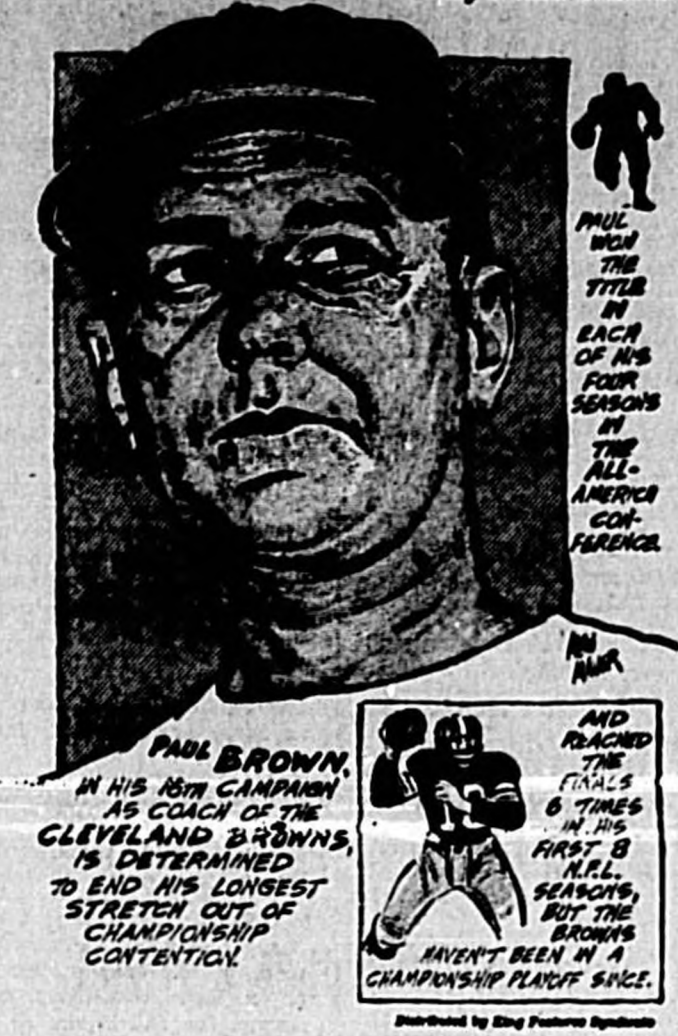
Former Champ Drops Decision

Skins Ask Waivers On Guglielmi

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The end of the line may be looming for Ralph Guglielmi, once called the greatest quarterback in Notre Dame history and now fighting to keep his job on the Washington Redskins.

Monday, the Redskins asked waivers on Guglielmi, sidelined with a back injury and if no team claims him, the Redskins could keep him on the injured reserve list for four weeks and still have the full quota of 35 active players.

But owner George Preston Marshall admitted that if another National Football League team offered the Redskins a top-notch player, he would let Guglielmi go. "If anyone does claim him," he explained, "we'd withdraw the waivers immediately—but not if someone claimed him and gave us a top player in return."

Marshall's apparent willingness to trade The Gog was the direct result of rookie Norman Snead's somewhat sensational play. The big bomber from Wake Forest played the entire game against Green Bay last Saturday, threw two touchdown passes, scored once himself on a 19-yard run and guided the underdog "Skins to a rushing and passing total of more than 400 yards.

Grid Punting Contest Announced

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Move On To Abolish Racing In Italy

MONZA, Italy (UPI) — Italian newspapermen joined in the drive to abolish auto racing in this country today after the tragic crash in the Italian Grand Prix that caused the death of 14 spectators and German Driver Wolfgang von Trips.

"The gladiator games also were a gruesome and risky affair, but mankind decided to stop them," said Il Giorno, a Milan newspaper.

Il Tempo of Rome said that if auto racing in Italy is not banned, "at least they must take the necessary precautions to protect the public."

Three more spectators struck down by Von Trips' bright red Ferrari during the second lap of Sunday's race died in local hospitals Monday.

It was the worst auto race accident in Italy in over 30 years. The 1937 crash of Spain's Juan de Portago in the Mille Miglia race took the lives of 11 persons, including De Portago and his American co-driver.

The Mille Miglia has since been reduced to a mere auto rally with fixed speed limits, and the mounting horror over Sunday's tragedy may cause officials of the Italian Grand Prix to take the same steps.

Second Round Am-Play Set

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (UPI) — Defending champion Deane Beman, the crew-cut insurance executive from Arlington, Va., and veteran Billy Joe Patton clash today in the featured second round match of the 1961 National Amateur golf championship.

Patton sat on the sidelines Monday with a couple of ex-champs, Jack Nicklaus and Charley Coe, while 23-year-old Beman nearly was ousted by newcomer Harry Allers. Easy victories are anticipated for Nicklaus and Coe in their initial firings at Pebble Beach, rated one of the toughest layouts in the world.

Beman was four-up at the turn over Allers, Port Lauderdale, Fla., lad playing in the National for the first time, but ran into trouble on the back side. The champ got back on the stick for the last four holes to oust the 21-year-old Allers, 1 up.

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Tanks Roam Dominican Streets

CIUDAD TRUJILLO, D. R. (UPI) — Tanks and troops roamed the streets early today in a show of force apparently intended to forestall a threatened anti-government "businessmen's strike."

The armed forces moved into the city at nightfall Tuesday, after a day of riotous outbreaks in which at least two opponents of the government were killed and 40 were injured.

Opposition mobs swarmed into the streets in an apparent effort to convince investigators sent here by the Organization of American States that the Dominican Republic is still a long way from democracy.

Demonstrators carried banners reading "Give us liberty" and "Trujillo, go away!" This last slogan was

directed at surviving members of the family of assassinated ex-strongman Rafael L. Trujillo.

About 1,000 government supporters staged a counter-demonstration at the airport when the OAS investigators arrived Tuesday, carrying signs saying "We don't want another Fidel Castro here!"

In a radio broadcast Tuesday night, the opposition UCN party called President Joaquin Balaguer a "dictator who wants to continue the killing and torture" started by Trujillo.

The UCN sent cables to the presidents of the United States, Panama, Colombia and Ecuador—the nations represented on the OAS team—expressing confidence that the investigators would be "just and impartial."

77 Die As French Jet Crashes

RABAT, Morocco (UPI) — An Air France Caravelle jet airliner carrying 77 persons, including three Americans, crashed into a ravine outside Rabat Tuesday night as it approached a landing in foggy darkness. Air France

Also among the passengers were J. P. Quin, 47, the Australian ambassador to the United Arab Republic; a U.A.R. Foreign Ministry official named Bouffini; and Prince Sahri of the oil-rich sheikhdom of Kuwait.

The 71 passengers aboard the Paris-to-Rabat flight included six children, six infants and several staff members of the French Embassy in Rabat. There were six crewmen.

The crash was the third major air disaster within 12 days. A westbound crash of an American charter airliner at Shannon Airport, Ireland, killed 81, and a Trans World Airlines plane crash near Chicago Sept. 1 killed 78.

For Morocco, it was the second air tragedy this year. Only July 11, a Czech Airlines Soviet-built Dnyuzin-18 went down near Casablanca, killing all 72 persons aboard.

Six Indicted On Bribery Charges Face Fast Trial

RALEIGH, N. C. (UPI) — Solicitor Lester V. Chalmers today promised to bring to trial "as soon as possible" six New York men indicted on bribery charges in game-fixing and point-shaving by North Carolina State basketball players.

Bench warrants were to be issued by Superior Court Judge C. W. Hall at Chalmers' request and sent to New York for the arrest of:

Joseph Green, already named in bribery and conspiracy charges in New York City. He is now being held in New York.

Attorney Charles Tucker, 25, who played basketball at Kalamazoo, Mich., in the 1956-57 season. He has been indicted in New York on three counts of bribery and one count of conspiracy.

David Budin, 26, formerly of

Brooklyn College. He was named as a co-conspirator in the New York basketball scandal. He is accused of acting as a "contact man" for gamblers Aaron Wagman and Joseph Hochen, both of New York. He also is charged in New York with 27 counts of bribery involving point-shaving in 25 games and according to New York Dist. Atty. Frank Hogan, made game-fixing arrangements with five players at three schools.

And Michael Siegal, Lou Barshak and Bob Kraw. Chalmers describes Kraw, who has been sought by North Carolina officials for several months in connection with the bribe scandal, as being "a well-known gambler."

In describing Siegal, Chalmers said he was "a friend of players from the New York area." The prosecutor said Barshak was a "contact man."

Chalmers expects to draw more persons into the case but his activities will be limited only to action at N. C. State, for the time being. His hands are tied to some extent since his solicitorial district does not take in any Atlantic Coast Conference schools except N. C. State.

Moses Denies Subsidy Charge

NEW YORK (UPI) — Robert Moses, president of the 1964 New York World's Fair Tuesday denied the fair will seek a federal subsidy to promote, build and run the fair.

Moses made the statement in a telegram to Sen. Frank Lautenberg, D-Ohio, who had charged earlier that the fair had broken commitments by seeking federal participation in the fair.

"We made it clear from the very beginning," Moses said, "that we expected the United States government to provide a pavilion or exhibit as a focal point in the fair to emphasize the achievements of our country and the major objectives and purposes of our democracy."

"It seems to us unthinkable that there would be no federal exhibit at the New York World's Fair," Moses said, "considering that most of the other nations of the world are exhibiting, not to speak of all our industries."

New Cancer Theory Announced

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The National Cancer Institute says it has evidence strongly supporting a theory that damaged tissue contributes to lung cancer.

The institute said Tuesday research was conducted on rats which showed a known cancer-producing agent developed cancer only at point where lung tissue had been damaged and regenerating cells were formed.

Results of the research were reported by Dr. Mearl F. Stanton and Robert H. Blackwell in the institute's journal.

Klan Leader Gets Conviction

TALLADEGA, Ala. (UPI) — A Ku Klux Klan leader, charged along with eight other men with stripping and flogging a white couple with a leather strap, was convicted Tuesday of assault with intent to commit murder.

Attorneys for Thomas Jackson Graham, 37, a Sylacauga, Ala., textile worker, were expected to appeal the verdict which carries a maximum sentence of 30 years. Sentencing was scheduled for Sept. 22.

All eight men charged in the case said they were Klansmen. Trial of the second man was scheduled for today.

An attorney summing up the state's case reading from Graham's purported confession, quoted the former high school football star as saying: "I hit her eight or nine times. Then I struck sick."

Mrs. Marlin White, who was abducted from her home with her husband, said she was told they were flogged for associating with Negroes and permitting their 15-year-old son to be disciplined by a Negro.

White watched helplessly from a car where he was held as his wife was flogged.

Efforts Renewed By UAW To End Strike At GM

DETROIT (UPI) — The United Auto Workers, after getting contract extensions from Ford and Chrysler, concentrated today on wrapping up a new pact with strikebound General Motors Corp. before Thursday afternoon.

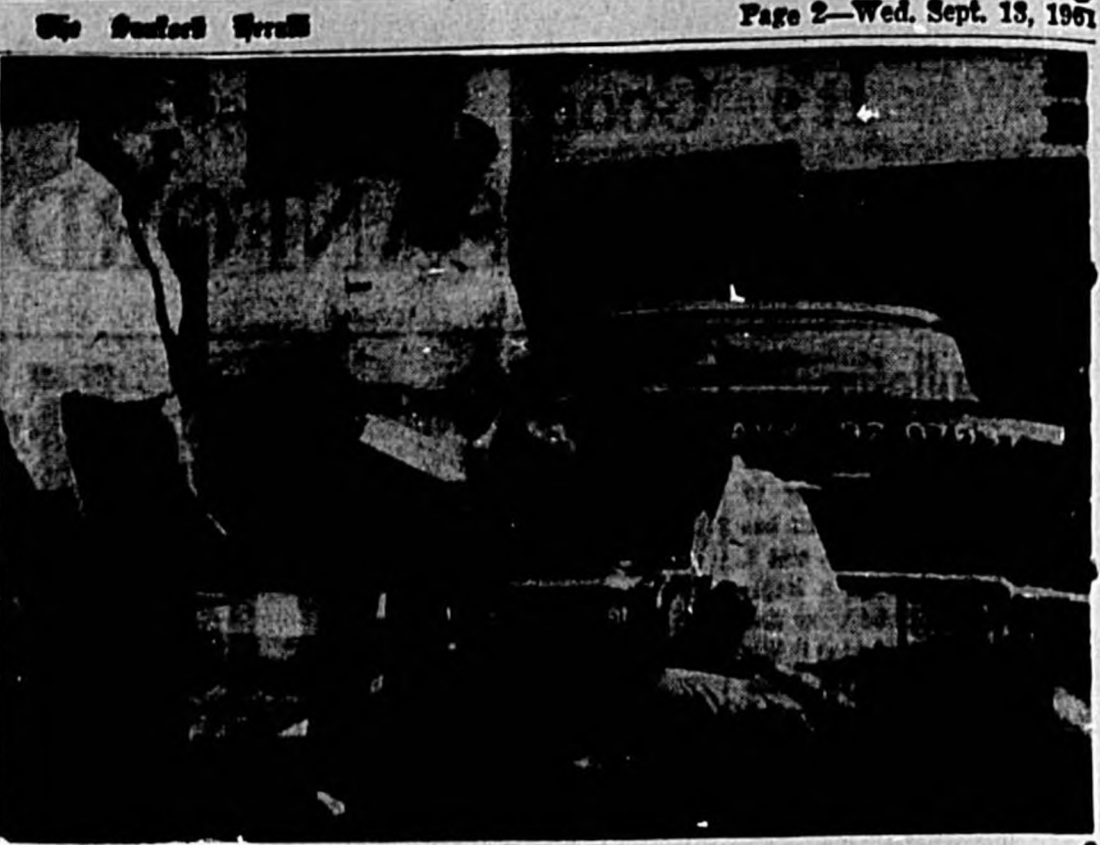
UAW President Walter P. Reuther and GM vice president Louis G. Seaton spent most of their time helping settle 10,000 local plant problems which triggered a strike by a quarter-million workers.

Agreements were reported at 41 UAW-represented GM plants and two represented by the International Union of Electrical Workers. But 94 plants still were closed with more than 230,000 workers idled.

GM said 94,000 workers were working without contract since the UAW pact expired Monday. The GM walkout then ensued at some plants because full agreement had not been reached on local and national contracts.

Chrysler and Ford, with contracts set to expire at midnight tonight, agreed to extend their agreements indefinitely, subject to 48 hours cancellation. If the agreements had not been extended, UAW members had planned to work without contracts.

The UAW has set an unofficial deadline of 9 p. m. EDT Thursday, for a full settlement at GM. At that time, the union's 800-man national GM council will meet to ratify or reject an economic agreement reached last week and a national non-economic agreement now being worked out, and to decide what action to take on local problems.

Steel Wage Boost To Cost 'Plenty'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The steel industry estimated today the Oct. 1 wage increase for steelworkers will cost more than \$2 billion in the last three months of this year alone.

The figures, compiled by the American Iron & Steel Institute, could be used to defend any price increases that steel firms may put into effect following the wage boost. The institute said the wage raise will cost nearly 14 cents per man-hour.

President Kennedy has asked the steel industry to hold the line on prices now to avoid the threat of a new inflationary spiral.

Kennedy's Council of Economic Advisors said steel firms could make reasonable profits without raising prices because of greater output and increased productivity. Industry sources, however, have said the odds still favor a price increase around the first of next month.

The new wage cost figures appeared certain to stir up controversy between the industry and the United Steelworkers.

Union president Dave McDonald has argued that unit labor costs — the amount spent on labor for each ton of steel produced — have been steadily declining despite higher pay.

A high administration official disputed the institute's 14 cents estimate and said the increased hourly costs to the companies would be somewhere between 9 and 10 cents.

Brief Lull

Commander Heavy Attack Wing One wishes to inform the citizens of Sanford and the surrounding area of the schedule of night flying at the U. S. Naval Air Station.

There will be a lull in the night flying at NAS Sanford until Sept. 18, when from Sept. 18 to Oct. 2 it will become necessary for another period of night-flying.

The planes that fly from sundown until approximately 11:30 p. m., use the North South runway for their carrier landing practices whenever the weather permits, thus keeping the planes away from the congested areas and lowering the noise.

AEC Probing New Reports On Radioactive Wastes

POINT PLEASANT, N. J. (UPI) — The Atomic Energy Commission today was investigating reports that commercial fishermen had pulled drums containing radioactive wastes from the Atlantic Ocean 72 miles off the New Jersey coast.

AEC regulations prohibit dumping radioactive materials within 150 miles of shore and in waters less than 4,000 feet deep.

John E. Deeds, an AEC investigator from Washington, arrived here Tuesday and questioned a number of fishermen. He declined to elaborate on his findings.

"My report will go to the AEC compliance division in New York," he told newsmen Tuesday night. "I haven't seen any of the drums, nor do I know if there have been other incidents of the sort reported to our people."

Edward L. McKelvey, a crewman on a fishing trawler, said he told Deeds he removed a steel and cement barrel from the ship's nets 72 miles southeast of Manasquan Inlet several weeks ago.

McKelvey said the barrel contained the inscription "AEC—wastes." He said the drum, which he tossed back into the water, was found at a point where the water is only 232 feet deep.

Russell Jailed On Bomb Protests

LONDON (UPI) — Supporters of Earl Russell's "ban the bomb" campaign vowed today they will stage a sit-down demonstration in front of parliament Sunday despite the jailing of their leader.

"We are determined to go through with it," said a spokesman for Russell's law-defying "Committee of 100." "We are prepared to take any consequences."

The wretched octogenarian and his wife were jailed Tuesday for a week along with 30 others on charges of inciting the public to commit a breach of the peace. Russell's sentence was scaled down from two months because of his advanced age, 80.

Ralph Schoeman, the earl's American secretary, was jailed for two months. British playwrights Robert Bolt and Arnold Wesker draw a month each.

**Anti-Trust Group
Summons Welfare
Boss On Drug Policy**

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate antitrust subcommittee today summoned Welfare Secretary Abraham A. Ribicoff to ask him if the government wants to license drug manufacturers and police some of their operations.

Ribicoff was expected to endorse features of a bill proposed by subcommittee chairman Estes Kefauver, (D-Tenn.), who claims it would help cut drug costs.

Ribicoff's Food and Drug Administration (FDA) chief, George P. Larrick, already has told the subcommittee he favors parts of Kefauver's bill, including one empowering the FDA to test new drugs for effectiveness before they can be sold.

Kefauver said the bill would lower prices by encouraging competition. If drug companies are strictly supervised, he said, doctors will have more confidence and will prescribe by chemical rather than brand names, which would let consumers shop for the cheapest brand.

Other congressional news:
Aid: The Senate Appropriations Committee called a closed meeting to vote on foreign aid funds for the coming year. Administration forces counted heavily on Republicans to help restore most of the \$96 million the House slashed from the foreign aid appropriation bill.

Schools: The House was expected to approve two-year extensions of aid for schools crowded by children of federal employees and servicemen, and the National Defense Educational Act. The administration failed in an attempt in the Senate Tuesday to cut the extension to one year so the popular programs could be used to revive broader school aid measures next session.

Depressed: The House Appropriations Committee approved Tuesday \$68 million to aid economically depressed areas through next June. The money would finance loans and grants designed to reduce unemployment in areas suffering from such economic difficulties as migration or decline of industry.

**Royal Engagement
Reported By Prince**

ATHENS (UPI)—Crown Prince Constantine today announced the engagement of his sister, Princess Sophie, to Don Juan Carlos of Bourbon, son of the pretender to the Spanish throne.

The crown prince, acting as regent in place of his vacationing father, King Paul, made the announcement.

Constantine said King Paul telephoned the news from Lausanne, Switzerland, where the Greek royal family—including Sophie—is vacationing along with the prospective bridegroom.

The crown prince said Spain's Generalissimo Francisco Franco was told the news by King Paul.

Constantine said Sophie and King Paul were returning by plane to Athens later today. He said Queen Frederika and his other sister, Princess Irene, will return Thursday.



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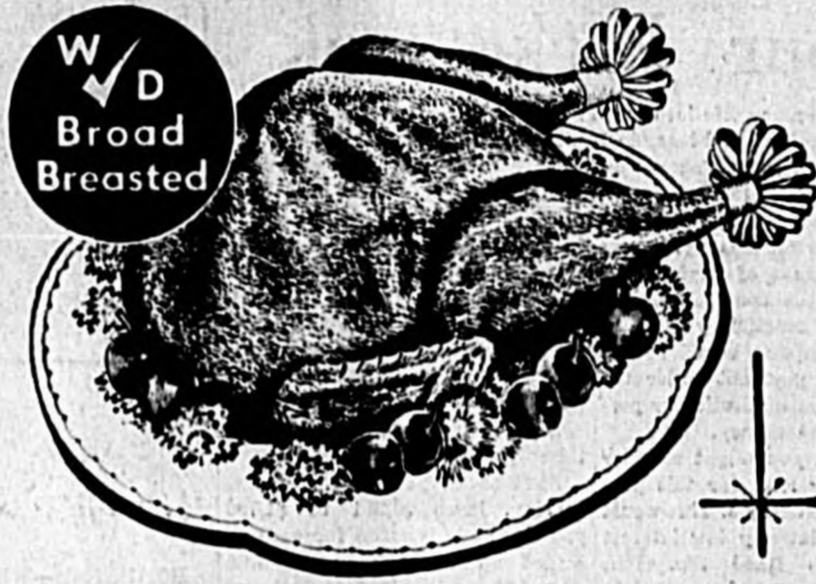

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Shelter Survey

A great many Sanford residents are following the examples of both local and national civil defense leaders by building fallout shelters to protect themselves and their families in the event of nuclear attack.

These CD leaders continually have stressed that the lead in civil defense plans must be taken by the individual—the old law of self-preservation.

But there will be many in every community who are financially unable to provide such a family shelter. For this reason we would recommend the establishment of a community civil defense committee for the purpose of preparing adequate shelter for those who cannot fulfill their own needs.

The committee would be appointed by the mayor with orders to survey the community for appropriate shelters. A list of the buildings which could supply protection could be prepared and posted so people would know where to go when and if the city is covered by fallout.

The committee also should investigate the possibility of acquiring government surplus food and medical supplies to stock the shelters. Sanford is not a primary target and consequently shelters could be established and stocked with supplies that could well provide the means to saving lives of hundreds of our residents who otherwise might perish.

Your Pocketbook

Q—If I assign my life insurance policy for an educational loan, do I have to notify the insurance company?—D. H. K.

A—Dear D. H. K.: Yes, in case of death the insurance company has to make payment of proceeds as stipulated in the contract. Unless the change of beneficiary is designated, the company would not be able to make payment under the new plan to the institution or person lending the money.

Incidentally, you might consider using a policy loan for this purpose. Many parents do. This would give you a relatively low interest loan with no fixed repayment plan required, or a plan suited to your own wishes.

Q—Please let me know where I can get more information on the Wage Earner's Plan.—E. H.

A—Dear E. H.: The Wage Earner's Plan is a provision of the National Bankruptcy Act of 1934 which enables insolvent families to pay off their debts, keep their self-respect and avoid bankruptcy. To take advantage of the law you must hire a lawyer and ask him to file in your behalf in the U. S. court in your district.

Q—I am a widow. My husband passed away at 68. He was drawing \$48 in social security a month. I am able to work only part-time. His illness and death and my own medical expenses have taken over my savings. I am 69 years old. Can I draw on his social security account?—S. M. A.

A—Dear S. M. A.: Sorry. Widows benefits under social security begin at age 62. If you wait until you are 65 you will receive more unless you have dependent children under 18.

Q—I am a widow entitled to such property as tools, trucks, furniture, or does it all go into the estate?—E. M. A.

A—Dear E. M. A.: This depends upon the law of the state in which your husband lived. The best person to answer the question would

be a lawyer. However, the estate planning department of a large commercial bank or the officer to your local probate court could help you.

Q—I retired and started getting \$88 a month social security. Now I've gone back to work. I understand that my earnings will cause me to lose some of my social security payments. Just how does this work?—T. H.

A—Dear T. H.: The law works like this: First \$1,200 you earn, you lose nothing. From \$1,201 to \$1,700 you lose \$1 in benefits for each \$3 earned up to \$350 in benefits. Above \$1,701 you lose \$1 in benefits for each \$1 earned. Since you are due a benefit of \$80 a month, you can earn \$2,410 before all benefits must be withheld.

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From Rome

ROME, Italy—When I was told by an Italian friend with a beard that Rome had now taken Paris' place as the world leader in modern art my heart skipped two beats and a flutter.

Modern art has been a major passion of mine ever since I saw my first modern artist at work. That was about 20 years ago in New York, and I remember that I left my hat in his studio. I was so carried away by what he was doing.

This artist was of what I suppose is called the "Paint Spray" school, for that is what he was using to turn out masterpieces of their kind. Standing well back from his canvas, he would let fly with his spray gun until he had achieved the splatter that satisfied his soul.

It was when he told me that his smallest paintings sold for \$500 that I believe I forgot all about my hat.

Rome's art center is on one of the most delightful streets in

town, Via Margutta, which runs between Piazza Spagna and Piazza Popolo. We visited Via Margutta the other afternoon and I had a dog's bark up the street from the Piazza Spagna and before I found a painting that goes a long way toward upholding Rome's claim over Paris.

It's a big thing, and the first thing that catches the eye is enough shattered glass to make four milk bottles. It was as if my artist friend in New York had laid down his spray gun and started hurling bottles against a sticky canvas.

But that wasn't all that delighted the eye. There were several large patches of burlap, strategically placed, and a torn fragment from a Rome newspaper—Passe Sera. Between the glass and the burlap and the newspaper were vivid splashes of paint, and in a corner a bottle opener, a real one, dangled lonesomely.

There was no title, but that old hillbilly song came right to mind: "I heard a crash on the highway, but I didn't hear nobody pray."

As I stood flat-footed in front of it, drinking in its beauty, I thought of Raphael, Leonardo, the Lippi Lippi boys, Titian, and Botticelli. What a pity, I mused, that these men of earlier centuries were unable to rise from their graves and enjoy it.

And how Velasquez, to mention one of a thousand, would have thrilled to another of the canvases I saw on Via Margutta. Its simple title, "Black on Black With Bird," was in perfect keeping with the theme. A large square of black paint on top of another black square. There was no bird showing, thank goodness. That would have spoiled the whole effect. The bird was left to the imagination—I like to think it was a bat from the artist's belfry.

I never reached the end of Via Margutta. One couldn't in an afternoon's walk. Beauties of modern art almost assailed one. Cubes inside of cubes, rectangles fighting for mastery over oblongs, three-headed women dusting bird cages. It was overpowering, and I had to walk all the way to St. Peter's for a glimpse of Michelangelo's Pieta to revive me.

American Communists Betrayed By Mr. K's New Bomb Testing

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Pity the poor Communists, American and foreign, who are active in peace organizations and among the rank-and-file membership.

Patriotic Americans will not be downhearted nor will they waste sympathy on their fellow citizens who have chosen to be Communists. These Communist fellow citizens are committed by their communism to the betrayal of the United States, the destruction of the American way of life and, presumably, to carry out Mr. K's promise that he will bury us.

But it is interesting that among American Communists, Mr. K's announcement on nuclear testing is being compared to other monstrous somersaults of Soviet policy which have caught the Americans in embarrassing moments. These monstrous somersaults included the Stalin-Hitler pact at the beginning of World War II and the 1956 revelation by Mr. K. of Stalin's horrible crimes.

Last week American Communists were waving on high their banners for what they call "peace." Today these same banners are dragging in the dirt. Party members are bewildered, exasperated, dissatisfied. You see, all the news isn't bad.

Stephen Foster wrote "Oh Susanna" in Cincinnati, Ohio, where he arrived in 1846 to act as book-keeper for his brother.

One old-time member of the CP, U.S.A., summed it up like this: "Betrayed again!"

"Are we," this subversive American asked of a fellow subversive, "affiliated with a party, (the Russian CP) which is tied to a government (the Soviet government) that will lead us to destruction without even talking us into its confidence?"

The Communist Party, U.S.A., is committed officially to propaganda for "peace" and for "peaceful coexistence." It has propagated for an end to the cold war. It has called for resumption of United States trade with the Soviet Union and its captive satellites. The CP, U.S.A., has made much noise in opposition to nuclear testing.

Therefore, from the standpoint of the dedicated and subversive members of the Communist Party, U.S.A., Mr. K's war-mongering nuclear test announcement was a deadly blow. The CP, U.S.A., is in a boiling dispute with itself. To say that there is dissension within the ranks of American Communists is a gross understatement.

There is a hot and angry feeling that the Soviet Communists have betrayed their comrades in the United States. This feeling of betrayal exists among the top leadership of the Communist Par-

Peter Edson's Political Notebook

WASHINGTON (NKA)—With Congress about to adjourn the regular weekly press conferences of the two Republican leaders, Senator Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois and Rep. Charles A. Halleck of Indiana may be suspended for a few months.

No GOP decision has yet been made on what, if anything, will take their place during recess. Democratic scoffers claim that this "Ev and Charlie" cast, as it has been dubbed, will never be missed if discontinued.

But there is some opinion among Republicans that the Dirksen-Halleck commentaries have been effective, have influenced policy and congressional votes, and will be resumed next year. A recap of their criticisms reveals these points: They blasted the "Two China" policy. It was repudiated. They blasted the move to recognize Outer Mongolia. The Kennedy administration backed off on the idea. They blasted the proposed swap of U. S. tractors for Castro prisoners held in Cuba. The deal fell through.

They opposed "backdoor financing" for long term foreign aid. They won. Congress cut the authorization and approved financing by annual appropriation. They called attention to the increase of U. S. export licenses for trade with Russia. They are being reduced.

Red China be admitted to the United Nations. A congressional resolution was passed almost unanimously, opposing any such policy.

They backed up President Kennedy after the Cuban invasion fiasco. They have consistently backed him on the Berlin crisis. Their effort has been to stiffen the President's stand. They supported his defense build-up.

There has been little carping at President Kennedy himself. But top members of his official family have been singled out for criticism: Ambassador Averell Harriman for indicating that a neutralist government in Laos might be desirable; by Governor Phoenix; Undersecretary of State Chester Bowles for saying that if India was attacked from any source, U. S. help would be there the next morning; Ambassador Adlai Stevenson for voting with Soviet Russia against Portugal on Angola; Senate Majority Leader Mike Mansfield for advocating the establishment of a free city in Berlin.

Dirksen and Halleck themselves have not been above such mistakes. Several times they have advocated resumption of nuclear testing by the United States. In view of the bad reaction to Russia's announcement of its intention to resume testing, it is good the U. S. didn't take this step first.

On domestic issues the Dirksen-Halleck pronouncements have followed the more traditional Republican line. They have repeatedly criticized Kennedy's increased government spending proposals and the mounting public debt. It is standard political procedure for any party not in power to criticize opposition extravagance.

Halleck has carried most of the load in criticizing Kennedy domestic policies. He fought federal aid to education and the House majority went along with him.

Halleck tried to switch \$50 million from rural development to urban depressed areas, but failed on this one. He backed Hanford atomic power development. He called attention to the fact that President Kennedy could have had the 1961 minimum wage law in 1960 if he had taken it then instead of playing for higher stakes which he lost.

Halleck also charged that Democratic farm policies would drive farm prices down. Congressional majorities went along on this one, to kill most of the Kennedy-Freeman farm program.

It all adds up to a pretty impressive record of victories for the Republican—conservative Democratic coalition.

ISTANBUL, Turkey (UPI)—The Atlantic Allies tested their defense muscles today under the shadow of a growing Berlin crisis and the resumption of Soviet nuclear weapons tests.

The Block System, new this year, worked smoothly for 279 fifth and sixth graders, Dabbs said, explaining that this teaching method is being used as an experimental approach for handling large numbers of students in classes only for these two grades.

An increase of 17 teachers brings the faculty number to 35 this year to keep pace with Altamonte's enlarged territory, Dabbs reported.

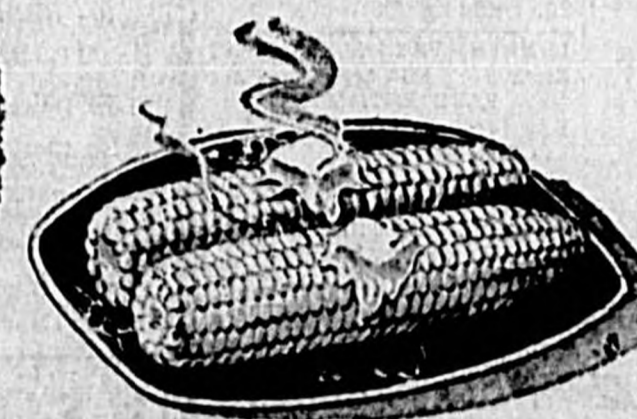

Czech Troops On Move

VIENNA (UPI) — A Czechoslovakian newspaper here reported today that Czech troops have been moved into East Germany, apparently because of the Berlin crisis.

The newspaper said the decision to send the troops into the Red zone of Germany was connected with the recent meeting of chiefs of the Warsaw Pact Nations.

The newspaper said that the troop movement was accompanied by panic-buying all over Czechoslovakia.

It said Czech visitors attributed the panic-buying to recent announcements that Czechoslovakia has halted demobilization and was calling reservists back to duty.

Allied Foreign Ministers Meet On Berlin Crisis

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Secretary of State Dean Rusk and German Foreign Minister Heinrich Von Brentano met here today to initiate a three-day round of conferences by the Big Four allied foreign ministers on the Berlin crisis.

Brentano, British Foreign Secretary Lord Home and French Foreign Minister Couve de Murville gathered in Washington for the talks. They met against the background of President Kennedy's suggestion of "serious talks" with the Russians when the United Nations General Assembly convenes next week.

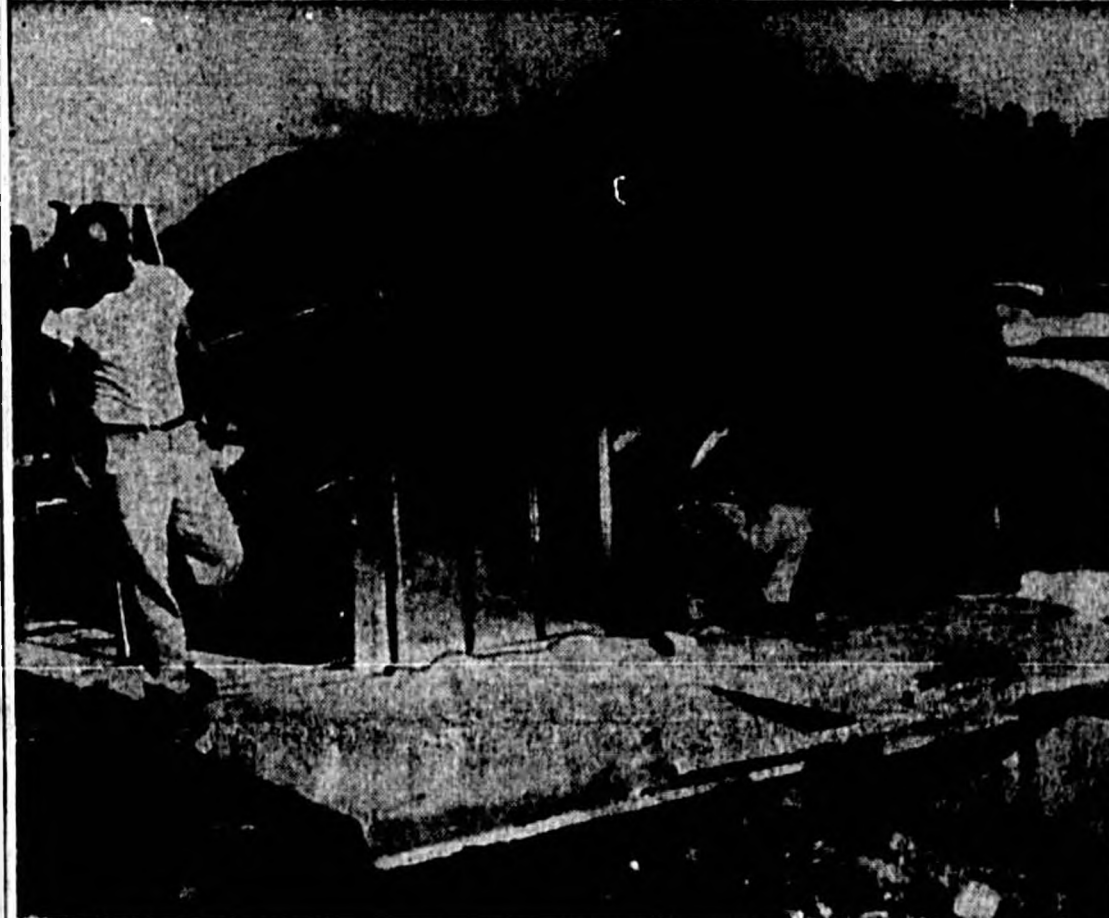
The Soviet government said today that Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko "is ready" to talk with U. S. Secretary of State Dean Rusk on the German problem.

Rusk and Von Brentano met at 8:30 a.m. Lord Home was to lunch with Rusk. Late this afternoon, Rusk, Lord Home and de Murville were to get together for the first formal session of the conferences.

Friday and Saturday, all four will hold discussions. They were seeking a diplomatic formula to ease the peril of nuclear war without making damaging concessions to the Soviet Union.

The board stated again that no school bus will be allowed to leave the county over a radius of 15 miles.

Mayor To Ask New City Hall For Longwood

Longwood Mayor A. R. Lormann said today he will ask the town council at its meeting next Thursday to set aside funds in its 1961-62 budget for construction of a new city hall.

Lormann said the council met Monday to work on the budget calling for expenditures of \$11,000 and a 10 mill tax levy.

"The budget will be presented to the council next Thursday and there is a reserve of \$5,000 that could be used to start construction of the new facility," Lormann added.

He said he would like to see a basic building first with room for additional wings later on. He added that if the council gives him the okay, work on the building could start within six months.

According to Lormann, the initial cost of the building could be kept under \$6,500.

Lormann also said that the council would study a proposed sewage treatment plant for the city. He cited an engineer's feasibility report on the proposed plant.

"We could get help from the federal government on a matching basis to help construct the plant," the mayor added.

The other main budget items, Lormann said, were amounts set aside for the city's bond issue and for road maintenance.

The mayor also advised that Mrs. Onnie R. Rockett, town clerk, has asked that all business owners be reminded that occupational licenses will be due Oct. 1.

Milwee said that groups have time and time again asked for special allowances on the use of buses. He did not elaborate on what group was behind any pressure.

The board stated again that no school bus will be allowed to leave the county over a radius of 15 miles.

Construction On 3 Interstate 4 Bridges Slated

Construction of three bridges at the connection of Interstate Route 4 and U.S. Highway 99 west of Daytona Beach is expected to be started by Sept. 27, the State Road Department announced today.

A. Max Brewer of Titusville, Road Board member for District Five, said the \$29,150 Volusia County project includes overhead structures totaling 800 feet in length.

The largest of the three structures, 350 feet long, will pass over U. S. 92 where it ties in with Interstate 4. The second largest, 270 feet long, will provide ramp connections from Route 4 to U.S. 92.

The other bridge, 180 feet long, will cross the Tomoka River parallel to an existing structure on U.S. 92 where this route is being four-laned.

A. F. Foster Bridge Corp. of Ojus has been awarded the contract and will have 200 working days to complete the project, Brewer said.

Interstate 4, one of four super-highways being built in Florida, is now complete or under construction from Sanford to a connection with U.S. 91 west of Daytona Beach.

Building Permit Fees Increased

The county zoning board approved a raise in building permit fees Wednesday night. There was no opposition to the proposal at the hearing.

At the present time building permits are \$1.50 for the first \$1,000 in valuation and the proposed change would mean \$3 for the first \$1,000 and \$1.50 for each \$1,000 in valuation up to \$15,000.

Final approval on the request is expected at next Tuesday's county commission meeting.

Shipment Probe
