# Probe Set On Government 'Heckling'

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Congressional investigators have launched an inquiry to find out if the government is heckling the public with a lot of repetitious questions. The investigation, conducted by the House Civil Service Committee, is aimed at the government's big statistics collecting business. The investigators are trying to find out how many different agencies are asking the same people for identical or similar information. They suspect there is considerable duplication in the gathering of official statistics.

# Ike Asks Congress For School Funds

By HELEN THOMAS  
WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower sends Congress today his plan to give the nation more classrooms, probably by spending federal money to help needy school districts and colleges pay off their construction bonds. Arthur B. Flemming, secretary of health, education and welfare, will unveil the program at a news conference shortly before it is submitted to the House and Senate. Flemming said in advance there was "no question" that schools needed federal aid. He said the President's plan would provide that help. But he gave no details. However, other sources indicated Eisenhower would ask Congress to let the government assume part of the debt for classroom construction where school districts and colleges could not carry the full burden. The program would last five years. The outlays would be reviewed each year. They would be cut off when no longer needed. The states would be required to match, at least in part, the federal contributions. One official said the cost of the program would be about the same as that of Eisenhower's earlier school construction proposals. The President's direct construction aid bill, which died in Congress last year, would have cost about one billion dollars over four years. Another \$60 million dollars would have been put up to buy construction bonds of school districts which could not market them through regular channels.

# Debre In Algiers; Trouble Is Feared

ALGERS, Algeria (UPI)—Strong police forces were mobilized today as a precaution against possible disorders by French extremists during the first public appearance of Premier Michel Debre in the capital city of revolt-torn Algeria. Officials feared trouble, when Debre lays a wreath at the Algiers War Memorial, from extremist French settlers disillusioned with the policies of President Charles de Gaulle. It was at the war memorial that fighting settlers pelled for Premier Guy Mollet, with stones, eggs and vegetables during a similar wreathlaying ceremony two years ago. The visit was Debre's first to Algeria since he was named premier Jan. 8. He arrived Sunday by plane and was driven to Government House from the airport by back streets to avoid any disorders in view of the extremists' bias. They would give him a rough welcome.

**25,000 Years Old?**

# Transportation Snarled By Ice, Fog

Freezing rain and fog combined to snarl transportation across a vast section of the Midlands today. The ice storm began Sunday night, glazing highways from west and north Kansas through Iowa, northern Missouri, south-east Nebraska, northern Illinois, southern Minnesota, Wisconsin and Michigan and northern Indiana and Ohio. Weathermen posted hazardous driving advisories and warned the treacherous ice storm was expected to continue during the day from Kansas and Missouri through the southern and lower Great Lakes region.

South of the freezing rain, dense fog blanketed much of the area from southern Illinois across Missouri and into parts of Kansas and Oklahoma, reducing visibility to zero at some points. Fog also was widespread in the Gulf and South Atlantic states. The weather bureau at St. Louis reported visibility in fog at one-fourth mile Sunday night, and occasional periods of zero visibility. In Chicago, ice coated electrical lines, stalled rapid transit facilities for periods during the night. Cars and buses crept over icy streets. Up to four inches of snow fell from northern Arizona and Utah into Wyoming, while lighter amounts swept South Dakota, Nebraska and the northern Great Lakes. Major mowslides in the Rockies blocked U.S. 30 at Red Mountain Pass, which connects all of southwestern Colorado with the

corners of New Mexico, Utah and Arizona. Thunderstorms broke out in the Southeast from the lower Mississippi Valley to the South Atlantic. Amounts of around half an inch were reported at numerous points, including Memphis, Jackson, Miss., and Jacksonville, Fla. A cold wave overspread the Northeast, dropping overnight readings below zero from northern New York into New England. The arctic air chased a brief taste of spring-like weather that had sent temperatures into the 60s as far north as Virginia Sunday.
