Steel production, now at 95 per cent of full steel-making capacier, is being fully maintained and no material decrease is looked for until the middle of May. The first quarter of the year made a new production record 10 per cent above the best previously established, and the second quarter la expected to compare favarably with any other similar period in Industrial history.

The leading industries which are good purchasers of steel are now in the market for their seasonal supplies, and with the possible exception of the building intry, are buying heavily. DoranSaysProhibition Agents Are Not Interested In Curbing

WASHINGTON, Apr. 10. (INS) - Federal prohibition authorities have no intention of getting mixed up in the "prohibition rebellion" at the University of Virginia, they said today. Fraternity houses enjoy the same privileges against invasion by dry agents as do private homes. Assitant Secretary of the Treasury Lowman and Prohibition Commissioner Doran were both agreed on this point today.
