The chartered plane, returning from the Michigan-Stanford football game at Palo Alto, Calif., crash landed on busy Beverly Boulevard in midtown Los Ange-

Hayter testified he knew he was low on gasoline when he was above Bakersfield, some 115 miles north of here. The pilot added he used about 60 gailons on the trip north and added 85 gailons and a quart of oil before taking off for the return trip to Burbank, instead of taking on 60 gallons to fill the



Progress Of Benelux

The Benelux combination of nations, Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg, is moving ahead toward t... accomplishment of its goal of a working customs union. Agreements have been reached lifting customs restrictions from about a third of the trade among the three nations. and there is expecation that the complete union may be achieved by the middle of 1950.

When the full agreement is set up, all trade is to move freely among the three nations. It cannot yet be predicted what arrangements will be made for the movements of people, but it would seem that the full benefits of customs union could not be realized unless it is made fairly simple. and easy for people to cross the borders where customs barriers are dropped.

The Benefix nations will become as one nation as far as trade is concerened. It is hard to imagine that they could trade freely among themselves without being drawn closer together in other ways.
