REPORTS SHOW INDUSTRY HAS GONE '29 START

Business Statements Indicate Healthier Conditions Than At Most Other Periods

NEW YORK, Apr. 10. (INS)—The noise and confusion of the stock market, and heated discussion of money and banking situations have crowded from the financial records a good many excellent reports and statements of current industry and business in the United States but reactionary and hysterical stock markets have not wholly concealed the fact that business is good, in many cases exceptionally so, and on the average, on a year profitable basis than in any year since 1925.

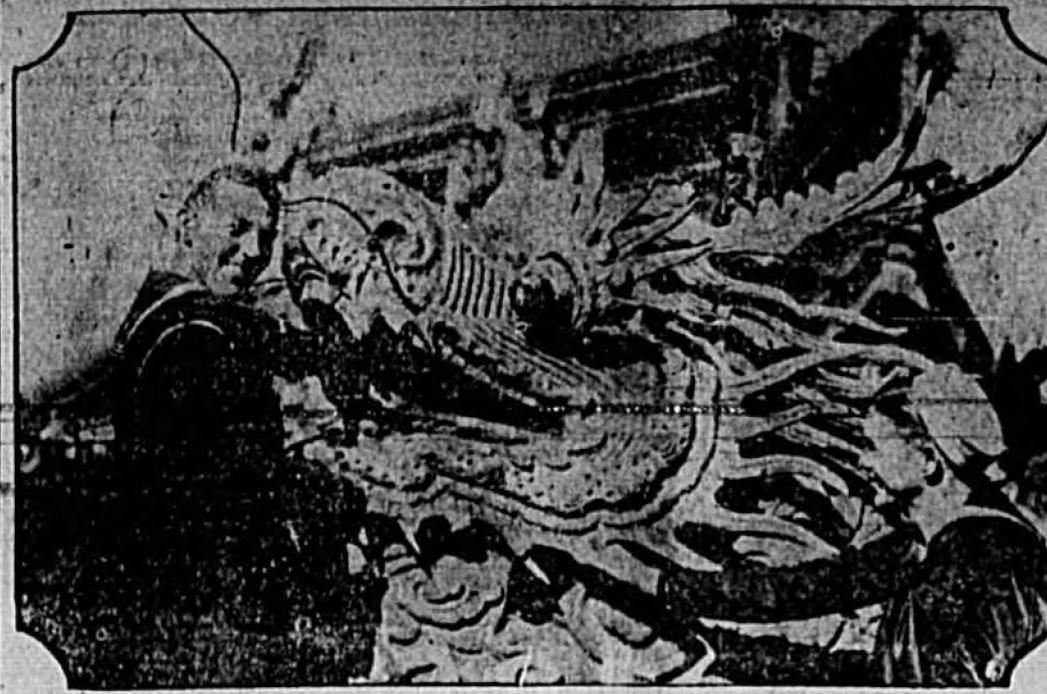

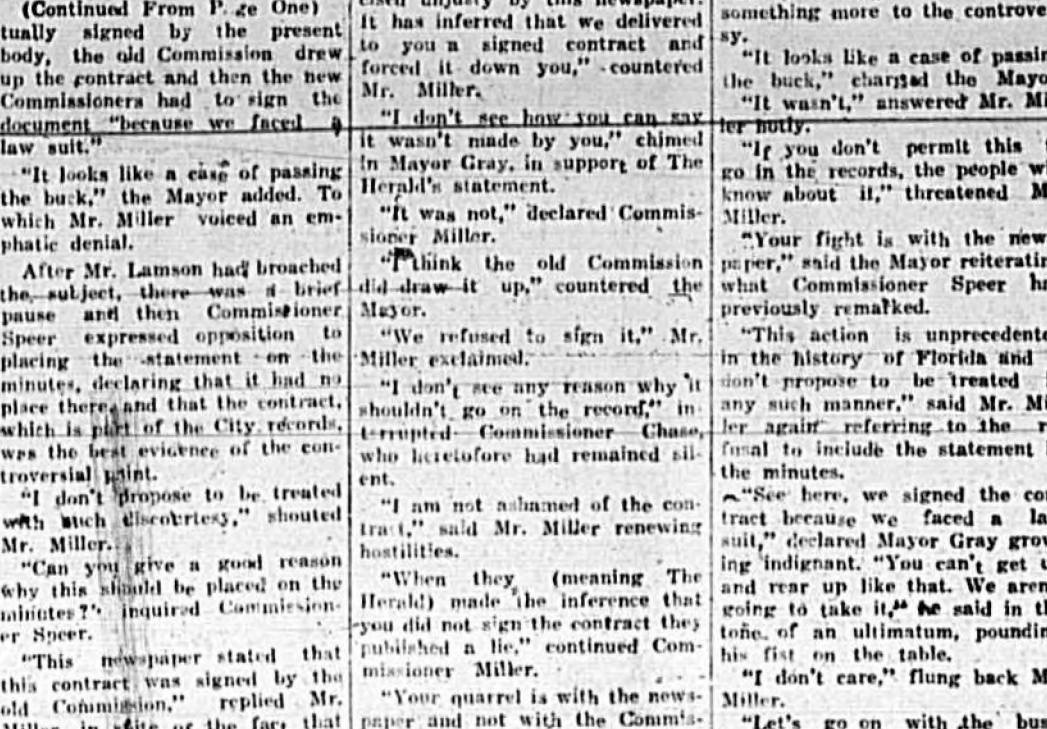

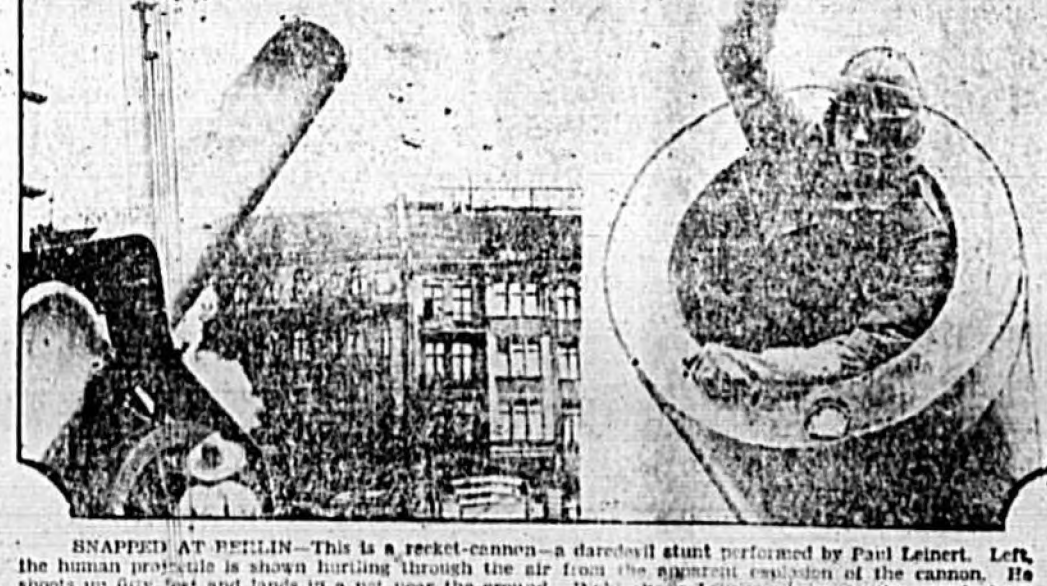

CALIFORNIA WILL HAVE SCHOOL OF AIR INSTRUCTION
Aviation Experts Are Watching Developments of College
NEW YORK, Apr. 10.—(INS)—Out in California, military and aviation experts will watch with keen interest the first non-profit endowed college of aeronautics to be established in the United States.
Captain G. Allen Hancock, Los Angeles banker and capitalist, who was the backer of the "Southern Cross" flight to Australia, in opening the college at Santa Maria on May 1.
The college will be patterned after the army and navy flying schools, with the same curriculum and semi-military discipline. According to military men in San Francisco, a graduate work rating will be ripe for army service.
Lieutenant Ross McBride of Los Angeles will head the faculty, while W. E. Strohbridge, former manager of the Los Angeles Philharmonic auditorium, has been appointed director of recreation and welfare.
Every phase of flying and air-plane mechanics, including experience with many makes of planes, will be taught at the college. Aerobatics, or stunt flying, will be a part of the advanced work because it is important in military maneuver, and emergency work. Special emphasis will be placed upon "instrument flying" instruction. Experiments have proved that expert flyers can be deceived as to balance, speed and direction when they trust their senses instead of watching their instruments, and this is thought to be the cause of unexplained crashes of experienced pilots.
