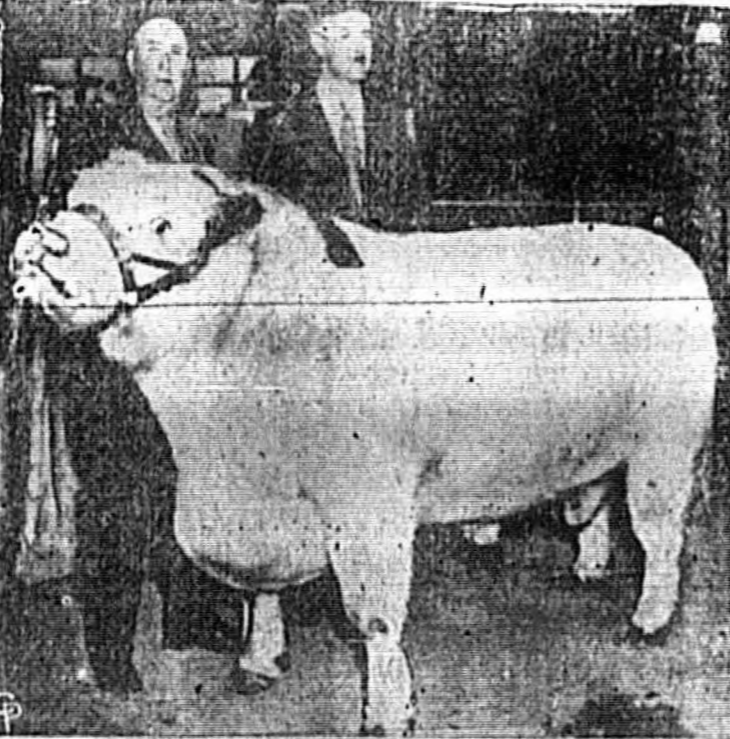

Nazi Revolts Said Planned By Columbians

Former Active Members In Organization Tell State Of Dictatorship Plot

ATLANTA, Dec. 10.—(AP)—A stranger-than-fiction story was told today by two young men who asserted that the anti-negro organization known as the Columbians, Incorporated was working to set up a Nazi-like government in the United States.

The story comes from 21-year-old Lester Waller and James Childers of Atlanta who were themselves active in the organization until they learned that the Columbians were planning to take over the country and establish a dictatorship.

Both men describe themselves as "former suckers" but say they have now turned state witnesses in Georgia's prosecution of the organization. The state is trying to revoke the charter of the Columbians.

Attorney General Eugene Cook announced that the state has obtained evidence for criminal charges against several members of the organization. Presumably Waller and Childers were instrumental in unearthing that evidence. Just before Cook's announcement Waller declared that he and his companion had given information linking the Columbian leader with the purchase of dynamite to blast negro houses.

Waller said he had originally joined the group because he "just naturally doesn't like negroes." But he says he and Childers took it upon themselves to find out what they could about the organization when it began to develop into an anti-Jewish group.

Both men revealed that on Dec. 2 they went to New York and exposed the Columbians to Professor James Sheldon, administrative chairman of the Anti-Nazi League. Sheldon passed testimony on to Georgia's state attorney general.

The two youths said that Sheldon had spies planted in the Columbian with whom they voluntarily established contact. Waller and Childers said they were flown to New York by Sheldon 20 hours apart to keep Colonel Canine from suspecting that they are planning to expose organization secrets. When they returned to Atlanta, they said, Homer Loomis, secretary of the Columbians, called on them. Waller said Loomis liked them about what they might have told and said he'd be seeing them around.

Waller declared both he and Childers were interested only in an anti-negro organization and were strongly opposed to any program for overthrowing the government. Waller quoted Loomis as saying to him at one time that he had plans to take over the country and be a dictator.

George P. Driggers, 64, Dies Suddenly

George Postman Driggers, 64, resident here for the past 24 years and for 18 years an employee of American Fruit Growers Inc. died suddenly Monday afternoon following a long illness.

Mr. Driggers was born in Henry County, Alabama, Aug. 9, 1882 and was a member of Antioch Baptist Church of Geneva, Ala. He is survived by the widow, Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Driggers of Sanford.

Survivors include four daughters: Mrs. Grover David and Mrs. R. E. Kelly of Sanford, Mrs. U. S. Hayes of Jacksonville and Mrs. Clifford E. Gustavson of Dade City; one son, J. D. Driggers of Sanford; eight grandchildren and one great-grandson; a sister, Mrs. Emma Wiggins of Hartford, Ala.; two brothers, Eddie Driggers of Hartford, Ala. and Marion Driggers of Texas.

Funeral services for Mr. Driggers will be held Wednesday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock at the Erickson Funeral Home with the Rev. W. F. Brooks, Jr. officiating. Interment will be in Evergreen Cemetery.

Ten Commandments Of Courtesy

1. SPEAK TO PEOPLE. Say a cheery "Good Morning" to members of the family; to the servant, to the next door neighbor; to the bus driver, the traffic cop, the doorkeeper or elevator operator, to fellow employees and to the first customer encountered.
2. SMILE AT PEOPLE. A gracious smile is good to have on the welcoming committee of any concern, and a smile will get you over the threshold and through the door of many a heart that otherwise you might not be able to enter.
3. CALL PEOPLE BY NAME. When you can greet Mr. Brown the second time you meet him with "Good morning, Mr. Brown," he feels that he "THE customer, not just a customer. Calling a person by name is one way of making him feel important. It is wise to subordinate self and build up the other person's sense of self-importance.
4. BE FRIENDLY AND HELPFUL. Go out of your way to be helpful to others. It will pay big dividends in appreciation and good will. It will cause people to say kindly things about you and your place of business. It will make people want to come back and to continue to give you their patronage.
5. BE SINCERELY CORDIAL. Cordiality added to courtesy makes an irresistible combination. Do things for people as if it were a genuine pleasure, not half heartedly or grudgingly, but joyously.
6. BE CONSIDERATE OF THE FEELINGS OF OTHERS. No one likes to be rebuffed. Some are more sensitive than others, but by the same token, may be capable of greater appreciation.
7. BE TOLERANT OF THE OPINIONS OF OTHERS. Courtesy calls for consideration of the opinions of others. It is narrow to be wrapped up in one's self and to yield to bigotry. It is broadening to be able to see the other person's viewpoint.
8. BE GENUINELY INTERESTED IN PEOPLE. If you are genuinely interested in the welfare, success and happiness of others, they will sense it, and in turn will become genuinely interested in your welfare, success and happiness.
9. BE GENEROUS WITH PRAISE; CAUTIOUS WITH CRITICISM. The spirit of courtesy demands it. Criticism often lowers; praise usually lifts. Of course constructive criticism has its uses, but caustic and unkind criticism often leaves life-time scars that cannot be erased.
10. BE ALERT TO RENDER SERVICE. Take the spirit of service out of business, out of all human activity and only a shell remains. When we can saturate ourselves with genuine desire to serve others, we have already taken a long step towards success and happiness.

Iranian government troops, four columns of them, drove into truculent Azerbaijan bordering on the Soviet Union and attacked Azerbaijan militia.

As the government forces opened up against the troops of the Azerbaijan Democratic party, Iran Premier Ahmad Qavam stressed two points. Qavam told the governor general of Azerbaijan that government troops had been sent into the province to supervise parliamentary elections, and that they would do the job no matter (Continued on Page Six)

V. T. Grizzard Gives Lecture On Courtesy

Local Sales People Attend Session Of "Courtesy Clinic" At Tourist Center

"It won't be long before there will be enough goods on hand in stores to supply the demand, and those firms which win out will be those who sell good merchandise, use good salesmanship and whose employees have a courteous attitude," Vernon T. Grizzard, business lecturer, who was introduced by Manager Edward Higgins of the Chamber of Commerce, told nearly 200 employees of local firms, business executives and members of boy scout troops at the opening session last evening of the "Courtesy Clinic," held at the Tourist Center. The concluding session will start at 8:00 o'clock this evening.

Mr. Grizzard forecast the end of what he termed the "gray trend" in business in which employees put forth only enough effort to get by. He attributed this tendency to the fact that during the war period many employers had to hire untrained and transient people who did not seem to care whether they brought in sales or not. "There has been a let-down in the country courtesy, and there is need of learning the fundamental principles of good selling and of pre-war courtesy," he declared.

Real, genuine courtesy, he asserted, is not a veneer, but is based on genuine consideration of the other person's needs and desires and is a habit that can be improved. He then stressed the necessity of greeting people with a smile and suggested smiling at oneself in the mirror in the morning as a means of getting in the proper mood. He then outlined "Ten Commandments of Courtesy."

Calling people by name is a good method of inducing good customer relations, said Mr. Grizzard, and as a means of remembering names he suggested, "Get the name right, repeat it as often as possible, associate it with something or someone you know and visualize the name and spelling."

A talking movie produced by the Bell Telephone Company showing the effect on a gruff voiced man of hearing his own voice and of how he learned how much the inflections and tones of the voice influence business, was shown. Herman E. Morris furnished and operated the projector. The film showed common faults and discourtesies of telephone users in business and correct procedures that avoid lost sales.

Mr. Grizzard then resumed his sales technique talk; told of the use of self-interest that motivates all customers, and outlined procedures of securing customer good will. He read a telegram from Andrew Sline, president of the Sanford Merchants Association and now in Richmond, Va., expressing regret at being unable to be present. Mr. Grizzard thanked Mayor H. J. Gut and members of the City Chamber of Commerce, Merchants Association and Press for co-operation in making the "Courtesy Clinic" a success. City employees, including police and firemen, will get special courtesy instruction Wednesday and Thursday afternoons at 4:00 o'clock.

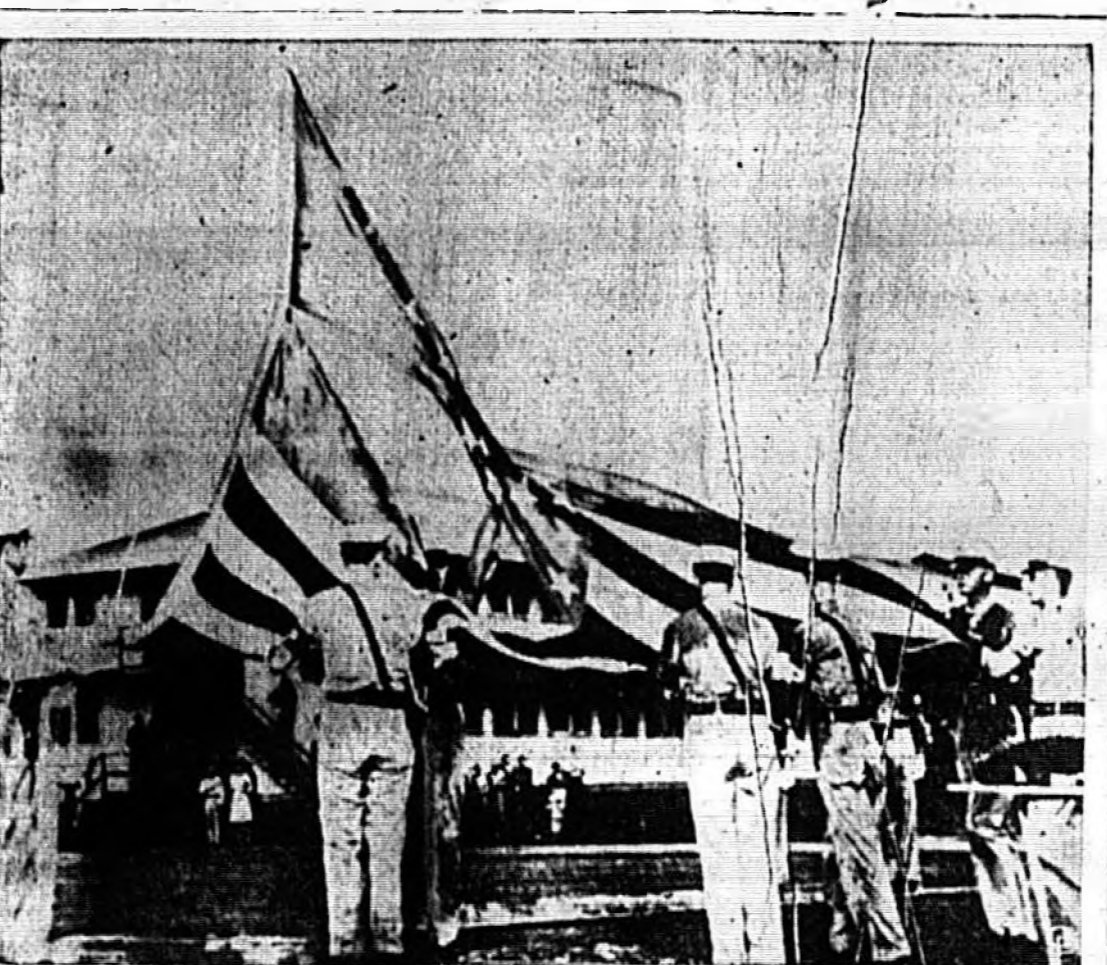
Two Masted Vessel Arrives From Essex

Hotel Fire Rules

Chicago, Dec. 10.—(AP)—The National Safety Council today set forth seven rules for safety in a hotel fire such as the disastrous blaze in Atlanta Saturday. They are worth remembering. Here are the seven rules:

1. When you go to your room for the first time, locate regular and emergency exits.
2. If you detect fire or smoke act quickly but coolly; notify the telephone operator; give exact information.
3. Feel your door before you open it; if it is hot, keep it closed; also close transoms and cover the cracks around the door with wet towels or sheets.
4. Do not act on impulses, or take unnecessary chances to get out of your room; you may be safer where you are.
5. If door is cool, open it a little; if the hall seems safe, leave by a known exit.
6. Close doors and windows behind you to reduce drafts.
7. If there is much smoke, hold or tie a wet cloth over your face and go on your hands and knees to an exit.

Those are the seven rules recommended by the National Safety Council for you to remember if ever you are caught in a hotel fire.

Governor May Call Troops In Wisconsin

Mayor Of West-Allis Asks Aid In Strike At Allis-Chalmers As Riots Continue

MILWAUKEE, Dec. 10.—(AP)—The governor of Wisconsin was asked today to send National Guard troops to maintain order around the Allis-Chalmers plant at West-Allis.

The request was made today by Mayor Arnold Krentz of West-Allis. So far, there has been no reply from Governor Walter Goodland at Madison. However, Governor Goodland conferred with Adjutant General John F. Mullen on the strike situation.

The executive office said later that no decision has been reached. The announcement went on to say that Milwaukee County Sheriff George Hanley had made no report on yesterday's disorders around the Allis-Chalmers plant.

Fifty policemen, including 22 policemen, were lined up yesterday at the plant. The street warfare marked a removal of previous demonstrations there.
